said. "It's kind of hard to describe really..." He waited, then began talking once more. "They called me at the shop and told me. "I told them they had to be kidding. They said they weren't. "I don't know. I didn't drive all that fast-65 or 70-I figured what was done was done." His voice started to trail off. "I washed my hands," he said.

They'd Talked About it
The huge mechanic's hands still looked grimy, and the slim silver wedding band shone incongruously. Porter lit an unfiltered cigarette, a Camel. "We'd talked about it a few times, what might happen if the bank were robbed," he responded to a question. "Actually, we always felt it would be one of the more difficult banks around here to rob. It's the location-central to

larger towns, but no big places where they could infiltrate into traffic and get themselves lost." Porter mentioned the couple's only child, a 20-year-old daughter, who lives

in Tulia. He said he passed her on the drive to Tulia, that she was on the way down to Petersburg. He didn't stop.

Suspect Nearby
A door started to swing open. It led to the room where one of the suspects was being held; officers apparently were to go to move the man.

Porter stepped forward toward the door, face muscles rigid and eyes seeming to water with what could have been rage. A law enforcement officer stopped him. "You don't want to go in there," the officer said. Shortley thereafter, Mrs. Porter was freed to go. Porter went ahead to the waiting car as friends slowly walked his wife.

The mechanic fumbled with the car keys, he had trouble getting the back door open. But it finally swung open. His wife got in, and he climbed in beside her and shut the door. The waiting was over.

Former Floydada Man Gives Alarm
During the robbery Mrs. Porter recognized the robber and called his name, sources said, apparently scaring the bandit. (The robber was a Petersburg native). "To me he seemed very nervous, he wasn't calm at all," Sell said. "That's what worried me."

Bank president Al Moody said the actual robbery lasted about 10 minutes. In those 10 minutes, two customers walked into the bank and were forced at gunpoint into the office. Two other customers entered the bank, saw the robbery was in progress, and left. One called police.

J. H. Burelsmith, a Petersburg farmer, said he walked into the bank "to do some banking business" and saw Sell with his hands above his head. "I just noticed something going on that didn't look like my business, so I just left," Burelsmith said.

Minutes later, Seaton Howard, 67, manager of the Petersburg Co-op Grain Co., entered the bank to make a deposit. Howard said he noticed the teller cages were empty and then looked into Moody's office where "I saw by friend (Sell) standing there with both hands in the air." (Howard is a native of Floydada.)

Officers Notified
Howard said he left the bank and went across the street to the city secretary's office to notify police and encountered Brewington preparing to return to the bank. Howard and Brewington called the Hale County Sheriff's Department and reported the robbery.

Inside the bank, Moody filled two cloth bags with cash from teller drawers and then from the vault. Then, Sell said, the robber "went down the line" of persons in the office "pointing the shotgun at each person and stopping on her (Mrs. Porter) and saying 'I want you.'" Moody said he told the robber to take him and not Mrs. Porter and was told, "Shut up or I'll blow your head off."

Sell said the robber took Mrs. Porter and Moody to the side door of the bank where he grabbed Mrs. Porter and ran into the alley.

Kathy Burk Gives Program

Miss Kathy Burk, home economist for Lighthouse Electric, presented a program on Christmas ideas for members of Homebuilders Home Demonstration Club at their regular meeting held November 23 in the Raymond Evans home.

Miss Burk displayed an assortment of very clever Christmas gifts and decorations she had made. Complete written instructions on making the items were given to members present.

Some of the gifts on display included arm puppets made from fur fabric using ping-pong balls for the eyes; a Christmas stocking with the wiggle toes, grandpa elf made of plastic foam balls; recycled containers for live plants such as a roasting pan. Miss Burk said the pan should be scrubbed and spray painted and attached to two lightweight metal chains, then suspended from the ceiling with hooks. She said some of the most unlikely items can be interesting habitats for plants. Such items as tea kettles, shaving mugs, earthenware crocks, coffee grinders and goldfish bowls may be used.

Miss Burk said bright colored yarn can transform a lightweight plastic flower pot with "wild and woolly" color by painting the bottom half of the pot with white

glue, then wrap several rows of each color of yarn around the pot and press into the glue. Repeat on top half.



Petersburg Bank Robbed

\$59,000 Seized; Hostage Safe

PETERSBURG—An Amarillo man and his son were captured late Tuesday near Tulia after a frenzied two-hour chase across the back roads of two counties and then charged with the brazen \$59,000 shotgun robbery of this city's only bank.

Charged in Hale County with aggravated robbery and aggravated kidnaping were Paul Breeding, 38, and Allen Wade Breeding, 18, both of Amarillo. Justice of the

Peace Glenn Stone set bonds of \$150,000 on each charge — \$300,000 on each man — and the suspects remained in Hale County Jail late Tuesday.

The suspects were arrested about two hours after the 2:10 p.m. robbery of the First State Bank after officers from several law agencies surrounded an abandoned farm house 5 miles east of Tulia and convinced the suspects to surrender.

Hostage Released Unharmed

A hostage taken by the robbers, bank teller Mrs. Leota Porter, was released unharmed to lawmen. Officers recovered the money and a shotgun.

Mrs. Porter told officers she recognized one of the men who took her hostage after the bank robbery. Petersburg residents said the suspect was a former resident of the Petersburg area and possibly a former classmate of the woman taken hostage.

A ski-masked man entered the First State Bank of Petersburg about 2:10 p.m. armed with a shotgun and forced a customer and all employees into bank president Al Moody's office, police said. There he demanded the cash from three teller drawers and the vault.

The man then took Mrs. Porter hostage and led her through the side door of the bank to a waiting car which fled north from the town of about 1,300.

Suspect Recognized
Mrs. Porter's recognition of one of the suspects was only one of several bizarre elements of the ill-fated and poorly-planned bank robbery—Petersburg's first in about 40 years.

At least four witnesses viewed the robbery from points inside and outside the bank, however police were not notified until the heist was well advanced and the final witness became aware of the robbery.

Accounts from witnesses placed the two suspects in a parked car in front of a pool parlor next to the bank at least 20 minutes prior to the robbery.

Wind Chill Index Chart

The temperature alone does not always tell the entire story about the weather. To know what clothing we should wear during the cold season we need to know what the "chilling effect" will be on the skin.

Or, we need to know what the Chill Index is. The chill index is a chart used to determine the combined effect of the temperature and the wind on the skin.

If the chill index is known, persons can better protect themselves from the cold before going outside.

Should the temperature be zero with no wind, a person does not lose heat as rapidly as when the temperature is 20 degrees and the wind is 20 miles per hour. The wind has a tremendous effect of the chilling effect of the actual temperature.

The chart at right is a "Wind Chill Index Table." Pick out the approximate temperature along the top of the chart and the approximate wind speed along the left side of the chart.

By following the two numbers into the graph the chill factor will be listed and will give a better indication of how cold the weather actually is.

What One Person Can Do

As a London nurse and social worker, Cicely Saunders became convinced that "You can live in dying." So she became a doctor to help people do just that.

St. Christopher's Hospice for terminally ill patients is the realization of her dream for a place dedicated to the special needs of the dying—physical, emotional and social—and their families.

At 30, Sister Saunders enrolled as a medical student. As a nurse, she had seen beyond the pain of death to feelings of defeat, loneliness and neglect. During her internship, she began planning and raising the \$1.2 million needed to build a special kind of hospice to care for the dying.

In 1967, Dr. Saunders founded St. Christopher's. There, families can visit at any time; children wander freely; even pets are welcome. Gloom is not evident. "It's a family community," says Dr. Saunders, "a caring place." An outdoor play area for children of staff members gives a cheerful sense of on-going life. A staff of 270 (including volunteers) cares for about 550 inpatients a year. Another 250 receive at-home care. Care is free. A weekly contribution

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
