


It is too painful to see the images or hear the stories over and over. Not that we want to forget. It is just that remembering is full of bad memories and images.



## Local Group Enjoys Tour Of NW Pacific Coast Area

The Friona contingent combined with people from all around the country to make up the whole tour group of around 50 people. There were eleven states represented from New York to California, with about a dozen folks from the area of Tallahassee, Florida.

The tour started out in Seattle where they visited the usual tourist attractions; the Space Needle, the Monorail, Washington University, the waterfront, a boat trip around Puget Sound, and a stop at Blake Island State Park where they enjoyed a meal of freshly caught salmon at the Tillicum Indian Village.

Carol's comment: "During a jaunt around Seattle with a local guide, we found out that cyber-giants Paul Allen and Bill Gates seemingly have a personal contest going on to see who can give the most charitable gifts to the city and the University. . . several thousand for a stadium, more thousands for an art center, thousands for a civic event center, more thousands for a museum, etc. You never saw a place with so many stadiums, domes, and gathering places!

Boeing and Starbucks are the main industries in Seattle, employing thousands of people and there is a Starbucks Coffee Shop on every street corner in Seattle."

The weather was exceptional during the trip and, in fact, was too warm in a few places. But the clear weather did allow for some fantastic views of mountains in the area; Mt. St. Helen's, Mt. Ranier, and Mt. Hood, plus part of the Cascade Mountain Range. The tour group visited Timberline Lodge, an old historic ski lodge at the foot of Mt. Hood, where there was snow on the mountain and young people were skiing on July 30th. Katherine Smith ventured about a quarter mile up the mountainside to bring down a snowball to show to some of the Floridians who had never seen snow before.

The bus stopped in one remote area for a few minutes to allow people to walk up a wooded path to view the actual wagon ruts of the Oregon Trail. Farther along the Columbia River Gorge area, they stopped to see the Bonneville Dam and

the beautiful double cascade of Multnomah Falls. Through the Willamette Valley and across the Coastal Mountain Range, the group got their first view of the Pacific Ocean along the wild and windy Oregon Coast at a place called Devil's Churn. Then in the southwestern corner of Oregon they took a chilly boat ride up the Rogue River at Gold Beach, Oregon. There were salmon and harbor seals in the water, racoon and mink along the shoreline, and a lot of bird life; osprey, Turkey vultures, cliff swallows, gulls, cormorans, Stellar jays, etc.

Carol's comment: "There were hydrangeas blooming everywhere on this trip, and the farther south we went along the coast, the deeper and more vibrant the colors became. Also there were wild sweet peas growing in patches alongside the highways and the colors ranged from light pink to fuchsia to light purples."

There are 51,000 acres of Giant Redwood trees along the "Avenue of the Giants." They average about 240 feet in height, but they can reach up to over 300 feet and over a thousand years old. The tour group stopped at a couple of different groves along the way to view the giant trees.

A small group of tired travelers returned to Friona on Carol's comment: "Gift shops were selling live burls from August 4th, from a tour of the Northwest and Pacific Coast the redwood trees. You put this wooden blob-looking thing, Carol's comment: "Gift shops were selling live burls from about the size of a sweet potato, into a shallow bowl of water and soon little tiny redwood trees grow up out of it. After about six to eight months, you can plant it. I bought one and now five little green dots are already starting to pop up. Drive by Maple Street in a few years and see how tall my five redwood trees have gotten to be by then."

The last couple of days on the tour were spent in San3 Francisco, the "City by the Bay." The tour folks walked out? onto the Golden Gate Bridge, had dinner in Chinatown, strolled through the Japanese Tea Garden, took a boat ride? around the bay, and saw the sights around Fisherman's Wharf. Buses are not allowed to drive down Lombard Street, which is famous as the "crookedest street in the world," with about seven hairpin turns down the steep hill in a one block area. However, the Tuckers and the Ellises later hailed a cab and got first hand experience at riding down Lombard Street.

Carol's comment: "Bill and I lived in the San Francisco area right after we graduated from Texas Tech in 1960, but? Texas called us back home. Because of the mild temperatures, there are a lot of homeless people in both Seattle and San Francisco. You could see them everywhere on the street corners and lounging in the parks. We learned that the city of San Francisco currently pays each homeless person \$400 per month. Now that we are retired, Bill and I are thinking about selling our house in Friona and joining the homeless folk in San Francisco to collect our \$800 each month."

Carol's final comment: "All during this trip, we enjoyed some of the best fresh fruit we've ever eaten. The West Coast has us all beat when it comes to growing fruit."







Surgeons are high risk too. He said that high risk malpractice premiums are the main reason the Friona Rural Health Clinic doctors do not perform surgery or deliver

> In economic terms there are not enough potential baby deliveries in Parmer County to pay for the malpractice premiums. With the relative lower cost of delivering a baby, and the higher premiums for the specialty, delivering babies is not a profitable operation here.

> He said the \$750,000 cap arbitrary non-economic damages applies to those people who claim mental anguish, or loss of companionship, or other nebulous emotional damage for

which sympathetic juries might award millions.

The second part of the proposition, no limit on actual economic damages, applies to cases where malpractice might result in a patient suffering thousands or millions in actual medical costs. In other words a hard dollar amount, not an emotional greedy one.

I am not in favor of more government interference in the lives of us Texans. Indeed medical costs are astronomical these days. What used to be simple medical procedures can today force many families to the brink of bankruptcy. Many more cannot afford health insurance, nor can they afford to go to the doctor.

Doctors make mistakes. At clinics and hospitals, like life in general, there are good and not so good medical personnel, doctors included. Yet to penalize all doctors at the expense of the few doesn't seem fair when life and death is involved.

Dr. Alexander also said that trial lawyer groups in Texas have spent over \$7 million to help defeat Proposition 12. That should tell you something about the importance of amendment. The question you have to ask is, just how much is loss of consort worth, especially if you had pretty much given up consorting anyway.

I plan to take the Lubbock A-J list along Saturday and vote accordingly. Right down the line. I'll be in and out in a matter of minutes. It's my duty. I'll be voting yes on Proposition 12. Just like they recommend. Hope to see you there.

## **Voting Suggestions** For September 13

The following are recommendations by the Lubbock Avalanche Journal Editorial Board for voting on the 22 proposed constitutional amendments on September 13th:

FOR Proposition 1-Allowing Veterans' Land Board to use excess assets to provide veterans' homes for the aged or infirm.

AGAINST Proposition 2-Establishing a two-year redemption

period for mineral interests sold at a tax sale. AGAINST Proposition 3-For a property tax exemption for land owned by a religious organization that could be used for expansion or

AGAINST Proposition 4-Allowing conservation and reclamation districts to develop parks and recreational facilities.

AGAINST Proposition 5-Exempting travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income to be exempted from

property taxes. FOR Proposition 6-Allowing use of a reverse mortgage to finance

a home equity loan.

FOR Proposition 7-Permitting six-person juries in district court misdemeanor trials.

FOR Proposition 8-Canceling elections for offices where candidates are unopposed. FOR Proposition 9-Adopting a total-return strategy for the

Permanent School Fund.

FOR Proposition 10-Allowing cities to donate used equipment to

rural volunteer fire departments. FOR Proposition 11-Allowing wineries to sell, manufacture and

dispense wine in any part of the state, even "dry" areas. FOR Proposition 12-Authorizing the legislature to determine

limitations for non-economic damages in medical and other liability FOR Proposition 13-Allowing the freezing of property taxes for

people who are disabled or 65 years or older.

FOR Proposition 14-Allowing borrowing by the Texas Transportation Commission to fund highway improvement projects. AGAINST Proposition 15-Guaranteeing benefits earned in local public retirement systems.

FOR Proposition 16-Authorizing home equity loans.

FOR Proposition 17-Freezing school district taxes for disabled people.

FOR Proposition 18-Canceling elections for unopposed candidates in political subdivisions


AGAINST Proposition 19-Removing authority of the legislature to create rural fire prevention districts.

AGAINST Proposition 20-Authorizing general obligation bonds for military enhancement projects.


AGAINST Proposition 21-Allowing current or retired faculty members of a public college or university to be paid for serving on

EARLIER THIS YEAR I promised Ron Carr that, although I would be retired by the time football started, I would write up the Friona varisity games for him this fall if he wanted me to.

Naturally, Ron remembered this, and here I am, partially out of retirement.

While writing the Chieftains' first game last week, it BILL ELLIS suddenly occurred to me that this is the 50th football season that I've been involved with reporting in some form or fashion. During the 1954-55 school term, I wrote up some games for the Muleshoe Journal, as well as calling in the results to the

Amarillo Daily News and the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. I continued to be the "correspondent" for the daily newspapers into my college years, and during my senior year in high school, I furnished the dailies with results of not only the Muleshoe basketball tournament, but also the other two tournaments in which they played, where the 'papers didn't have a correspondent. As I recall, the checks I received from Amarillo and Lubbock just about paid my gas money (they 6. wouldn't have paid for the gas these days!)

I had done some work while in high school for the late Gil Lamb at KMUL, Muleshoe, and when I started to Texas Tech, he hired me to come to the Muleshoe games on Fridays and do the play-by-play broadcast, which was replayed the next morning on the station, much the way Clint Mears and Mike Hutson do nowadays with their video broadcast.

In fact, the first Friona game I ever saw was in 1958, when I came up from Lubbock to tape the Chieftain-Mules game, played at the old Chieftain Field north of Highway 60,

where the junior high Braves now practice.

That game was the first football meeting between my high school alma-mater and the Chiefs in 17 years, although they had played 12 earlier games, beginning 'way back in 1936. The '58 game ended in a 0-0 tie, the only tie in the series.

Carol had accompanied me to most of the 1958 games, and has often reminded me that she married me even though I "dragged her out" to a number of high school games that fall, in a day when virtually none of the press boxes had glass windows, and probably no seats.

MY NEXT PROJECT is one for which I have been

collecting data for a number of years. I plan to publish a sports record book that will trace FHS records from as early as possible up to the present.

I plan to use as many team photos of as possible. I'm in pretty good shape on records since I started working at the Star, but I'm badly needing scores, records, team members' names, etc., for football seasons before 1931.

Anyone who has any old records, team photos, etc., from any of the past years are asked to contact me, so I can Jason Gutierrez 2-23-11.5 compare notes on what I have.

I started out to do just football, but have decided this wouldn't be fair to the outstanding basketball and track teams we've had in Friona. So--let me know if you have something I could use in my "project."



The Chieftains sputtered their first three possessions, and even spotted visiting Tulia a 6-0 first quarter lead in last Friday's game at Chieftain Field.

But the team could do little wrong the rest of the way, scoring on six of their next seven possessions, and holding the Hornets to just two first downs from the start of the second quarter to the game's end.

During the final three quarters, the Friona defense limited Tulia to only 22 net yards.

Tulia drove to the Friona 45 only to lose the ball, but Friona couldn't move the ball, and Brock Field's punt backed the Hornets up to their own four with 3:30 left in the opening quarter.

Three plays later, Tulia's Terrence Powell got loose on a 79-yard ramble to paydirt. The Hornets' PAT kick failed, but the Swisher County boys had grabbed the lead at 6-0, with 2:10 left in the first.

The Chiefs again failed to mount a drive, but the FHS defense rushed the Hornet punter and forced a short kick to the Tulia 44.

Friona took advantage of the break. Field gained nine on an option play, and two first downs later, he worked the keeper again for seven vards to the Tulia 13.

Sophomore Pedro Ramos carried twice, the second time being a ten-yarder, shaking off tacklers to record Friona's first TD of the game.

Antonio Monreal's first of six kicks gave the Chieftains the lead at 7-6 with 5:56 left in the half and Friona would never be seriously threatened the rest of the way.

Getting the ball back after holding Tulia on three plays, the Chiefs mounted another

It's been almost a month since I took the job of Interim Police Chief of the Friona Police Department and I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone I have met for the warm welcome I have received.

I would especially like to thank the police officers and dispatchers in the Police Department for their dedication to making this department function, as it should during the transition period. Their help to me is invaluable and the welcome they have extended to me is gratifying.

On a more serious note the State Legislature has passed the driver's license point system and the accompanying fines for 'poor driving habits'. Under this system moving violations will carry two points each. Violations that result in an accident will have three points each. The accumulation of six points in a three-year period will assess the driver a \$100 surcharge on their driver's license.

A no driver's license conviction will place a \$150 surcharge a year for three years on the violator, and driving without liability insurance will have a \$250 surcharge for the next three years.

As of today, Thursday, September 11th our officers will try to issue warnings for minor traffic violations whenever possible for a period of a few weeks. Any speeding violation in a school zone will not warrant a warning citation, and any speeding violation 25 miles over the posted limit will not get a warning citation. Running a stop sign will not get a warning citation.

All of the above violations have the potential of resulting in serious injury or death, and are taken very seriously by the police in any city. Our Municipal Judge Eddie Mays invited me to have lunch at the Senior Citizens Center last Thursday and I had a great meal. It was home cooked and I didn't have to do any dishes! I am looking forward to meeting more of the citizens of this very friendly town next Thursday.

I will attempt to keep you all informed as to what your police should have been removed department is doing so as long as I am filling the position of Chief, and I will try to have a column in this paper every two weeks. ## Cotton Market

According to traders, it is rare for the market to rally at this time of year unless there are major weather developments; however, cotton futures on the New York Cotton Exchange rallied to a fiveweek high Thursday on fund, trade, and options-related buying. The market also has been rallying on anxiety over the size of the U.S. cotton crop.

"This is a tough time of year," David Stanford, PCCA's vice president of marketing, explained. "Weather is a topic of conversation for everyone in the cotton industry since it is a pivotal factor in the direction of prices in the cotton market, especially when the market is almost void of substantial news. Analysts will continue to monitor the weather and crop conditions for the next few months until we know the size of the U.S. crop," he continued.

Most of the U.S. crop still looks promising, and crop prospects in the Southeast are better than they have been in several years. The crops there have received excellent rain this growing season, and if weather conditions continue to cooperate through harvest time, Georgia could produce 2.0 million bales, considerably higher than the norm for the state. In the Far West, there are encouraging prospects for the crops in California and Arizona as well where less pima and more upland cotton was planted this season.

"The cotton crop was planted late all the way from the East Coast to the Southwest," said Stanford. "The crop is highly subject to weather damage around harvest time, and there is a possibility of both yield and quality loss if adverse weather hits the crop in the fall."

Cotton production in the southwestern cotton producing states poses the greatest concern to analysts. The region has suffered substantial weather-related difficulties this season. In fact, a sizeable amount of cotton planted in Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas was considerably later than usual, and much of the crop was further hindered by a lack of rainfall during peak growing periods.

Although there are bright spots in parts of the Texas High Plains, the state's largest cotton producing area is expected to produce less cotton than it has in past years. Meanwhile, the South Texas crop, the first off the stalk in the United States, is of excellent quality.

"The South Texas cotton we've handled this year has been of superior quality and strength," Stanford explained. "It certainly will meet the demand in the present marketplace and will not be difficult to move. Conversely, we expect the average qualityof West Texas cotton to fall below last year's standards due to a combination of drought conditions and losses in irrigated production which will result in a much higher percentage of this year's harvest coming from dryland acreage," he concluded.

In other news, USDA's weekly export report was at the lower end of analysts' expectations and was construed as neutral to the market.\* According to the department, net upland sales of 77,400 bales in the week ended Aug. 28 were 22 percent less than the previous week. Mexico, Thailand, and Colombia were featured buyers. Exports of 129,300 bales equaled the volume of a week earlier but were 48 percent less than the four-week average.

Meanwhile, activity increased considerably on the spot cotton scene. Online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers in the four trading days ended Sept. 4 totaled 55,784 bales compared to 27,504 bales the previous week. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 47.70 to 48.98 cents per pound versus the previous week's range of 47.54 to 49.28 cents per pound.

**Corn Producers Encourage Continuation Of Existing Congressional Districts** 

The 15-member Corn Producers Association of Texas (CPAT) board recently met in Lubbock and discussed the current legislative redistricting situation. The overall consensus of the board was that they are in favor of maintaining the districts as they are.

The proposed changes that have surfaced are causing many concerns across the corn producing areas of Texas. Many key issues concerning those producers will be discussed during this and upcoming sessions of congress.

CPAT president and Muleshoe producer Jimmy Wedel said, "The current districts provide adequate representation for all citizens and to the agricultural and rural communities in the state. It is very important that this representation is maintained because of the significant impact agriculture has to the overall economy of the state."

CPAT believes that if the proposed changes are accepted, putting more diversified areas into a district, that agricultural interests and rural representation will be diluted. It would best serve the state to have districts grouped that recognize similarity in crops, climate and growing conditions.

"The importance of maintaining representation for all communities should be the highest priority for the legislative districts, and party affiliation should not be the top priority for determining the lines," said Scott Averhoff, CPAT vice-president from Waxahachie.

CPAT urges that this issue be brought to a rapid conclusion so that other key issues concerning the state can be resolved.

#### Dept. of Security Awards \$31.4 Million to Texas

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has awarded a grant of \$31,370,000 to the Texas Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) to prepare for threats posed by Weapons of Mass Destruction, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, announced Thursday.



#### U.S. Cotton Bracing for Media Onslaught As **WTO Negotiations Resume**

LUBBOCK, September 5, 2003 By Shawn Wade With next week's resumption of the Doha Round of WTO Trade Negotiations in Cancun, Mexico, U.S. cotton industry officials have been busy fielding media inquiries from around the world.

The efforts of the international media to cover the pending negotiations, fueled by the claims and often one-sided information provided by special interest groups worldwide, have been a cresting wave that is expected to break in the next few days.

Given the recent track record of media stories and editorials it is hard to imagine that a positive picture of U.S. farm or trade policy will be put forth.

Closer to home Plains Cotton Growers dealt closely with reporters from the London-base newspaper The Guardian in mid-August. The Guardian's story is expected to run as early as the weekend of September 6-7, just before the Cancun talks get underway.

**Pay Limit Commission Issues Final Report** 

LUBBOCK, September 5, 2003 By Shawn Wade It has been a long time coming, but finally the report from the Commission on the Application of Payment Limitations for Agriculture has been released.

The full report, which spans a total of 170 pages, provides recommendations and analysis regarding current payment limitation

The good news for cotton in particular is that the report stops well short of recommending wholesale changes to current rules.

In fact, the key recommendations put forth by the Commission were that changes to payment limit rules would have a negative impact on U.S. agriculture in general. The report also states that consideration of pay limit changes is best left until the next Farm Bill and that any changes that are adopted be phased in over a period of

Other recommendations put forth by the Commission were:

 The need for additional resources to be allocated to the Farm Service Agency and Office of the Inspector General to improve oversight and implementation of the rules and prevent abuse of the program;

Payment limit rules and regulations should not encourage producers to choose a form of business organization they would not otherwise consider;

Rules should not cause producers to take on production or marketing risks they would not otherwise undertake;

Efforts to change payment limit policies should strive to make those policies meaningful, transparent and simple;

Changes in payment limits should be sensitive to the differences in commodities, regions and existing agribusiness infrastructure; and,

USDA should increase efforts to provide more complete data on farm program benefits.

The Commission's recommendations were also prefaced by the need for additional study to better understand how payment limit rules affect producers today so that potential changes to those rules can be more accurately anticipated.

The report also emphasizes the many different reasons that payments are made to producers and the complex interactions that each payment type has with another.

Critics and supporters alike will no doubt find information to support their arguments in the details of the report. On its face, however, the recommendation that no changes be made at this time is s positive statement that program supporters can use to fend off future attempts to change current rules.

#### Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

We possess the broadest freedom to travel of any nation. Each year, Texans take to the roads and skies to visit family and friends, relax and explore new cultures.

The freedom to travel is critically linked with our freedoms of assembly, association and speech. Former Supreme Court Justice William Douglas said "freedom of movement is the very essence of our free society, setting us apart...it often makes all other rights meaningful." Travel allows us to explore, hear new ideas, and enable other cultures to understand who we are as a country.

Average Americans are this country's strongest ambassadors.

Virtually unimpeded, we freely travel throughout the world. Yet, we cannot freely visit one of the top Caribbean destinations - Cuba. Just a brief flight from Texas, Cuba is the largest and most populous Caribbean island. An estimated 2.8 million U.S. citizens and over 200,000 Texans would travel annually to Cuba, if allowed.

Cuba annually attracts more tourists than the Bahamas, Jamaica or the U.S. Virgin Islands. International visitors to Cuba come from all walks of life, growing from 327,000 visitors in 1990 to almost 1.7 million in 2002. During the first quarter of 2003, Cuba experienced a 19 percent growth in international visitors over the same period in 2002. Except for a scattering of U.S. government screened individuals, Americans are not a part of this exchange.

While the U.S. Supreme Court has recognized that our federal government can restrict travel, restrictions can be only put in place for serious national security concerns. How is it that we can freely

travel to North Korea and not to Cuba? The reason can be found in aged and failed U.S. policy toward Cuba, put in place more than 40 years ago. Typically referred to as the "Cuba embargo", these policies were intended to end Fidel Castro's political domination in Cuba. However, our policies have had the opposite effect. Our policies have become Cuba's scapegoat for its own government failures. Fidel Castro's political domination in Cuba has outlived nine U.S. presidencies.

Both Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch have found that our embargo has made human rights conditions worse rather than better for Cubans. Both organizations have called for the end of our travel restrictions and economic embargo.

While having no desired impact on Cuba, our embargo has had significant, negative consequences on Texas employment and our international exports. The embargo is costing Texas thousands of jobs and over \$300 million a year in exports of Texas produced commodities.

Over time, lifting the travel restriction would expand annual economic output in the U.S. by at least \$1.2 billion, creating between 17,000 and 23,000 new U.S. jobs. Many of these new jobs would occur with Texas employers such as Continental and American Airlines. Texas ports, rural small businesses ad international exporters located in Texas cities would all benefit from lifting travel

Across Texas, we are uniting our voices to say that Congress should admit its Cuba travel restrictions on U.S. citizens are counterproductive. It is time to immediately pass the appropriate legislation and bring these restrictions to an end, replacing and solation policy with a policy of engagement.

If we truly want freedom to spread, then we need it at home first.

#### Common Cold **Cures Cancer**

A team of brain cancer researchers caught a nasty cold-one that destroys brain tumors.

Led by researchers at the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, the team says it successfully treated the deadliest form of brain cancer, malignant glioma, using a modified strain of the common cold.

Gliomas arise from glial cells in the brain and represent 44 percent of all brain tumors, according to the Brain Tumor Society. Glioblastomas are the most common type of glioma and fewer than 3 percent of patients survive five years post diagnosis.

Dr. Juan Fueyo, an assistant professor in M.D. Anderson's Neuro-Oncology Department, and a team of researchers implanted human glioblastoma tumors in the brains of mice and then injected the modified cold virus directly into the tumors. After four months, all that was left where the tumor once thrived was an empty cavity and scar tissue, according to the researchers.

Fueyo says that the therapy has potential but needs more study. "We've never seen this kind of response before with any other treatment tested in either animals or humans," Fueyo says.

The National Cancer Institute committed \$1 million to develop a drug-grade version of the therapy to test in humans. Researchers say clinical trials could begin by late 2004.
