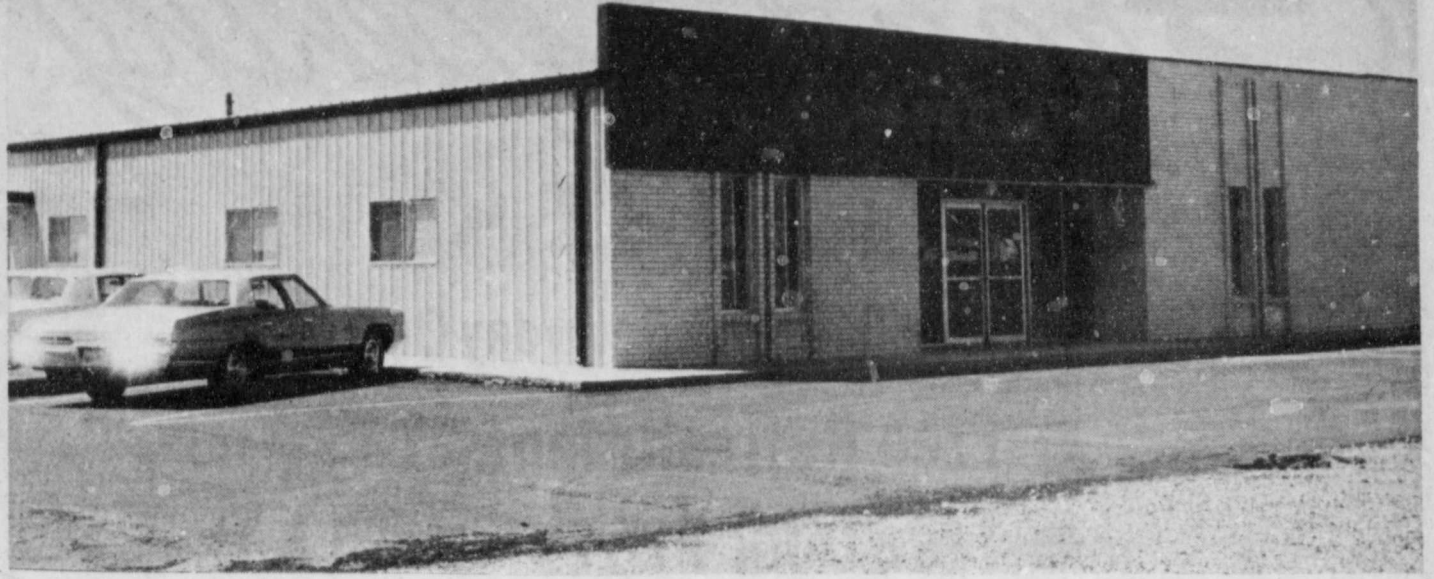
Rhonda Jordan and Sylvia Martinez beat Lockney 6-2, 6-3 and then lost to number two seeded Tulia 6-1, 6-2.

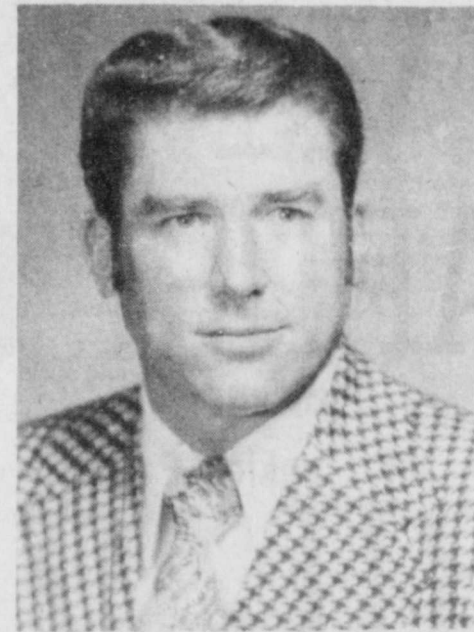
Spanish Revival At First Baptist

Mayor Parnell Powell read Carthel's resignation at the Tuesday night meeting and the council accepted it "with regret."

Jarrett has lived in Floydada since 1945 and is a native of Floyd County. He is a brother to Floyd County commissioner Bob Jarrett.

The council again visited with D. H. Pope of TV Signal Service in Paducah about putting in cable TV here. Pope said the cable would bring the Lubbock stations, plus a "movie channel, an educational channel, and a local church channel."

The council will study the possibilities of cable in a special called meeting later this month. The monthly charge for cable TV would be around \$8.25 according to Pope.

Hagood's Department Store Closing Business

One of Floydada's three department stores, Hagood's, officially began its closing business sale Tuesday. The business, which has been here some 40 years was owned by Dan Hagood.

The decision to close the store was not made because of lack of business, but the continual problems of hiring employees and the risks of buying almost a year ahead of selling season.

Cecil Hagood began the business back in February of 1937 at the location now occupied by Thompson Pharmacy. Cecil moved here from Lorenzo. He was formerly from Tulia.

Dan bought the business from his father in 1963, then decided to enter farming in 1968. Manager of the business Earl Minter had planned on retiring this fall.

Cecil owns the building, and said he would be trying to rent it. Hagood's featured mostly nationally advertised merchandise and wearing apparel for every member of the family.

Wednesday Dan Hagood said, "I want to say that we appreciate so much our loyal and dedicated manager and employees who have done a good job of operating the store...and in the six or seven stores that our family has closed out in the years past, this is the most fantastic first day of sales I have ever seen."

Dan also said he and his family appreciated the loyal patronage of the Floydada trade area people ever since the store opened here.

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President Carter Spends 50 Minutes With FU Presidents

WASHINGTON, D.C.— National Farmers Union officials from 22 states had a wide-ranging 80-minute discussion late Tuesday afternoon at the White House in which the farm group leaders indicated that "dismay" of the nation's farmers with farm commodity support rates established for 1977 and proposed for 1978.

President Jimmy Carter spent 50 minutes with the Farmers Union presidents, including Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco.

The discussion included Vice President Walter Mondale and Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland. "I thought it was a worthwhile meeting," said TFU President Jay Naman. "The President expressed concern at the negative reaction from farmers to his proposed farm program."

"From the campaign assurances, farmers expected that support protection at the cost of production meant the full cost of production. What we have gotten so far is an almost straight-line extension of the Butz support levels," National President of the Farmers Union Tony Dechant said. "On top of that we are being nickel-and-dimed in the budget process."

President Carter said that "for the future we would like to have a stable agriculture with an aggressive export capability."

The President noted Monday's increases in support levels for 1977 and the recommended levels for the four-year farm bill and said he regarded them as "better than the Butz figures."

Carter said that the support levels would be reviewed, but gave no indication of when changes might be made. "There will be adjustments as we find them possible," he said.

The President asked the Farmers Union leaders to keep in close and frequent consultation with him and the Department of Agriculture.

"We trust your judgment and need your advice even if we cannot entirely agree," he said. "We're approachable."

Florida Freeze Affects Texas Citrus Market

Tie downs can be an effective means of preventing a mobile home from being pushed or rolled off its blocks by the wind, according to a study conducted by the University of Michigan, says Mrs. Jane Berry, housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas

AUSTIN--Texas-grown oranges and grapefruit are some of the juiciest and sweetest ever produced and have been damaged only by adverse publicity concerning damaged Florida fruit.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has reported a "serious marketing situation" in the lower Rio Grande Valley. Consumers began shying away from state-produced citrus in reaction to national publicity

depicting damaged fruit and predicting drastic price increases following the Florida freeze.

"We have more fruit on the trees for this time of year than in recent memory," commented Ed Miller, general manager of Texas-Sweet, Inc. "Oranges and grapefruit are just not moving. The situation is getting very serious."

Another citrus spokesman, Lesley Whitlock of the Texas Valley Citrus Committee, said the quality of the grapefruit and oranges was "better than ever."

"In fact," Whitlock said, "at this time of the year it is really at its best." He explained that the juice content was very high, the fruit very firm and that the longer the fruit—especially grapefruit—stayed on the tree, the higher the sugar content.

Those marks are not a sign of inferior fruit, but are caused by the warm winds of the Lower Rio Grande Valley blowing against the young fruit as it's growing.

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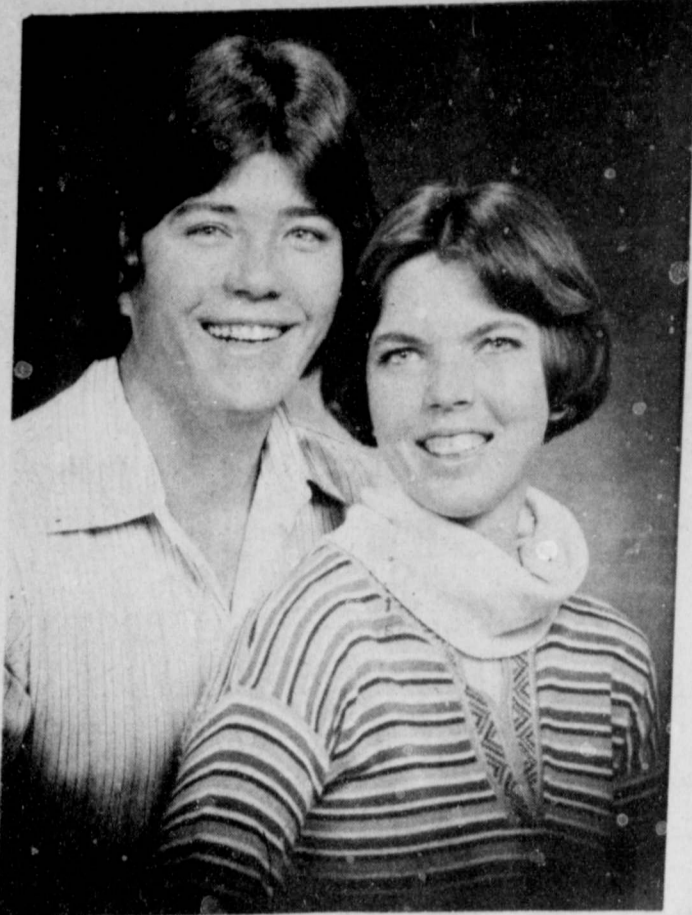

NEWS 'N' NOTES

(by Sharon Hillis)

Meat is an outstanding nutritious package, because it can be entirely assimilated in the human body.

Research has shown that a diet deficient in animal foods can lead to a B-12 deficiency, a cause of pernicious anemia. Babies nursed by vegetarian mothers have also suffered from this B-12 deficiency.

Meat provides a high quality protein—including all of the essential amino acids (building blocks of protein). Besides protein, a three ounce serving of meat provides the daily dietary recommended allowances of the B vitamins—thiamin, riboflavin, niacin, B-6, B-12, iron and zinc.

Meats also provides vital phosphorous, potassium, and essential micro-nutrients, many of which cannot be duplicated. One serving of liver a week provides

enough vitamin A for the entire week and is a primary source of vitamin B-12.

Meat is the best dietary source of iron to prevent anemia. Iron is especially necessary for growing children, teen-age males, and females ages 11-52. During pregnancy and lactation, there is an increased need for iron. The dietary recommended allowances of iron ranges from 10-18 milligrams depending on age and sex. A three ounce serving of liver provides 18 milligrams and heart, 5.4 milligrams per serving. The muscle parts of other meats besides beef are also good sources along with oysters, dried beans and dried fruit.

The average adult requires only two (two and one-half to three ounce) servings from the meat group foods daily, along with foods from the other three food

Another Hearing Set On County Budget Proposals

Due to the absence of a commissioner Monday morning Commissioner's Court have scheduled another meeting for 10:30 a.m. May 9, 1977 for the Revenue Sharing budget adoption. Voting of the spending of Revenue Money was tied two to two and the lack of majority votes required the second meeting.

Bob Jarrett made the motion that proposed Revenue Sharing budget be changed from \$49,408 to the sum of \$59,289.60 for county precincts and that the Muncy Road project remain at \$20,000; Floyd County Museum, \$1,000; Day Care Center, \$1,000; High Plains Health and Mental Retardation Center, \$3,200 and drop the proposed \$24,208 for county library, agriculture

building and jail to \$14,326.40 for jail only.

Voting for the proposal with Jarrett was Grigsby Milton. Voting against the proposal were Judge J. K. Holmes and Aaron Carthel. Jack Lackey was unable to attend the meeting, therefore the motion failed for lack of majority requiring a second hearing on May 9.

Commissioners canvassed precinct and common school votes which were found to be satisfactory, then accepted the resignation of Floyd County Librarian Nita Merle Hull effective July 31, 1977.

Milton made the motion, seconded by Carthel, that the equalization board hearing be set for Wednesday, June 8, 1977 at 9 a.m.

Sales Tax Man In Floydada Today

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced he is sending a representative from his Lubbock office to Floydada on Thursday, April 14th to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

"If Floydada-area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Mr. Bogus will be there to assist them," Bullock

As we approach another Tax Day (April 15), there are a couple of bills pending in the House of Representatives which will be of interest to many persons in the Floyd County area.

Some 54 million Americans are hit with an income tax penalty of up to 20% because they are single, or because they are married with both partners working. The Committee of Single Taxpayers (COST) has been working for several years to eliminate this inequity. To accomplish this goal, Rep. Ed Koch has again introduced HR 850 in the House.

Also pending in the House is HR 84, introduced by Rep. Herb Harris, which would make a beginning toward income tax equality for renters, similar to what has for so long been available to homeowners.

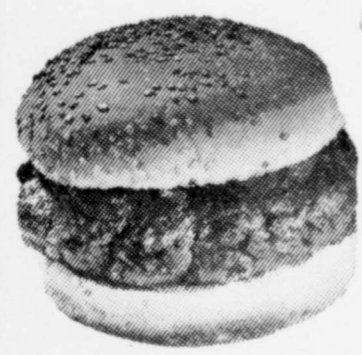

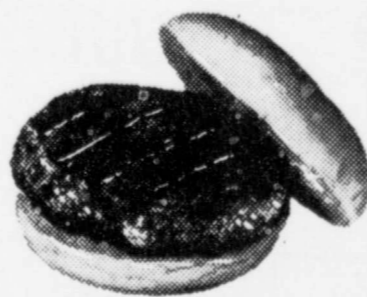

...would benefit from soil water remaining after an irrigated crop. In addition, he checked disking and sweeping for tillage in both the continuous and the alternate systems. With irrigation, beds were formed prior to planting with either tillage method. Dryland plots were left flat. Ammonium nitrate fertilizer was used. Irrigated plots received 120 pounds per acre of nitrogen. Tascosa wheat was planted at 30 pounds per acre on dryland. One bushel per acre of TAM-101 was planted for irrigation.

...separate areas was 47 bushels per acre. Where dryland and irrigated wheat were alternated, yield increased to 52 bushels per acre. Unger states that this extra 5 bushels per acre of wheat is profit. The alternate system took the same amount of irrigation water as continuously irrigated wheat, provided equal areas were irrigated. "Farmers having a lot more land than irrigation water will find that alternate irrigated wheat will pay dividends," Unger said.

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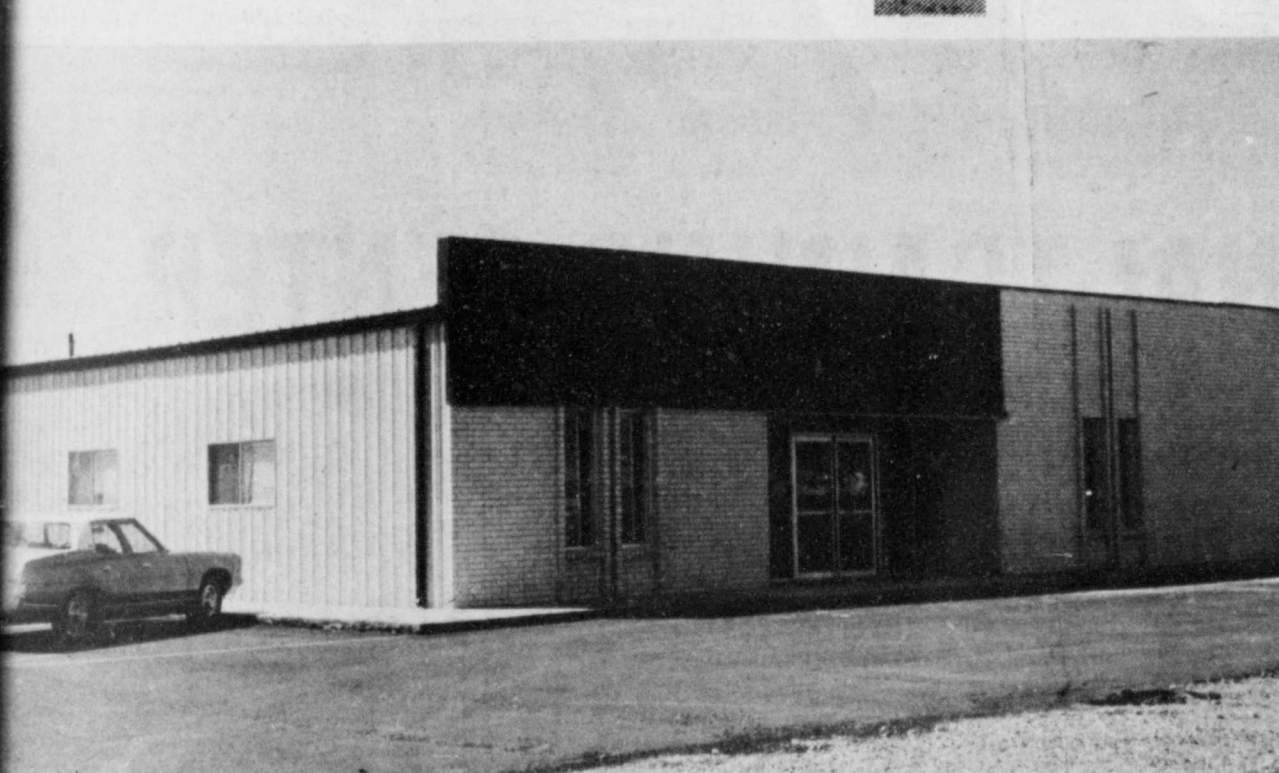

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First 1977 Cooperation Tax Estimate Payment Due Soon

Corporations operating on a calendar year tax basis with an expected income tax liability of at least \$40 are required to pay estimated taxes by Friday, April 15.

When the payments are deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, they must be accompanied by Form 503, "Federal Tax Deposit, Corporation Income Taxes," the Internal Revenue Service said.

The amount deposited by April 15 should cover one

quarter of the 1977 estimated tax. The estimated tax and the amount of each installment can be computed on Form 1120-W, "Worksheet Corporation Estimated Income Tax," which is not filed with the IRS but retained in the corporation's records, according to the IRS.

Supplies of Form 1120-W and a helpful pamphlet, IRS Publication 542, "Corporations and the Federal Income Tax," are available free from local IRS offices.

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The Floyd Philosopher
Takes A Possibly Inadequate Look
At The Senate's New Ethics Bill



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm takes a sidelong glance at the Senate's new ethics bill this week.

Dear editor:
 As I understand it, the U.S. Senate has passed an ethics bill. It's not, as some people first thought, a bill banning ethics. No, no, it's another branch of the government that's in charge of banning, and it was saccharin, not ethics, that was banned. Nobody has yet proved that ethics causes cancer in rats.

The Senate bill attempts to define ethics for the benefit of any Senators who heretofore didn't know what it was.

It was no easy task. It was like Lewis and Clark exploring the west. They were in unfamiliar territory.

Mainly, the bill declares that a Senator's warned income from the outside, like money accepted for making speeches before his committee, can't exceed 15 per cent of his yearly salary, which is now \$54,000. That means he's limited to \$8,600 a year in earned income. Any bribe beyond that is unethical.

What "earned" income is threw the Senate into an uproar. Some members were afraid it

meant they had to earn their regular Senate salary and they weren't about to vote to have their pay cut in half. Senators with large holdings such as oil and gas wells, stocks and bonds, certificates of deposit, family businesses, etc., didn't want to have to limit their outside income to \$8,600 a year. That'd be carrying ethics too far. It costs that much just to keep a kid in Harvard, and more than that to keep him out of jail.

Another thorny problem was how to classify the income of a Senator who owns a farm and spends his weekends telling his hired hand what to do. Should his farm income be limited to \$8,600 a year? This buffaloes me. I've always thought it ought to be against the law for a farmer to make less than \$8,600 a year, not more. If that Senator can do it just on weekends, he ought to be Secretary of Agriculture.

The gist of the ethics bill as finally boiled down and passed is that a Senator cannot ethically get paid for more than \$8,600 worth of speeches a year. It sets no limit on the amount of free speeches he can make.

The bill doesn't go far enough.

Brown Takes Over State Ag Department

AUSTIN--Reagan V. Brown of Bryan has been named the seventh Texas Commissioner of Agriculture since the position was initiated in 1907.

Brown was appointed by Governor Dolph Briscoe to serve out the remaining term of John C. White, recently named U.S. Deputy Secretary of Agriculture to the Carter cabinet.

A popular public speaker throughout the state, Brown has been a special assistant for agriculture and rural development on Briscoe's staff since March, 1974. He has been in charge of rural development and agricultural programs and has been involved with industrial and job creation programs.

Bringing his knowledge of agriculture from nearly 30 years with the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service, Brown has pledged his efforts to see Texas the number one agricultural producer in the nation.

In accepting the nomination, Brown included energy, water, cattle prices and soil depletion among the major agricultural problems being faced in the state today. He also stressed the need to keep Texas farming and ranching profitable.

The new commissioner holds masters' degrees in rural sociology and educational psychology. For many years he was in charge

Added Moisture Generally Aids Dry Cropland Throughout State

AUSTIN--Recent rains were a welcome sight in most areas of the state, although excessive amounts caused flooding in North and East Texas, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The widespread rain should offer some relief to hard-hit fields on the Plains and Edwards Plateau. Some farmers in the Edwards Plateau and a few East Texas areas had delayed planting until rain fell, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service has

reported, and progress should be in full swing this week.

Cotton planting continued active in Central and South Texas and is currently four per cent complete, well behind the 1976 rate of eight per cent. Many fields in the Lower Rio Grande Valley are up to good stands, TDA experts say, with some worms reported in early fields in South Texas and the Coastal Bend.

Sorghum planting jumped ahead again last week and is now 38 per cent complete,



77 Onion Crop 'Crying Shame'

AUSTIN--The 1977 spring onion crop will most likely have everyone in tears—both the consumer and the producer—since this year's harvest will be almost half that of 1976, according to reports from the Texas Department of Agriculture. Cool, wet weather throughout the winter months have slowed crop development and normal cultivation for weed control, and have slashed yields in the Lower Valley, Laredo, and San Antonio Winter Garden areas. This year's crop, which should go on the market this week, is the smallest since 1966.

A total of five million 50-pound sacks are to be harvested, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, compared to 9.7 million sacks last year. Prices are already reflecting the shortages, with jumbo onions selling for \$18 per 50-pound sack and \$14 to \$15 for medium onions.

Marketing experts predict that prices will remain at that level throughout the season, possibly rising even higher.
