Bass Put In Mackenzie Lake

LUBBOCK-Bass fishing received a shot in the arm last week as the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocked 350,000 smallmouth bass in two area

The inch-long bass were transported from the state fish hatchery at San Marcos and 40,000 were put in Mackenzie Lake near Silverton and 310,000 were stocked in Lake Meredith near

The trip from central Texas was made without incident and very few bass were lost from the shock of transporting over the long distance. Agitators and bottled oxygen were used during the trip to keep the young fighters healthy.

These smallmouths are the offspring of Tennessee smallmouth brought to

Texas two years ago. Several Texas lakes now have a catchable population of smallmouth bass including Lake Meredith where anglers are catching some nice one-pound fish.

Both Meredith and Mackenzie lakes have the required habitat that smallmouth bass prefer which includes rocky points, and deep, cool water.

Anglers are finding that the new import prefers about the same lures and bait as the native largemouth bass of the Panhandle and South Plains reservoirs.



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Is The Year To Stamp Out Screwworm

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MAY 9-14, 1977

(1) The weather is on our side. The cold winter has kept most screwworm flies dormant, inhibiting mating and thereby reducing the fly population ranchers will have to face in the spring;

(2) The new screwworm production plant near Tuxla Gutierrez, Mexico, opened in July 1976 and has been producing millions of sterile flies ever since. Over 200 million sterile flies now are being raised each week in Mexico. Added to the Mission production, that gives the program about 400 million sterile flies each week to use in the stamp out effort;

(3) A new strain of sterile flies-many feel the best strain ever-was introduced last spring and seems to be a strain of "super flies." Scientists believe this "009" strain is the first time a complete strain change has ever been made at Mission. This means we now have flies which fly and mate at the same time the wild fly does-in short, a

competitive, aggressive fly. These three points, added to the ongoing hard work at the Mission, Texas, screwworm plant, make 1977 THE year for ridding the U.S. of screwworms.

There's only one catch. Sterile flies cannot do the

job alone. It is not an excuse, it is the simple truth. Sterile flies only work when the fertile population is low. The fertile population is kept low by rancher cooperation such as treating all wounds and postponing wounding operations. The screwworm program needs your help more than ever this year. It's an old refrain-Inspect, Collect and Treat-but this

year it's the song of success. Only if everyone-especially ranchers and pet owners-cooperates fully by inspecting animals frequently for screwworm infested wounds, by collecting worm samples and sending them in to the Mission plant for identification and by treating all wounds with approv-

ed insecticides, can the weather, the Mexico plant and the new fly strain make a difference. (Sample viles may be obtained at the Floyd County Extension Office-Courthouse-Ag. Buil-
