Bass Put In Mackenzie Lake

LUBBOCK—Bass fishing received a shot in the arm last week as the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocked 350,000 smallmouth bass in two area lakes.

The inch-long bass were transported from the state fish hatchery at San Marcos and 40,000 were put in Mackenzie Lake near Silverton and 310,000 were stocked in Lake Meredith near Fritch.

The trip from central Texas was made without incident and very few bass were lost from the shock of transporting over the long distance. Agitators and bottled oxygen were used during the trip to keep the young fishers healthy.

These smallmouths are the offspring of Tennessee smallmouth brought to

County Commissioners will meet Monday to discuss a revenue sharing budget for monthly meeting in the afternoon. The meeting will start at 10:30.



The agenda includes several other items: appoint county librarian, discuss chemicals for road application, sign easement for Southwestern Public Service, organize equalization board, visit with county tax assessor-collector Jonelle Fawver and discuss mini-bus.

The proposed budget, made from suggestions received from Floyd County citizens at the Public Hearing on March 14, includes the following items:

This budget reduces the amount the Commissioners' precincts receive for road maintenance to 50% of the funds. The Commissioners had received 60% of the funds from the past Revenue Sharing program.

The Muncy Farm to Market Road in Precinct #2 and Precinct #3 is allocated \$20,000.00 to complete the purchase of rights of way, moving utilities and other expenses. A total of \$40,000.00 has been set aside for this project. Small amounts to the museum, Day Care Center, and Mental Health Center in Plainview will leave \$25,208.00 in an Agriculture, Jail and Library fund for rebuilding or improving these buildings. Additional money will be added to this fund in the next three years.

Joe played in the Texas Jr. College All Star game earlier this year, was named "All Texas Eastern Jr. College Conference" and all regional team.

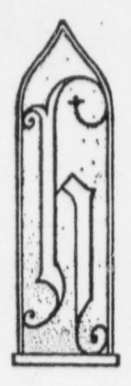

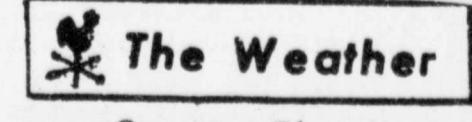

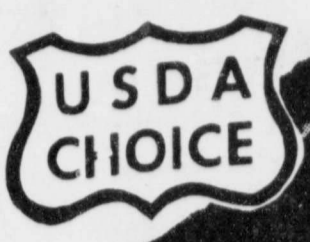

(1) The weather is on our side. The cold winter has kept most screwworm flies dormant, inhibiting mating and thereby reducing the fly population ranchers will have to face in the spring;

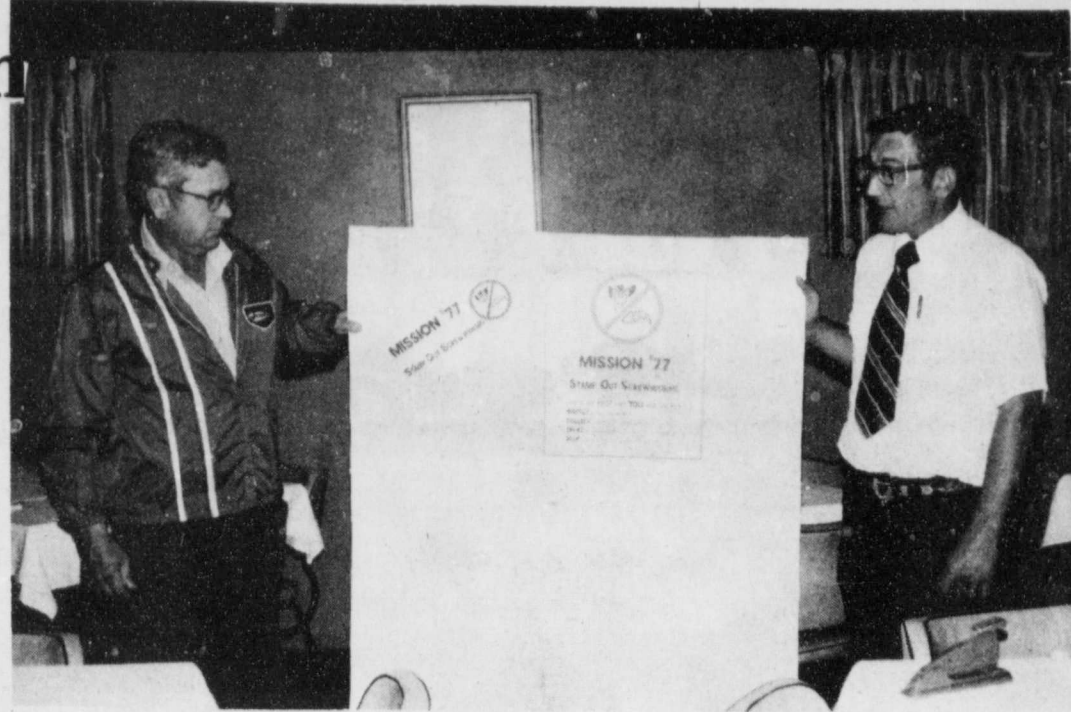
(2) The new screwworm production plant near Tuxla Gutierrez, Mexico, opened in July 1976 and has been producing millions of sterile flies ever since. Over 200 million sterile flies now are being raised each week in Mexico. Added to the Mission production, that gives the program about 400 million sterile flies each week to use in the stamp out effort;

(3) A new strain of sterile flies—many feel the best strain ever—was introduced last spring and seems to be a strain of "super flies." Scientists believe this "009" strain is the first time a complete strain change has ever been made at Mission. This means we now have flies which fly and mate at the same time the wild fly does—in short, a competitive, aggressive fly.

job alone. It is not an excuse, it is the simple truth. Sterile flies only work when the fertile population is low. The fertile population is kept low by rancher cooperation such as treating all wounds and postponing wounding operations. The screwworm program needs your help more than ever this year. It's an old refrain—Inspect, Collect and Treat—but this year it's the song of success.

Only if everyone—especially ranchers and pet owners—cooperates fully by inspecting animals frequently for screwworm infested wounds, by collecting worm samples and sending them in to the Mission plant for identification and by treating all wounds with approved insecticides, can the weather, the Mexico plant and the new fly strain make a difference. (Sample vials may be obtained at the Floyd County Extension Office-Courthouse-Ag. Building.)

So, if you own any animals at all:
-Inspect, Collect and Treat.
-Postpone until cool weather any livestock handling operation which could cause screwworm attracting wounds.

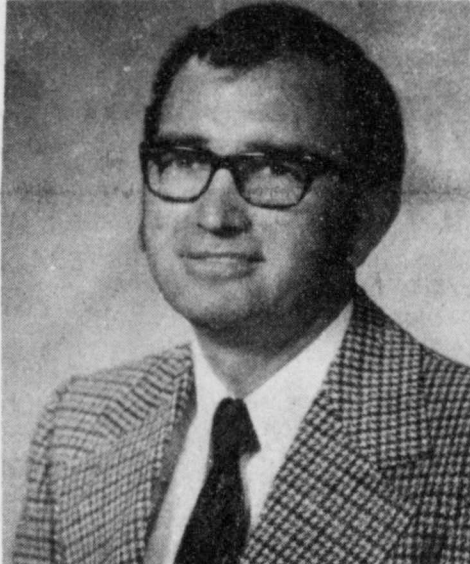

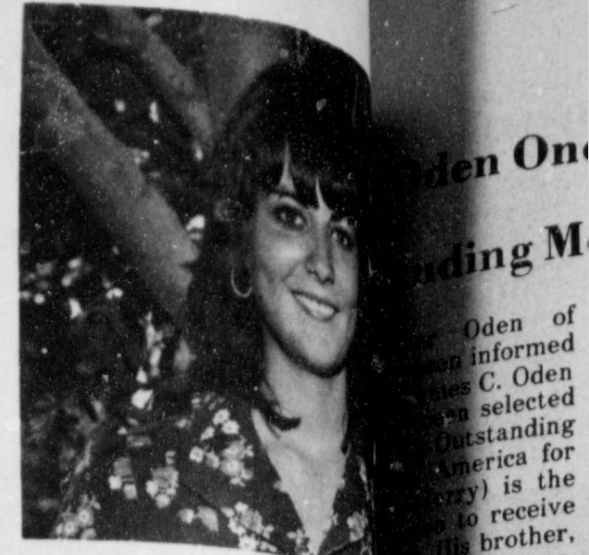

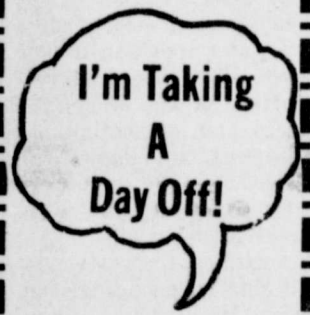

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Opposes Hospital Cost Control Act

Hospital Association announced opposition to the "Hospital Cost Control Act of 1977." Carter and California proposed legislation this week. President of the Hospital Association, J. C. Willis, said the act would set a limit on the amount of money that hospitals can spend on salaries and other expenses. He said the act would also limit the amount of money that hospitals can spend on capital equipment and other long-term investments. participating in this productivity center. We show participating hospitals how to improve the management and operation of the hospitals. To day, we can point to over \$20 million that has been saved by Texas patients in this short period of time and these savings are ongoing and will be recurring each year. The proposed legislation gives no credit to these well managed hospitals—in fact, it penalizes them.

The President's Wage and Price Council, for the past two years, has been studying health care costs and has conducted hearings around the nation, including Texas. The final report was issued this past December. In that report, the Wage and Price Council said that one of the major factors that is increasing hospitals' cost in the nation, was the number of government regulations that the hospital must comply with. Each hospital must answer to 25 to 30 government regulatory agencies at the local, state and federal level. Each one of these agencies requires reports and information which are costly to prepare and the hospital must look to its patients to pay these costs.

We find that the Carter proposal is most arbitrary and capricious legislation in that one industry has been singled out to live with cost controls. The Texas Hospital Association, as well as the American Hospital Association

will be doing everything we can to fight this proposal. We are convinced that it is not in the best interest of the patients we serve, and we do want to continue to render the best of health care to all the citizens of Texas. The Texas Hospital Association is the trade association for hospitals in Texas with over 690 health care institutions as members.
