



According to an article I read in a newspaper the other day, President Carter is getting about 75,000 letters a week from people around the country. It might be even more, but you know how the mail service is

Anyway, I got to thinking about this. Seventy-five thousand letters! If each letter averages just 100 words, that's 7,500,000 words, or divided into books of 50,000 words each, 150 books.

Now no man can read 150 books a week and still have time to run the country and teach a Sunday School class too. So obviously somebody else reads the letters and answers them. It's like nine million people trying to call the President when he held his famous phone-in a while back. Only about a dozen actually got to talk to him. Those 75,000 letters a week constitute a problem for which I have no solution. It's one of those problems like energy or the Middle East which, after shouted. you get through stating it, you're too tired to go any further.

But speaking of mail, I understand some people are suggesting the post office department adopt an electronic system of delivering the letters. Instead of being actually carried from one town to another, the letter is photographer and transmitted by wire to its destination, where another machine reproduces it exactly like you wrote it and seals it. A mailman then delivers it to the proper address, as soon as he can get around to it.

The system has a few drawbacks, like what about privacy, although I guess clerks could be required to turn out the lights when they're feeding your letter into the transmitting machine so they couldn't see what you

This reminds me of an experience a depotagent in a small town had back in the days when we had trains and the agent, being the only telegrapher in town, handled telegrams.

One cold rainy day he received a telegram on his wires for a woman. He telephoned her and said he had a telegram for her but since it was too cold and rainy outside for her to come by and pick it up, would she like for him to read it to her?





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

ity has a tendency of shutting up and withdrawing from that which she/he may fear. Emotions like automobiles, can carry us forward or destroy us. Consider the following

attitudes or emotions, and evaluate the discrepancies with the responses. Love: (Normal) most people want to be loved. Take Ginger for example, she wants to be able to give and receive love in a mature fashion. She is able to accept the fact that love is a "giving" rather than a "holding" emotion. (Neurotic) Sally is the type of person who must be constantly reassured at the inappropriate times of another's love, suffers neurotic fears of insecurity and unworthiness.

Anger (Normal) Ginger becomes angry on occasion when provokes. As is the case of all emotions, the

appropriateness of the emotion and the way it is handled indicate the quality of mental health. (Neurotic) Sally becomes angry inappropriately. She feels "done against" quite of ten, and remains angry for a long period, of ten not able/will-

ing to forget it. While no doubt everyone has some neurotic behaviors, sometimes the problems mount to the degree that a person is persistently unhappy. The point at which a person enters therapy may directly relate to the success of treatment.

Former Floydada Man To Retire As Senior High Conservation Essay Winners Named Superintendent Anchorage Schools

A former Floydada man, who grew up here, played football here and migrated to New Mexico for one year in order to play another year of football, is retiring as superintendent of Anchorage, Alaska Schools at the end of this term. Joe Montgomery described as the best friend the children and their parents could ever have, has been superintendent of schools in Anchorage since 1971 going there as a teacher in 1941. He has seen the system grow to be a \$100 million a year operation, from two schools, 23 teachers and 2,000 students to 70 schools, 40,000 youngsters, and 2,100 teachers and administrators

mery's district. Not only did Montgomery play football in Floydada back in the 30's, he later played at Eastern New Mexico University before transferring to Colorado State University. 

Check Cattle For Pinkworm

With bright, sunny days in the offing, pinkeye often becomes a problem in cattle herds. Pinkeye, caused by a vet unidentified organism, can lead to varying stages of ulceration of the animal's eyes and even blindness The impaired vision and discomfort restrict the animal's abiliy to graze and can result in serious weight losses, points out Doyle Warren, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

Once an outbreak occurs, other animals in the herd can become easily infected by flies or eye gnats that travel from an infected animal to those that are heal-

To keep pinkeye problems

at a minimum, Warren off-

ers these suggestions:

1. Check animals closely as often as possible to observe any excessive watering or discharge from the eyes. Animals with light colored makings or white skin may show a stain or matted hair below the eye. Separate any suspected animals and treat them early in the course of the disease to prevent a herd problem.

2. Try to control flies and gnats with sprays and dust bags. Good fly control may help prevent pinkeye and will also minimize the spread if it occurs.

3. Clip pastures before seedheads develop on grass. Seedheads may irritate the eyes of cattle and increase the chances of infection.

4. Adequate amounts of

vitamin A help keep tissues healthy. Good pastures generally provide sufficient vitamin A. However, when pastures dry up and get brown, supplementary vitamin A should be provided.

5. Shaded loafing areas allow cattle to get out of the direct sunlight and can prove valuable in most areas of Texas.

Many treatments have been utilized to control cases of pinkeye, including antibiotics, corticosteroids, and foreign protein therapy. If treatment is used, the preparation should be applied to both eyes, and treated or exposed animals should be kept separately from the rest to minimize the spread of infection, emphasizes Warren.

Since there are other problems of the eye that might resemble pinkeye, cattlemen should consult a veterinarian to determine the specific problem.

Research on an experimental vaccine consisting of a formalin-killed culture of the agent considered to be the cause of pinkeye has been in progress since 1963. However, the vaccine is still

not available for general use,



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
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
