## Betha Cunyus, W. O. Denning Honored At Pioneer Reunion

### Parade Highlight Of Event

Mrs. B.A. (Betha) Cunyus of Lockney, 83 and W.O. Denning, 90, who lives south of Floydada were named Pioneer Woman and Man of the Year and presented certificates by Hubert Frizzell of Lockney, at the annual Floyd County Pioneer Reunion here Saturday.

It was one of those perfect days weather-wise-good and hot, perfect for the young cotton and maturing wheat, and the beautifully decorated floats in the parade.

The parade remained the highlight of the reunion as it took some 20 minutes for it to pass in review.

Only thing lacking was the 'Lemon-drop Saloon' which never did open Saturday.

Best attendance was for the barbecue at noon and the parade. Farmers went back to work after the parade.

The award presented to Mrs. Cunyus, who has lived in Floyd County since 1905, read "in appreciation for the love, care and devotion you have shown for Floyd County and its people through the years." A resident of Floyd County 68 years, Denning received an award "for going the extra mile for Floyd County."

Receiving certificates and \$5 each were the oldest pioneer woman and man, Mrs. Mather (Annie) Carr, 90, of Floydada, who has lived here since 1902, and B. Furrow, 93, a Floyd County resident 74 years. Recognition for coming the greatest distance to the celebration went to Wayland Bagwell of Montebello, Calif. who lived in Floyd County from 1917-26.

A COVERED wagon entered by Eddie Joe Fortenberry of Lockney won first place and \$20 in the pioneer float division of the afternoon parade. In the best commercial float class, Caprock Hospital won first and \$15, Davis Farm Supply, second, \$10 and Producers Cooperative Elevator, third, \$5.

The 1950 Study Club won first prize of \$20 for its float showing a congregational singing. Second of the best club floats was South Plains Radio Club,

\$10, and third, was Emergency Medical Technical Association, \$5.

Lubbock Saddle Club carried off first place honors in the posse division, and Floydada Riding Club won second place. They received trophies. Having the best decorated bicycles were Angie Bertrand, first place, to win \$3; Shad Morris, second, \$2; and Kelli LaBaume, third, \$1.

CRAIG BARKER received a trophy for having the best Shetland pony in the parade, and Wayne Smith won \$15 for having the first place antique car. W.R. Daniels placed second with his car to win \$10, and Keith Reeves, third, and \$5.

Mrs. Carr, earlier recognized as the oldest woman at the reunion, was the oldest woman in the parade and was awarded a plaque. The oldest man in the parade was Charlie Spence, also given a plaque. Best dressed oldtime cowboy in the parade was Paul Atteberry of Floydada.

Best modern cowgirl and cowboy honors went to D'lee Marble and Jay Waller. Best junior cowboy was Bryan Barker and best junior cowgirl was Crystal Rogers of Ralls. They were presented plaques.

THE DAYS agenda included also a wild flower show, a style of early 1900 fashions sponsored by junior study clubs of Lockney, a memorial service conducted by Mrs. Flora McNeill, and a speech by the Rev. John Jenkins, pastor of First Baptist Church of Lockney.

During the business session of the Floyd County Pioneer Association, new officers were elected. They are Aldine Williams of Floydada, president; Jim Bert Bobbitt of Lockney, vice president; Anne Sweptson of Floydada, secretary; and H.E. Frizzell of Lockney, treasurer.

A square dance exhibition was scheduled between parade time and the lunch, which was free to all pioneers living in Floyd County 50 years or over. Closing the reunion were a Melodrama by the 1956 Study Club and an oldtimers dance.

### 4-H Dance Friday For Senior Members

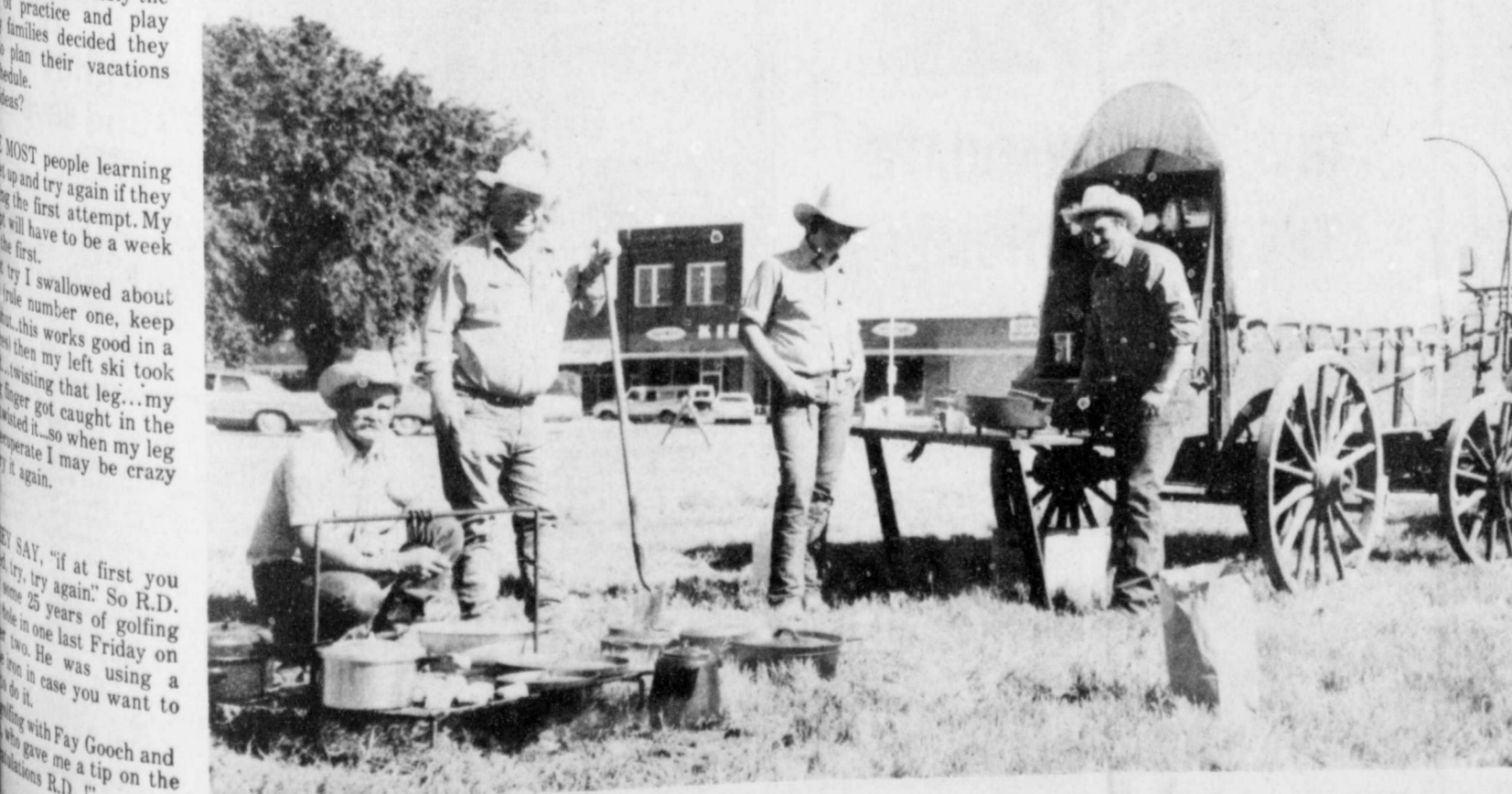
Floyd County 4-H Club is sponsoring a dance Friday, June 3 for Senior 4-H members only. The dance starts at 9 pm. at the American Legion building in

Friday afternoon Mrs. C.H. Wise kept baby Robert

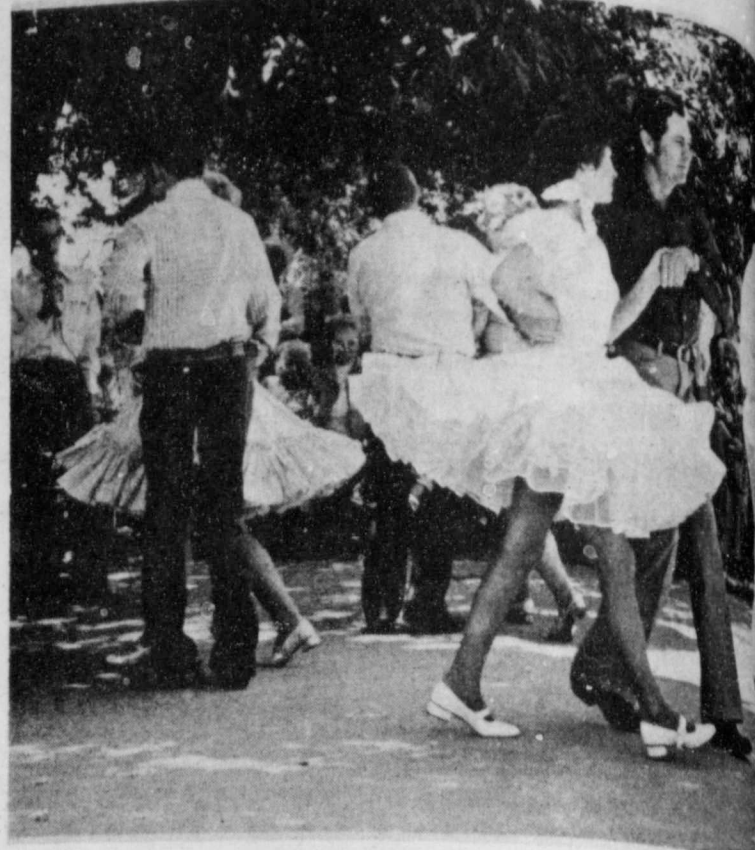
Eckers while his mother attended to business.

erties like this, where management is the key, and turn this around. To somebody else, it may look like it's lost its value. Our success is the competence of back-up in the office."

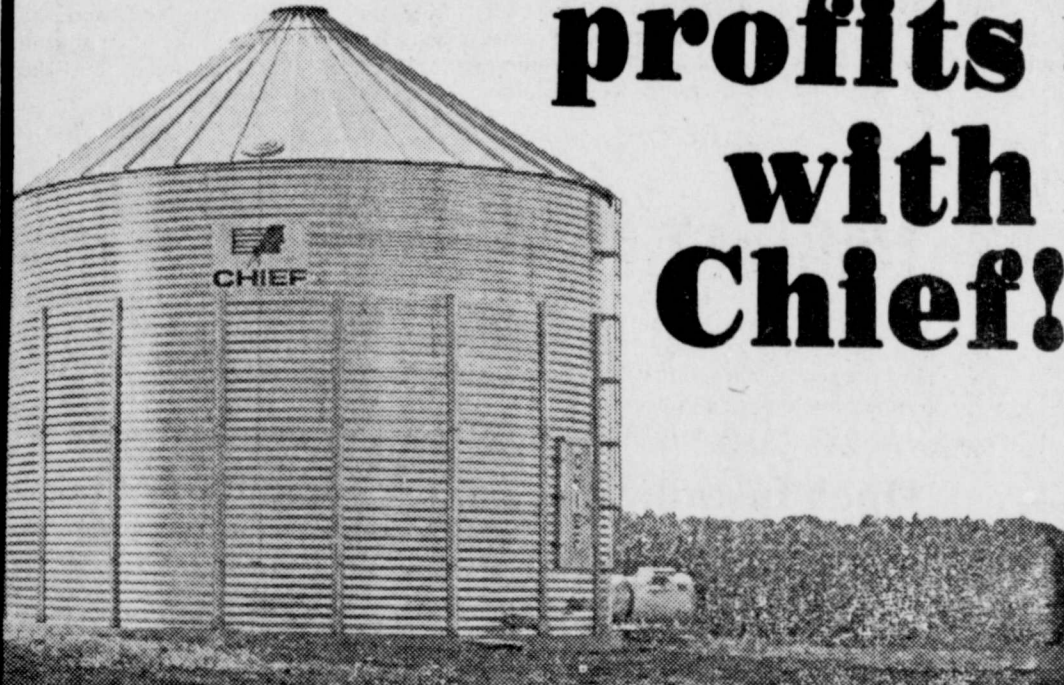

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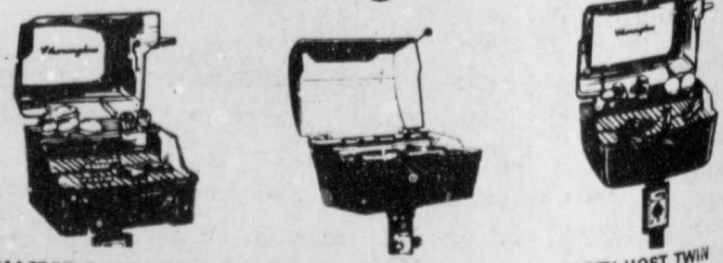

"Send that check back and tell them to figure it again." Bullock urged.

The Comptroller said a bill recently passed by the Legislature exempts mandatory gratuities from the sales tax. He urged restaurant and club owners -- and their customers -- to familiarize themselves with the new law.

Bullock said the law will eliminate the past confusion over the taxability of tips.

In the past, a tip was subject to the sales tax if it was automatically added to the bill by the management.

Voluntary tips or gratuities, however, were exempt from the tax.

The new law, which became effective April 25, excludes from the sales tax "reasonable" mandatory gratuities which do not exceed 20 per cent of the price of the meal or drinks.

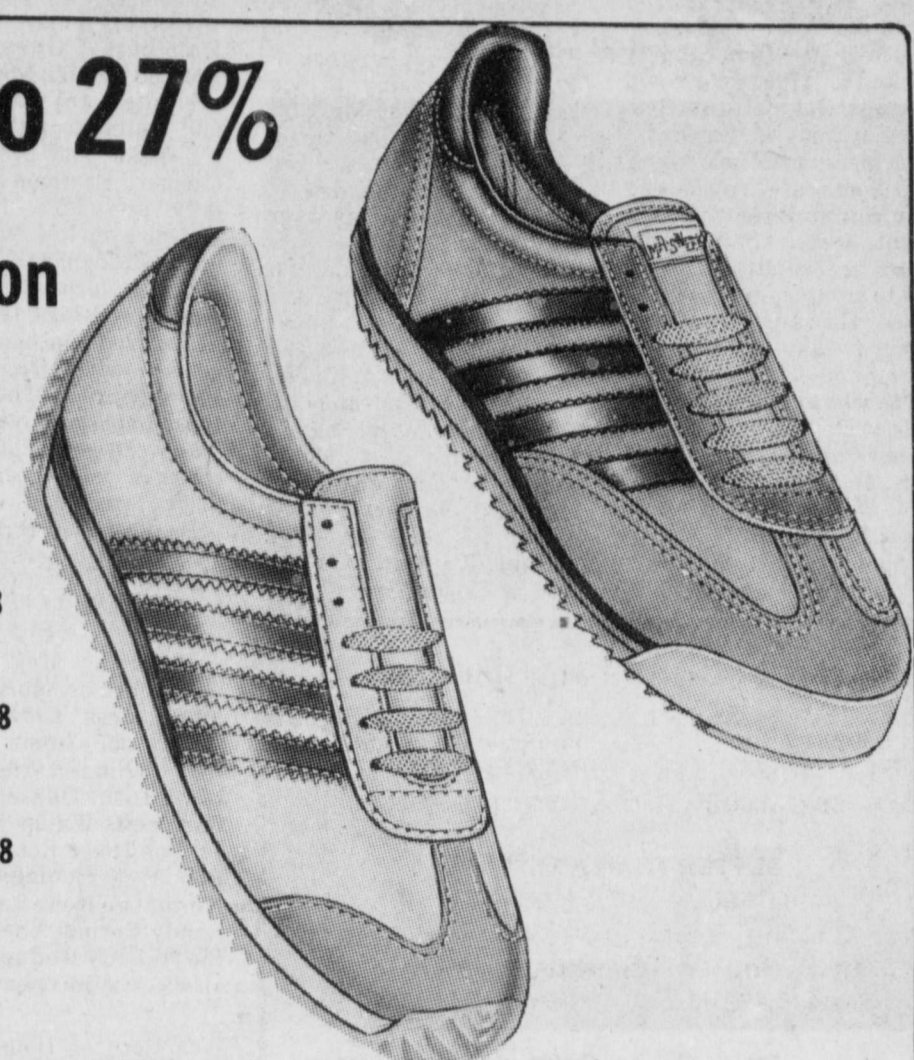
The law requires, however, that the gratuity be identified as such on the check and the full amount be distributed to the employees who provide the service, such as waiters, waitresses and bartenders.

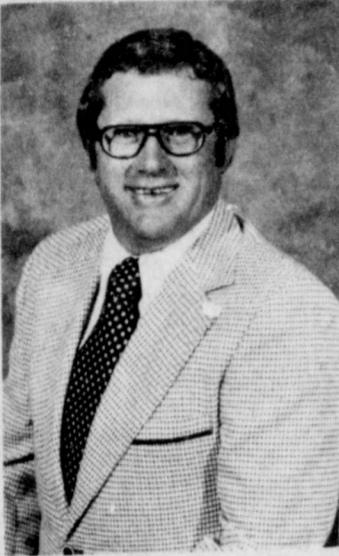






### Allen To Coach At Mexican-American Track Meet In Mexico

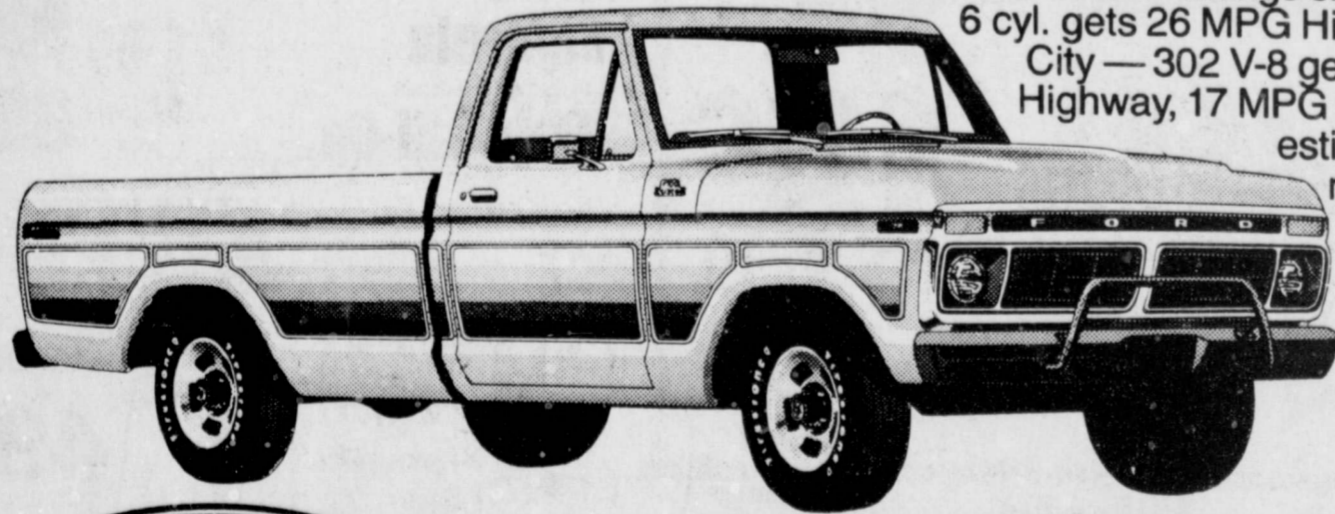

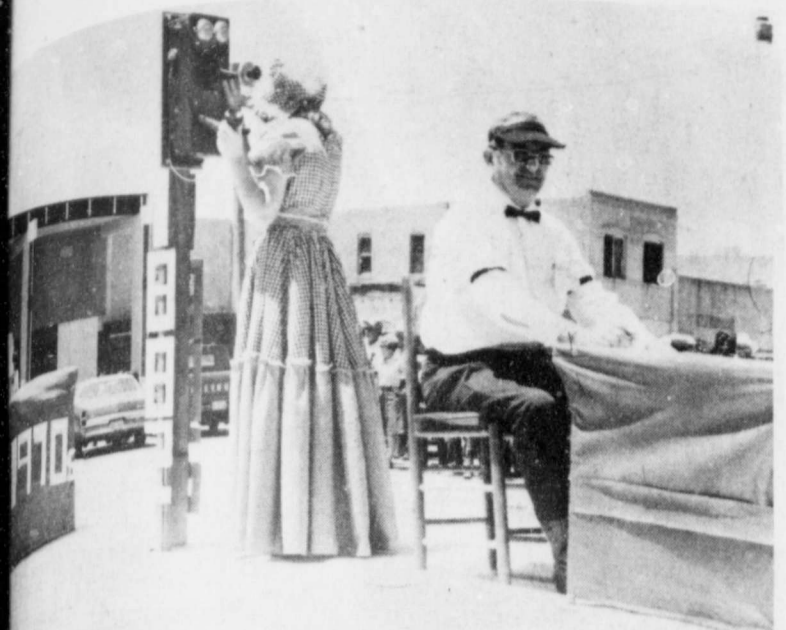
Fewer than five thousand students nation-wide will be

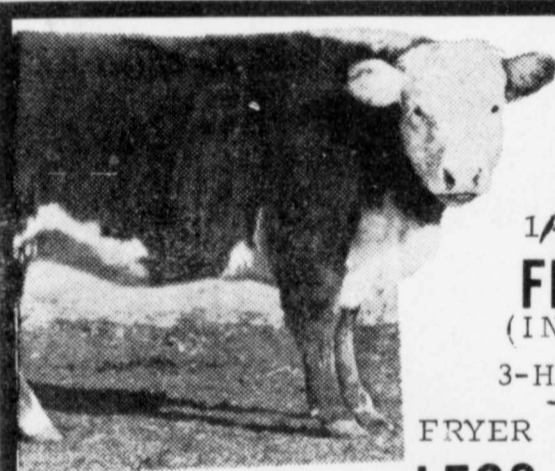

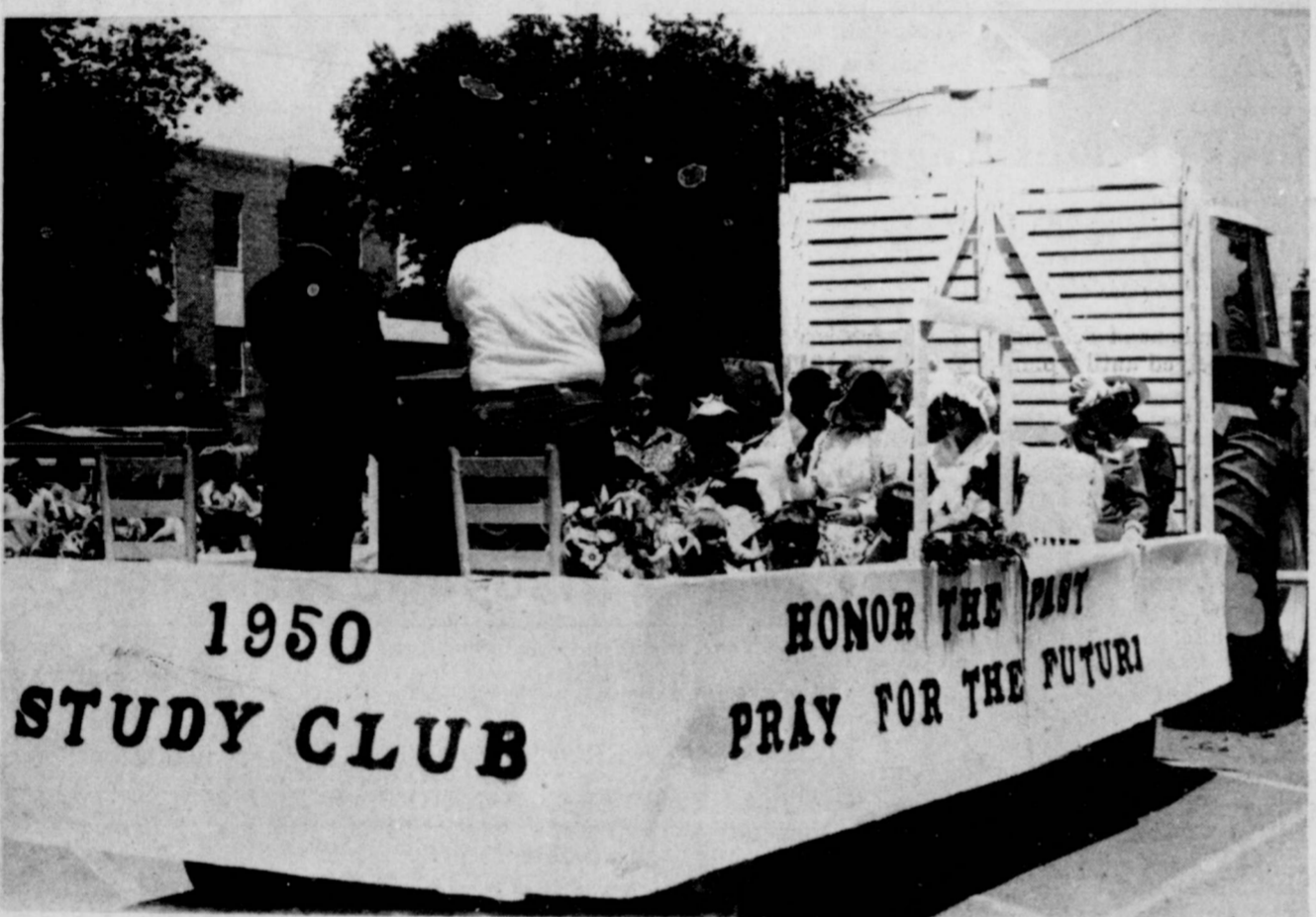
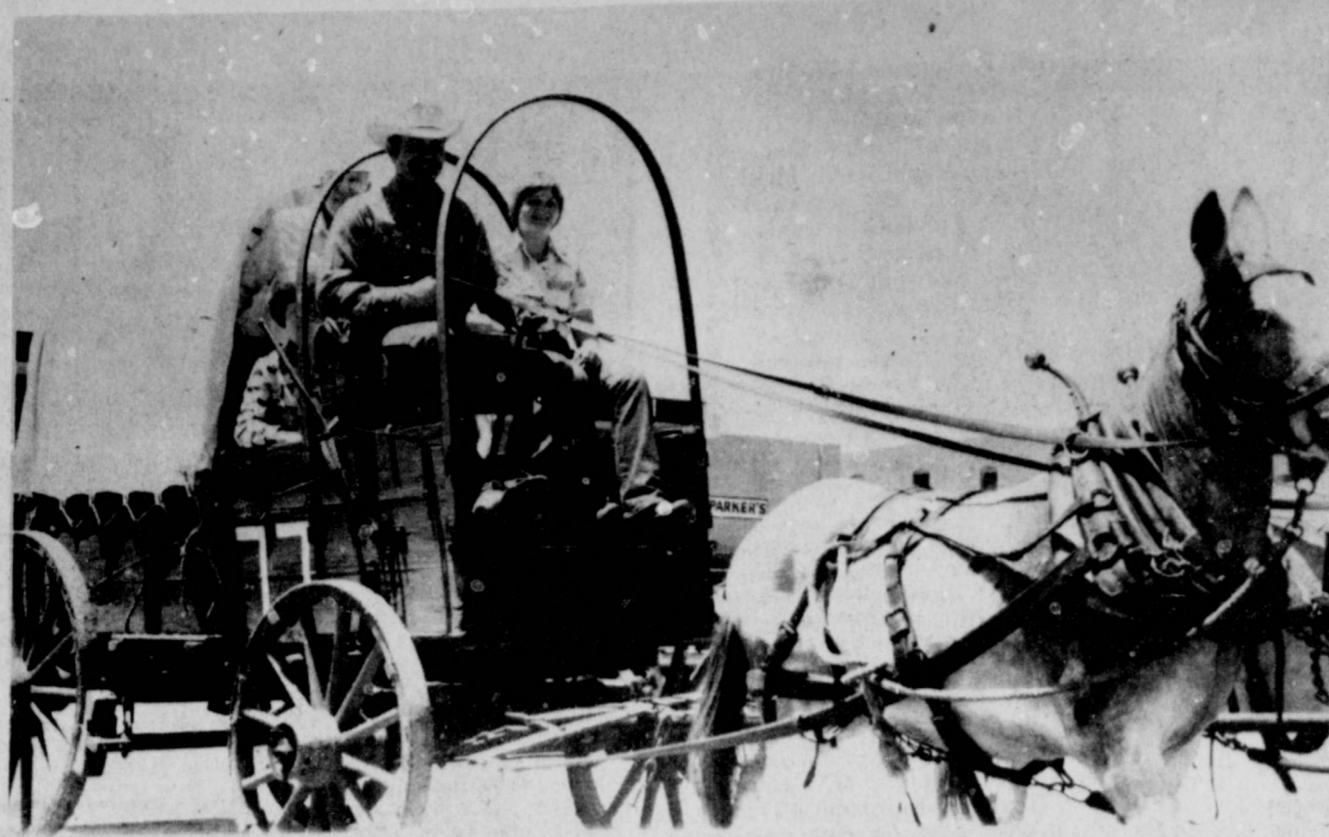

## County Agent's Corner

### RABIES

Rabies is an acute infectious encephalomyelitis which can occur in all warm-blooded animals including man, and is caused by neurotropic virus (attacks nerve tissue). The virus is found in saliva, salivary glands and central nervous system of infected animals. Bats are the only symptomless carriers of the disease.

### SYMPTOMS OF RABIES

1. Incubation period is 21-60 days in dogs, but has a range of 10-205 days; Most develop symptoms in 21-35 days. In man, the onset of symptoms is 11 days to 11 months.

2. There are three forms of the disease:

- a. Furious
- b. Dumb
- c. Atypical

Symptoms in small animals:

### FURIOUS

- 1. Change in disposition-wants to be by himself in dark places.
- 2. Has desire to wander, about 2 days after symptoms start, and bites everything in its path. Dog will return home if possible after a time.
- 3. Mentally deranged.
- 4. Will eat indigestible objects such as rocks, sticks, etc.
- 5. Eyes mad.
- 6. Change in voice.
- 7. Paralysis of lower jaw.
- 8. Paralysis of muscles used to swallow.
- 9. Progressive paralysis and death occurs 4-7 days after onset of symptoms.

### DUMB

- 1. No particular viciousness.
- 2. Usually has a shorter course.
- 3. No tendency to roam-usually hides in a dark corner.
- 4. Stupid look due to paralysis of lower jaw.
- 5. Paralysis spreads to other portions of the body.

Symptoms in cattle and horses:  
In cattle the furious form is most common with the animal attacking other animals and humans. Instead of the usual peaceful look on their face, their expression is one of alertness, the eyes and ears following sounds and movements. Cattle usually begin to bellow as symptoms progress; the character of the bellowing is different from normal and may continue intermittently until approaching death.

Probably the so-called dumb form is the one to which people are exposed most often. The animal is not that vicious; one of the symptoms is as if the animal is choked or has something wedged in its mouth. In attempting to relieve the choke, a person comes in contact with infected saliva. Horses may show symptoms of colic by rolling. These animals usually are very aggressive, biting and kicking viciously. They frequently suffer self-inflicted wounds.

The virus of rabies may be found in saliva a few days before symptoms begin; this is the reason for the 10 day observation period.

### WHAT TO DO IF AN ANIMAL BITES A PERSON OR THEY BECOME EXPOSED TO INFECTED SALIVA BY ANY MEANS.

- 1. Catch animal immediately-keep for 10 days.
- 2. Wash bite very well with soap and water.
- 3. Contact doctor immediately.
- 4. Bites over exposed areas are more severe than if bitten through clothing, because clothing will absorb some of the saliva.

The Beef Board could initiate a broad spectrum of projects to improve beef production, distribution and marketing. Such a program could include consumer education and information, and research.

During the first three years of operation, the Board could collect assessments of up to three-tenths of one percent of the value of all cattle sold. After that, the rate of assessment could be changed but could not exceed five-tenths of one percent — the maximum amount permitted under the Beef Research and Information Act. Producers not wishing to participate in the program could have their assessment refunded.

### RABIES CONTROL PROGRAM

1. Vaccination of all dogs every year.

2. If having a rabies epidemic, keep dogs in fenced yard; if taken from the yard, must be on a leash and muzzled.

3. All ownerless dogs should be impounded and destroyed.

4. License must be purchased for all dogs.

5. Fine should be imposed on people who do not have dogs vaccinated.

6. Education of public via radio, TV, etc.

If a person is bitten by an animal and for any reason rabies is suspected, the animal should be taken to a veterinarian and observed for 10 days. This way positive diagnosis of the disease can be made. If the animal is normal at the end of 10 day observation period, the person who was bitten will not have been exposed to rabies. The animal should be captured alive if possible, without undue risk to the captor. If it is necessary to kill the animal in order to capture it, do not shoot it in the head, since the brain has to be submitted for microscopic analysis in a laboratory for positive diagnosis, and damage from a bullet in the brain makes this diagnosis much more difficult and occasionally impossible. This would require the exposed individual to undergo the Pasteur treatment as a precaution when a definite diagnosis might have shown the animal to be negative to rabies.

When handling a suspected animal, always wear gloves to prevent possible exposure from saliva. All suspected cases should be submitted to your local veterinarian as soon as possible. If it is not practical to submit the head to the veterinarian immediately, wear gloves and cut the animal's head off (if animal is too large to refrigerate whole).

- 2. Place the head in one or two plastic bags and seal.
- 3. Refrigerate the head (do not freeze) since warm temperature causes rapid deterioration of the brain

and makes positive diagnosis much more difficult.

4. As soon as practical, submit the head to your local veterinarian, who will assist you in the proper method of submitting it to a diagnostic laboratory.

Animals exposed to rabies is about 99.9% fatal once symptoms start; therefore, prophylactic treatment of an animal which has been exposed to rabies and not previously vaccinated could be very dangerous to the owner in the event that prophylactic treatment did not prevent the infection. Therefore, the safest precaution generally would be to destroy the exposed animal unless it had been previously immunized against the disease.

Rabies occur year-round but the incidence is greater

## Cattlemen To Register For Beef Referendum

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced

June 6 as the beginning of a two-week registration period for Beef Research and Information Order referendum and issued rules for the referendum.

Anyone who was a cattle producer during 1976 can register to vote, either in person or by mail, at local ASCS offices between June 6 and June 17.

A list of those registered will be posted daily at ASCS offices and final listing will be posted five days after registration closes.

Those registered can vote between July 5 and July 15 at their ASCS office. For approval of the Beef Research and Information Order, at least

50 percent of those registered must vote, and two-thirds of them must favor it.

The Order that producers will consider in the upcoming referendum would authorize a research and information program administered by a Beef Board of up to 68 producers. Board members would be appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from nominations submitted by producer organizations. Each state of geographic area would be represented in proportion to its cattle production.

The Beef Board could initiate a broad spectrum of projects to improve beef production, distribution and marketing. Such a program could include consumer education and information, and research.

During the first three years of operation, the Board could collect assessments of up to three-tenths of one percent of the value of all cattle sold. After that, the rate of assessment could be changed but could not exceed five-tenths of one percent — the maximum amount permitted under the Beef Research and Information Act. Producers not wishing to participate in the program could have their assessment refunded.
