## School Board Hires More Coaches, Teachers

Popular Floydada basketball coach Rollie Rinker submitted his resignation to the Floydada school board Monday night, and will be moving his family to Perryton where he will be assistant high school principal.

Rinker told a Hesperian reporter, we have made many friends in Floydada and were reluctant to make the decision to move. However, we feel it is time to retire from coaching and enter the administrative field."

The board hired Mike Cocanougher to replace Rinker. Mike was assistant varsity basketball coach here in 1974 and 1975. He left here to go to Odessa where he was assistant coach to former Floydada basketball coach Curtis Chatham.

The board also accepted the resignation Donny Carthel who enters college football coaching and Francis Puckett. Mrs. Puckett was high school English teacher and is moving with her family to Ruidoso.

Rinker and Carthel were coaches here for the past two years. Barbara Cocanougher will teach special education.

BETTY crocker has come

out with a delicious summertime rhubarb dessert. She gives some timely rules in case you are not familiar in making her Sweet 'N' Tart Shortcakes or Rhubarb Sauce. One pound of rhubarb makes two cups and whether you grow your own or pick from the crop at the supermarket, you can add strawberries to make it summertime simple. For a mild flavor the early pink takes less sugar and if the stalks are tender there is no need to peel, just sauce it in the skin . You can also have a pretty combination with pineapple, blueberries or pears, fresh, canned or frozen.

Here is her shortcake recipe followed with the rhubarb sauce:

2 1/3 cups Bisquick baking mix 3 tablespoons sugar 3 tablespoons butter

or margarine, melted 1/2 cup milk Slivered almonds 2 cups strawberry

1 1/2 cups sweetened cooked rhubarb 1/4 cup sugar Whipped cream

Heat oven to 425°. Mix baking mix, 3 tablespoons sugar, the butter and milk until soft dough forms. Gently smooth into ball on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Knead 8 to 10 times. Roll dough 1/2 inch thick. Cut with floured 3-inch cutter. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Brush tops with cream; sprinkle with sugar and almonds. Bake until golden brown, 10 to 12 minutes; cool. 



sites available to them when they arrive. A reservation system could prevent them from being turned away and also keep visitation within capacities of the park.

A potential park visitor can either go to the park and make reservations or it can be done by mail or phone. Telephone requests for campsite reservations must be made at least the first day of occupancy. If the fee has not been received within five days, the campsite will be removed from the "reserve" list. Reservations for camping after September 4, 1977 or any succeding calendar year will not be accepted.

Campsite reservations may be made at the designated parks daily during the hours between 8:00 a.m. and 5:p.m. All the campsites at the 17 State parks participating in the 1977 reservation system are available for reservation. However, those campsites which have not been reserved, and those reserved campsites which are not clamied by 6:00 p.m. will be available on a first-come, first-served basis to campers arriving at these parks without advance reserva-

If a one day's user fee has been paid in advance,

the site will be held until 2:00 p.m. the following day. Those areas open to reservations at Palo Duro State park include Hackberry, Mesquite, Juniper, and Sunflower.

Campsites at all other State parks not participating in the reservation system are available on a first-come, first-served ba-
