### School Board Hires More Coaches, Teachers

Popular Floydada basketball coach Rollie Rinker submitted his resignation to the Floydada school board Monday night, and will be moving his family to Perryton where he will be assistant high school principal. Rinker told a Hesperian reporter, "we have made many friends in Floydada and were reluctant to make the decision to move. However, we feel it is time to retire from coaching and enter the administrative field."

The board hired Mike Cocanougher to replace Rinker. Mike was assistant varsity basketball coach here in 1974 and 1975. He left here to go to Odessa where he was assistant coach to former Floydada basketball coach Curtis Chatham. The board also accepted the resignation Donny Carthel who enters college football coaching and Francis Puckett, Mrs. Puckett was high school English teacher and is moving with her family to Ruidoso. Rinker and Carthel were coaches here for the past two years. Barbara Cocanougher will teach special education. The board also employed Michael Dean Brownlee as Junior High athletic coach and science teacher. Brenda Brownlee will teach third grade. The Brownlees are recent graduates of WTSU. Edgar Cornelius, recent graduate of Texas Tech was hired to teach Junior High science. Joan Grady, recent graduate of WTSU was hired as art teacher at Duncan Elementary. The school system is still in need of a high school math teacher and a tennis coach.

Lake Meredith—water temperature is 76 degrees at the five-foot level with lake water elevation at 83.82 feet. The best fishing is for channel catfish using water-dogs as bait. Walleye fishing is good with worms in the 40-50 foot level. Sand bass is good with minnows. Gummy, Okla. anglers took home over 151 sandbass last week. An excellent hatch of both largemouth bass and channel catfish have been noticed by anglers this

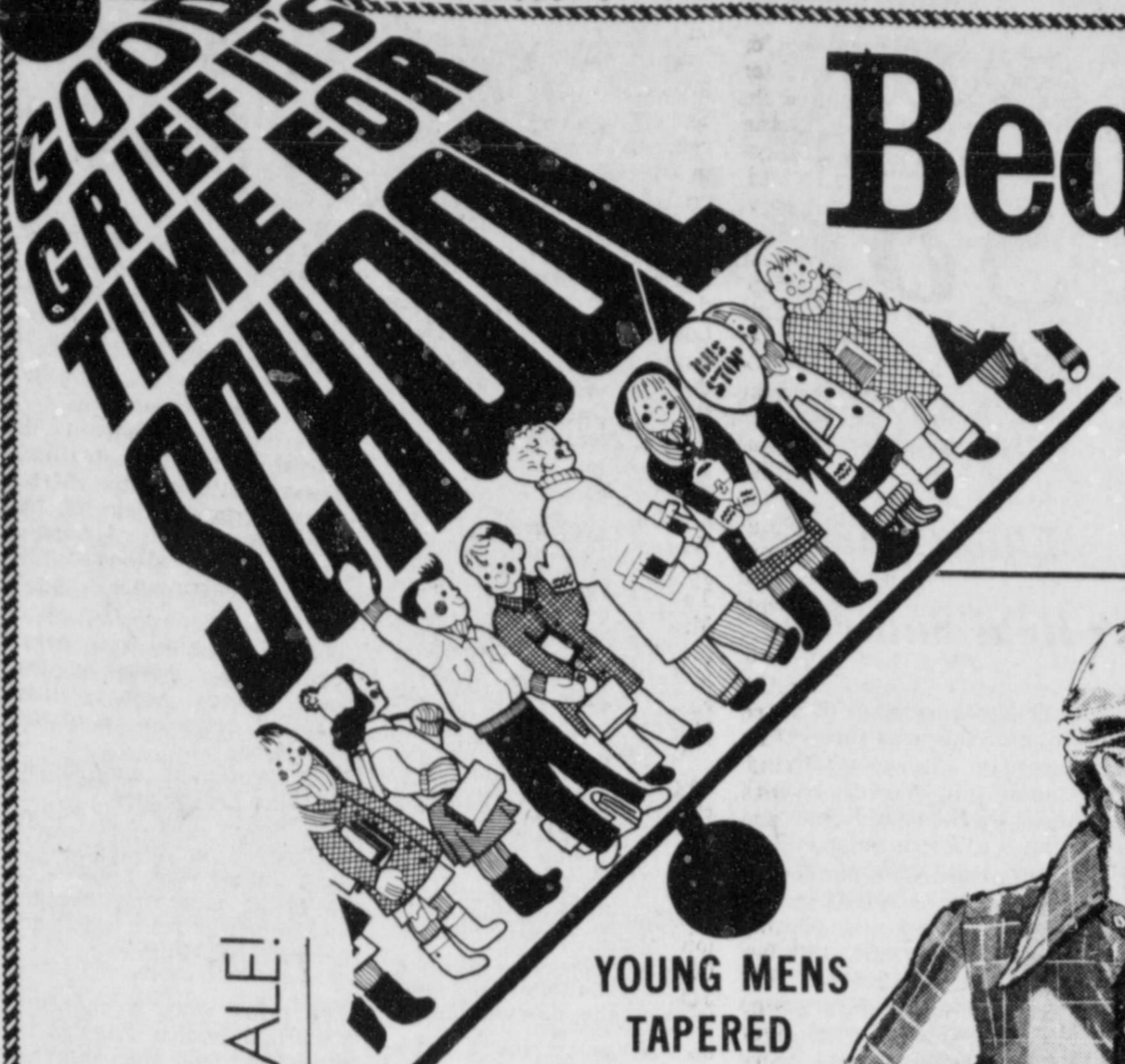

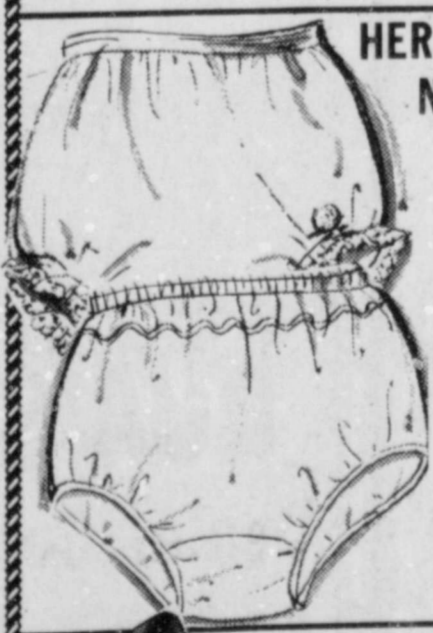

- 2 1/3 cups Bisquick baking mix
  - 3 tablespoons sugar
  - 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted

  - Slivered almonds
  - 2 cups strawberry halves
  - 1 1/2 cups sweetened cooked rhubarb
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - Whipped cream
- Heat oven to 425°. Mix baking mix, 3 tablespoons sugar, the butter and milk until soft dough forms. Gently smooth into ball on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Knead 8 to 10 times. Roll dough 1/2 inch thick. Cut with floured 3-inch cutter. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Brush tops with cream; sprinkle with sugar and almonds. Bake until golden brown, 10 to 12 minutes; cool. Mix strawberries, rhubarb and 1/4 cup sugar. Split shortcakes; fill with fruit mixture. Top

parks scattered across Texas. A total of 91 campsites will be available at Palo Duro according to Elton Baker, park superintendent, and for a \$2 non-refundable reservation fee, park visitors will have a guaranteed place to camp. The reservation fee is in addition to the usual entrance and facility use fees. "The reservation system is experimental and generally includes those parks with heavy demands for campsites on summer weekends," Baker continued. "Such a reservation system has become necessary because of increased visitation in state parks during the summer. Many visitors to parks drive long distances only to find no campsites available to them when they arrive. A reservation system could prevent them from being turned away and also keep visitation within capacities of the park." A potential park visitor can either go to the park and make reservations or it can be done by mail or phone. Telephone requests for campsite reservations must be made at least seven days in advance of the first day of occupancy. If the fee has not been received within five days, the campsite will be removed from the "reserve" list. Reservations for camping after September 4, 1977 or any succeeding calendar year will not be accepted. Campsite reservations may be made at the designated parks daily during the hours between 8:00 a.m. and 5 p.m. All the campsites at the 17 State parks participating in the 1977 reservation system are available for reservation. However, those campsites which have not been reserved, and those reserved campsites which are not claimed by 6:00 p.m. will be available on a first-come, first-served basis to campers arriving at these parks without advance reservations. If a one day's user fee has been paid in advance, the site will be held until 2:00 p.m. the following day. Those areas open to reservations at Palo Duro State park include Hackberry, Mesquite, Juniper, and Sunflower. Campsites at all other State parks not participating in the reservation system are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Additional information on state parks and other camping facilities in the Texas State Park System is available by calling Palo Duro State Park 806/488-3622 or by writing the park Route 2, P. O. Box 114, Canyon, TX. 79015.

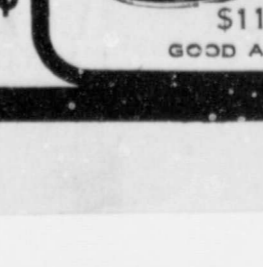

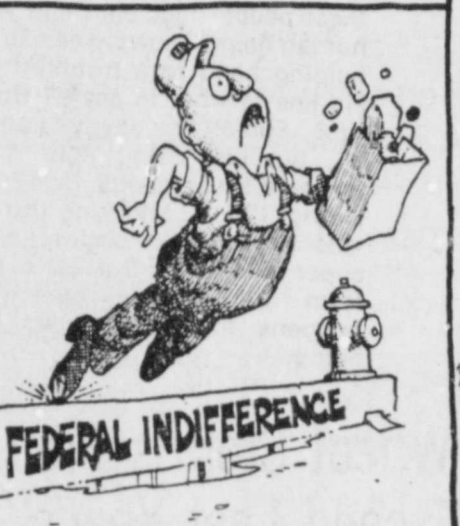
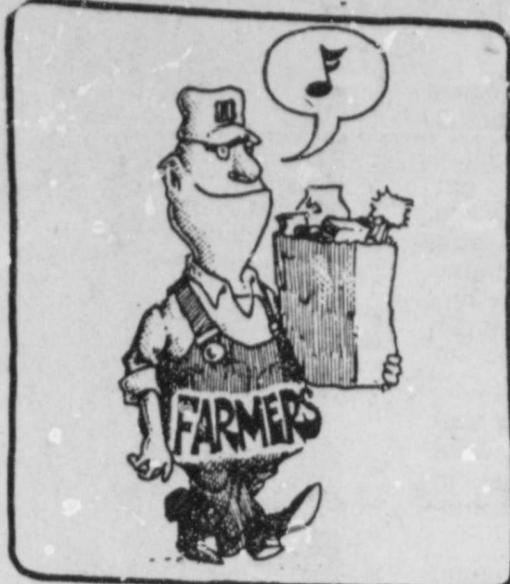

### TETANUS IMMUNIZATION FOR ADULTS TOO

Tetanus immunization is not kid stuff. Adults need its protection, too.

More than half of the reported cases of tetanus occur in persons 50 or older.

Tetanus—also known as lockjaw, can often be fatal. It is caused by spores of bacteria which can enter the body through a wound. The spores are almost everywhere, but particularly in manured soil.

Because the tetanus germ cannot grow in the presence of air, deep puncture wounds or cuts are a favorable growing environment for the germ.

Once in the wound, tetanus germs secrete a toxin. This toxin is so powerful that one-fourth teaspoonful is enough to kill 100,000 people.

For children, protection against tetanus usually start with the basic immunization series—in which the tetanus toxoid is given in combination with diphtheria toxoid and pertussis vaccine—at two, four, six, and

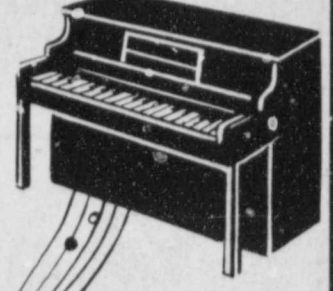

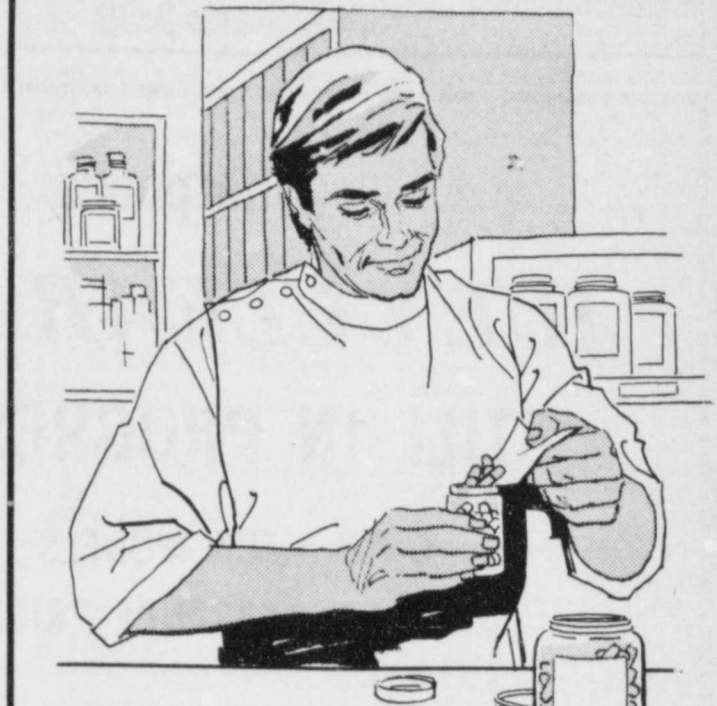

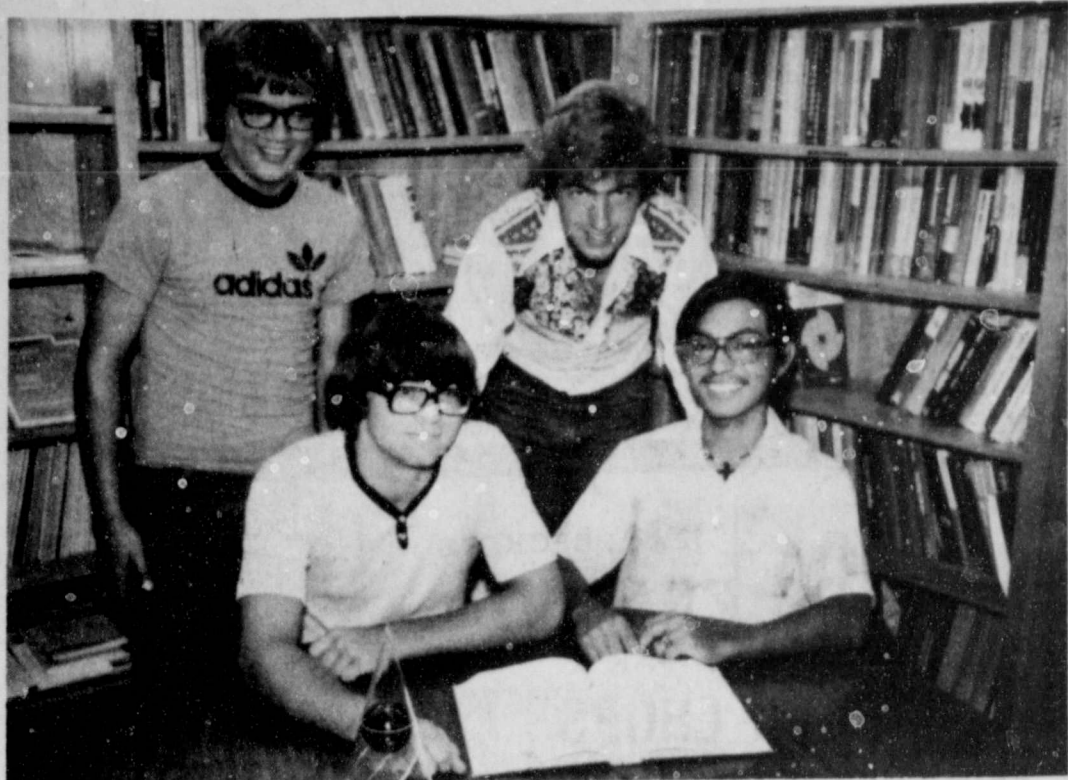

Floydada schools will receive approximately 133,900 additional dollars from the State of Texas, according to Senator Ray Farabee. The State Legislature in Special Session last week adopted a new public school finance plan which will benefit area school districts and taxpayers.

Senator Farabee said, "The new education law represents a balanced approach to school funding and is a great improvement over past plans. The new plan provides for local property tax relief, increased salary benefits and additional sums for

equalization aid." Farabee voted to concur in House amendments to the original Senate Bill stating, "Under the new plan, rural areas will fare better. This legislation uses agricultural values based on productivity in its apportionment of state and local fund require-

ments." The Legislature passed the new law during the first week of the Session. The prompt action by the House and Senate will allow local school districts to set their budgets immediately for the 1977-78 school year.

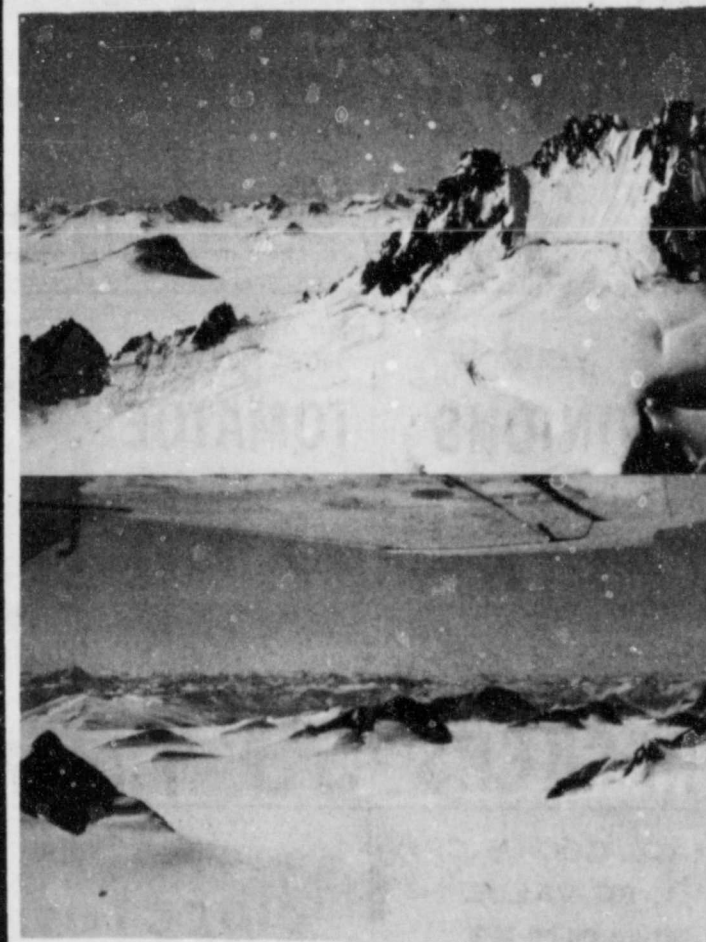

'77 Wheat Crop Is Predicted To Exceed Last Year's Total

AUSTIN—Increased yields per acre boosted this year's

Texas wheat crop over totals for last year, even though some 300,000 fewer acres were in production, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Total production this year is expected to yield 110 million bushels, according to Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service statistics, Brown said. This is 6.6 million more bushels than harvested in 1976 due to the yield increase of three bushels per acre.

Total acreage this year is 4,400,000.

Harvest began in mid-May in South Texas and is now underway in the Southern Low Plains.

"Good rains during April and May provided needed moisture and allowed remaining dryland stands to reach full maturity," Brown said. "Scattered hail hit the High and Low Plains, but overall crop prospects are excellent.

"If prices for farmers were excellent too, this large crop would surely send Texas over the top in cash receipts," he commented, "but the average price in Texas last month was down to \$2.10 a bushel."

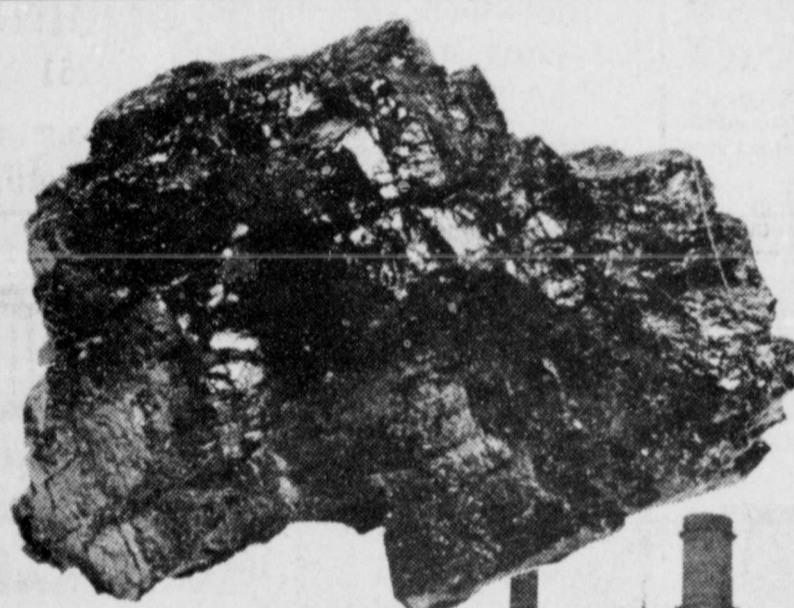

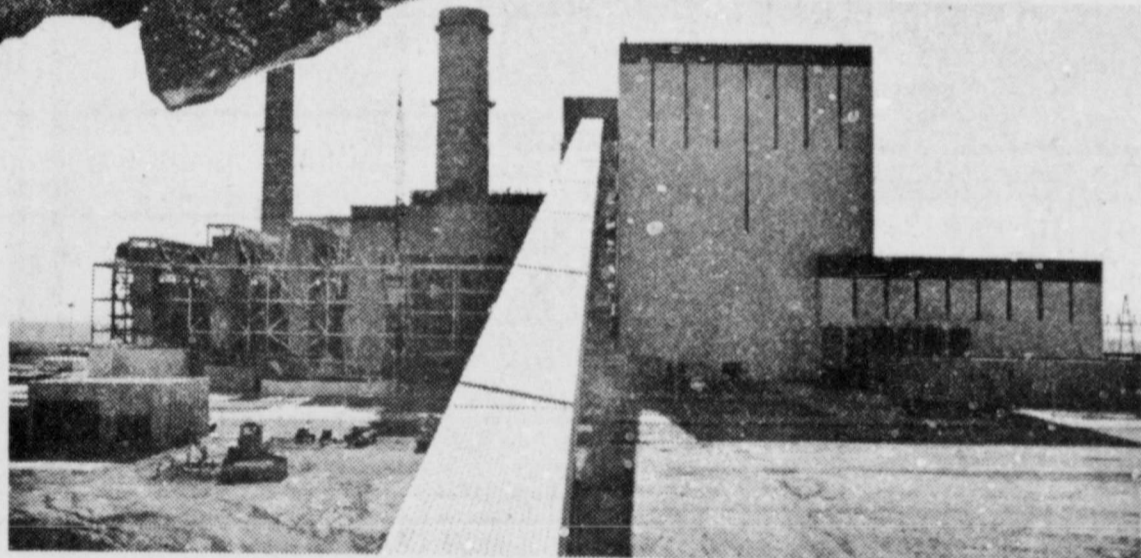

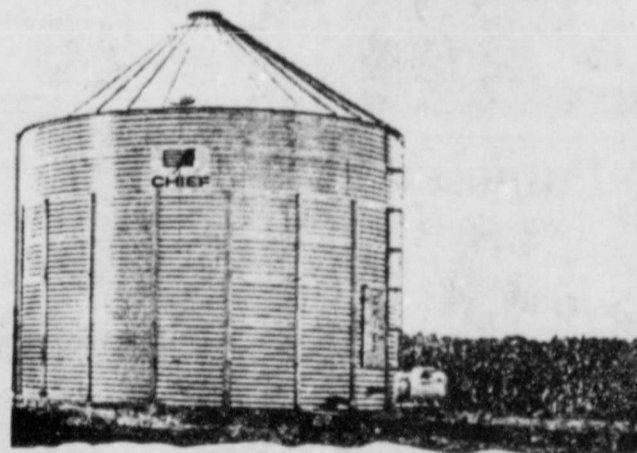

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## Charley Pride Returning To Panhandle South Plains Fair

LUBBOCK Country singer Charley Pride, top box office draw in the history of the Panhandle South Plains Fair, is being returned to the 60th annual exposition. Steve L. Lewis, general manager, has announced. The signing of Pride, along with the popular trio Dave and Sugar, completes the lineup for the Sept. 24 Oct. 1 fair. Pride will appear here for two shows, at 3:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. on the second day of the exposition, a Sunday. Earlier, Lewis announced these attractions for Fair Park Coliseum: Sept. 26-Danny Davis and Nashville Brass, 3:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Sept. 27-Mel Tillis and the Statesiders, 7:30 p.m. shows only. Sept. 29-30-Barbara Mandrell and Ronnie Prophet, 7:30 p.m. shows only.

The popular fiddlers contest will be on stage in the coliseum on opening day and a free entertainment package will be arranged for the closing Saturday, Lewis noted. Tickets for all shows will be available next month. Pride holds the coliseum house record for a single performance, drawing 5,510 here in 1969. Pride has 22 albums in his catalog, including a dozen gold albums. In addition, he has had a steady stream of chart-topping singles, including the million selling "Kiss an Angel Good Morning." His other credits include a string of top awards, such as artist of the year, best male country vocalist of the year, entertainer of the year, top country artist, top male vocalist on singles and albums, and several Gram-

mies. As a stage performer, he is one of the hottest tickets in country music, drawing sellout houses on completely booked-up tours and in the top country music rooms in the nation, like the Longhorn in Dallas (his home town), Panther Hall in Ft. ## The Floyd Philosopher Cuts Letter Short While He Takes Time To Think About Human Nature



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm takes a brief look at some aspects of human nature this week.

Dear editor: Right after Watergate when most of the culprits had been tried and convicted, newspaper pundits began writing about the post-Watergate morality, how the lessons of that big scandal would slow down law breaking in high places, would frighten the short-cutters into towing the mark, for a while at least.

Most big-city columnists seem to know more about typewriters than human nature. Skulduggery kept right on going. Witness the news about the rip-off of millions of dollars from the Small Business Administration by people who elected janitors as presidents of their company in order to qualify their firms as minority run

outfits. Or how about all those Congressmen who're now checking their records and admitting that, by the way, they did get some of that South Korean money? It looks like Watergate had as much effect on morality as hanging pickpockets in England a hundred years ago had on other pickpockets still on the loose. The pickpockets discovered that the best time to lift people's purses was while they were staring goggle-eyed at the public hanging of a convicted pickpocket. They learned that when the trap door was sprung, the spectators were so transfixed by the gruesome sight that even an amateur could pick a pocket without being noticed. This is a short letter this week. I'm going to go off by myself and think about human nature.
