Floyd County Among Top 10 Sorghum Producers

AUSTIN—Floyd County was among the top 10 sorghum producing counties in the state in 1976, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.
County producers harvested 8,226,000 bushels, 2.8 per cent of the state total of 292,900,000 bushels, Brown stated.
This year the state sorghum harvest

is well underway from South Texas to the Blacklands. Harvesting in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and the Coastal Bend is now nearing completion.
The Texas Department of Agriculture estimates that the state's sorghum harvest is now 39 per cent complete, compared with a 26 per cent completion reported at the same time

last year.
Dryland stands in the Cross Timbers region and on the Plains could use rain, the Department reported, as they are already stressed from lack of moisture.
Texas was the No. 1 producer of sorghum in the United States last year.

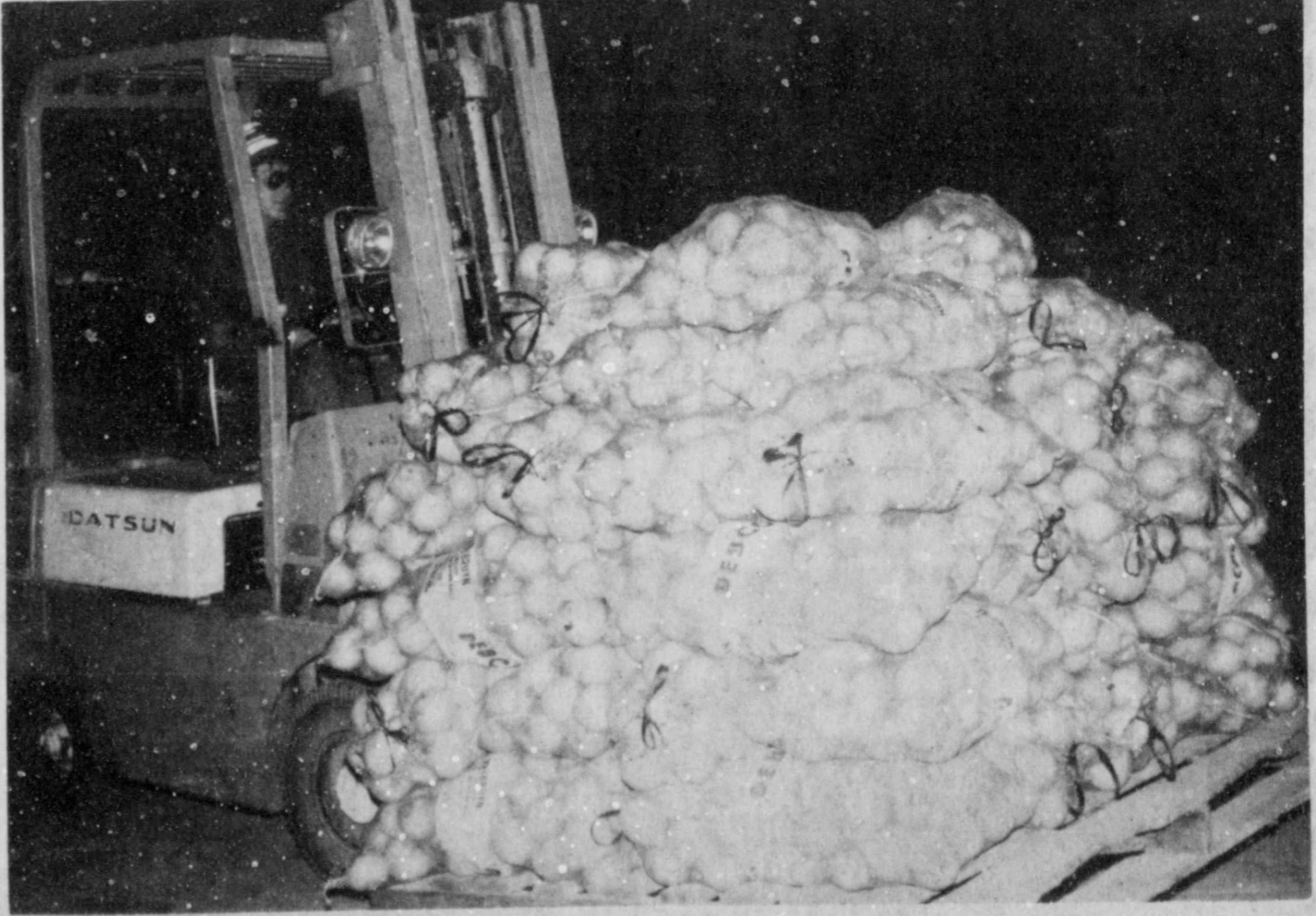
School officials have announced the school registration for the coming year so that parents may plan their remainder of the summer schedule.

THE CHIEF landscape architect for the state of New Mexico has come up with the solution to lawn buffs who spend all summer in a continual progression of watering-fertilizing-mowing.

Richard Brammer planted a mixture of blue grama, sideots grama, western wheatgrass and buff alo grass on his lawn, and says he thinks he has the ideal turf.

He has a nice, soft turf, the architect says, and one that does not require nearly so much watering as bluegrass or bermuda, nor as many mowings.

By having a yard of native grass, the state employee says he has cut his work and water bills at least in half. And with many cities in the throes of a water shortage, and most areas at least in the midst of a drought, this is quite a consideration.

Native grass can be watered only sporadically and it will look healthy. The only danger in growing a lawn of native grass, the experts warn, is that if you aren't careful about what you're doing, you might end up with a "native weed patch."

Another tip on saving water is to set your mower high. This is said to reduce evaporation. The grass builds its own thatch.

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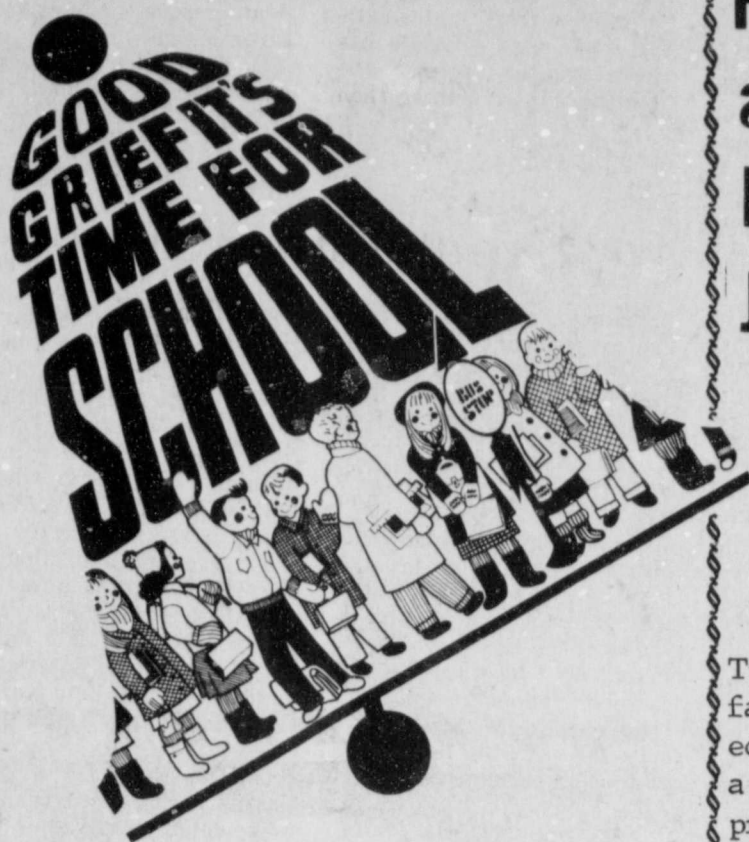

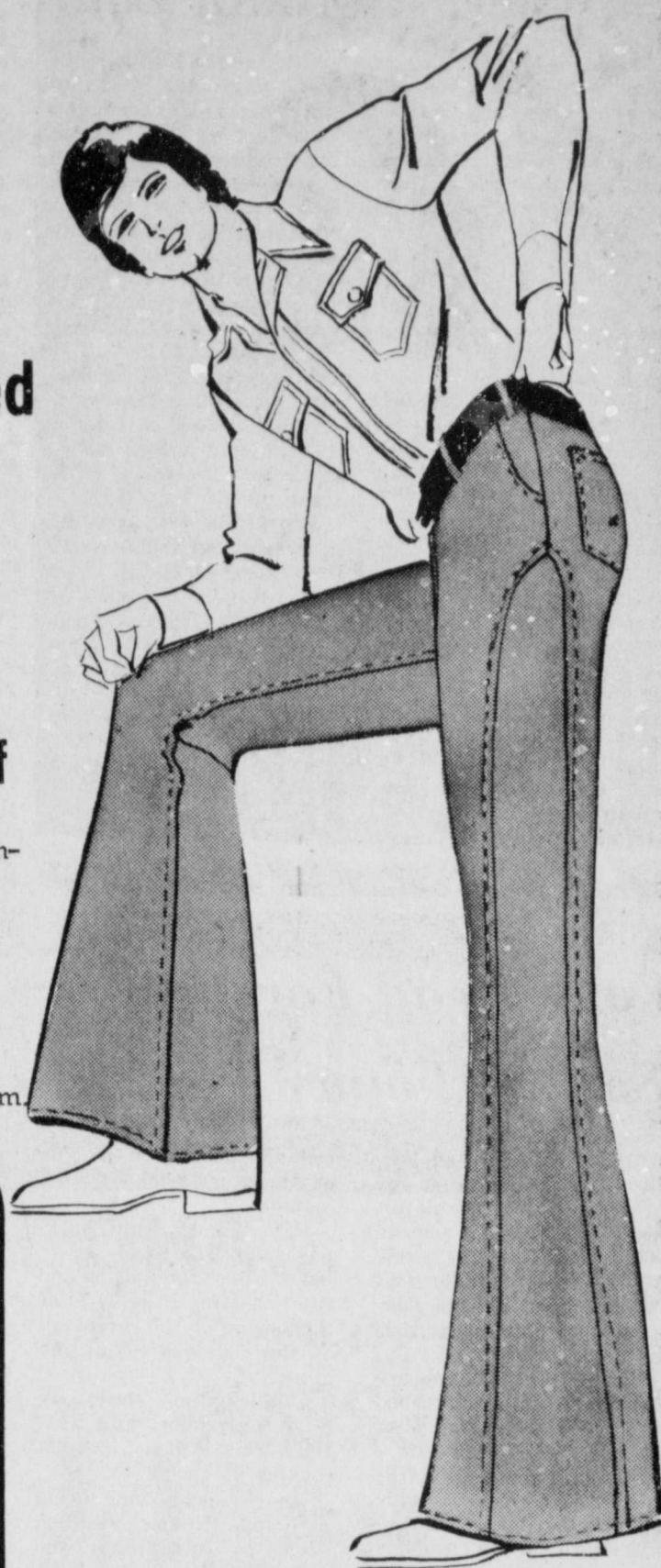

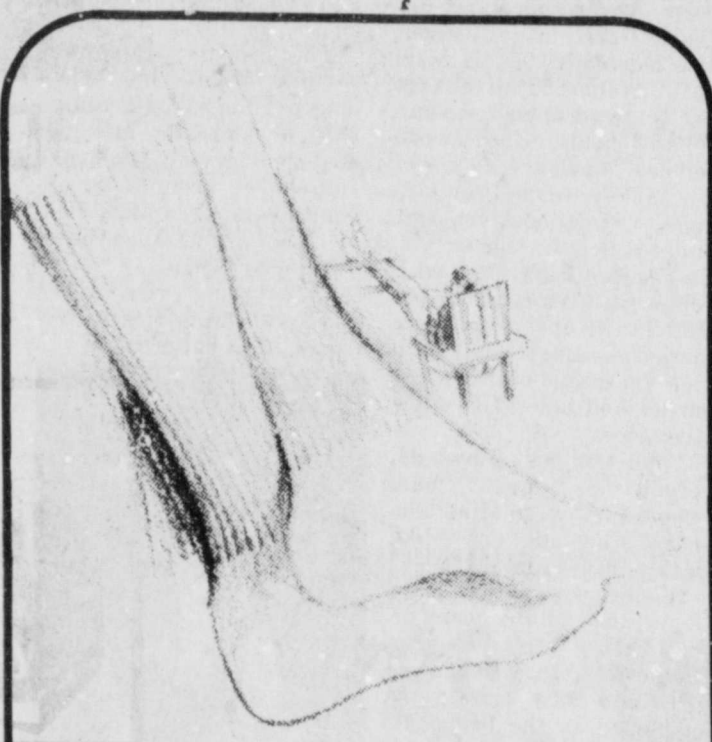

Swisher, Randall, Lamb County Cloud Seeding Elections Aug. 20

Residents of three South Plains counties will trek to the polls Aug. 20 to decide whether to retain controversial cloud seeding operations over their areas.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. in Swisher, Randall and Lamb counties. Swisher is the main target area for the weather modification program while Randall and Lamb counties are affected areas.

Voting will be conducted in all Lamb County precincts, but only Precincts 2 and 3 in south and southwest Randall County will be casting ballots. All Swisher residents, except those in Vigo Park, will be able to vote.

Opponents of hail suppression activities circulated petitions in order to have the elections called.

Earlier, weather modification foes had forced an election in Briscoe County, where voters in Precincts 1 and 3 soundly voiced their opposition by a margin of more than 100 to 1.

Citizens for Natural Weather, a protest group of more than 4,000 farmers, is spearheading the anti-hail suppression activities of Atmospheres Inc. of Littlefield and Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview.

Petitions also are being circulated in Castro County, which is serviced by both cloud seeding firms.

Separate petitions are being circulated and separate propositions will be included on different ballots when or if an election is called there.

Bruce Bigelow, general counsel for the Texas Water Development Board, said that procedure should be followed where a precinct is in a target or an operational area of both companies.

Voters in each election will be able to cast a ballot only on the proposition affecting the company which operates above their precinct. Some precincts may vote on both, Bigelow said.

Although the elections are called against specific permits for specific companies, Bigelow said, the results will be binding for any company for a period of two years.

In counties where a negative vote results, no company operating weather

modification programs could be issued a permit for a period of two years after the election in target area precincts, not until a future election changed the results in operational areas.

The controversial weather modification hassle has been raging across the South Plains for more than

seven years. Cloud seeding firms claim the ability to decrease rainfall and increase rainfall to benefit paying customers, mostly irrigation farmers, on farmlands below by seeding storm clouds with silver iodide.

Dryland farmers, on the other hand, contend the

companies are working in reverse, reducing rainfall and not significantly affecting the amount of hail over the nation.

The series of elections is the most serious threat Citizens for Natural Weather have mounted against the cloud seeding operations to date.

Also selected were Frank Gray, cotton producer, Lubbock; H.L. King, cotton producer, Brownfield; James Mitchell, cotton producer, Wolforth; and Joe Unfred, cotton producer, New Home.

According to Cunyus, the men were chosen because of their knowledge of High Plains agriculture as well as involvement and interest in

furthering agriculture on the High Plains.

The board members will add producer insight to the planning of the exposition. Cunyus said, "to insure that the show will be one producers will want to attend."

The High Plains Agribusiness Exposition will be held September 8-10 at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center. Over 125 exhibitors are currently scheduled to participate in the exposition,

which will include an education symposium on Estate Planning, Energy Development, Water Development and Marketing.

Events of special interest will include "Taste of Texas"; a microwave cooking demonstration; a home decorating seminar; a natural fiber fashion show; a program on "News in Cotton" by Cotton, Inc. and a dinner theater presentation of "I Do! I Do!"

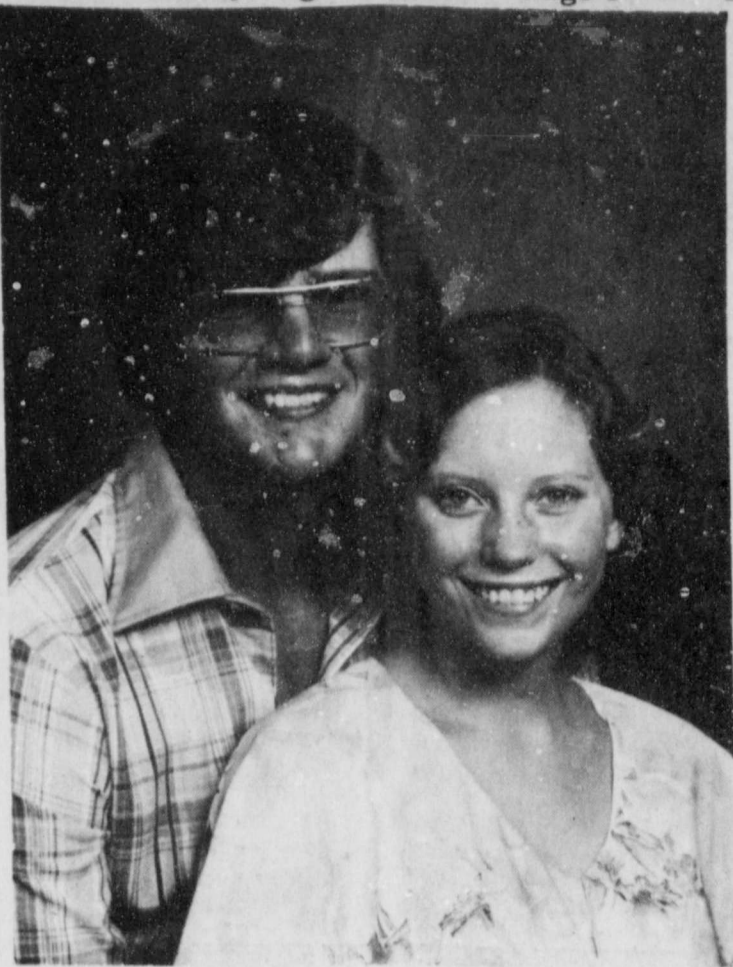

Meddlin's BY PEGGY MEDLEY

FOR a delightful delicacy and something different with cucumbers why not Red Pickles! Nettie Ruth Whittle passed this recipe along and relates the pickles are something on the order of apple rings.

RED PICKLES

Slice and peel cucumbers into 1/4" slices. Use a plastic pill bottle as a biscuit cutter to cut out centers of cucumbers. Use one-half gallon sliced cucumbers, add one-half cup lime and cover with water. Let stand overnight then rinse in clear water. Add clear water and let stand from four to five hours.

In large pan put the following:
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cup vinegar
1 1/2 cup water
1 1/2 cup red hots
1 1/2 cup sugar
red food coloring
Dissolve red hots and

pour cucumbers into solution. Bring to a boil. Cook 30-40 minutes and put in sterilized jars. Wait 30 days to open. Yields five pints.

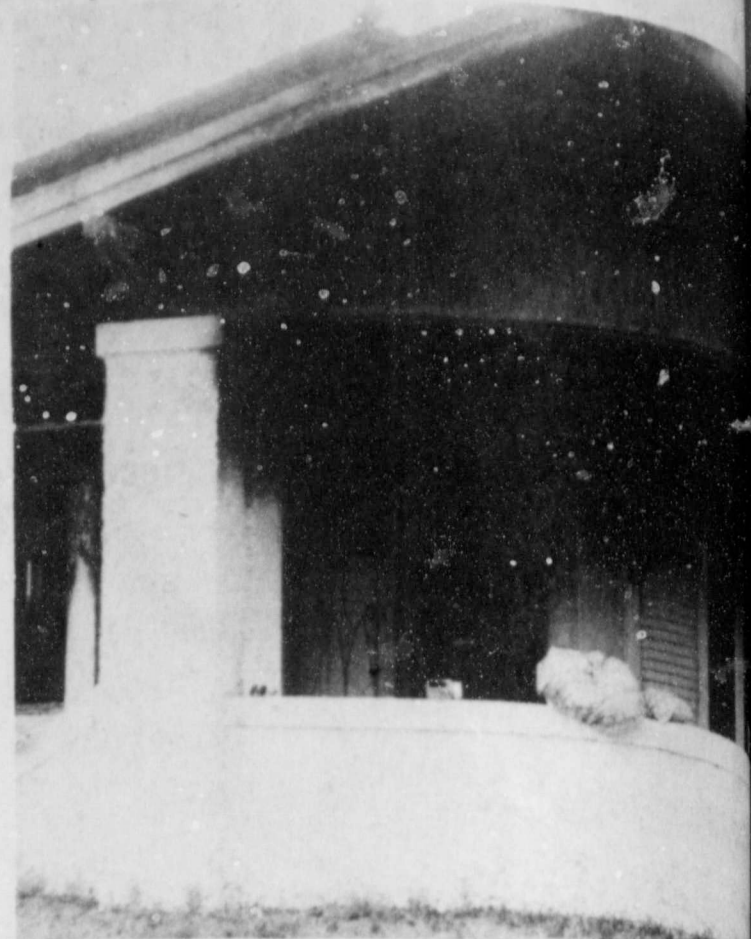

Hints For Motorcyclists
NIGHT RIDING
If you're one of America's 15 million motorcyclists the chances are that sometimes you're a night rider. Here from the experts at Motorcycle Safety Foundation are some tips to make your night riding safer.
• Learn to use the lights from other vehicles. Don't override your headlight which may not cover the road as well as those of an automobile.
• Take extra care to make sure others see you. Your riding gear is important. Wear light, bright clothing. Reflective tape on your helmet and clothing may help catch another driver's eye.
• Don't wear a scratched face shield or goggles. At night it would be particularly dangerous because of the poor vision caused by the reflective glare from oncoming lights. If you use tinted eye protection during the day remember to carry a clear face shield or goggles for night riding.
• If the high beam of your headlight goes out, use the low beam, but get the lighting system fixed at the first opportunity. If your low beam goes out, switch to high beam, and turn or twist the headlight lower so it does not annoy other drivers.
Remember, when riding at night, to take extra care.
