The next day, I may be beginning a program of exercise, using sugar substitutes in my coffee, eating fruit instead of snacks, etc.

I suppose that's why the magazines use both types of articles and advertisements. Whatever mood their readers happen to be in on the day they read them will determine which slant they will be taking.

Prime Officials Say Future Looks Great

Speaker for the regular meeting of the Friona Evening Lions last Thursday was George DeBoer, plant manager for the new Prime International plant in Friona.

DeBoer told the group that the new Friona plant was just finishing its second full week of processing liver, and that among the plant's first orders was one for three loads of liver to go to France. A load weighs between 40,000 and 45,000 pounds.

As of last Thursday, the plant was employing 41 people, and DeBoer said an effort was being made to employ local people whenever possible. The company official said they hoped to be able to double the number of employees by next July or August.

Prime, International has leased approximately one-fourth of the Millard Warehouse space. Prime operates two plants in Omaha, Nebraska, with Friona being its third location.

Livers for the new plant come from the local EXCEL plant, as well as from Clovis and Hereford. Markets for the processed liver are mainly domestic, although from 30 to 40 per cent of the livers are

expected to be exported. Main foreign markets will be in France, Japan and Egypt.

City Has Three Spots Expiring

Three seats are expiring on the Friona City Council this year. Filing deadline is March 6, and as of Thursday, February 21, no one had filed for the position.

Those with terms expiring are Jack Hamil, Dr. Jon Mack Roden and Beth Thompson. Each of these have served at least two terms, and have indicated a preference not to run for re-election. Holdover members of the council are Bill Denney and Carl White, and mayor Clarence Monroe.

People interested in filing for the race may fill out an application during regular office hours at the City of Friona office.

The election will be held on Saturday, April 6 in conjunction with the school board election.

The plant will process some pork and lamb livers, but the overwhelming majority of its product will be beef livers.

"We have a beautiful facility here, and we look forward to a long association with the people of this area," DeBoer said.

Twenty-seven schools took part, from as far away as Fort Worth, Dallas and Ignacio, Colorado. Friona, Floydada, Tulia and Boys Ranch were the only class AAA schools in the tournament.

Only one candidate had signed up for the Friona School board race as of press time this week.

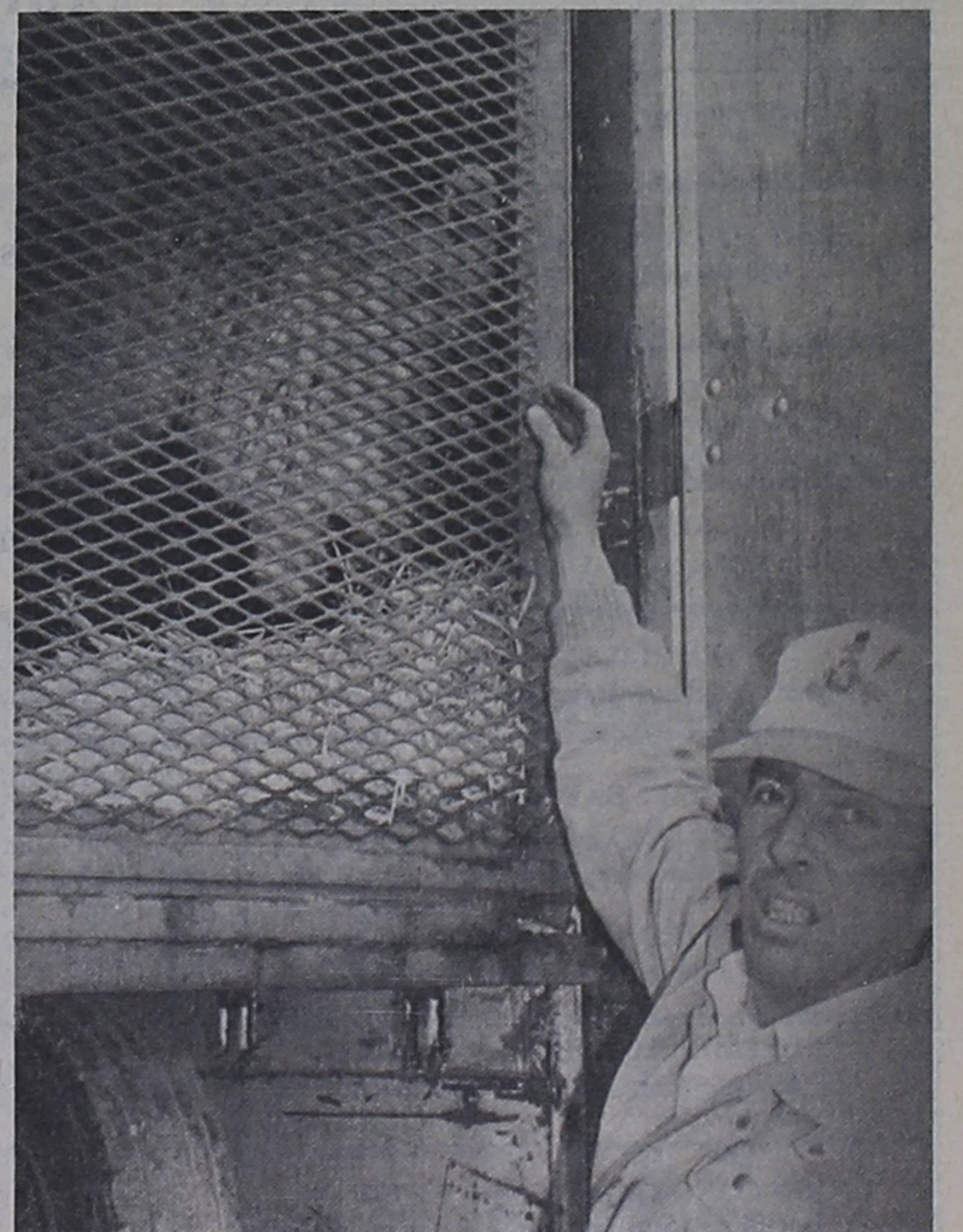
Board member Kathryn Goddard has placed her name on the ballot for re-election, in the April 6 race.

55 YEARS AGO--FEB. 28, 1930

W.H. Warren has the masonry work done on his new building on Main Street, with fair prospects of completion within the next two weeks. The building will be 26 by 60 feet, one story high, divided into three offices. One of these rooms will be an office for Dr. Wills, and another to be occupied by the Friona Star. The third is as yet unrented.

45 YEARS AGO--MARCH 1, 1940

Our people received word with regret which informed them that Dan Ethridge has arranged to move from our city to Lubbock, where he and Mrs. Ethridge will make their home in the future, although they extend congratulations to Dan for the promotion he has received by his appointment as special agent for the Cravens and Dargan Insurance Brokers, of Houston.

40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 2, 1945

The Friona Squaws became champions of District 19 after beating four good ball clubs at the tournament February 23 and 24 at Claude. The Squaws downed Lazbuddie in the opening round, 25-14, and then Lakeview, 28-20. Friona downed Claude, 19-14 in the semi-finals, and then outplayed the Quail Bobwhites, 31-24 in the finals. The Squaws are eligible to attend the state tournament in Hillsboro by virtue of winning this tournament.

35 YEARS AGO--FEB. 24, 1950

At a meeting of the directors of the Friona Wheat Growers, Inc.

Tuesday night it was definitely decided to build more elevator and storage space for the wheat growers, and a contract was let to A.F. Roberts for the erection of another concrete storage elevator. The new elevator will have a capacity of 600,000 bushels of grain, and construction will begin in the near future.

30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1955

Friona businessmen desiring direct motor freight service with Lubbock are reminded this week by Chamber of Commerce president Dillie Kelley that intensified efforts in this matter should be made by next week. A Lubbock meeting with the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Lang Transit Company has been arranged for Thursday, March 3. Several local firms have already made plans to be represented at the meeting.

25 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1960

A farmer and rancher, and a farmer's wife were named the Outstanding Man and Woman of the Year by the Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture at the annual banquet held Friday night at the school cafeteria. A.L. Black, prominent farmer and rancher, and an active member of the Soil Conservation District's board of directors, was named Man of the Year, and Katy Osborn, long-time resident of the Friona and wife of Claude Osborn of Friona, was named Outstanding Woman of the Year.

20 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1965

The clock finally struck

"midnight" for the Friona Chieftains, and their "Cinderella" basketball season Tuesday night at Whiteface. The Chiefs, in the basketball playoffs for the first time in 20 years, ran into a polished herd of Denver City Mustangs, and the playoff-experienced Mustangs made off with an 81-66 victory to win the right to advance to the regional semi-finals Saturday.

15 YEARS AGO--FEB. 26, 1970

Exhibitors from Lazbuddie had another field day at the 36th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last weekend. Lazbuddie claimed the grand champion awards in the barrow show for an unprecedented tenth consecutive year, won four of five trophies in the sheep show, and then surprised all by taking the steer championship on Saturday.

10 YEARS AGO--FEB. 23, 1975

The sale totals at the 27th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show came within \$200 of beating the all-time mark established at the 1974 show. Prize animals sold for a total of \$60,195.78 last Saturday, compared to \$60,387.33 the previous year.

A crowd of 57 people attended a meeting in Friona Monday night, in response to a request by the Friona Chamber of Commerce to determine the interest in building a rest home in Friona.

5 YEARS AGO--FEB. 24, 1980

Lazbuddie exhibitors swept championships in all three divisions of the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last weekend. Vandl Tarter captured the barrow title with a 244-pound Duroc. Sean Mason exhibited the grand champion lamb, a medium wool entry. Phillip Jesko gave Lazbuddie their "sweep" in the show, when his 1156-pound Angus was tapped for grand champion honors in the steer show.

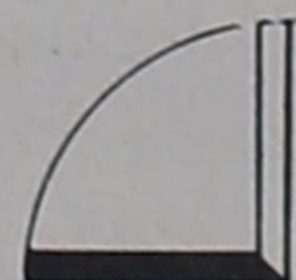

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Chieftain Tracksters Preping For Season

The Friona Chieftain track and field team for 1985 will depend on the most part on some quality young performers, according to Coach Steve Williams.

"They are young, and for the most part untested on the varsity level. But they are working hard, and are looking good," Williams said.

The team's first outing will be their own invitational meet here on March 9.

Among the experienced members of the team coming back are senior John Aguirre and junior Daniel Gowens.

Aguirre won the district title in the 400-meter run, and Gowens won the high jump with a school record 6-4 height.

However, Gowens has been recovering from a knee injury which shortened his football season, and thus far has not been released by his doctor to jump. This okay is expected within a couple of weeks, however.

Another cause of excitement for Williams is the fact that the Friona track will be getting new all-weather runways for the long jump, pole vault and high jump, which should improve these events.

"We have some quality performers in each of these events, so this will be a big help," said Williams, explaining that the runways would be so constructed that the high jump and pole vault could be run either to the north or south, depending on the wind direction on a given day.

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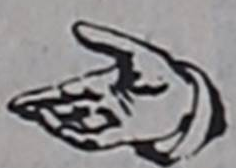

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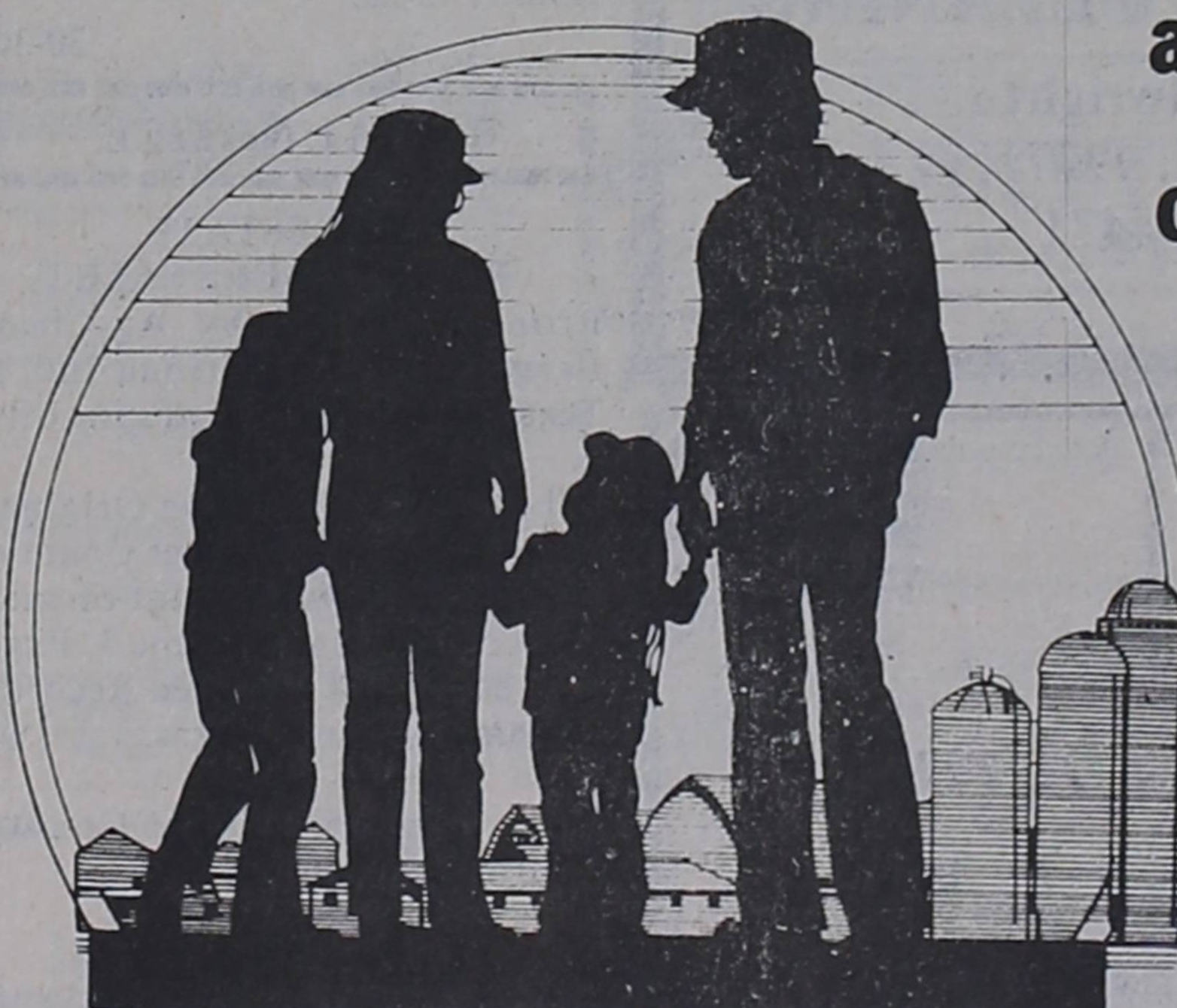

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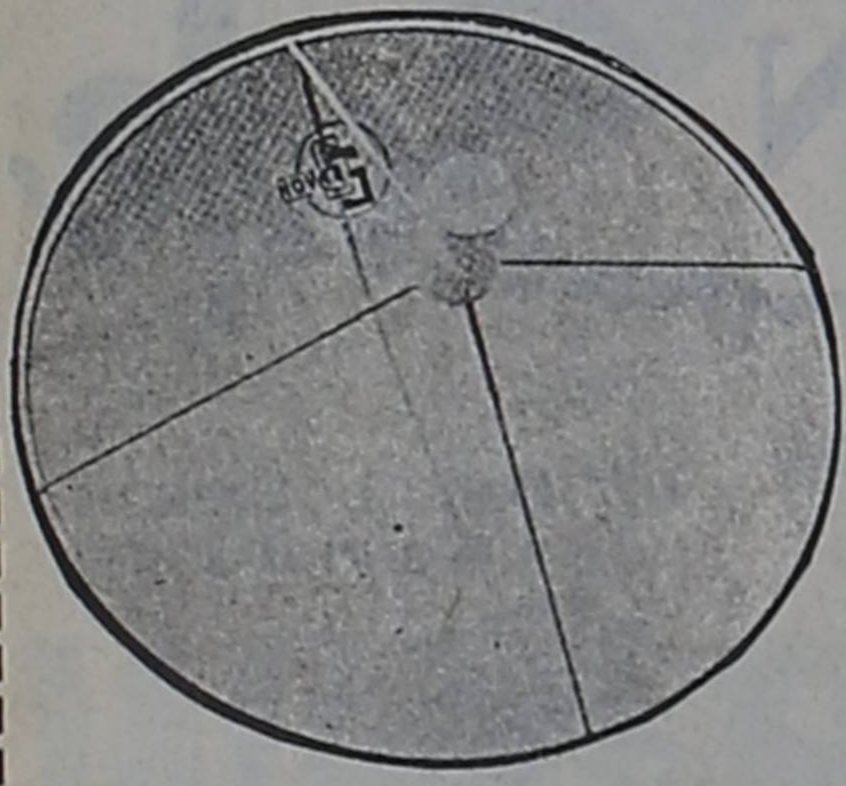

Moseley Does Well After Heart Surgery

Hugh Moseley, Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector, underwent a four-bypass, open heart surgery last year.

On July 24, Moseley was in Friona on business when he began to feel ill after lunch. He drove to Reeve Chevrolet-Olds for a soft drink but didn't feel better.

So Glen Reeve, Jr. took him to Parmer County Community Hospital. Moseley walked in but began feeling faint. Within a few minutes, he had a doctor and four nurses caring for him. He was given an i.v., oxygen and medication for pain.

Moseley was having a heart attack.

"It felt like an 18-wheeler had run over my chest," he recalled.

After two days, he was transferred by ambulance to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. While there, he was in the care of Dr. Joel Osborn, who Moseley had known since the physician was an infant.

On August 21, Dr. Osborn ran an angiogram, and three days later Moseley underwent open heart surgery. Four veins were

transplanted from his leg to his heart.

After the surgery, he was placed in the coronary care unit for two days, then transferred to a regular room. He was discharged and returned home August 29--only five days after the operation.

On October 10, Moseley returned to work on a part-time basis, gradually working up to full-time.

Now, Moseley says he feels just fine, and has ever since the surgery.

Moseley has lived in this area all his life. He was born January 22, 1927 on the family farm south of Friona. Moseley grew up on the farm, and attended school in Friona. When World War II was still in progress, Moseley and a friend, David Johnson, decided one day that they wanted to join the Navy. They were still in high school, and Moseley was 17 years old.

When they got to Dallas to enlist in the Navy, the recruiter told them that they were full up that week, but to come back next

week. Moseley said, "Well, you just didn't make a trip to Dallas every week."

When they walked out of the Navy recruiter's office, right across the way was a sign advertising the Merchant Marines--so they signed up with them. They went back home for the holidays, and were in St. Petersburg, Florida on January 3, 1945, to leave on their first Merchant Marine "adventure."

During the two years Moseley was in the Merchant Marines, he went around the world three times, carrying supplies from port to port.

After the war ended, when he was coming into port at San Francisco, he decided to come home to see his folks. His dad, David Moseley, wanted him to stay home and finish high school, so that he and his brother, Jack, could graduate in the same class. He did, and he and his brother graduated in May 1947.

His friend, David Johnson, was struck by lightning and killed on Easter Sunday, 1949.

Edith Johnson of Friona is Moseley's sister.

After graduating from high school, Moseley attended Texas Tech in Lubbock, majoring in agriculture. He graduated with a Smith-Hughes Degree, which qualified him to teach vocational agriculture, in 1953.

He decided that teaching wasn't really what he wanted for a life's career, and came back to Friona and farmed with his dad in 1954. Also in 1954, he ran for the office of Parmer County and District Clerk. He was elected and took office in 1955. He served in that position for eight years.

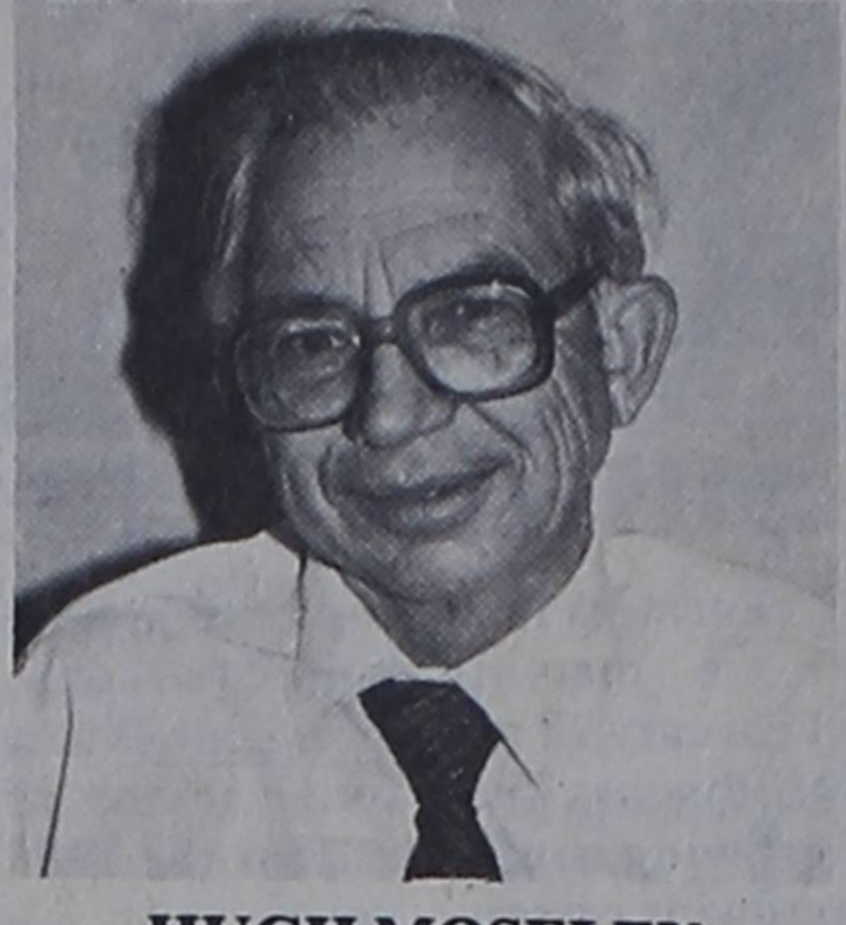
Beginning in January 1963, Moseley drove back and forth from Farwell to Friona Feed Yard, where he worked on the construction of the feed yard for nine months.

Friona Feed Yard was the "pioneer" of the big, modernized feed yards to be built in Parmer County.

In September 1963, Lee Thompson resigned the position of tax assessor-collector, and Moseley applied to replace him. He was hired by the commissioners, and has run and been elected to continue ever since.

In 1962, Moseley married Wilma Louise Snider of Farwell. They have one son, David, who is fifteen years old and a freshman at Farwell High School.

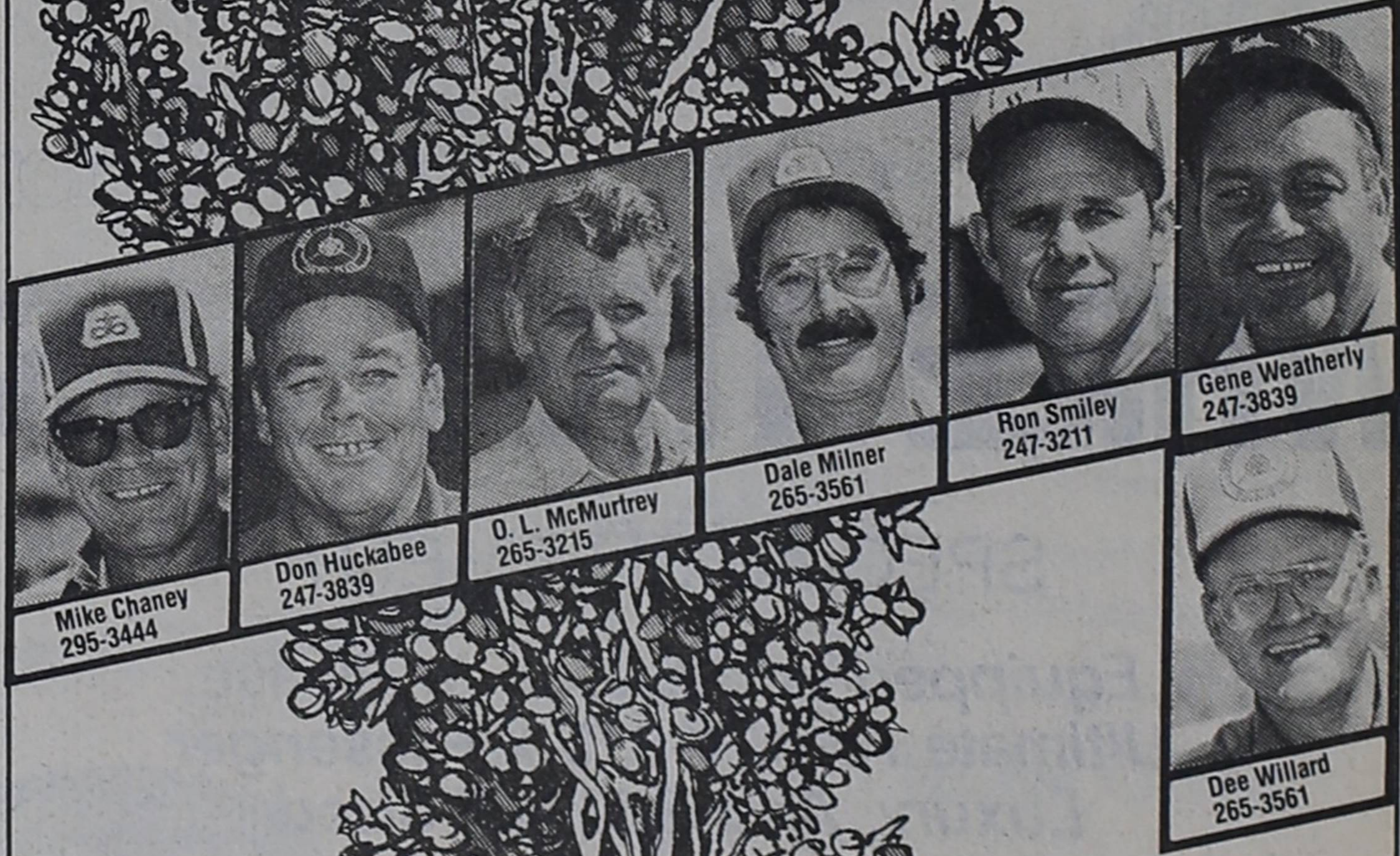
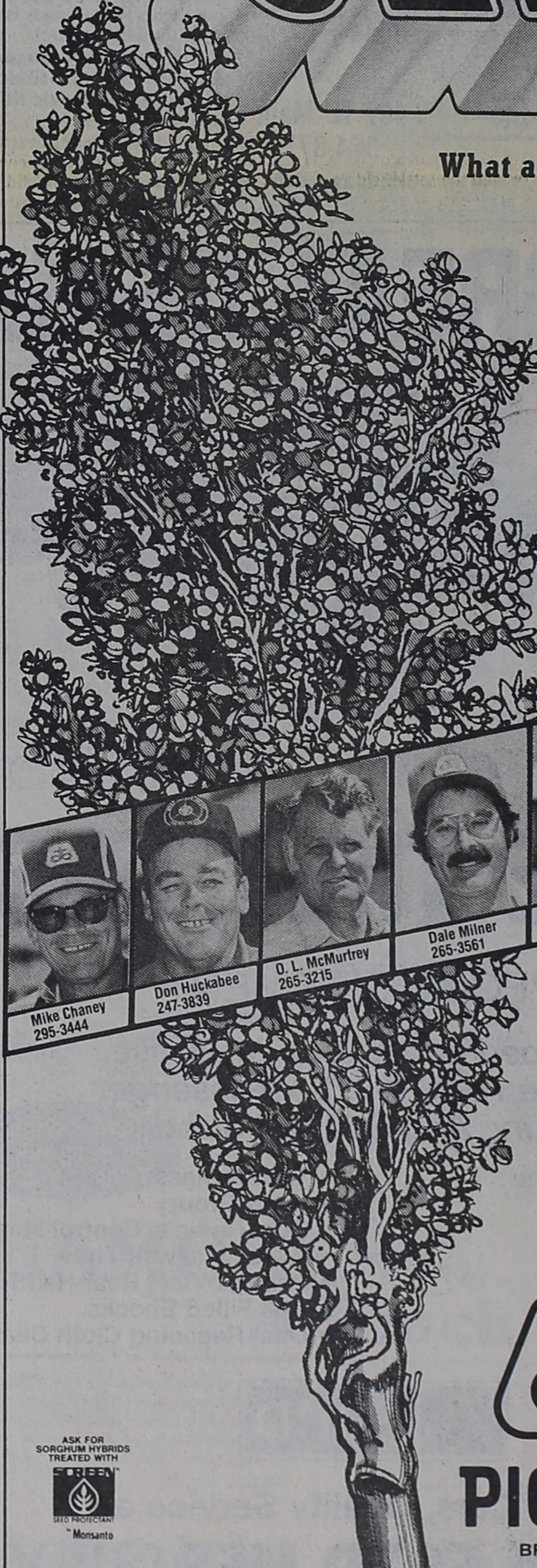
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L.L. Haney's Rites Held In Farwell

Farmer Group Sets Washington March

The AAM is calling for a Farmer's Parity March on Washington, D.C., Monday, March 4 through Friday, March 8.

Larry Scott, local spokesman, says a delegation from Farmer County is being organized.

"All farmers and interested people, labor, consumers, Main Street businessmen, soil conservationists, hunters, church groups, etc., who believe we must save the family farm system should plan on attending," said a spokesman for the organization.

"There will be no next time. We must get parity in agriculture now! Monday will begin with a rally on the steps of the Jefferson Memorial at 12 noon, followed by a march to U.S.D.A. Tuesday through Friday, will be lobbying days for every single Congressional office to be visited," said Corky Jones, national president of the AAM.

The American Agriculture Movement, in conventions and meetings held across the country in recent weeks have come up with a number of proposals it wishes to have included in the 1985 farm bill.

The proposals deal with production controls, loan rates, a food reserve, imports, exports, farm tax loopholes, soil

conservation, farm credit (FmHA), and ASCS practices.

The group wants loan rates to be set at not less than 70 per cent of parity (the average cost of production) on all storable agriculture commodities including milk. Minimum non-recourse loan term should be 36 months with loan rates increasing two per cent annually through 1996 and remain at 90 per cent parity thereafter. Storage rates for on-farm and commercial storage would remain the same, according to the recommendation.

Friona Industries Tells Of New Plan

Friona Industries, Inc. announced today that it has entered into a definitive agreement to be acquired by CHS Holding, Inc. in a merger, or at CHS's election, a tender offer, in which holders of Friona Common Stock will receive \$19 cash per share. The merger is subject to approval of the Friona shareholders and CHS's securing acceptable financing, among other conditions. CHS is owned primarily by Edwin L. Cox, Jr., Chairman of Valley View Holdings, Inc. of Dallas, Texas.

Friona also announced that it has acquired all of the outstanding capital stock of Littlefield Feedyard, Inc. from CHS in exchange for 2,000,000 shares of Friona's newly-issued Cumulative Convertible Preferred Stock valued at \$4,500,000. The Preferred Stock may be converted into Friona Common Stock at \$19 per share and is entitled to one vote for each share of Common Stock into which it is convertible on all matters presented to shareholders and to vote as a class on certain

extraordinary corporate transactions such as mergers. Littlefield Feedyard, Inc. owns a 35,000 head capacity cattle feed lot and related assets in Littlefield, Texas.

In connection with the execution of the merger agreement, Friona granted CHS an option to purchase up to 2,700,000 shares of its Common Stock at \$19 cash per share, and agreed to use its best efforts to obtain agreements from certain of its principal shareholders granting CHS the right to vote and an option to purchase their shares of Friona Common Stock at \$19 cash per share. Friona has presently approximately 2,200,000 shares of Common Stock outstanding. Friona also granted CHS separate options to purchase certain of its assets including its Hi-Pro Feed facility, its Black Grain facilities, and its Friona Transport division. Friona may terminate all the options granted to CHS and rescind the Littlefield acquisition if CHS has not secured financing

before April 14, 1985.

Friona has previously announced that Eller Enterprises, Inc. has made a cash tender offer for all outstanding shares of Friona's Common Stock at \$17.25 cash per share. At a meeting on Tuesday, February 12, the Board determined to recommend to its shareholders that they reject the Eller offer. The Board determined that the Eller offer of \$17.25 per share is inadequate based on the proposed merger with CHS at a price of \$19 cash per share.

According to Ron Davenport, President and Chief Executive Officer of Friona, "We are enthusiastic about this proposal and Ed Cox's future role with Friona Industries. He is an individual with demonstrated experience and substantial commitment to our industry."

"Friona has a strong and unique position in the industry and we look forward to continuing to build that position," stated Cox.

Friona is engaged in seven industry segments: meat

processing and distribution; the manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds; the retail marketing of animal health supplies; the custom feeding of customer-owned cattle; the purchase, fattening and sale of cattle owned by the Company; the operation of grain facilities; and the transportation of grain and feed.

Friona Industries' common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI.

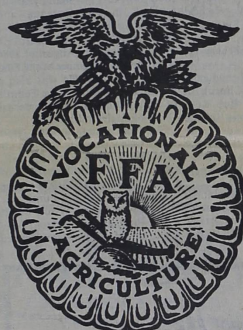
