Defense Prevails Again

turn prior to Friday's crucial district opener with cross-county rival Lockney. And what a way to prepare for such a challenge! Levelland was knocked down and almost down and nearly out during many instances of the contest, but was able to keep driving and give the 'Winds a real test defensively in the uneasy final two minutes. Friday night's game is an example of such pressure the Whirlwinds will receive in competition with 4-AA foes. The drama began in the second half, with Floydada on top by the score of 7-6. For the initial couple of series of downs, the name of the game was field position, which was what eventually led to the game's third score. The Lobos, pinned deep in their own territory inside the 20, punted on fourth down, resulting in a critical situation for them. Kent Rhyne's kick sailed just 21 yards to the 41, where the visitors took over, first and ten. From this point, quarterback Todd Vickers instigated a 10-play scoring march that vaulted his team into a touchdown advantage. Using backs Larry Jones and Joe Covington, Vickers finally went upstairs, after his running game had put the ball on the Lobo 28, to hit Jones for a first down and 15 yards to the 13. Four plays later, he handed straight up the middle to Jones, who plunged a yard for the score. Junior Cuevas tackled on the extras, and Floydada led 14-6, with 1:43 to play in the third period. Levelland took the ensuing kickoff on its own 22, and for the first time in the ball game, let loose its most dangerous weapon that had been no threat previously. Fullback Ivan Mitchell got loose on an off tackle play and dashed 67 yards, the distance needed for a Lobo touchdown, and in the final half minute of the third quarter, the hosts were again knocking on the Whirlwinds' door. Suddenly, the two-point conversion became almost as important as the touchdown itself. Quarterback Lance Anthony calmly went the three yards needed on a keeper right and the scoreboard at the south end told the story and what the Whirlwinds had to do. Part of the assignment was accomplished through the outstanding contribution provided by the 'Winds defense. Levelland came no closer than the Floydada 35 for the entire remainder of the contest, and the unit that shined

the most and longest, was the infallible pass defense. Todd Vickers, Marty Daniel, Jay Waller, Jimmy Jackson, Larry Jones, and Rick Covington headed a defensive secondary that allowed only three completed aerials, kept the sweeps and end runs from being a serious threat, and withstood a last-minute surge by the hosts that just almost spelled defeat for Floydada. The play that was the key for the Whirlwinds came on that beautifully executed 80-yard winning march. Larry Jones got the call to run, went to his left, found some daylight, and dashed 50 yards all the way to Levelland's 30, before finally being brought down. Ricky Day rushed for the next three downs and carried the ball to inside the 10. Vickers carried to the 1, then tried himself to score twice, but with no luck. Finally, on fourth and a foot for the TD, Vickers kept it again and squirmed in through the defensive line to score. This time, Cuevas' PAT attempt failed. Levelland never stopped fighting. The ensuing drive was halted by Jay Waller's interception, but soon Floydada was forced to punt, and the hosts got a desperation shot. On two fourth down situations they converted and found themselves in Whirlwind territory with less than a minute to play. And on the game's last play, quarterback Anthony just hurled the ball into the end zone, hoping for a miracle. Ironically, Jim Faulkner wound up very close to catching it, in spite of a tremendous effort by Todd Vickers in tipping it away from his fingertips at the last second.

FIRST HALF

Each team managed to score in the first half of play, but each club again managed to sing that same old song of mistakes resulting in the thwarting of mounting drives. The hard running of Jones, who had another 100-plus yard outing, carried the 'Winds to their first score. On a third down situation it was Vickers going upstairs to hit Jones for 11 yards and a TD with 5:52 to play in the second period. Cuevas added the point after, to make it 7-0. Faulkner used a few running tactics of his own to slice the Whirlwind advantage to a single point late in the half. The big Lobo halfback raced 41 yards to paydirt with 2:17 remaining, after being helped by a crucial interference penalty, good for 39 yards, moments earlier. The PAT failed.

Watch for flatware sales in October—stainless steel or sterling silver. This may be a good time to add to a collection, or to start one.

Both sterling and stainless flatware are available in patterns from very ornate designs to simple, modern lines.

As for care, both can go in the dishwasher; however, hollow handle silver knives usually cannot. Intense heat weakens the glue on the handle, causing it to loosen. Silver will need an occasional shine-up with a silver polish.

Quarterback Marty Covington scored the only touchdown the Breezers were able to punch across all evening, in the second period on a keeper play.

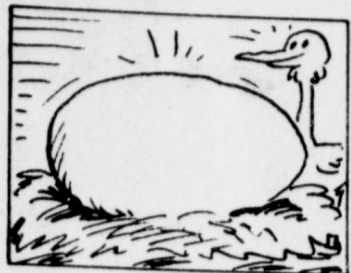
The 'Horns were able to snap a 6-6 halftime deadlock and contain Floydada's offensive attack for the entire last half.
