The elderly in West Texas sometimes are victims of consumer fraud and deceptive practices, according to Prof. E. Carolyn Ater, project director of the senior citizen consumer advisory program.

Studies show that the elderly frequently face loneliness, health and appearnace problems. low self-esteem, and social isolation. These characteristics can add to the preclusion of fair

treatment in consumer dealings. Benefits include enhancement of consumer behavior for participants and an opportunity for persons serving as peer councelors to make social contrib-

Program objectives are aimed at strengthening the present system of peer counseling, incorporating a system of mini-program modules on preventive and advocacy consumer issues. and initiating use of a manual and mini-program system. Program objectives will be established in an eight

county area around Lubbock county. The goal is senior citizen peer counseling training in consumer and financial management.

This year's grant expansion includes Floyd, Crosby, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn and Terry counties.

The training manual for the program serves as an extension of related programs by the Better Business Bureau of the South Plains and the Legal Services Corporation.

Program expansion is designed to help the elderly realize that consumer education can be a preventive measure against possible victimization.

Following the wedding the couple will return to make their home in Floydada where he is employed in marketing at Piggly Wiggly.





From birth to death, life is a series of crises. In varying degrees every person must learn to cope with these times of trouble, ranging from mild depression to deep despair. Andrew Lester has written IT HURTS SO BAD, LORD! which is described as "What to do when the pain is almost more than you can bear." Simply knowing that you are not alone in your pain and distress can help you cope with a crisis. He deals with several of life's most devastating blows. Chapters one and two deal with depression and the recovery of hope. The next three chapters are directed to the person facing a terminal illness and are entitled "The Crisis of Dying," These are not pat answers but an honest discussion of the feelings and conflicts of facing death coupled with compassion and helpfulness rooted in the Christian faith. The next two chapters are designed for the loved ones who must cope with the bereavement of illness and death.

The feelings of failure and grief that accompany the crisis of separation and divorce are the focus of the last two chapters. Dr. Lester is director, Department of Pastoral Care, North Carolina Baptist Hospital, and doesn't claim to have all of the answers, but he does give comfort, presence, and stability for the worst times of your life-when you feel
