

CPA Gives Tips On Farm Management

In a speech to the farmers and business gathered at the Massie County Center on last Monday, Fred Thayer, local C.P.A., was asked to give observations on the plight of Floyd County farmers.

Thayer noted that most of our farmers have been able to pay out this past year's taxes, but he said that many have not been able to show a reasonable return for their investment and the risks involved. Floyd County farmers in general have fared better than most because of very high yields from cotton.

Thayer noted however that 1978 will see farmers facing bankruptcy if they stay the same, costs continue to rise and only normal production levels are attained.

Thayer said the wheels of government are slow to turn, but he said the farmer may not come in time or in amount to help in 1978. Cash flow will be the key to survival.

For the heavily mortgaged farmer and the smaller operators, Mr. Thayer outlined several points whereby the farmer can better control his economic future.

1. Plant a variety of crops, but only if sufficient water is available to insure harvesting those crops after a dry summer.
2. Carefully evaluate the need for new equipment and the cash required to make payments on the notes. Repairing old equipment can avoid high dollar commitments and interest charges; however, new equipment can provide tax advantageous depreciation and investment tax credit.
3. Evaluate the benefit of new versus the reduced cost of used equipment in your own farming situation. Reduced dollar investment may be of the most benefit in 1978.
4. Know the income tax consequences of your decisions in buying, selling or trading equipment; forward con-

tracting, deferring payments; prepaying expenses.

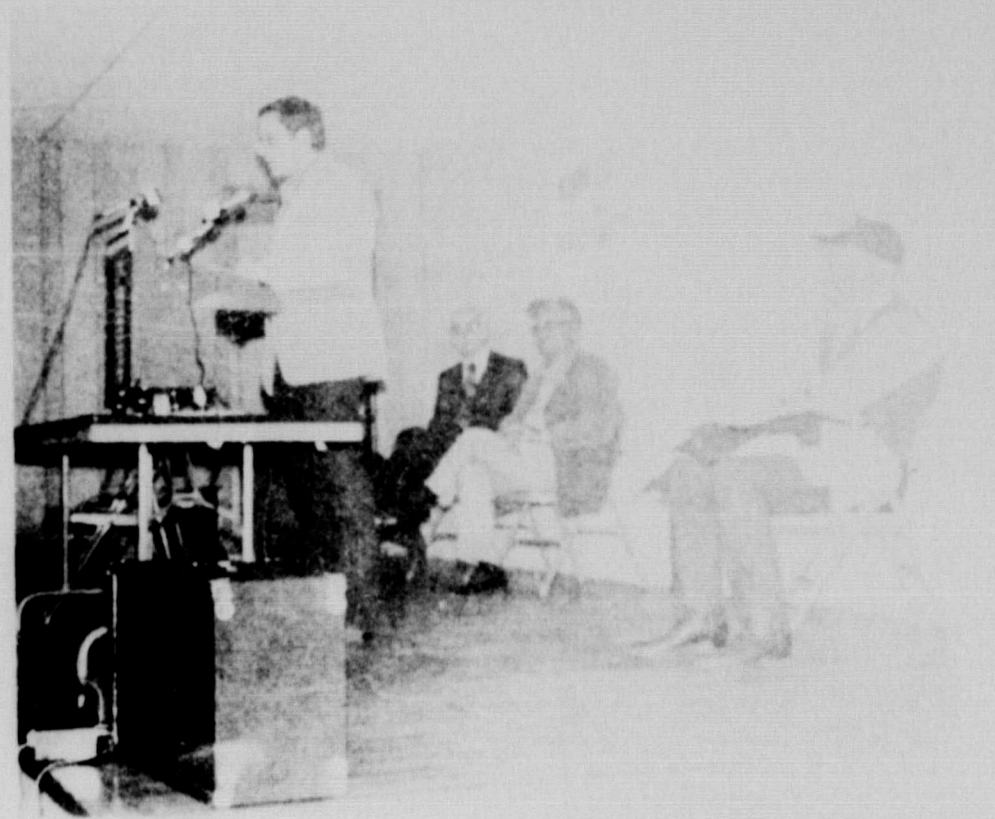
5. Project tax liabilities for 1978 while there is still time to alter the outcome. Early November is usually best.
6. Avoid the tax traps of large crop carryovers. It can create a large tax liability in an otherwise unprofitable year after the money is spent on production or personal extras. It also creates a large taxable income in years when prices are good and one needs to sell to take advantage of market conditions. Your flexibility at marketing time is limited.
7. Estimate your production costs by crop, assuming normal conditions, before you ever plant. Compare to market prospects.
8. Control personal living expenses. Many do not realize how much they do spend. If you are in a marginal cash position, a budget for family living expenses and separate bank accounts

for farming operations and personal living expenses could be good control tools.

Births, Deaths, Marriages, Divorces Down

Four phases of the way of life in Floyd County were in a downturn in 1977.

According to courthouse records births were down from 287 in 1976 to 233 in 1977. Deaths were down from 96 to 84; marriages were down from 96 to 95 and divorces were down from 32 to 26.

Emergency Loan Meeting Monday

WE MENTIONED that Frank Brown was one of our better Floydada farmers in the last edition of the Hesperian.

Brown says there is a former FHS farmer who has really won some awards. He is former Dougherty County Bill Daniel, son of Ruth Brown.

December Bill won a 40 mile race in California, and through the years won several major races.

Brown graduated from Floydada High School, then got his B.A. and M.A. at Southern Tech. He received his PhD from Southern Illinois University. He is now state professor of Political Science at Southern State University in California.

Bill ran the 40 mile in four and 35 minutes. I figure it would take two or three days to walk that distance.

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). Gary L. Brown, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Brown asked that those who need farm credit as a result of hail make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 107 W. California, Floydada, Texas.

Application for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until July 17, 1978 for physical losses and January 16, 1979 for production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming or ranching operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Brown said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of three and five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is 8 percent. Long-term loans are being made at an interest rate of 8 percent.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

Gary L. Brown, FmHA County Supervisor for Floyd County states that there will be a county wide meeting on January 23, 1978 in the county court room in the Floyd County Courthouse. The meeting will be held at 3:00 p.m.

Mr. Brown requests that all Floyd County farmers who suffered a production loss on 1977 crops, by hail, come to the meeting. At this meeting additional information and needed forms will be distributed.

If FmHA's assistance is to be received by those who are eligible, the cooperation of each farmer is a must.

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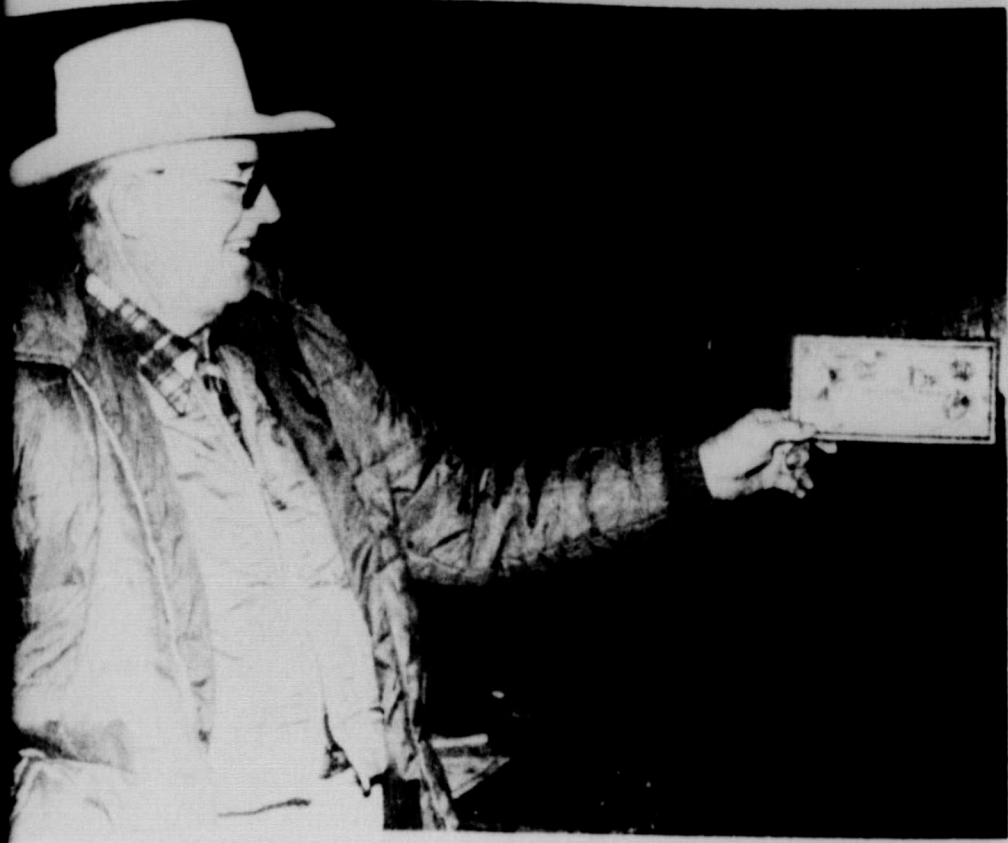

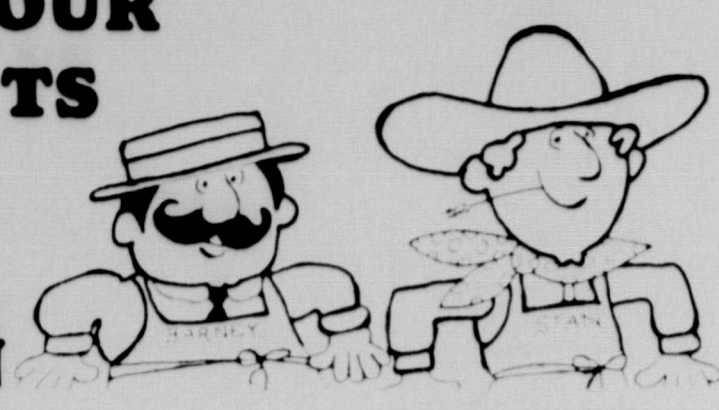
Beef Cattle Short Course

FISH COOKERY NEEDS "TLC"

"Tender Loving Care" is a "must" in cooking fish whether today's home chefs follow an old English proverb on the subject or create their own techniques.

Some seafood epicureans agree with the old English proverb that "fish must swim three" in water, in a sauce, and then in wine in the stomach, while others says only necessary to enhance seafood's natural flavor, a treat in itself.

However, cooking seafood lightly and serving it as soon as the real secrets to connective tissue and requires only minutes for its protein to coagulate.

To cook fish, apply full heat for only a few minutes until the outside is cooked to seal moisture and flavor inside.

Then lower the temperature to a moderate heat and complete cooking for only a

few minutes more. Test fish for doneness slightly before the prescribed cooking time is up to prevent it from drying out.

Use a fork to test it. When the fish flakes easily at the thickest part and the flesh is white, stop the cooking process.

These cooking steps help maintain the delicate flavor and flakey texture of sea food, and they keep the natural juiciness from cooking out.

Fish does not require the slow cooking that meat does even at very low temperatures, because fish muscle fibers are short and they soften quickly when heat is applied.

INADEQUATE WIRING SIGNS

Spot "Warning signs" of inadequate wiring and save money. Three signs can indicate inadequate wiring in the home:

TV picture "wines" or shrinks in size when an

appliance is plugged in, fuses blow or circuit breakers trip too frequently, lights flicker and dim when appliances are turned on.

"In addition to causing inconvenience, these signs indicate that appliances are wasting money when they cannot perform their full jobs."

"Too many appliances running on the same circuit can cause a voltage drop."

"With a voltage drop of only 10 percent, a lamp loses 30 percent of its light and heating appliances produce at only 70 percent efficiency."

When remodeling a house, be sure to install adequate wiring for present and future needs. Many homes over 15 years old need wiring improvements to match today's life style.

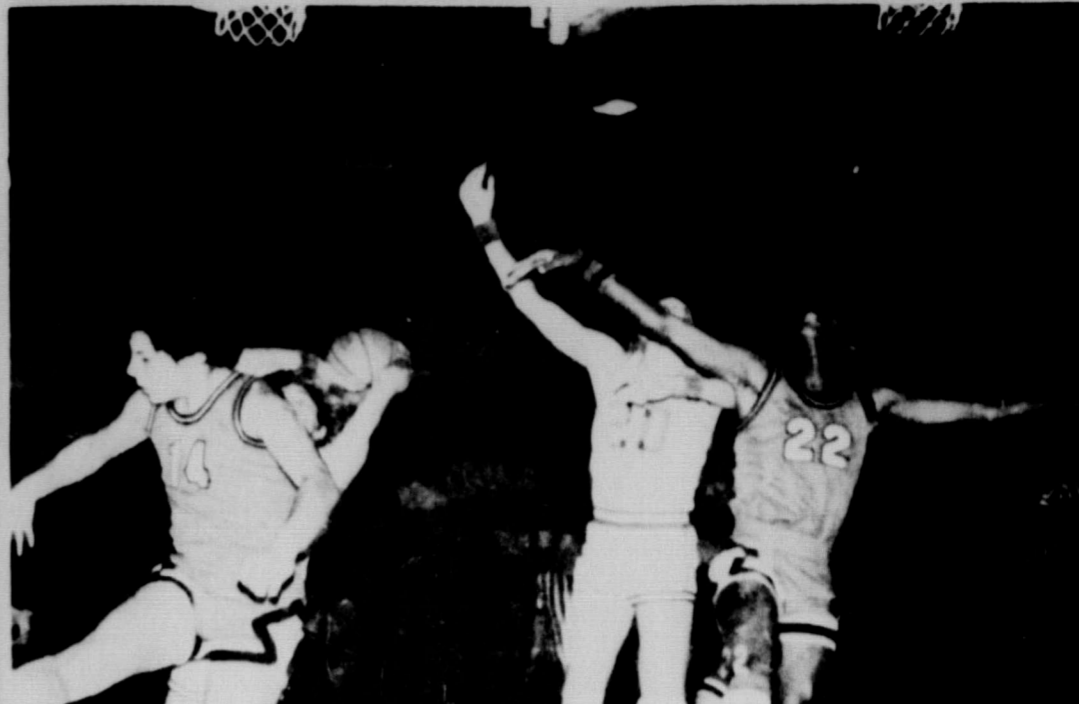

Farmers Face Low Farm Prices, High Costs-- Texas farmers are facing serious problems due to low farm prices, high energy costs and decreasing water supplies. Comparing target prices in the new Farm Bill and average costs of Texas farmers, many will be hard pressed to make ends meet financially, notes an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Policy solutions might lie in higher target prices for higher cost production areas, subsidies on agricultural input prices, or increased research and extension support to reduce production costs.

Candidate Supports Farmers

Congressional candidate A.L. "Dusty" Rhodes Wednesday said he supports the concept of 100 percent parity in the marketplace for farmers.

In a press conference at the Massie Activity Center here, the Abilene Democrat, running for the 17th District seat being vacated this year by veteran U.S. Rep. Omar Burlison, added that he supports the efforts of farmers in showing the nation what their problems are.

"I'm calling for immediate action by the Congress to solve the farmers problems," the 47-year-old attorney said. "I feel that the Congress should call on the U.S. Department of Agriculture to account for its failure to actively participate in the sale and distribution of farm products on the world market."

"I think that Congress should realize that we've the ability through international persuasion to require foreign countries to purchase our food and fiber."

Rhodes said he intends to meet with farm groups and economic experts to evaluate the possibilities for immediate action in solving the farmers problems "not only after I'm elected but while I'm running."

The Abilene attorney also said that President Carter's proposed five percent reduction in taxes is not enough. "I've made a thorough study of the tax problem, and I would ask for a 25 percent tax cut," Rhodes said, adding that a substantial reduction in taxes would stimulate the economy.

In 1962 and 1963 the income tax was cut at about the same percent, and the economy soared, he said.

On other issues, the candidate said that he is "100 percent" opposed to federal intervention in land and water use and for the deregulation of oil and gas, adding that he recognizes the serious harm in regulation of the oil and gas industry.

Rhodes' Democratic opposition for the seat includes Charles Stenholm, Stamford Fike Godfrey, Abilene, Jim Snowden, Merkel, and Jim Baum, Big Spring. The only announced Republican candidate for the race is Bill Fisher of Abilene.

The 17th Congressional District encompasses much of north central Texas, including Floyd, Crosby, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Borden, Scurry, Howard, Mitchell and the southeastern corner of Dawson County.

Rhodes visited with Lockney folk Wednesday morning, spoke to the Floydada Senior Citizens, then at noon spoke to the Floydada Rotary Club. At 3 p.m. he visited with Floyd county farmers.
