## Sales Tax Ups City's Coffers

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that his office has mailed checks totaling \$13.8 million to 898 Texas cities as their May share of the one percent city sales tax. The May allocation brings collections for the year to \$135.5 million, a 6.1 percent increase over the same period last year. The City of Lockney received \$1,321.92, compared with \$1,609.37 for the same period last year. Lockney's payments so far in 1978 have totalled \$12,187.14, up three percent from the \$11,635.46 collected through April 30 last year. Floydada's check was for \$2,490.63, compared with \$4,868.47 a year ago. 1978 payments to date total \$27,337.24, six percent higher than in 1977 (\$25,762.22). The City of Houston received the largest check--\$3 million. City sales tax collections there are running 8 percent ahead of last year. The local-option city sales tax is collected by merchants along with the state sales tax and rebated monthly.

## Blood Drive Set To Go May 31

A blood drive has been set for Floydada at the end of this month, giving Floydada and area residents an opportunity to support this always-worth cause, Carl Jarrett, blood drive chairman, announced yesterday. Jarrett said the drive, under the director of the South Plains Blood Service of Lubbock, will be conducted from 3-6 p.m. Wednesday, May 31 at the Lighthouse Electric Cooperative offices in Floydada. Blood donors must be age 17 through 65 and weigh a minimum of 110 pounds. Prospective donors should eat prior to their blood donation and avoid large quantities of fatty foods up to four hours before giving. Donors are also asked to bring their social security numbers at time of donation.

Tyer noted that approximately 88 students will receive their diplomas, climaxing 12 years of study in the public school system. The ceremony will start at 8 p.m., Principal Charles Tyer said. The administrator said the 755-seat high school auditorium will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis and advised parents and friends to be there early if they wanted to be sure of being seated.

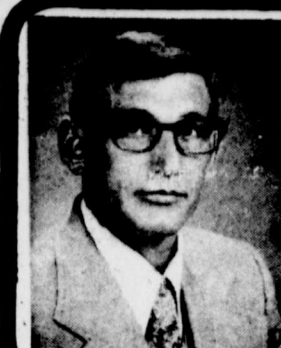

## Around the County County Agent's Column

By Doyle Warren  
County Extension Agent

Homeowners, as well as our farmers, face many problems with the "planting-growing season." Keeping a landscape around the home is no easy chore. Water, fertilizer, herbicides, insecticides, and fungicides, even though good tools to be used, create problems for home "green thumbs." Care should be taken to follow the directions on the labels of pesticides that are used around the home. Most are extremely poisonous, so consider this in using and storing them.

The recent rains were great, but not anywhere near sufficient for our drought-stressed plants. Heavy applications of water on a ten to fourteen day schedule is still needed to maintain lawn and shrubs during the growing season. The rain was a start, but stay with a good schedule.

Fertilizer applications need to be made about every six weeks. Apply fertilizers to lawns at the rate of two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet. That

Lawns need at least one application of phosphate per year. Established lawns seem to do better with a complete lawn fertilizer including trace elements. **Important:** Follow the directions on the label for fertilizers containing weed killers. Do not over apply. "Myth Killer": Fertilizing a lawn means that you actually use less applied water. The well fertilized lawn utilizes the moisture better by deep rooting and a healthy condition.

Now is the time to control bagworms. Close inspection of infected trees and shrubs will reveal very minute worms inside a protective cover. These small bagworms hatch from the old bags left on the tree during winter. Young worms spin silken sacs and attach small bits of leaves, twigs, and needles to the outside. The bagworm carries this sac wherever it goes. In a few weeks the worm will be almost impossible to kill. The insecticides left on the market recommended for use are usually very effective against these very tiny worms. They are less effective as the worms grow larger. Malathion, sevin, diazinon, and dipel are available locally. Follow label instructions for mixing and application.

White grubs are damaging many lawns. The grub cuts the grass just under the soil line, leaving the exposed portion to die. Chlordane and diazinon are recommended for control. Follow label directions.

### Social Security Answer Column

Question: Is it true that some young people get social security benefits just for being in school and have never worked under social security?

Answer: Yes and no. Such benefits go to dependents of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who remain in school up to age 22. The benefits are based on the work records of the parents, and recognizes that so long as a child remains in school and is unmarried there is still some dependency involved. Of course, like all social security benefits, they would be affected by any earnings the student has over the annual earnings limit, a test the law provides to measure whether dependency actually exists.
