

Highlight of the day's event was the annual parade. In the Commercial float division the Producers Cooperative Elevator float was named first for a \$15 prize, followed by Caprock Hospital's float which took a \$10 prize and Davis Farm Supply third for a \$5 prize.

As always, the barbeque luncheon drew a large crowd to the court house square as they partook of a traditional western fare meal.

Charlie Spence was recognized as the oldest man in the parade and Mrs. Mather Carr, as the oldest woman. They were awarded plaques. Wayland Bagwell of Montebello, Calif. was the pioneer coming the longest distance. He had lived in Floyd County from 1917-26.

Dr. Jack Henry, a San Antonio orthopedic surgeon and the son of Mrs. Jack, Henry of Floydada, and a grandson of County Judge F.P. Henry who served Floyd County from 1907-12, was the speaker for the Old Settlers Reunion.

Dr. Henry sketched the history of the county, recalled early medical practices and then reminisced about his days at Floydada High School in Miss Anne Swepston's English class.

"But let me tell you about the time I quit Floydada High School," he told the crowd. "Miss Swepston had assigned the senior class to commit to memory the prologue of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales in Old English. I tried ... a little bit, as did Glad Norman, Kent Covington, George Chapman, Bobby Carmack, Doyle Grundy, John West, Keith Marble, Gary Carthel, Jimmy Collins, Waldo Baxter, Ray Ferguson, Jack Womack, Roger Poage and some others.

"There have been many, many successful people produced by this county," Henry told his audience. "I can personally name engineers, doctors, lawyers, teachers, accountants, and preachers who are leaders in their respective fields, all from Floyd County. These people were not successful by accident; they were nurtured through their roots [in Floyd County] and given wings with strength to fly. They received their confidence, discipline, sense of responsibility, tests of their abilities and most important, their values, right here in a West Texas town, from you people sitting out there. For this, they are eternally grateful. However, I would remind those of us assembled here today of the moral: "For unto whom much is given, of him much is required; and to whom men have committed much, of whom they will ask more," he concluded.

This was in 1909. In 1926 the fire department bought a Model T fire truck and by experience they learned that sometimes water is not the best answer. One time they had a fire in a dry goods store and they washed all of the goods off the shelves before they discovered just a smoldering fire in the back of the store in a barrel used for a waste basket. By that time they were wadding in water up to their knees. What were early mail facilities like?

"As long as my parents were on the ranch, they had a post office in their home. Mail was carried from Floydada to Childress in a hack pulled by two wild mules. They would change teams at our place, deliver mail there for that

County had 32 precincts with each precinct having its own school and Since the ranch was near the Caprock my mother named the post office church.

Each community was the center of activity and interests for that community. Young people were happy in their own community and rural people came to town only to trade and transact business. Rural people developed strong character and dependability and they are still the backbone of the nation," she said.

The first FHS graduating class was composed of Pearl White and Edith Duncan in 1908.

Mrs. Garrett said she attended school in a three-room school building in the north part of Floydada.

"The building I attended was so dilapidated that they built a new two-story school building on the same ground in 1908 with about eight classrooms. About three years later a brick school building was built in the south-east part of Floydada and I attended this high school from the sixth grade until I finished high school in 1918.

"The old wooden school building in the northwest part of town was used for an apartment house and about 1924 the lighting struck the school bell and it burned in a few minutes.

At that time I was not married and was living on the same street. My husband to be and I were watching the storm from the window and saw the lighting strike the bell.

"At school we studied the usual reading, writing and arithmetic, spelling, science, history, Latin and the basic subjects as now used. The main sports were basketball and football, mainly intramural.

"There were probably 25 teachers and about 300 students in the Floydada school system in 1918. The Andrews Ward school was built about 1923 and the present junior high school was built in the 1930's. The old school building in southeast Floydada was torn down about 1945 and the bricks sold to the First Baptist Church for use in the old section of the church.

"Incidentally, the Presbyterian Academy was built in northeast Floydada about 1916 but did not run more than three or four years.



**Plant Mums Now For Fall Color** 

COLLEGE STATION Although the fall season seems far away, it's time to plan for some color for the home landscape this fall. Chrysanthemums can fill the bill.

"Chrysanthemums can provide color and variety in the fall months after many annual flowers have passed their prime, says Everett Janne, landscape horticul-turist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Rooted cuttings of chrysanthemums planted in late

May or early June will have

Dusty Rhodes has been endorsed by the political action committee of the Texas State Teachers Association in Taylor County (TAPAC.)

TAPAC, which interviewed Rhodes and his seven rivals for congressman in March, announced the endorsement Tuesday at Rhodes' Abilene campaign headquarters.

Lynn Nichols, dean of students at Abilene High School and TAPAC chairman, said members were pleased with Rhodes' attitude toward business, agriculture "and particularly your attitude toward education."

"I deeply appreciate this endorsement," Rhodes said in responding. "I hope to be challenged by it."

He pledged to support TSTA's goal of "a better educational environment, not only for the students but for the teachers."

His aim as congressman would be to "actively, agreeably and persuasively represent this district."

Asked what benefits the TAPAC endorsement would bring his campaign, Rhodes said, "These folks are going to help in a voluntary way."

Did the endorsement carry any promise of campaign funds?

"We have not talked about financial support." Rhodes replied.

Nichols guipped, "You don't ever ask a teacher for money." Other teachers chuckled. TAPAC will make sure, Nichols said, that "the word will go out to 1,135-fellow educators that he's the man ... "

Rhodes did not promise TAPAC to do as the committee wished, Nichols said.




His record, in truth, is remarkable for one of 39 years, and it portends many years of productive service for the 17th district if he reaches Congress.
