Water For Tulia, Lockney, Silverton, Floydada In Planning Stage

Officials from Floydada, Lockney, Silverton and Tulia met at the Silverton Monday, July 24, 1978 to discuss the possibility of securing funds for building a water transmission line, raw water lines, pump station and storage and transmission facilities.

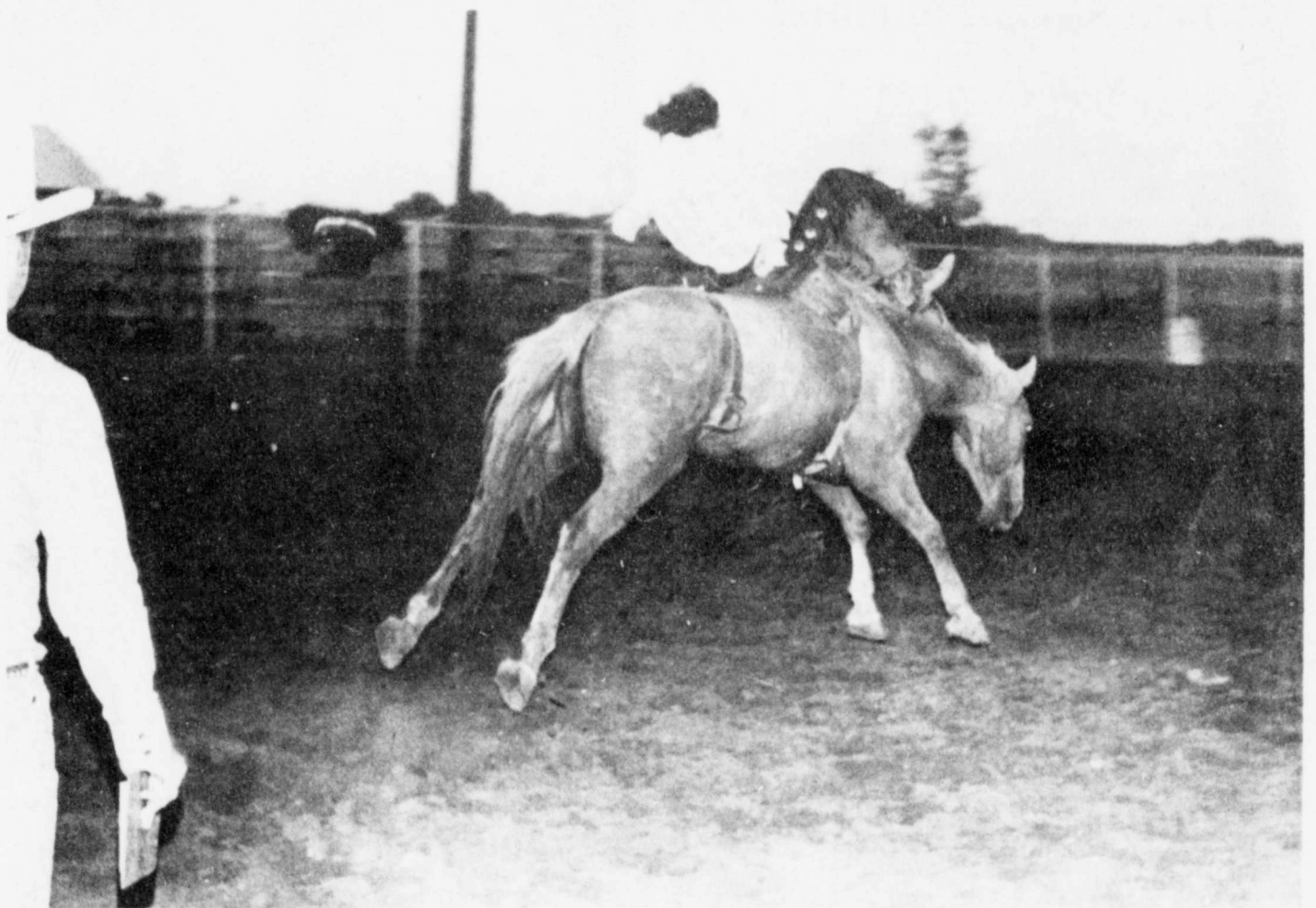

This was the second of two meetings of this type getting information and input in trying to put together materials for filing applications with both Economic Development Administration and Farmers Home Administration. The funds from EDA would be used for building the Treatment Plant, Raw Water Lines, Pump Station and Storage facilities. The funds from FHS would help in building Transmission Lines from the Plant to the four towns.

At this time Silverton is the hardest hit for water - what little water they have is not state approved. They have exhausted all possible means for new water and there is none to be found in this vicinity. City officials do not feel that their present water supply will hold out until water can be secured from the lake. Members present from some of the other cities feel that in a very short time they will also be experiencing the same problem that the city of Silverton is having. With the water table dropping nearly three feet each year it will be only a very few years that the towns on the High Plains who have surface water will survive.

The cost of building the above mentioned at Lake Mackenzie has risen nearly three million dollars in the past six years and there is no reason to believe that the cost will not continue to rise.

Most everyone present at this meeting expressed the opinion that the water authority should continue with the applications and that they would help in any way possible in securing funds for this project.

A few light showers hit other areas of the county. Irrigation wells continue to run night and day, many farmers irrigating every other row of their cotton to keep it "cooled off".

People Won't Pay For An Ambulance Ride!

Many people appreciate the services of emergency ambulance service, but when it comes time to pay for the service, will not...or cannot pay. Thus, the Caprock Hospital Ambulance Service lost money last year.

According to a report from Doyle Walls, president of Caprock Hospital board, expenses for the ambulance service the past 12 months were \$16,395. A total of \$8,371 was billed, and of this amount only 54 percent was collected. Net loss was \$12,328.

Some of the loss is defrayed by the county and the city, each pays \$350 per month to help keep the emergency ambulance service going.

Walls reported that he is pleased with the personnel and equipment that make the service first class in every way. He said there are two qualified people on stand by at all times...the fully equipped ambulance is almost

brand new.

"I can give you this example of how the ambulance service loses money," Walls said. "The ambulance picked up a drunk that had been cut up one night. Doctors here, Lockney, Plainview, were unavailable or refused to take care of the man. The ambulance finally hauled the man to an Amarillo hospital. The ambulance charge was \$165, and we were never able to collect the money."

In making this report to the Floydada Rotary Club Wednesday, Walls concluded that the overall need of this community and the hospital is more medical doctors. "This would mean more people in Caprock Hospital, and we could reach a break even cost of operation," Walls told the Rotarians.

In conclusion Walls urged everyone to make a big effort to secure more doctors for this community.

Crencensio and Lydia have three children of their own, two boys and a girl, who are married and have their own families.

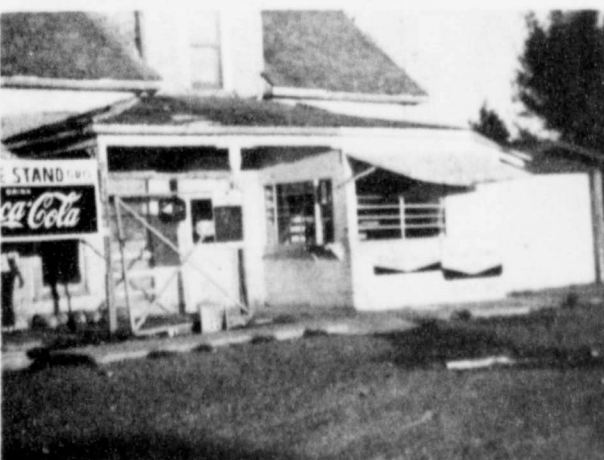
A grandson, Rodney, has helped in the store and plays in the Whirlwind band. Rodney is now in the Texas Tech band summer school for high school students.

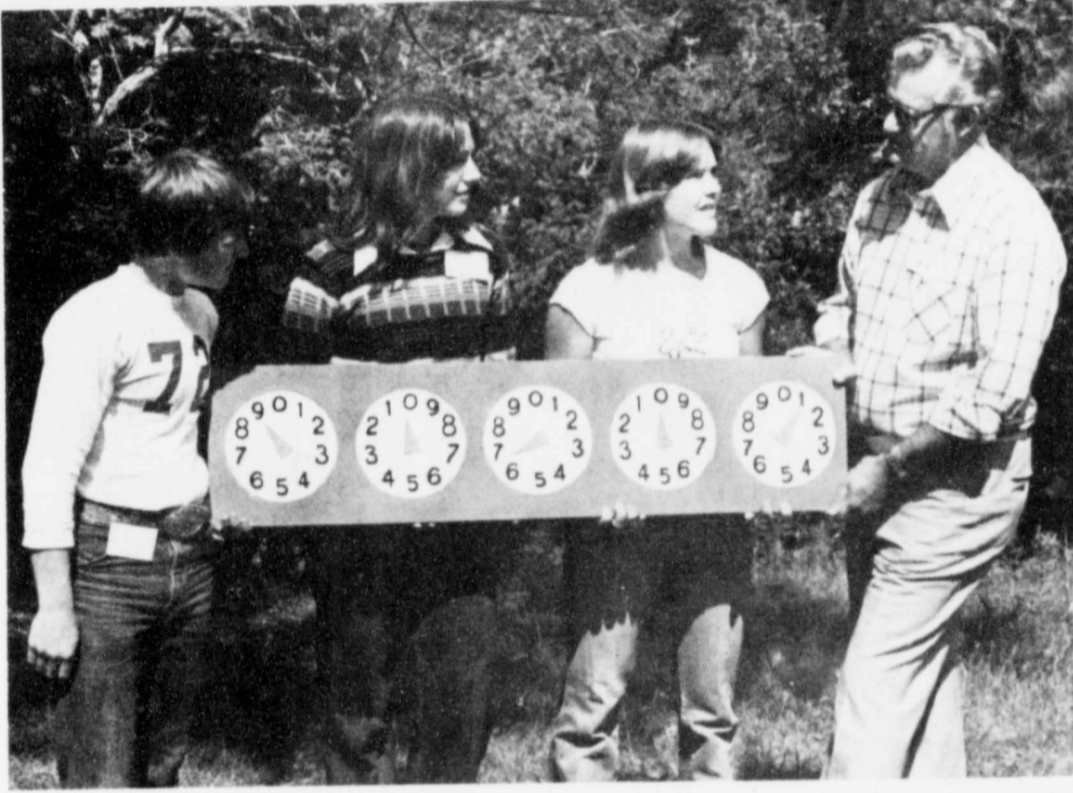

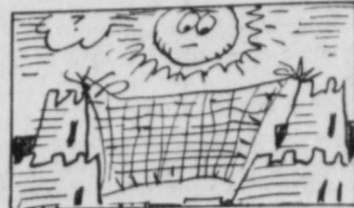

Check Belts, Hoses Before Auto Trip

COLLEGE STATION-- Check the condition of a automobile belts and hoses before starting a trip, advises Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist.

Ms. Kerbel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

BELTS

Look for cracks, peeling, splitting or glazing on belts for the fan, alternator and power steering, the specialist says.

With the engine off, turn the belts and visually examine the underside. Also, check them for proper tension.

A glazed fan belt may slip causing overheating of the engine. A glazed, slipping alternator belt can result in a lack of proper battery charge which could lead to an expensive battery replacement even though the real problem is a defective belt.

Failure of the power steering belt will result in loss of power steering.

Check for swelling or bulging, cracks (especially

The WCCC Is Out For Blood

In cooperation with the Caprock Hospital Auxiliary, the women will be sponsoring the South Plains Blood Service bloodmobile on Tuesday, August 8, at Lighthouse Electric Co-op, from 5 until 8 p.m.

Approximately 150 pints of blood a year are used by Caprock Hospital. The demand for blood is rapidly increasing as its tremendous therapeutic value is realized. Medical advancements and modern surgical techniques - such as the ability to transplant healthy human organs and perform open-heart surgeries - have created this vital, ongoing need for human blood throughout the country.

Safe blood of all types must be available around-the-clock to assure the good health of our community.

We will get this blood from qualified donors who care enough to help those in need. All donors give on a completely volunteer basis, and the possibility of any commercialism is eliminated in the acquisition of human blood. Therefore, the charge to a patient who used blood reflects only the blood center's actual cost for drawing, processing and distributing the blood. This service fee is generally covered by the patient's personal insurance. The patient is not charged for the blood itself since it is given freely by concerned volunteer donors.

In addition to helping fulfill a vital community need, each blood donor receives a thorough pre-donation interview. A careful medical history is taken and temperature, pulse, blood pressure and hemoglobin are checked. After the blood is drawn, it is carefully typed and tested for diseases which could be transmitted to the recipient. Should any of these tests indicate the need for medical attention, the donor is notified and referred to a physician. It's like a physical which benefits both the donor and the patient.

Members of both sponsoring organizations will be recruiting other civic and service organizations in Floydada to contact their members about the special opportunity offered by the bloodmobile.

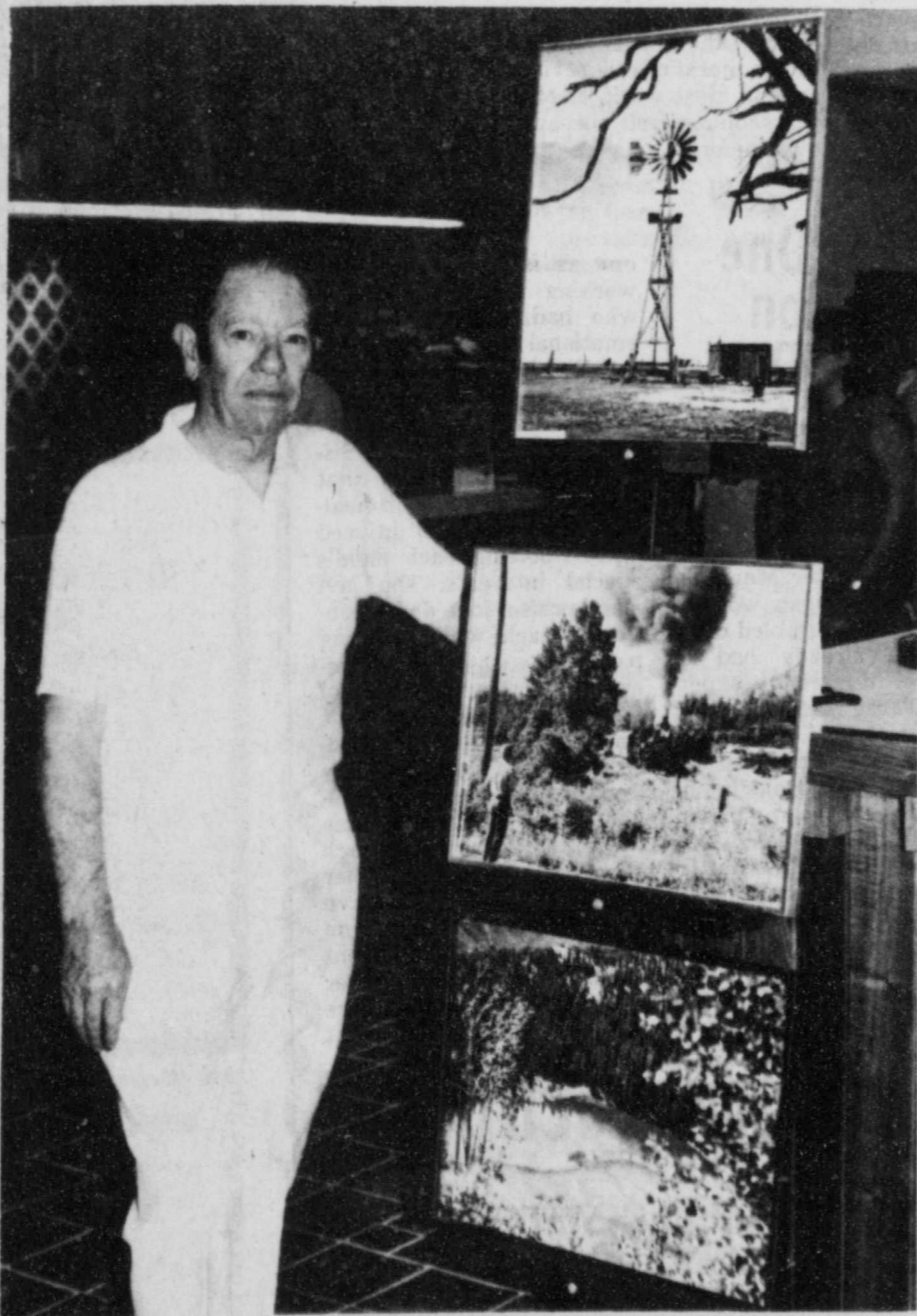

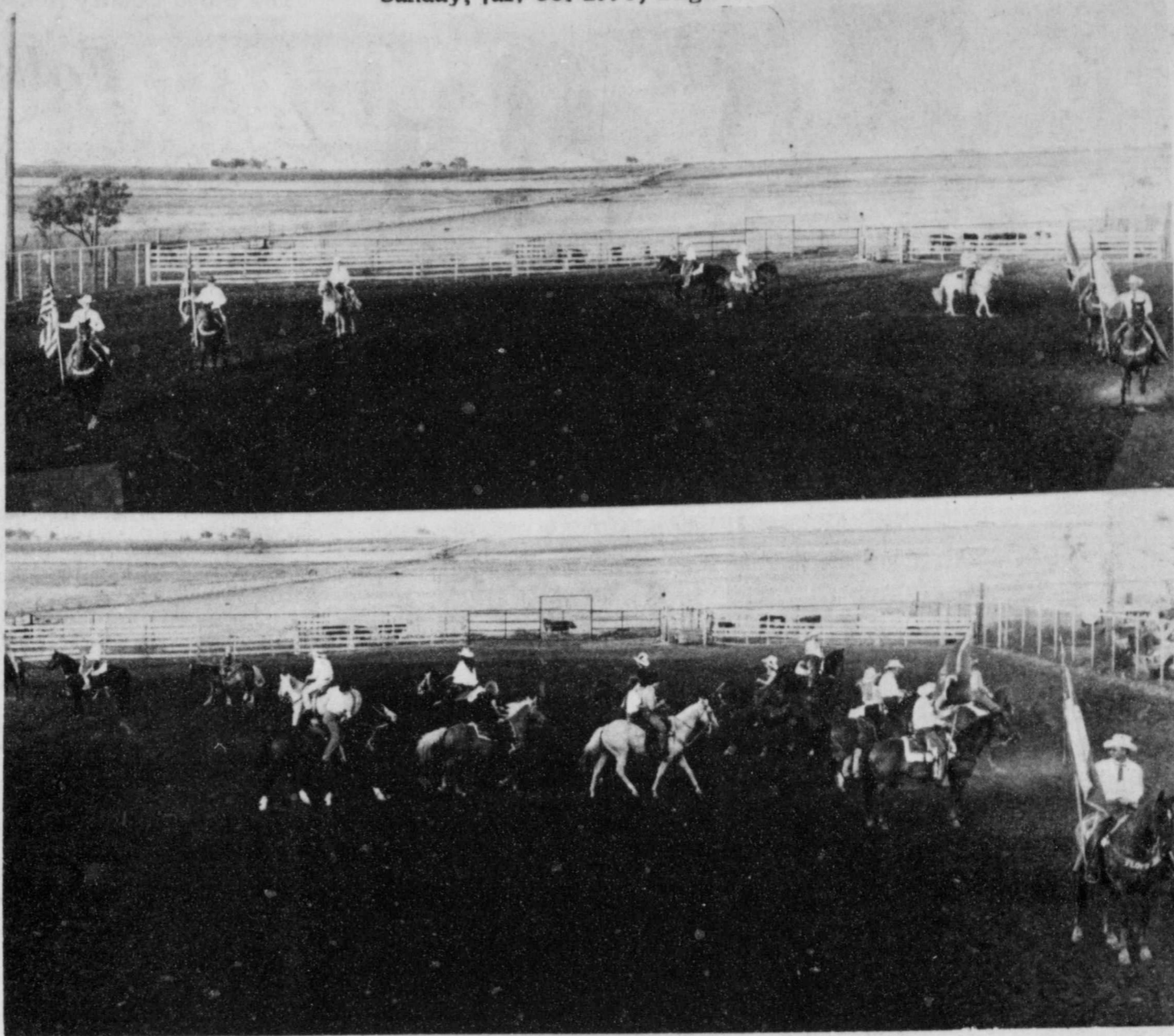

When Sister Mary George Kissel began working with learning disabled children, she already had 30 years of classroom experience. Three years teaching illiterate children and adults in Bogota, Columbia, led to a decision that only one-to-one situations with an understanding teacher could help youngsters who were labeled "failures" in school.

Deciding "It's now or never," she opened the Reading Carrel, a center for the learning disabled in Evansville, Indiana, in 1975. With

one assistant, she began working with six children who had visual, auditory, emotional or general learning disabilities. By the year's end, the number had grown to 35. All were learning.

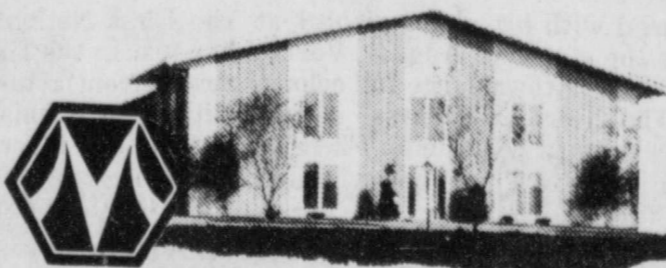
Early that first year, Sister Mary George saw that progress depended on healing the children's injured egos. Spotting each child's special interests, she lavished praise, love and attention on each, while working patiently with them. Barriers of shyness and fear of failure were erased.

With three teachers added to her staff, Sister Mary George now teaches 60 students, and foresees a time when her Carrel will reach hundreds. 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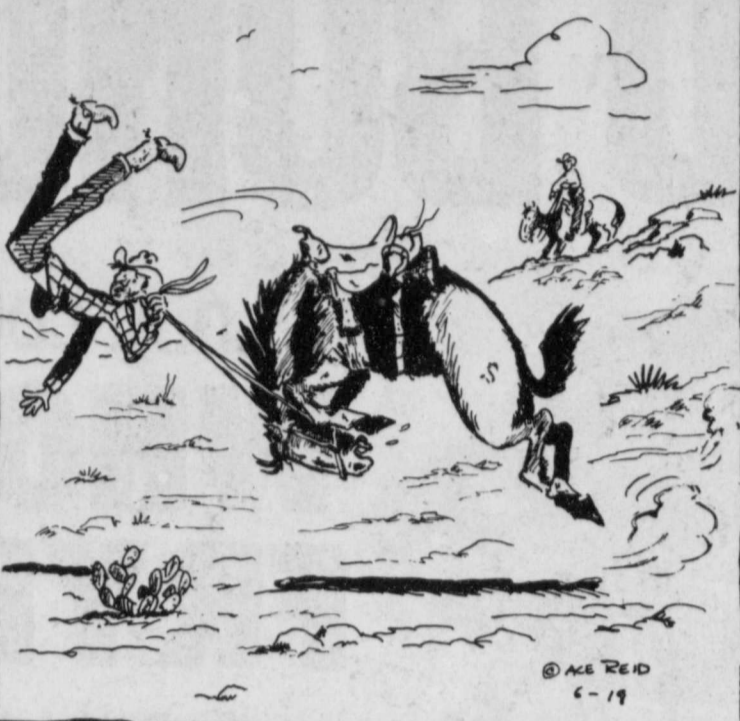
