First Freeze November 19?

The old Indian adage says the first killing freeze will come 90 days after the first summer Norther. On this basis, the first freeze might be as late as November 19, as a Norther eased across Floyd County this past Saturday of August 19.

Although temperatures are still hitting in the 90's farmers are wondering how long that June cotton will have to mature.

County Agent Doyle Warren says there's some dryland cotton in the county that might as well have a freeze now, "because it has done its do".

ASCS manager Tom Moore says a farmer can plow up his dryland cotton if he wants to give up on it and receive disaster money. He cautions the farmer to report his intentions to the ASCS office before he begins plowing. If the

farmer plows up all his cotton he will receive 17.3 cents per pound times his average farm yield times 75 percent of planted acres.

Although Floyd cotton acreage is up from last year's 180,000 acres to this year's 205,000 Moore doesn't expect the yield to be as good due to the

Moore said some farmers have a pretty good dryland cotton with the skip row pattern. He said if you want to see a good example of what's happening to most dryland cotton, you need only go east of the West Texas Regional Training Center just east of Floydada where the cotton crop is in distress. The Floydada Development Company

owns some 50 acres there. Moore said that although the Lamesa and other dryland areas will have a short cotton crop, the forecast hasn't affected the price of cotton up.





Carpets and rugs energy-conserving? This question has been asked frequently so I thought I would share the answer here for others who may have the same question. In a recent study, eighteen different carpets were selected from fibers and styles currently on sale in the marketplace. They included: acrylic, nylon, polyester, polyporpylene, and wool; and level loop, cut pile plush, high-low loop (tip sheared), shag, and saxony. Five different carpet underlayments (paddings) were also tested.

It is the pile construction of carpet that provides its insulation potential. Air spaces or pockets between the fibers hold the

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
