Collins, FHS Overcome 'Cats, 17-7

Floydada Whirlwinds overpowered Littlefield Friday night in a potent rushing attack they had lost a week earlier in a game at Olton.

Unstoppable Mac Collins led the Floydada picked up 268 yards ground in amassing 359 total yards and an unpenetrable Whirlwind continued to keep its opponent as FHS picked up its fourth loss in Littlefield, 17-7.

Collins marked the 'Winds' third consecutive triumph and kept Floydada game winning skin alive in the conference. FHS will return home to a power Wellington in the conference matchup of the before marching into district following Friday.

Collins carried 23 times in the half for 220 yards and two touchdowns including a 90-yard TD gallop gave FHS a commanding 17-0 lead.

Collins helped pick up the slack left by Arredondo, who saw limited action in the contest due to an injury. Collins marks the second Whirlwind who has missed action due to an injury, but as Collins led the Littlefield defense with his unusual depth at the running position was apparent.

Whirlwinds outpassed the Wildcats

and their talented sophomore quarterback Eddie Gregory 91-77. Floydada's Todd Vickers took to the air 13 times, completed five, and was intercepted once. But FHS picked off three of Gregory's aerial attempts, with Marty Daniel, Kary Helms, and Ricky Luna making the thefts, two of which led to scoring drives.

The FHS defense limited the Wildcats to 176 total yards and nine first downs.

Floydada scored in the second period to make it a 7-0 game at the midway point, struck twice in the third stanza on a field goal by Joey Luna and a Collins TD run, and was held scoreless but relied on its defense to protect its lead in the final period.

Whirlwind offense to a near complete halt on this occasion, and Jimmy Jackson was forced to punt again, this time from Littlefield's 45-yard line.

Daniel helped Floydada to take advantage of the game's first major break by picking off a Gregory pass at the Littlefield 30 on the 'Cats following offensive series.

Daniel returned the ball 20 yards to the 10-yard line, where he set up first and goal for the Whirlwinds.

Collins advanced the ball six more yards on first down, and carried for two more on the quarter's final play with FHS penetrating inside the Wildcat five-yard line.

FHS decided to give it to Collins on all four tries. The big fullback lunged ahead another yard on third down, and on a crucial fourth-and-goal play, Collins surged into the end zone for the first touchdown of the game with only 36 seconds gone in the second period.

Joey Luna, who has yet to miss a field goal or extra point try this season, tacked on the PAT and FHS led 7-0 with 11:24 to play in the first half.

Not to be outdone, Littlefield took the ensuing kickoff and marched from their own 26-yard line down to the Whirlwinds' 36. The Wildcats travelled that distance (48 yards) by utilizing their two setbacks, Rudolph Smith and Ruben Torres. Together, they accounted for three first downs on the drive.

But Smith lost the handle on a critical second-and-nine play from the Whirlwind 36, and defensive tackle Paul Radloff recorded his fifth fumble recovery of the season to kill the drive.

A holding penalty set the 'Winds back to their 21-yard line and from there, Littlefield's defense stiffened, forcing FHS to punt.

Unable to generate offense, Littlefield kicked it right back to Floydada four downs later and the 'Winds had the ball on their own 15.

Hickersons Visit AFS Sons In Turkey And Italy

On September 8, Pete and Wanda Hickerson left Lubbock for Istanbul, Turkey, the first stop on the trip to visit their two A.F.S. sons, Orhan Erisir (who resides in Istanbul) and Enrico Pizzini of Milano, Italy. They arrived on September 9 in Istanbul. Orhan had worked as a volunteer worker for the city of Istanbul this past summer, so he put on his badge and was allowed to meet the Hickersons before going through customs. Orhan was accompanied by his father, Zeki, to the airport which is about thirty-five miles from their home. Orhan's mother, Samime, stayed home, since they had planned a surprise welcome party for the Hickersons. The plane was three hours late and their luggage did not arrive, so more time was spent at the airport than planned. (Editor's note)

The following is Pete and Wanda's account of their trip.

On the way from the airport to Orhan's home, we crossed the Bosphorus Bridge, the longest bridge in Europe. This bridge connects Europe and Asia and was completed in 1973. When we arrived at Moda Coda 227-14, Kadikoy, all of the relatives living in Istanbul and a former A.F.S. student of America were waiting to greet us. Two aunts, two cousins, and the A.F.S. student spoke English. Words cannot describe how we felt with this meeting of all the family.

Orhan and his parents live in a lovely home overlooking the Marmara Sea. Sitting in the living room, you could see the ships from the Black Sea, passing through the Aegean Sea and the Mediterranean Sea. This is a very beautiful view. Orhan had every day and night planned for us, so that we could see as much as possible during our stay of eight days. We saw many, many beautiful places including the Blue Mosque, the Kaarye Mosque, St. Sophia, Galston Tower, Tophapi Palace, the covered Bazaar (3000 shops here), the Castle of Istanbul, and Roberts University where Orhan attends school.

We went by boat to three islands, the main islands being Buyukada, where we had a tour all around the island by horse and carriage. There are no cars allowed on this island. The last day on Friday, the 15th, we spent the day on the sea with Orhan, his parents, an aunt and two cousins. We saw ships from many nations going to the Black Sea. We had lunch in a fishing village near the Black Sea and we walked around seeing the style of life the people live. No cars are allowed in this village.

We enjoyed the boat rides each day. These boats leave every fifteen minutes taking the people to work, to shop, or to visit, from one side of Istanbul to the other—from Europe to Asia. Until 1973, when the bridge was completed, the boat was the only means of transportation from Europe to Asia, Istanbul. These boats are owned by the government. There are three decks and they will carry 2,000 passengers. As the boats make their run, tea and soft drinks are served. We really did enjoy the boat trips because we could see so many people. Istanbul is really a large city with a population of four and one-half million. In the old part of Istanbul, with all its history, there are no street markers, but one can ask and the people are very helpful in giving directions. Another interesting thing is that there are no signal lights, and very few policemen. The people respect each other and there are very few wrecks and very little crime. We felt that this is due to their religion. Although Turkey is a secular state, religion plays an important part in everyday life. Five times a day the priests call the faithful to prayer in the mosque. Before entering the mosque, Moslems wash themselves and remove their shoes. Foreign visitors should also remove their shoes and show respect as they would in any other house of worship. The men and boys are in the main area of the mosque, while the women and girls are in the balcony or at the back of the mosque.

The mosque floors are covered with beautiful Turkish rugs. There are two religious holidays in Islam. The dates of these festivals change according to the Moslem calendar and during these festivals, shops and government offices are closed.

The food is not heavily spiced, except in the southeast, and the Turkish olive and corn oil are very light and palatable. The food is very good. A typical Turkish meal starts with a soup, and on the meat course, followed by a vegetable, cheese and finished with dessert or fresh fruit. After the meal, strong coffee is served in small cups. The hot tea is the best we have ever drunk. I am going to try to learn to make tea like Orhan's mother prepares it. The Turkish people are most gracious and generous hosts. Hospitality is taken to such length that

you really feel welcome and loved. Most Turks speak another European language and some speak English.

Istanbul is a very interesting city with beauty, history, and culture. Orhan's parents are great and wonderful and we love and appreciate them very much—just the way we do Orhan. Oh, I forgot to mention that Orhan is a terrific driver. He drove us many miles. Orhan sends greetings to his schoolmates and friends in Floydada and we, like he, are looking forward to his visit back home in Floydada.

On September 16, we had to say goodbye to our Turkish family, and we left Istanbul for Rome, Italy. Enrico had come from Milano to meet us. Our plane was four hours late, but Enrico was still waiting for us. After going through customs, we met Enrico. It was another wonderful greeting. When we arrived at the hotel, Maria and Tony (Leonard and Lahoma Matsler's Italian family) had left word for us to call them. They came to the hotel and took Enrico and us out for dinner and a very enjoyable evening. Sunday morning, Tony came back to the hotel for us and showed us Rome (as far as possible in a short time). Tony is great and knows Rome like a book. We all four went to Vatican City and heard John Paul I at Twelve o'clock. There were so many people standing, it made one feel that people care and are searching for direction. After this, we visited St. Peter, which is a series of unending, stupendous marvels, but probably the most beautiful certainly the most famous one, is the marble group called the Pieta of Michelangelo. After seeing other sights, we went to Maria and Tony's for dinner. We enjoyed Maria and Tony and their children, Enrico, Maria, and Tony had a good time visiting, Enrico and Maria enjoyed recalling their years in Floydada.

At 5:30 p.m., we went by train to Florence. All day Monday, Enrico showed us Florence, the cradle of Italian Art. We visited museums, galleries, churches, and cathedrals. So much beauty if found in the art here, one cannot describe. Enrico showed us many places of interest as he had lived in Florence and worked here several years ago. Tuesday morning, we left by car for Milano. Enrico had left his car here so that we could see Italy by train, and then by car on to his home.

We arrived in Milano, Villa Menza 268 at 4:30 p.m. Enrico's parents Lugie

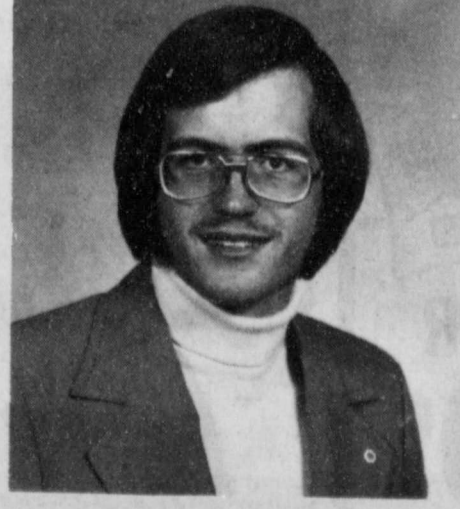

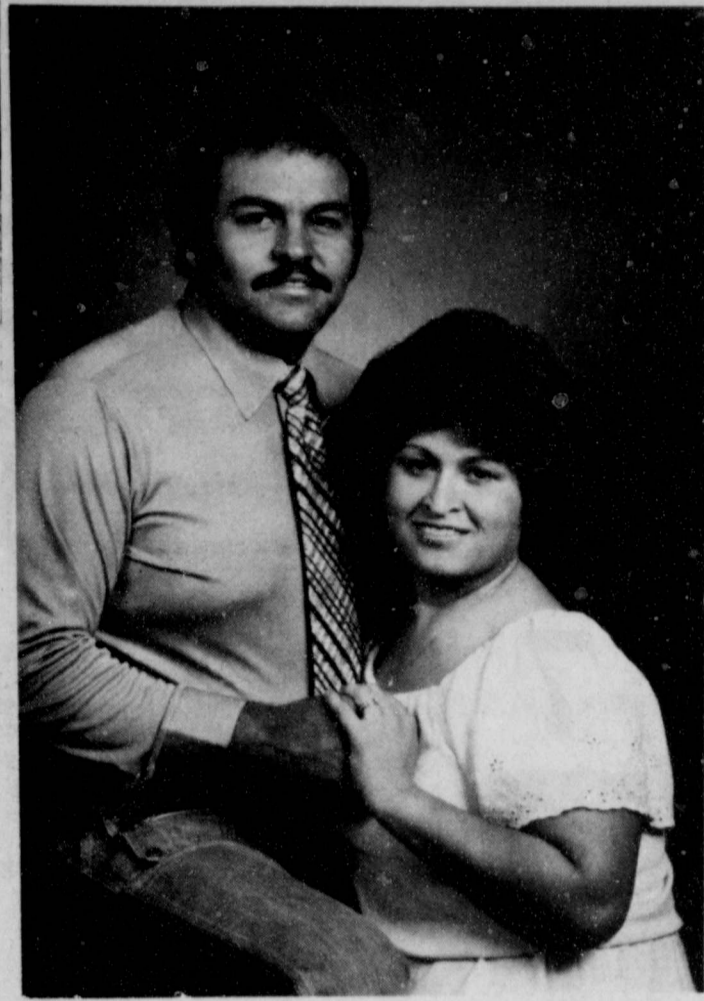
