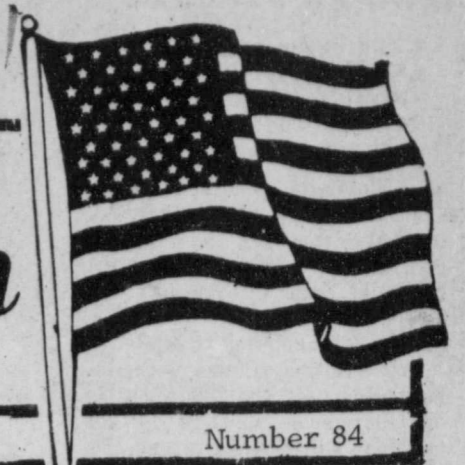

Senior Citizens Begin Drive For New Kitchen

DECISION AT CITY COUNCIL MEETING

For A Hot Check To The City

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council last night the City Council discussed problems until midnight, but very little action in the meeting.

The most exciting action of the night was to tack on a \$10 charge hot check written the city for some of the city's phones would have to be taken out because of the increase in phone costs. The council told Feuerbacher to cut out all the phones he could.

money needed, we have divided Floydada into four areas from the courthouse and we have four captains who will be in charge of fund raising," president of the Senior Citizens Menard Field told the Hesperian Tuesday.

Back in the football season of 1974 one of the most dreadful upsets happened right here in Floyd County... to be more exact...in the Lockney football stadium. Number 99 defeated number 2. That's right...when the final whistle blew Floydada's number two state ranked Whirlwinds just barely got a touchdown before the game was over and lost 13-7.

...and number two didn't even get out of district, as a three way tie and a loss of the coin let the Longhorns represent our district.

Well, that's the last time the Longhorns have won the county championship and they'll be back higher than a kite Friday night to get it back.

Kick-off time is 7:30 and if you want a seat the gates open at 6 p.m.

ADVANCE TICKETS
Although no reserve seats are available you can buy gate tickets ahead of time and avoid the line wait at the Lockney stadium. Advance general admission tickets may be purchased at high school until the Friday pep rally...adults \$2.50, students \$1.50.

DEFENSIVE TEAM
The Longhorns are 4-2 for the season, losing only to Olton and Friona. Their defense team has been plenty tough...other than Olton they haven't allowed over seven points per game.

Fullback Earlee Mathis is a good ground gainer right up the middle and

tail back Curtis Ford is quick and fast if he sees a little daylight. Quarterback is the coach's son, Steve Warren. Up until the Dimmitt game he hardly ever threw a pass, but completed five of eight attempts in that game.

The Longhorn line will average 175 pounds.

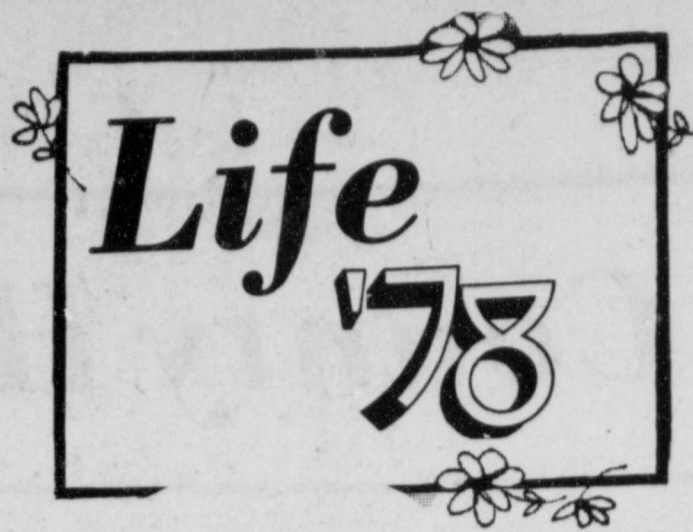
Baptist Women Meet In Lockney

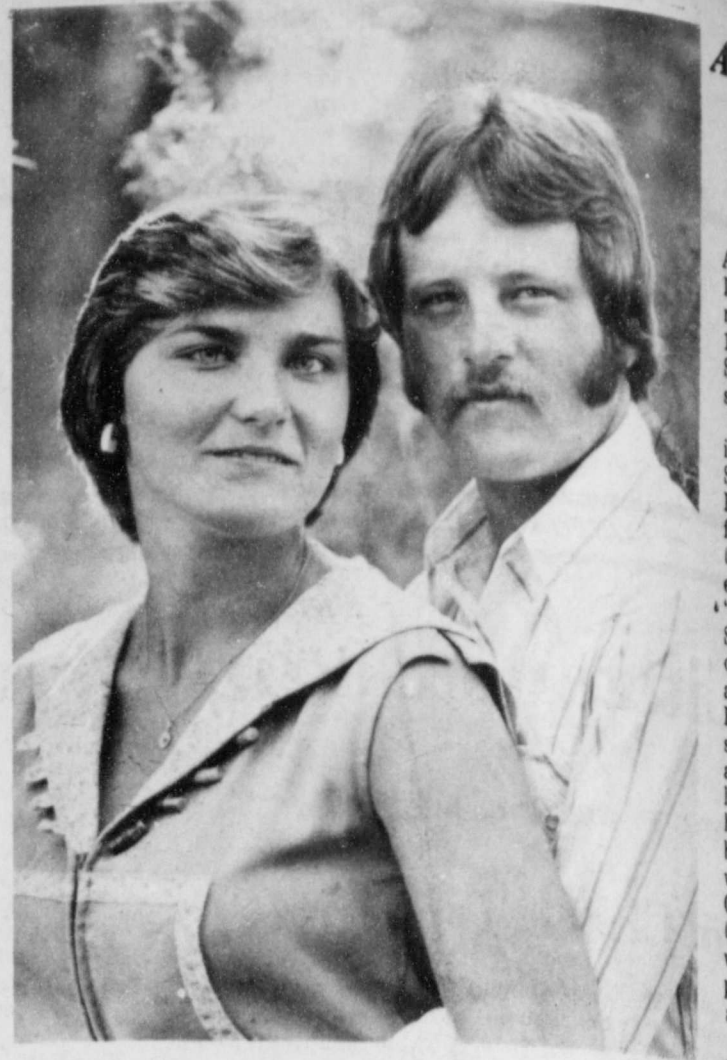
Pauline Sams brought the program, "Japan Baptists Celebrating a New Day." Melba Atkins concluded the program with a scripture

reading and a prayer for missionaries having birthdays today. Faye Ferguson voiced the closing prayer.

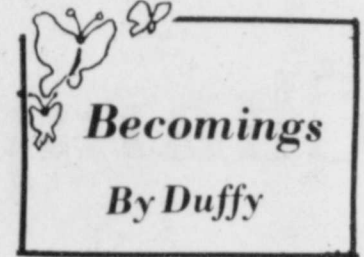

The small group of Floydada fans attending the state track meet in Austin a couple of years ago were cheering Lockney's Danny Clark on as he participated in the finals of the hurdle events. We were reminded of how brothers and sisters in a family fight and argue with one another, but each would stand up for the other if someone outside intervened or threatened.

The Lockney-Floydada sense of competition and rivalry has been a long lasting one, but just as long is the underlying goodwill and sense of cooperation between the two Floyd County towns. This 41 year old news clipping from the October 21, 1937 edition of the Floyd County Hesperian makes our point. The Hesperian editor is making sure the Lockneyites do not think that he said what had appeared in a Fort Worth paper.

"The following article is clipped from the Sunday Amarillo News and Globe, and also appeared in the Fort Worth Star Telegram on the same date:

FLOYDADA, October 16. The Floydada-Lockney High School football game was played in a cow pasture near here yesterday after a woman living near the regular playing field was stricken with paralysis. A doctor said the patient could not be moved and that the noise would be detrimental, therefore a new field was laid out...south of the city...no extra points were attempted from place-kicks since the field was without goal posts.

The Hesperian sports editor then makes this explanation.

This article did not come from this reporter, at no time were the goal posts missing. The field was good and fairly dry in spite of the rains. It was a cow pasture if the presence of cows on a pasture makes a pasture a "cow pasture", but the field was laid off with ten yard markers, fence and above all, good "goal posts."

Farabee Favors Amendments Two and Three

State Senator Ray Farabee today endorsed Proposed Constitutional Amendments Number Two and Number Three, Farabee said. "We urge all Texans to give favorable consideration to Proposed Amendments Two and Three on the November 7th ballot."

Amendment Number Two provides a new tool for attracting industry to Texas which will be particularly helpful to smaller cities and

rural areas. Safeguards included in the law provide that no city or county issuing the revenue bonds can

tax its citizens for repayment. In fact, that statement

must be printed on the bonds.

Amendment Number Three authorizes cities and towns to issue revenue bonds for public improvements in connection with local redevelopment. These bonds would be repaid from the additional revenue produced by the improvements. Neither the credit of the government nor its general revenue can be used to make payment of these bonds.

Farabee stated, "These two amendments will insure that Texans will enjoy a healthy economy and can compete with other states that allow this type of public financing." Forty-six states already have industrial revenue bonds and a number of states have provided for tax increment financing.

Crosbyton Event Boosts Stenholm Congress Bid

CROSBYTON-The ranking Democrat on the House Agriculture Committee was the featured speaker at a dinner here Tuesday night honoring Democratic Congressional candidate Charles Stenholm.

Stenholm, a Stamford farmer, is vying with Abilene attorney Bill Fisher for the 17th district Congressional seat being vacated by retiring Omar Burleson.

U.S. Rep. Eligio "Kika" DeLa Garza of Mission, was the night's keynote speaker at the \$25 a plate fundraiser for Stenholm.

DeLaGarza, 50, is the ranking Democrat on the House Agriculture Committee, and if re-elected this year, will become the vice-chairman of that committee.

He asked the crowd, "You're probably wondering what I'm doing here, when I should be out campaigning myself. But, I'll go any place for a friend."

DeLaGarza told the crowd, comprised mostly of Crosby, Garza, Lynn and

"There's nothing I'd like to see better than to see Charlie on the agriculture committee," DeLaGarza said.

"If my friend Charlie wants to be on the agriculture committee, I'll get him on that committee," the 14-year Congressional veteran from South Texas said.

The crowd resoundingly applauded when DeLaGarza said, "We've got to bring common sense to EPA and OSHA. If the government would just leave the farmer alone, he'd be alright."

"In agriculture there's just so much to do, and it took a group of farmers to bring their problems to the attention of the American public."

DeLaGarza, who represents the 15th Congressional District of Texas, said that he didn't mean to be running down the federal bureaucracy — "it's just that a few dumb-dumbs are ruining the whole thing."
