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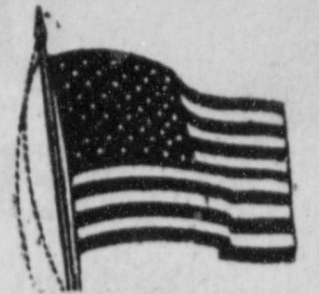

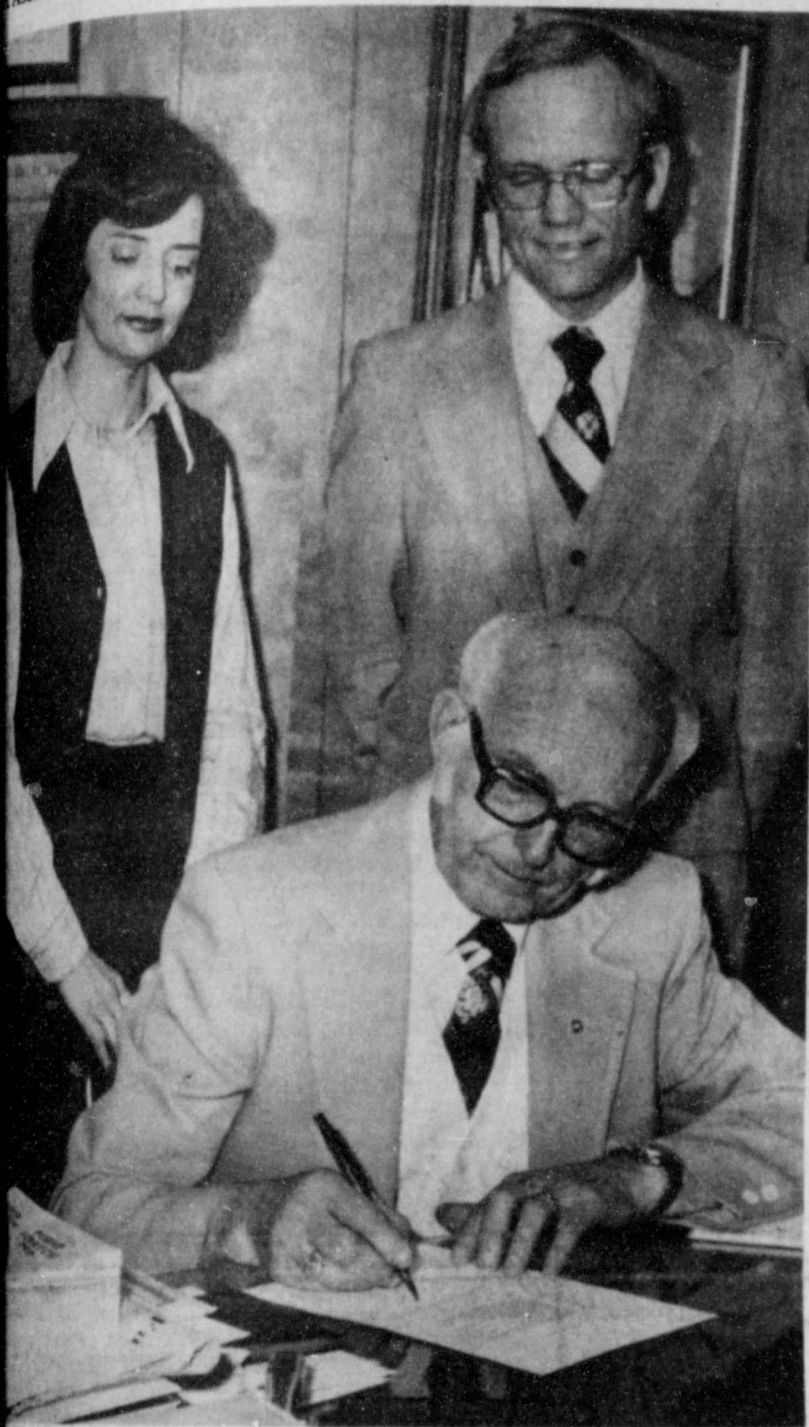
Tickets to the Heart Ball are considered as donations and are tax deductible.

## Senior Citizens' Contract Signed

Floydada Senior Citizens have contracted to serve this area with noon meals Monday through Friday of each week, according to President Menard Field.

Everyone 60 years or older may have their noon meal at the center for "a reasonable contribution to our kitty." No one 60 or over can be denied.

Persons under 60 years of age will be served for \$1.35 per plate.

"We plan to implement this plan about March first and will continue it for a year under the present contract," Field says. This program is being financed under the South Plains Association of Governments program for the aged plan of meals for Senior Citizens.

However, the program is not for senior citizens alone. All others may be invited to attend under the above plan.

"We urge you to take advantage of this program and help us put it over in a big way," Field says.

Cooks are to be supervised by Center Director Ethel Cross.

## Floyd Stock Show Exhibitors Must Complete Entry Cards

FFA and 4-H members in this county who plan to exhibit animals in the forthcoming Floyd County Junior Livestock Show are encouraged to fill out entry cards and return them to the county Extension office in Floydada by this Friday, Feb. 9.

Exhibitors may come by the Extension office and pick up blank entry cards for sheep, beef, and swine.

The 25th annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show opens Sunday, Feb. 18, and concludes Thursday, Feb. 22, with the banquet for 4-H and FFA exhibitors and their parents in Duncan Elementary School Cafeteria in Floydada. Floyd County Farm Bureau is sponsoring the banquet.

The show barn will open at 2 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 18, and weighing in of barrows is to begin at that time. All barrows must be in place by 6 p.m. that day.

JUDGING MONDAY, TUESDAY Weighing of steers begins at 7 p.m. Monday, Feb. 19, and lambs are to be weighed, classified and toothed beginning at 8 a.m. All steers must be in place by 9 a.m., with classification to begin at 10 a.m.

Barrow judging is scheduled to start at 2 p.m. Monday, the 19th.

Lamb judging is slated for 9 a.m. Tuesday, Feb. 20, and steer judging begins at 2 a.m.

Livestock judging is planned for 7:45

This Saturday will be "clean-up day" at the Floyd County Junior Livestock Show facilities in Floydada. It is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m.

Edwin Nutt, president of the stock show association, encourages all interested persons, particularly those who participate in the show, to assist with cleaning the facilities and preparing them for the annual stock show, Feb. 18-21.

"All volunteers are needed," Nutt emphasizes.

Wednesday, Feb. 21. The auction sale kicks off at 1 p.m. that day.

LAMB SHEARING THIS SATURDAY Stock show exhibitors are reminded that lambs will be sheared this Saturday, Feb. 10, at the show building. Shearing is to begin at 8:30 p.m.

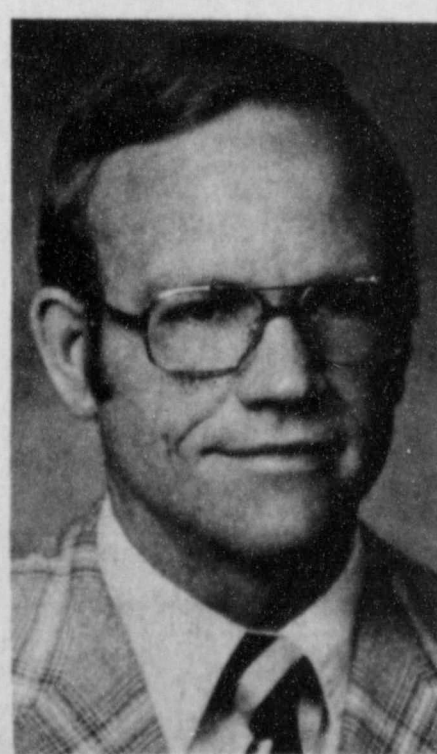
## Frank Barrow To Become Tahoka Bank President

## Scarlet Fever Symptoms Outlined For Parents

Although "several" cases of scarlet fever have struck Floydada public

school students, Gertrude Carr, R.N., the school nurse, says that the situation is "not nearly an epidemic."

She points out that the once-dreaded scarlet fever is "not now serious, if properly treated."

The school nurse says that scarlet fever "is a follow-up of strep throat." Some individual's bodily reaction to strep throat allows scarlet fever to develop.

This illness starts with symptoms of a sore throat, high fever, head and stomach aches. A rash is possible over various portions of the body in three to four days.

Strep throat normally begins with "a very red throat." Treatment should start as quickly as symptoms are noted.

Mrs. Carr adds that strep throat is infectious. However, the rash from scarlet fever is not infectious.

Strep throat is not uncommon among students during cold weather. However, Mrs. Carr believes that a greater number of scarlet fever cases have followed strep throat this year than normal.

Scarlet fever is not any more serious than strep throat.

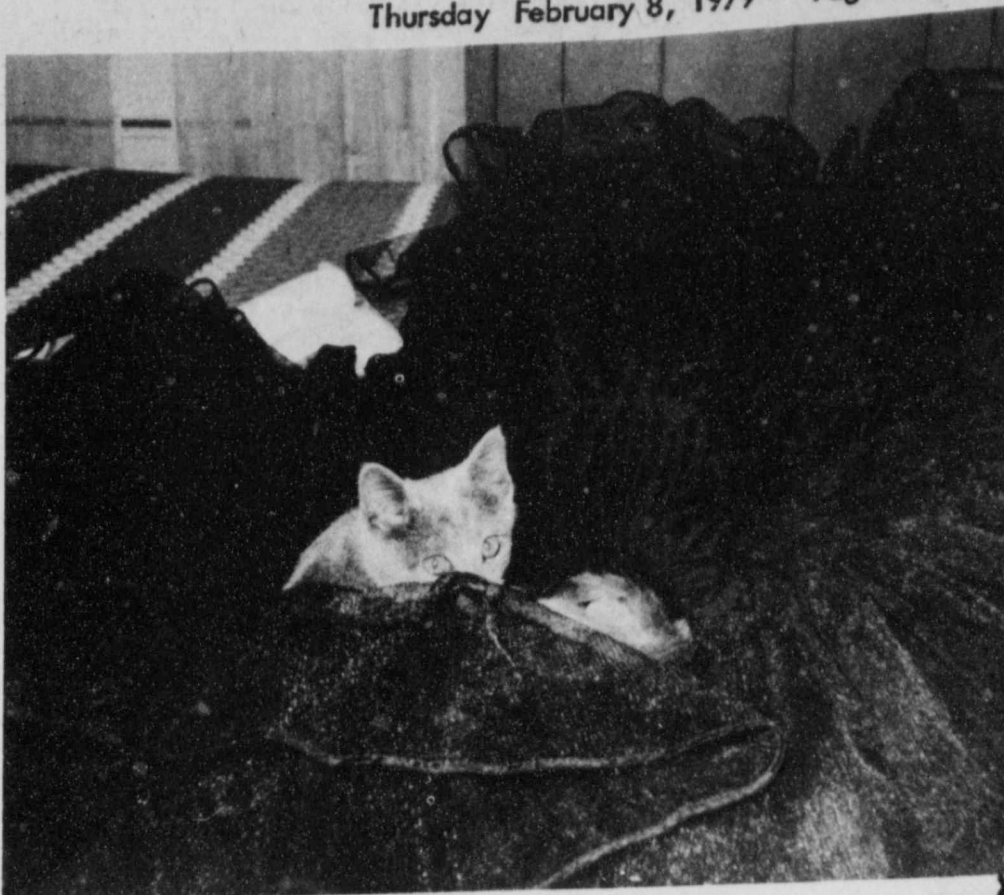

**APPLICANTS SCREENED**  
AFS International Headquarters in New York carefully screens candidates who apply for a year's stay in the United States. Students come here from more than 60 countries. There are over 3,400 students from abroad currently living and studying in the United States this year.

"The AFS program can not only be beneficial to the student, but also extremely rewarding to the host family," Mrs. Hickerson added. A family may:

- Acquire new perspectives about another culture.
- Experience the fun of a new and continuing friendship.
- Help a student discover the life of a community and a nation.

**COSTS GIVEN**  
Aside from food costs and possibly some small incidental expenses, the host family incurs no debt in hosting a student. The local AFS chapter raises an annual fee which — when supplemented by whatever contributions the student can afford — covers AFS program expenses.

AFS also extends a monthly allowance directly to the student to cover incidental personal expenses. The organization makes sure host families will not have to pay medical bills for

students. As a matter of policy, AFS extends medical coverage to its students.

Host families may take a monthly tax deduction in accordance with provisions made by the United States International Revenue Service.

"So there is a very little expense to a host family," Mrs. Hickerson stressed. "What is really needed is something that cannot be bought — love and attention that every young person wants in a home situation."

While many families participating in the AFS program include children who are high school students, any family is eligible to serve as host. "Young families can have tremendous success when they volunteer as hosts," Mrs. Hickerson notes. "It becomes a learning experience for young children and for parents themselves."

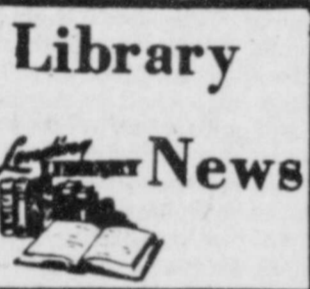

### OPTIMISTIC, BUT....

We're confirmed optimists... but we have to admit our optimism wears a little thin waiting for a little common sense to strike the federal government.

Enough examples keep popping up in the news about the lack of judgement and common sense among our federal bureaus to thoroughly test any belief that ultimately things will straighten out.

We get the feeling that the examples, far from being the exception, are actually only the tip of a gigantic bureaucratic iceberg of confusion, frustration, and unbelievable wasteful spending.

The way to the future is knowledge of past...and history reveals that only two federal programs in the history of the nation have ever been completely abolished. Uncle Sam no longer makes rum in the Virgin Islands and no longer breeds horses for the U.S. Cavalry.

Example No. 1 is typical of a case in point. The Regional Office of the Civil Rights in Seattle recently ordered that an all girl drill team in Boise, Indiana change its name from "The Golden Girls" to "The Golden Girls and Guys". This despite the fact that there's not a single male in the organization.

Sponsors protested to Senator Frank Church who blew his stack.

The senator called Joseph A. Califano, Jr., the secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. And no one can read senatorial or public reaction like Califano and he immediately blew the whistle on the Seattle regional office....and they backed off.

It's an example of only the intervention of a U.S. Senator stopping the nit-picking of our little pointy-headed bureaucrats.

Or take the example of the magnificent plan of the U.S. Forest Service in Virginia. The service came up with a plan to cut a "scenic highway" across farms in five counties in Virginia...then to build "living farms of the past" along the new road so folks whizzing by in their air conditioned cars could see how Virginia country life looked before the new highway came through and messed everything up.

We might think it a cockeyed scheme.... but it is so typical of government planning....and the project was actually funded before someone spotlighted just how ridiculous the whole scheme was.

Of course you read this week where that lovable, commonsense agency, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, denied a permit for the construction of a \$700 million oil refinery on the Maine coast.... because it might disturb the nesting grounds for a clan of bald eagles.

The backers of the refinery had been fighting to obtain the necessary permits for ten years....and one of the officers said they were giving up on the project.

This occurred in a state that used 324 trillion of BTU's in energy each year and produces only 79 trillion BTU's.

But one example every housewife should readily understand is an OSHA rule that requires that the floor in a meat plant but be mopped every four hours.

But under the same regulations, issued by the same agency, but several pages later, is another regulation that requires that the floors be kept dry so workers won't slip down.

Like we said, our eternal optimism is wearing thin as far as Uncle Sam is concerned.

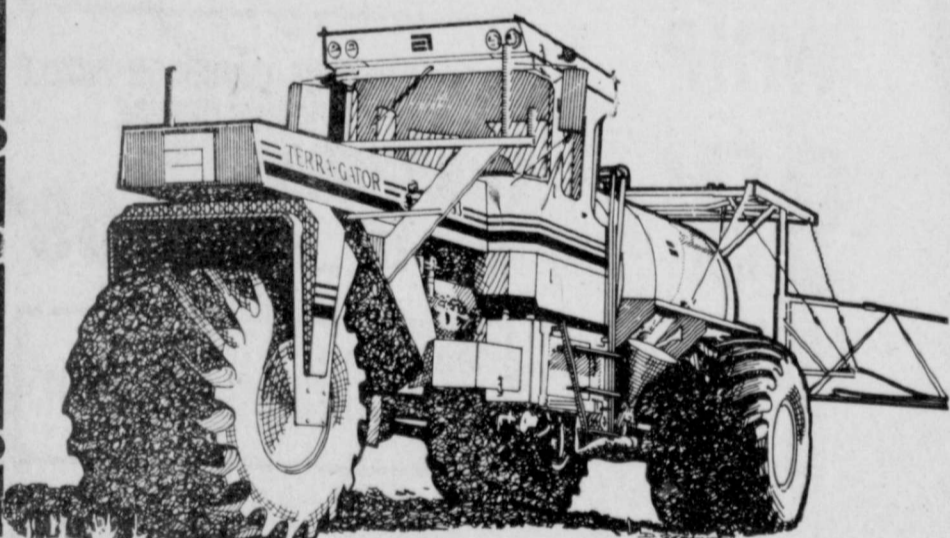

# Foster And Fulton Among Regional 4-H Grain Sorghum Winners

Regional winners have been announced for the 1978 Texas 4-H Grain Sorghum Production Project. Jody Foster of Tulsa placed first with a \$500 scholarship. Other winners in Region 1 of the project, in order of placing, include Jody Foster, Lockney; C. Fulton, Floydada; and Don D. Abernathy. Foster will receive a \$250 bond and Fulton and Abernathy will each receive a \$25 bond. The contest was conducted by the Agricultural Extension Service. Texas 4-H Foundation arranged for the awards. All entrants in the contest were sponsored by the Texas 4-H Foundation. Entrants included Jody Foster, Lockney; C. Fulton, Floydada; and Don D. Abernathy, Lockney. Foster, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Foster, planted 10.4 acres on May 20 and harvested 7,237.6 pounds per acre on Oct. 2. He applied 255 pounds of 10-35-5 as a preplant. Later, the Lockney 4-H'er sidedressed the crop with 230 pounds of anhydrous ammonia. Foster used Milogard as a herbicide and Thimet and parathion as insecticides. He irrigated the crop three times.

McClurg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon McClurg, planted four acres on May 22. As a preplant, he applied 200 pounds of 18-46-0 and 160 pounds of anhydrous ammonia. McClurg irrigated five times and applied Milogard herbicide and Di-Syston and parathion insecticides. The plot was harvested on Oct. 10, yielding 8,693.2 pounds of sorghum per acre.

Fulton planted 7.2 acres on May 13. The Floyd County 4-H'er irrigated his plot four times. He applied 200 pounds of anhydrous ammonia as a preplant and 120 pounds of 12-48-0 as a starter. Fulton applied Atrazine, a herbicide, and Di-Syston, an insecticide. He harvested the crop on Oct. 6 with a yield of 3,845.1 pounds per acre. Mr. and Mrs. Laron Fulton are Lanny's parents. Stone planted about 5.5 acres on June 12. He applied 125 pounds of 10-30-9 with a sidedressing of 100 pounds of anhydrous ammonia. He irrigated twice and applied Milogard herbicide. The plot was harvested on Oct. 12 with a yield of 3,781.8 pounds per acre.

These four 4-H members were among 37 across the state who planted and entered a minimum of four acres of sorghum in the production project.

## County Agent News

### COTTON PRICES LOWER

High Plains cotton prices were \$3.75 to \$7.75 per bale lower the week ended February 1, according to Paul R. Dickson, area director at Lubbock's Marketing Services Office.

Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30-33, mikes 35-49 around 52.15 cents per

pound. New crop lots of mostly grades 43 and 53, staples 30 and 31, mikes 35-49 brought about 46.80 cents per pound, Dickson said.

Gins paid High Plains growers \$115 to \$130 per ton for cottonseed.

USDA's High Plains Marketing Services Offices graded 68,000 samples this week, bringing this season's

total to 1,810,000. This compares to 2,922,000 graded by February 2 last year.

Predominant High Plains grades this week were grade 41 at nine percent, grade 51 accounted for nine percent, grade 42 amounted to 39 percent and grade 52 was 24 percent. Thirty-three percent was reduced one grade because of bark.

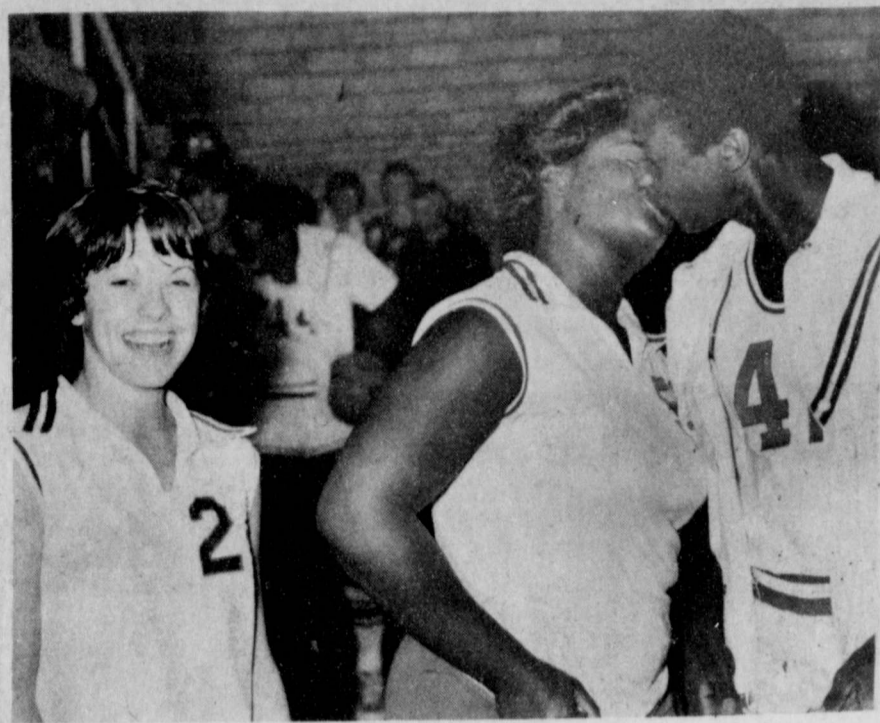
