City Borrows \$500,000 For Power System

City of Floydada's governing body Tuesday night called for issuance of \$500,000 combination tax and electric light and power system junior lien revenue certificates of obligation in order to finance installations to enable it to purchase a portion of its power from Southwestern Public Service Co. The action was taken during the regular March city council meeting.

The certificates of obligation will be utilized for:

- * The purchase of materials, supplies and equipment for an electric substation tie facility;
- * The erection of the electric substation tie facility, including the installation of electric transmissions and distribution lines; and
- * Professional services of engineers.

The proposed city substation is to be erected near the city power plant. A main trunk line is anticipated to lead from the Southwestern Public Service Co. substation near Brown Gin, immediately southwest of Floydada, to the city substation.

COAL-PRODUCED POWER
City Manager Bill Feuerbacher told The Hesperian that "the whole idea is to use coal-produced power due to the increased cost of natural gas and diesel-produced power." He added that "our plant's engines are getting older and the cost of repair and availability of parts is a problem."

In a related move, City of Floydada entered into contract with Quinton T. Colwell & Associates, Inc., for professional services as electrical engineer.

BID ACCEPTED ON AIRPORT IMPROVEMENT
After three sealed bids were opened, read, and discussed, the council accepted the low bid of High Plains Pavers of Plainview to seal coat and make other improvements at Floydada Municipal Airport.

This proposal, which called for 120 calendar days to complete the project, was for \$31,068.36.

The council was informed that "this was a good bid" compared with today's prices.

J. Lee Milligan, Inc., of Amarillo bid \$38,553.98 with 160 days required and Jake Diehl Dirt and Paving Inc., of Hereford and Muleshoe bid \$36,164.74 with 150 calendar days needed.

Texas Aeronautical Commission has implied that it will grant funds for one-half of the expenditure. A citizens committee headed by Tom Farris has raised another \$7,500 from local residents to further reduce the city's cost.

"We could not have done this without public support," Feuerbacher said. The engineer's estimate on the project was \$31,997.

POLICE CHIEF CLOSES BILLIARD PARLOR

Police Chief Royce Gilmore told the council that he had closed the Crooked Cue billiard parlor in the 100 block of East Missouri following a late night report of shots in or near the firm on March 3. Chief Gilmore said that the management was uncooperative in attempting to unveil the mysterious shots.

He also noted there had been earlier complaints and that the 11 p.m. weekday curfew was not being followed.

An ordinance was read stating that the mayor is empowered to revoke the license of a billiard parlor within the city limits if a public disturbance is created.

The ordinance also stipulates that the owners may present their case to the entire council and ask for a vote. Juan

Trustee meeting, held Monday night in the board room.

Certificates were accepted by Mrs. Baker for each member of her immediate family. Jones mentioned that trustee Lawrence Stovall suggested the memorials.

Personnel — instructors and secretaries — employed Monday night were recommended by their supervisors: Jerry Cannon, Plan A director; Bob Copeland, Duncan Elementary principal; Preston Watson, R.C. Andrews Elementary principal; Bob Alldredge, Floydada Junior High principal; and Charles Tyer, Floydada High principal; and Tommy Cathey, business manager. Recommendations were accepted by the board as presented by these officials.

Action on employment of aides will be taken at a later meeting.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

Cathey presented a report on the \$5,000 homestead exemptions. "We know that all eligible homestead owners have not applied for exemptions," the business manager stated, adding: "We hope they will do so by April 30 before the budget is begun."

Cathey also reported on meetings he attended in Corpus Christi, Lubbock, and Hereford concerning HB 1060, the "tax relief" bill, and also school finance and teacher retirement bills. HB 1060 has been introduced on the House floor. Supt. Jerry Cannon told trustees that the restrooms-concession stand at the high school track should be completed by the Whirlwind Relays this Friday.

TEXTBOOKS ADOPTED

Textbook committee selections were adopted by the board as presented. These relate to textbooks which will be introduced for the 1979-80 school year. Cathey informed the group that renovation of the junior high science room is "progressing well" and is about half complete. The room recently was damaged by fire.

The business manager noted that \$828,407.91 in taxes had been collected through last Friday, the ninth. This represents 92 per cent of the tax roll. On

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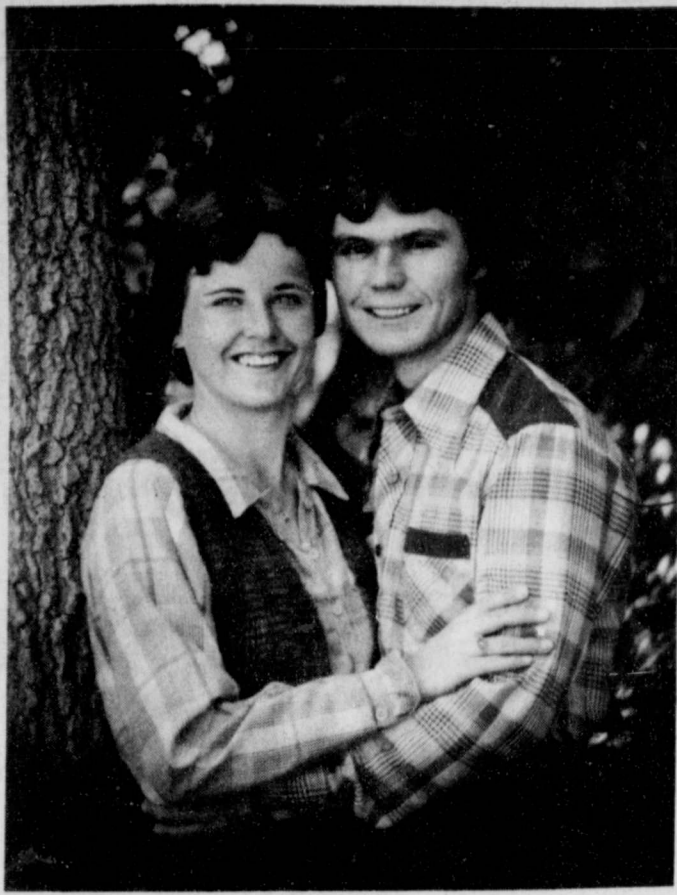

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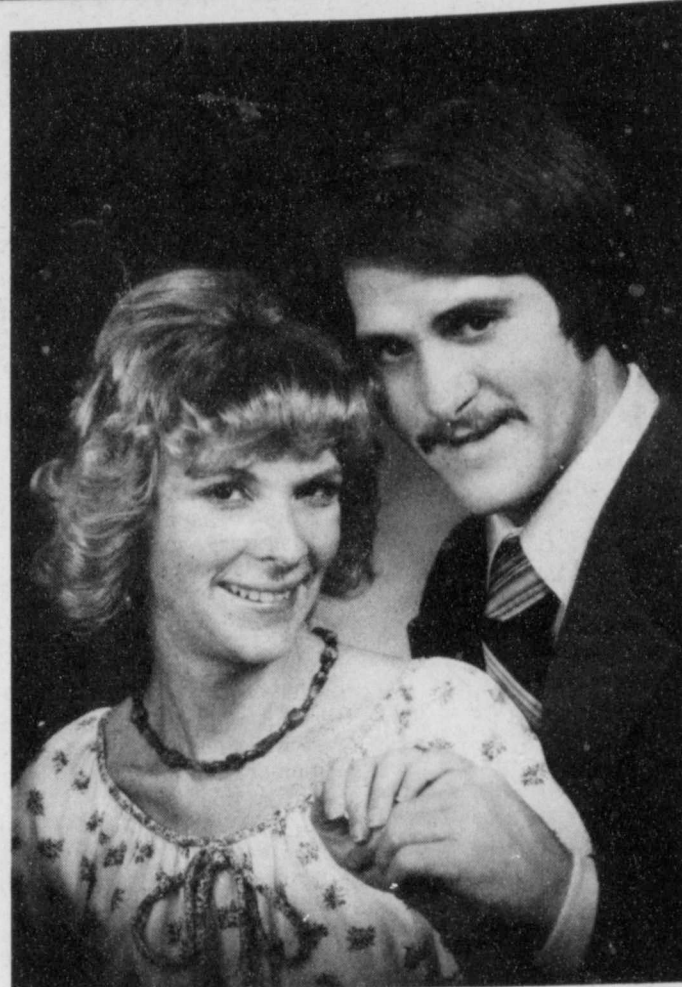



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Veterans Administration News

Many veterans are not receiving the full amount of disability compensation benefits to which they are entitled. According to D.G. Ayres, Service Officer for Floyd County, these veterans have failed to prove to the Veterans Administration that they have legal dependents. Under VA laws, it is the responsibility of the veteran to furnish the information and documentary evidence to establish his dependents. When this has been done, the VA can, in certain cases, pay additional amounts for dependents, thus increasing the monthly payment to the veteran.

A veteran whose service-connected disabilities are rated 30% or more is entitled to additional compensation for his legal dependents. A copy of the marriage license is normally sufficient to establish a dependent wife. The VA requires copies of birth certificates to establish dependent children, which may include permanently disabled children over 18 years of age, and children between the ages of 18 and 23 who are enrolled in an approved course of education.

Medical evidence that the conditions causing permanent and total disability of a child must be furnished, indicating that such conditions existed prior to age 18. An unmarried child over age 18 and under age 23 must furnish evidence of school enrollment to be classified as a dependent.

Veterans who think they may be entitled to additional amounts of VA benefits because of having dependents, should contact their local Veterans Service Officer for assistance. The Service Officer will help in completing the necessary forms for the VA, and will assist in obtaining the documentary proofs needed.

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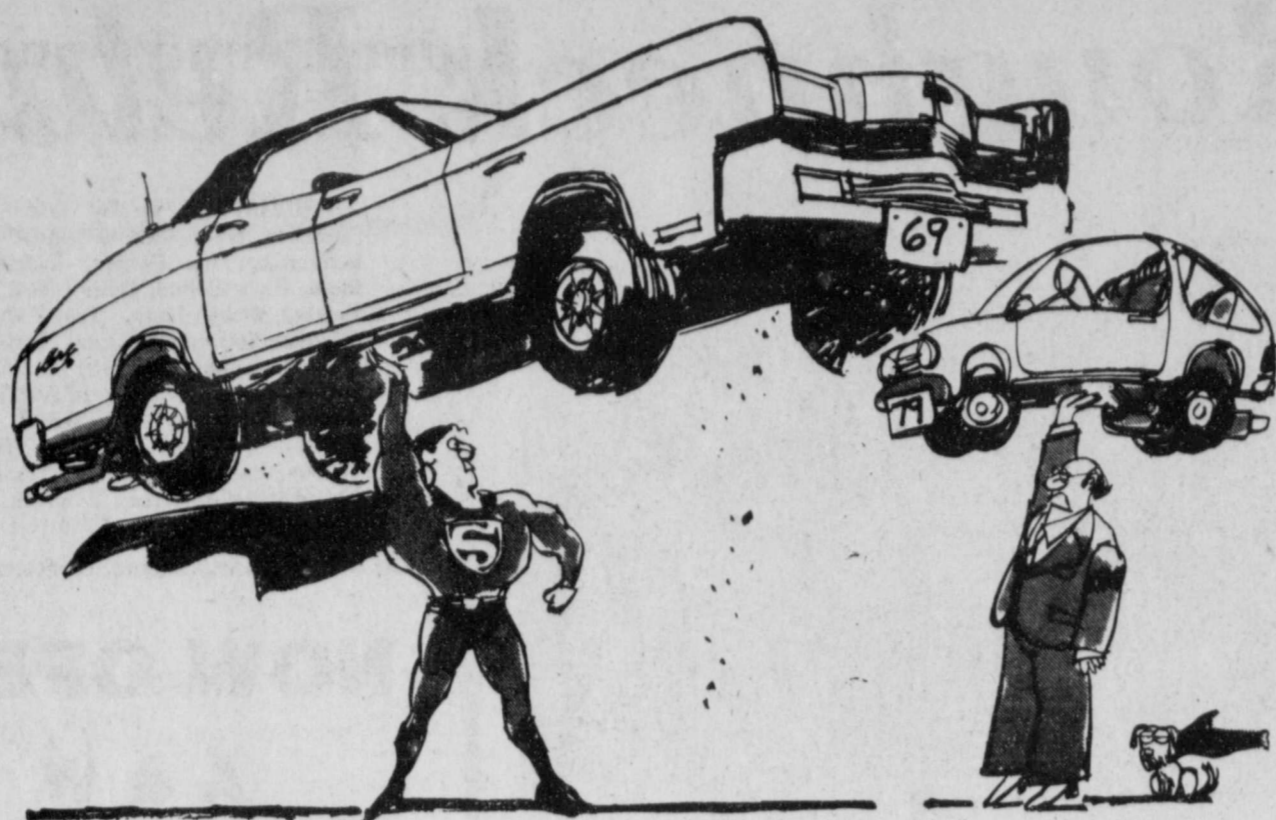
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So They Say

THE BIG BITE
It was late in 1977, and Congress could see an election coming; so with the prudence characteristic of men whose jobs are on the line, our representatives voted to defer until January, 1979, the massive Social Security tax hike they had just approved.

It is now 1979.
The amount of the increase — the biggest in American history — is \$227 billion, to be paid into the system between now and 1987.

What this means specifically is that workers earning \$8,000 will pay \$490, an increase of \$6 over last year, and that those making \$20,000 will hand over \$1,404 up \$155 from 1977. Until next year, when taxes go up again.

These figures evoke a couple of observations. The first is that, in absolute terms, the Social Security tax has increased fantastically since 1970, when the maximum that any worker paid was \$374 (an amount matched, of course, by his employer).

If one wants to look farther back, the maximum paid in 1949 was \$30 a year; a decade later, it was an astronomical \$120. The logical conclusion is that Social Security, once an almost trivial levy, has become dangerously expensive.

The second observation is that the middle-income brackets have been socked hardest — as usual — to bail the Social Security system out of impending bankruptcy and that the poor aren't faring so well either.

Now \$20,000 once seemed a fabulous sum, but inflation has rendered it just somewhat above average.

Within a few years, the ordinary American worker will be earning \$20,000. That means he will be bearing the brunt of the tax increase. It is not the wealthy who are to be soaked — though the maximum tax will eventually hit \$3,046 on incomes of \$42,000 — but rather the average taxpayers.

And what of the below average? They are hit proportionately harder.
It may be that they pay no income tax. But \$490 deducted from earnings of \$8,000 is nevertheless a goodly sum.

It is almost a cliché to say there are no easy answers to the Social Security mess. The halting of inflation would make a big difference; it would diminish the need for sharply higher benefits in the future.

In any case, future benefits — scheduled to reach \$800 a month for a 65-year-old retired worker, may have to be scaled down.

Social Security was never meant to be a full pension system but rather a cushion for the needy.

But as the level of benefits and taxation rises, it more and more resembles the retirement programs of welfare states like Great Britain and Sweden, neither one precisely a model of economic progress.

It is reasonable to ask whether the '77 tax hike will stick. We are in the midst of a tax revolt, if any congressman needs reminding of that.

Last winter there was panic in congressional ranks when the home folks professed distress at news of the tax increase, which, to be sure, had not even gone into effect.

The House Democrats voted informally by a 3-to-1 margin to roll back the increases, though when the coast seemed clear the rollback was forgotten.

The coast should be less clear henceforth. The increases are no longer pending. The first of them is here, and others, still out at sea, gather strength to roll in over us. Tax rebels, budding or fullblown, should take note. Dallas Morning News

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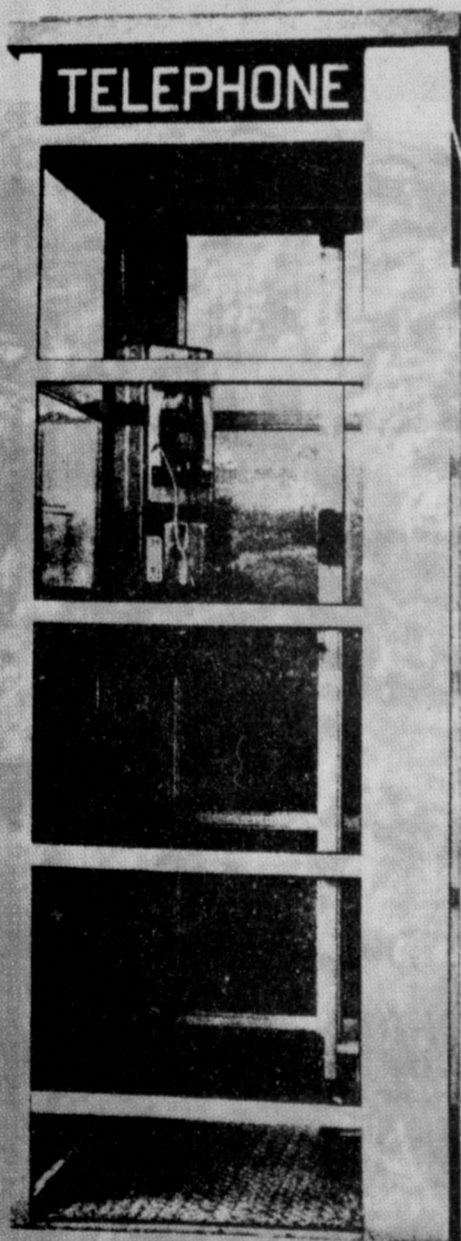

FROM THE FILES OF THE LOCKNEY BEACON

March 18, 1949 —

Coaches and players of District 3-A were honored at a banquet in Lockney. The Longhorns, 1948 district football champions, hosted the first and second string all-district teams, their coaches and superintendents. Longhorn players on the all-district team included Jerry McCulloch, Ewell Dee Kelley, Calvin Pyle, Donnie Bybee and Charles Hammit. Others were Bill Jeter, Floydada; Bill Simmons, Crosbyton; Neal Chastain, Spur; Joe Ed Sandlin, Paducah; and a fellow named Dunn of Crosbyton.

Gene Collis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Collis, showed the grand champion steer at the first annual Lockney Junior Livestock Show. The reserve champion was shown by Bobby Baxter of the Lone Star & community. A gilt belonging to Buford Shreves won first place in the breeding gilt class, and Don Bartram showed the first place swine in the heavy barrow class. Leon Morgan's light barrow won first in that class. Bartram's pig was judged grand champion, and Johnny B. Griffin's heavy barrow placed as reserve champion.

District 3-A was to have baseball that year (1949) under Texas Interscholastic League rules, and the district was divided into two halves. Teams in the east half were Paducah, Crosbyton, Spur and Matarador; west half teams included Floydada, Abernathy, Ralls and Lockney.

The Board of Trustees of the Lockney Rural High School District set Saturday, April 5 as the day for the election of two trustees. The terms of Henry Schacht and Hershel Carthel expired, and their names were filed for re-election by friends, it was reported.

March 15, 1956 —

The officers and directors of the Floydada and Lockney Chambers of Commerce were to meet for a general discussion of the four-lane highway in Floyd County and a proposed bond issue to pay for the right-of-way. The bond issue had been voted on twice and both times was defeated by a small margin. The proposition was to improve Highway 70 through the county and also Highway 135 south of Floydada to the Crosby County Line.

R.L. Knox Jr. was named Lockney "outstanding citizen" for 1955 and was presented a loving cup by Chamber of Commerce director Bob Miller at the annual C of C banquet.

Lockney was to host some 25 track and field teams in the first "annual" running of the Longhorn Relays. The event was to be held on the high school track located on the trailer parking lot belonging to Patterson Gin Company, just north of that gin and southeast of the Lockney grade school. The gin company had loaned the field to the school. Grand of Floydada, Estes of Olton and Wofford of Lockney were listed as favorites in the 220-yard dash. Cliff Hardy of Lockney was a favorite in the low hurdles event.

March 18, 1926 — Money were ready if the Interstate Commission acted favorably to build extensions to the Denver lines in West Texas, expected to be among the new service.

AUSTIN — After six weeks of complicated and exhausting deliberations over one of the most difficult tasks facing the 66th session of the Texas Legislature—implementation of the voter-mandated tax relief amendment—the 13 members of the committee voted unanimously to send their omnibus bill to the House

floor for debate beginning next week.
The committee also sent along their recommendation that the bill be acted on favorably.
Everyone appeared to get what they were looking for. Urban interests got intangibles—stocks, bonds, and bank accounts—knocked off the tax rolls, and corporations managed to convince the committee that their land, as well as the land of family farmers, needed to be taxed on its productivity, not its market value.
Rep. Wayne Peveto of Orange said giving corporate-owned land "agricultural use" write-offs might destroy the tax base of 11 Texas counties.
Since the revenues of local school districts will be effected by any legislation implementing the tax relief amendment, approval of the bill is central to the pending arguments over how Texas will finance its public schools.
The measure also exempts two automobiles or light trucks per family from the property tax rolls beginning in 1980. Homeowners will get a \$5,000 exemption and the elderly (over 65) and the disabled will get an added \$10,000 homestead exemption along with a "freeze" on their taxes.
Understandably, the measure also provides \$420.7 million for reimbursing school districts for revenues

that will be lost. Under the terms of the bill, a school district would be repaid "dollar-for-dollar" in 1979-80 for revenue lost but in 1980-81 a district would be penalized by 10-15 percent if its appraisal rates of property are below the state average.
Globetrotter
When Gov. Bill Clements said earlier this week that Texans "didn't elect me to keep quiet," he should have also added, "or sit still."
Clements has already hopped to Mexico, skipped to Washington (twice) and now says he plans a trip to Russia as the head of a delegation to study food production. The trip will come later this year, whenever the governor finds time on his cramped schedule.
Clements announced his Russia trip on the heels of rumors that he might be going to China. "That trip has always been on the back burner," said one Clements' aide. But stories persisted. And confirmed reports that Clements' world-wide oil drilling firm, SEDCO, was negotiating along with Hunt Oil Co. for exploration rights off the coast of China, didn't help cool the headlines. Clements, seemingly irritated with all the talk about a China trip and possible conflicts of interest, finally told reporters: "I'm not going to China. I never said I was. How does that grab you?"

But reporters weren't the only ones howling at the governor this week. June L. Karp, president of the Texas Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO, accused the governor of having a "plantation mentality" when it came to teachers and other educators in the public school system.
The harsh criticism came after a microscopic examination by Karp and associates of the governor's budget proposals by the Legislative Budget Board for education.

The governor's budget eliminates the 5.1 percent pay increase for teachers suggested by the LBB. Those salary hikes amount to \$314 million. Clements got the rest of \$548 million reduction by increasing local school districts share of the Foundation School Program by \$189 million. The FSP provides basic educational needs such as salaries, maintenance and operations.
"We believe the governor's proposals are a slap in the face of our profession."

Guerrero, owner of the Crooked Cue according to the license, and his uncle, a Lockney man said to be co-owner, appeared before the council. They requested a hearing at the next regular meeting of the city governing body.

Chief Gilmore told the council that the sheriff's department dispatcher heard three shots in or near the pool hall and summoned City Patrolman Raynard Macha and Sheriff Fred Cardinal. A car reportedly left the scene at a high speed.

When Macha, who was "three or four blocks away" and Cardinal reached the building at 11:46 p.m. they detected an odor which they believed to have been created from a recent gunshot, Gilmore added.

The police chief and the council also talked about junk yards within the city limits.

The billiard parlor will remain closed until the council meeting.

DOG PROBLEMS

A group of three citizens met with the council to request action on the city's "dog problems." After airing the matter, the council tabled until City Manager Feuerbacher has an opportunity to talk with officials in neighboring towns "our size" to acquire information about their handling of dog situations.

Al Howard again met with the city governing body concerning lease of space at the airport for an office building. The council declined Howard's choice of location in "a designated parking lot" and tabled the matter until the April session.

Babe Jones asked for lease of airport

space on which to erect a hangar for twin-engine airplanes. After discussion, Jones suggested that final arrangements could be made at the next regular meeting after he knows the exact space needed.

The council authorized Feuerbacher to seek a surplus beacon for the airport.

A Texas Department of Health letter urging the city to set a timetable for bringing its system into compliance with the department's "Drinking Water Standards" was read. The problem is an excessive amount of flouride in water, a situation which is faced by virtually every Panhandle-South Plains city and town.

The city engineer will be asked to make a study.

REVENUE SHARING FUNDS

Feuerbacher conferred with the council about proposed uses of general revenue sharing funds for the next budget year which extends from April 1, 1979 through March 31, 1980. A final decision is to be made during the April meeting. Anticipated revenue sharing funds from the federal government will be approximately \$31,210.

GARBAGE TRUCK

Mayor Parnell Powell and Feuerbacher were authorized to negotiate the lease purchase of a truck chassis for the city front loading garbage compactor.

A public hearing was called to discuss the proposed city operating budget for the budget year beginning April 1, 1979.

The council adopted an ordinance retaining the present one percent sales tax on the sale of natural gas and electricity within the city limits on residential utility customers.

Advertisements for bids on an oil lease for 410.84 acres of the city farm is to be placed in Floydada and Midland newspapers. This move was prompted by an officer for leasing oil rights by a Midland man.

FIRE ZONE CHANGE

The city manager was authorized to submit a written request for fire zone changes to the State Insurance Commission. Since Councilman Johnny Sue would be personally affected by this matter, he left the meeting prior to discussion.

Payment of February bills was approved, as well as minutes of the previous meeting.

Mayor Parnell Powell conducted the meeting which continued until after midnight. The entire council — Powell, Council members Wayne Russell, Leroy Burns, Sue, Carl Jarrett, and Jerry Thompson — was present, as were Feuerbacher, City Secretary Jimmie Lou Stewart, and attorney Bill Kincaid.
