Whirlwind Band Rated I And II

Sight Reading, Concert Contest

The 72-member Whirlwind Band came within one vote of garnering two "I" ratings Thursday evening during the Region XVI (North Zone) UIL Concert and Sight Reading Contest in Dimmitt.

One concert judge gave the FHS band, directed by Rusty Sherman, a I and the other two voted the local musicians a II. Thus, the band received a II rating.

Whirlwind Band earned a I in sight reading. Judge Norman Deisher of Mineral Wells termed the Floydada group "a very good sight reading band."

FLOYDADA AND LOCKNEY RECEIVE SAME RATING

Floydada and Lockney bands — two highly-regarded groups — received identical ratings of I in sight reading and II in concert.

During the Thursday evening performances in the Dimmitt High School Auditorium, the second Dimmitt band, Lockney, Floydada and Dimmitt's "first band" appeared in that order. Dimmitt's first band was the only group to receive two I ratings.

The UIL event continued Friday. Sherman said four bands from Class B schools, 10 from Class A, and eight from AA were to have appeared during the two days.

Concert tunes played by the Whirlwind Band were: "March Juno," "First American Folk Rhapsody," and "Exaltation."

"Our band played very well and I had a lot of fun directing them," Sherman said Friday morning.

Concert judges included: J.W. King of Canyon, Bob Gans of Grapevine, and James Mallow of Brady.

Four Juveniles Apprehended After Car Painting Incidents

Four juveniles were apprehended this week in connection with two car painting incidents, according to Police Chief Royce Gilmore. The victim of both episodes was a junior high teacher.

Two of the boys reportedly threw paint on the vehicle's windshield and painted the window on the driver's side last Sunday night. Paint splattered onto the hood.

The following night, paint again was poured onto the windshield and it splattered onto the hood.

Chief Gilmore said that two boys were involved in the first incident and four were responsible for the later episode.

PREVIOUS OFFENSES

One of the suspects reportedly had "been handled" by law officers on three previous occasions for theft, vandalism, and theft over \$500 offenses. Another has previously been charged with paint sniffing and "strongman robbery". The other two had no previous record.

The four — who range in age from 13 to 15 — were turned over to juvenile authorities after Gilmore and City

L. G. Wilson Selected To Coaches' Hall Of Honor

L.G. Wilson, athletic director and head coach in the Floydada school system for 11 years, has been selected as one of six men to be inducted into the Texas High School Coaches' Association (THSCA) Hall of Honor during a luncheon at noon July 28 in connection with the annual coaching school.

This is the highlight honor the THSCA can bestow upon one of its members.

A coach for 29 years, Wilson has amassed a 140-76-7 record as head mentor.

Each year the Texas High School Coaches' Association selects no more than six Hall of Honor inductees. Other honorees for 1979 are to include: the late Gano Tubb of Levelland, Jerry Hopkins of Sonora, Gene B. Hale of Nacogdoches, Joe Hedrick of Franklin, and John Clark of Plano.

This year's coaching school is scheduled July 24-28 in Fort Worth.

SPARKLING RECORD

During his 11 years in Floydada, Coach Wilson has led the Whirlwind gridders to a 90-26-4 record. His teams have won or tied for the district championship nine years. The Green and White under Coach Wilson have captured three bi-district wins and one regional victory.

While in Floydada, Wilson has been chosen three times by Region I to coach the all-stars. He represented Region I on the Texas High School Coaches' Association board of directors from 1971 to 1973.

Prior to moving here, Wilson served eight years as head coach and athletic director at Winters. While compiling a 50-33-3 record, his teams included one semi-finalist, one regional champion, and six district track champions. He was nominated for all-star coach by Region II.

STARTS AT BROWNFIELD

L.G. Wilson's first coaching job was at Brownfield, where he was line coach in football and head track mentor for four years. The Cubs twice won the football district championship during

this time. Wilson then went to Weatherford as line coach and head track and basketball mentor. During his four years in Weatherford, two football district titles were won.

For the next two years, the highly-respected Wilson was at Temple as line coach and head track coach. His playoff record continued as Temple captured a district football championship before Wilson was named head coach and athletic director at Winters.

ALL-AROUND ATHLETE
A Jones County native and an Anson

High School graduate, Wilson served two years in the U.S. Navy during World War II.

He was graduated from Abilene Christian College (now University), where he lettered four years in football and baseball and two years in basketball.

The Wilsons are parents of two children: Stan Wilson, a Texas Tech University graduate, who works with the Texas Department of Human Resources in San Antonio; and DeAun Wilson of the home, an employee of the ASCS office in Floydada.

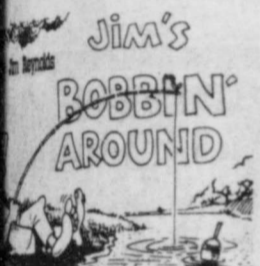

El Progreso Hears History Of The Llano Estacado

The El Progreso Study Club met in the home of Dorothy Smith and Jeanette Marr for the annual visitors day. As guests arrived, they were served delightful refreshments by Marie Brock and Hazel Johnson.

With president Anna Dell Quebe presiding, each member introduced her guest. Mrs. Smith introduced her sister-in-law, Mrs. Howard (Ruth) Smith from Lubbock, who in turn introduced the speaker of the afternoon, Mrs. Lorene (John) Harding of the Heritage Ranch Museum of Texas Tech. Her subject "The Three W's" was a short history of the Llano Estacado Plains of West Texas. As the first settlers came to this part of the state, there was no wood, no water and no women. There was no wood to build with and to use as fuel, so the people dug under the ground for shelter and substituted cow chips for fuel. Windmills were soon erected to pull the water from under the ground.

Few men brought their families as they came to settle these wide bare plains. As houses were prepared, the women and children

came to make homes and to help establish schools and churches over wide areas of this land. They were few but mighty, enduring unbelievable hardships to be with their men and to help tame these wild prairies.

Sketches of the lives of several pioneer women were mentioned. Henrietta Marse Chamberlain, Sally Ann Reynolds Matthews who wrote a book, "Interwoven" which was a history of her family, Hank and Elizabeth Smith of near Crosbyton, Lissie Campbell whose husband managed the Matador Ranch in its beginning, Mrs. Dora Roberts whose family homesteaded land near Big Spring on which oil was discovered, and she used her wealth in many projects to benefit her fellowman. Mary and Andy Blankenship filed on ranch land west of Lubbock as the children became of school age they bought a tract of land where Town and Country Shopping Center is now, to move to town to send them for an education. Rachel Singer and her husband were the first family of Lubbock, establishing the first store. Many more interesting facts were given

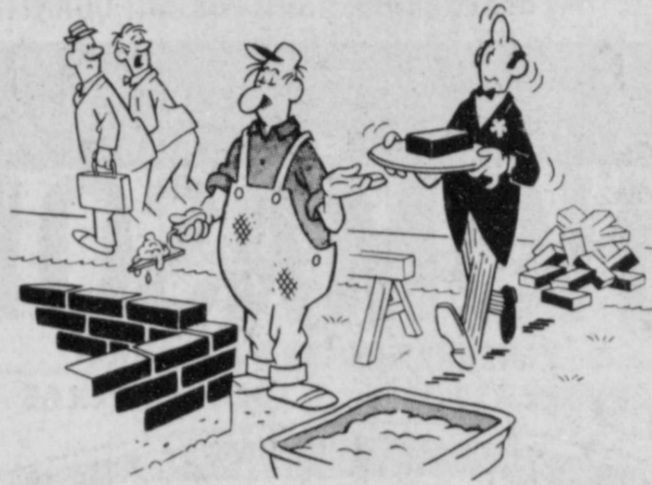

Major Food Stamp reforms In Effect

reforms in the Food Stamp Act of 1974, which include tightening requirements, imposing penalties for non-compliance, and simplifying the program to households, including the elderly and the disabled.

Chapman noted that while the new rules tightened program administration, they will also improve services to households. Elderly or disabled persons will be eligible to be seen in their home, if they cannot get to the food stamp office or find someone to go for them. It is hoped that this provision will increase participation by the elderly, which has historically been low.
