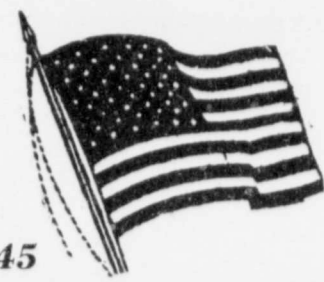

farmers have their continued rain is a real problem, there are many farmers who have not completed planting and are hoping for some hot, dry weather, in order to get back in the field.

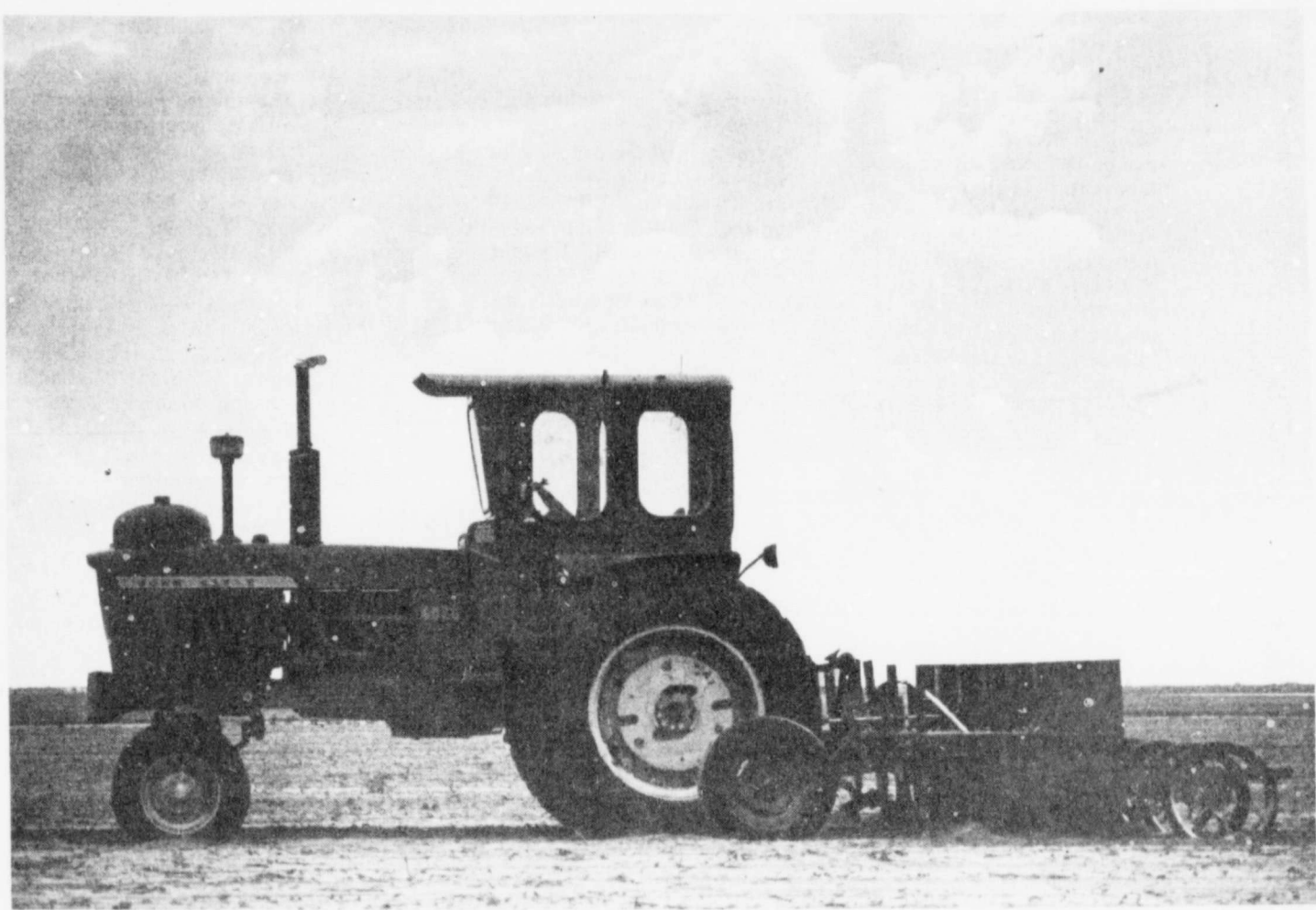
The cotton that is up is facing the problems of thrip and cold damp weather. Cotton really needs a lot of hot, dry weather.

The county's corn crop never looked better...some of it is already knee high. Most of the corn crop has only been "pre-plant" irrigated and the bountiful rainfall has already eliminated the need for one watering.

Many lakes are full, and this water will of course be utilized later on for irrigation when the weather turns hot and dry.

The rain gauge at Pioneer Natural Gas Company in Floydada showed 1.1 inches Friday morning, another 1.5 inches Saturday, nine-tenths of an inch Monday, and an additional half inch Tuesday morning. (Readings are taken at 8 a.m. each day.)

Rainfall reports from rural communities around Floydada: Sandhill 2.4 inches; Dougherty and Lakeview, two inches; Barwise one inch this week.

Love Fund For Injured Youngster

A love fund has been started at the First National Bank, Floydada, for three-year-old Melissa Osborn, daughter of Allen and Kay Osborn, who was injured in a pickup truck accident last week.

The youngster was taken to Caprock Hospital in Floydada, transferred to a Plainview hospital, and later taken to a Lubbock hospital when the extent of her injuries (she suffered a cracked skull in addition to other injuries) was known. She spent time in the intensive care unit at the Lubbock hospital. Reports Monday indicated the child was out of ICU and expected to return home soon, but the Osborns, newcomers to the community, had no insurance. Osborn had been employed by Marble Brothers for about a week, not long enough to qualify for hospitalization insurance coverage.

Marble Brothers and employees have donated funds to the family. Anyone else who would like to help the Osborns is urged to contribute to the fund at the bank.

The Osborns have three other children, a five-year-old and four-year-old twins.

Fortenberry Hearing Scheduled Friday

A pretrial hearing for Larry C. Fortenberry, 30, who is accused of killing Motley County Sheriff Jalmar "Jinks" Wilson and has been convicted once in that slaying by a Hale County jury, is scheduled at 10 a.m. tomorrow (Friday) in the courthouse in Floydada.

The hearing was originally scheduled Tuesday morning but was transferred to Friday because two of the attorneys involved could not be present Tuesday.

The Hale County jury sentenced Fortenberry to death in 1977, but the conviction was overturned in March by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. The Court of Criminal Appeals found that jurors had not been properly

instructed on corroboration needed to convict a suspect on the basis of an accomplice's testimony. The alleged accomplice, Stacy Albert Carter, testified that Fortenberry knew Wilson was a law officer when Fortenberry shot Wilson. The appeals court ruled that the jury should have been told that Carter's testimony was not sufficient evidence to prove Fortenberry knew that Wilson was a peace officer.

District Attorney John R. (Randy) Hollums, the prosecuting attorney in the case, said Tuesday that the date and time of the second Fortenberry trial had not been set, and might or might not be set at the pretrial hearing Friday.

Kenneth Underwood, who had been the Route 3 carrier, was transferred back to Petersburg April 7.

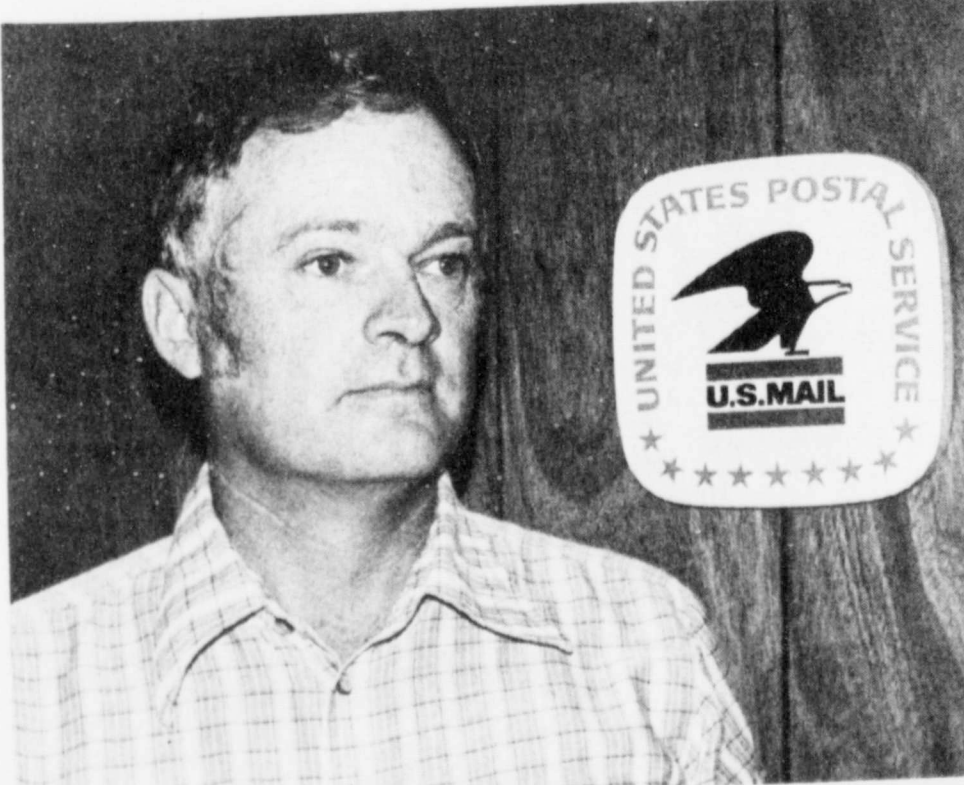
NEW SUBSTITUTE CITY CARRIER

NEWS 'N' NOTES

Electronic sewing machines — some with a "brain" (computer) and pre-programmed touch buttons — have advantages and disadvantages, so shop carefully before buying. Not all are fully electronic. Many are a combination of mechanical and electronic parts, but if a machine has just one electronic feature, the company may label it "electronic."

Electronic features on these machines range from simple electronic needle power to the complex touch-button pre-programmed stitches.

ADVANTAGES Advantages of electronic machines start with their having more reliability and cooler-running motors than mechanical machines. Electronic machines have more sensitive foot power. Also, they generally have full needle power at all speeds — enabling you to sew through several thicknesses of heavy fabric, such as denim, without speeding up the machine.

In addition, electronic machines with touch-button control let the home-sewer change from straight stitching to zig-zag to decorative stitching with the simple touch of a finger. These machines almost "sew for you."

DRAWBACKS On the other hand, electronic machines have some drawbacks.

Most cost more than mechanical machines — the more electronic features, the greater the cost.

In shopping for one, ask to see the inside of the machine head to determine the extent of the electronics.

Drawbacks also include the fact that electronic parts are more sensitive, so they can be damaged easily by improper handling. This can make internal cleaning difficult or impossible.

REPAIR PROBLEMS Repairs may be expensive and difficult to obtain. Many machine repairmen don't know how to repair electronic

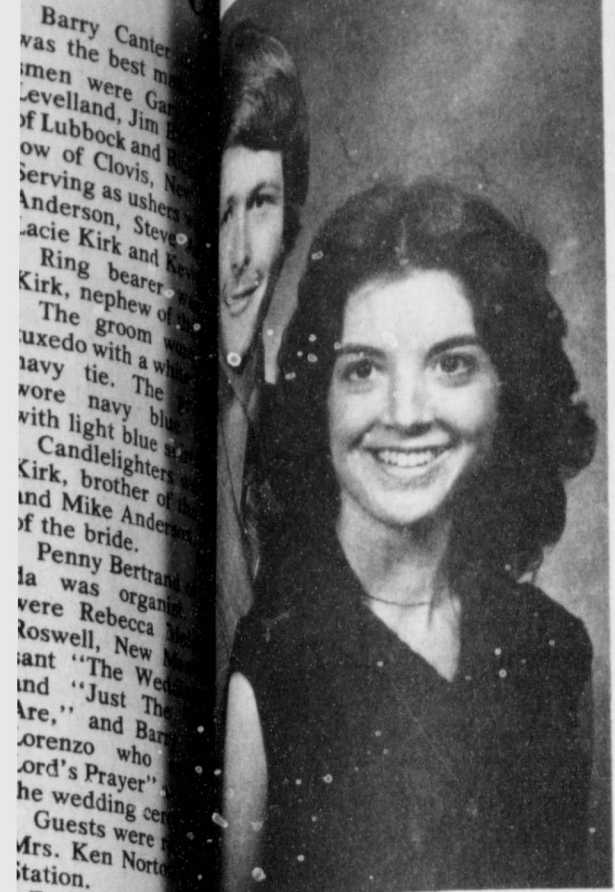

June 4, 1953

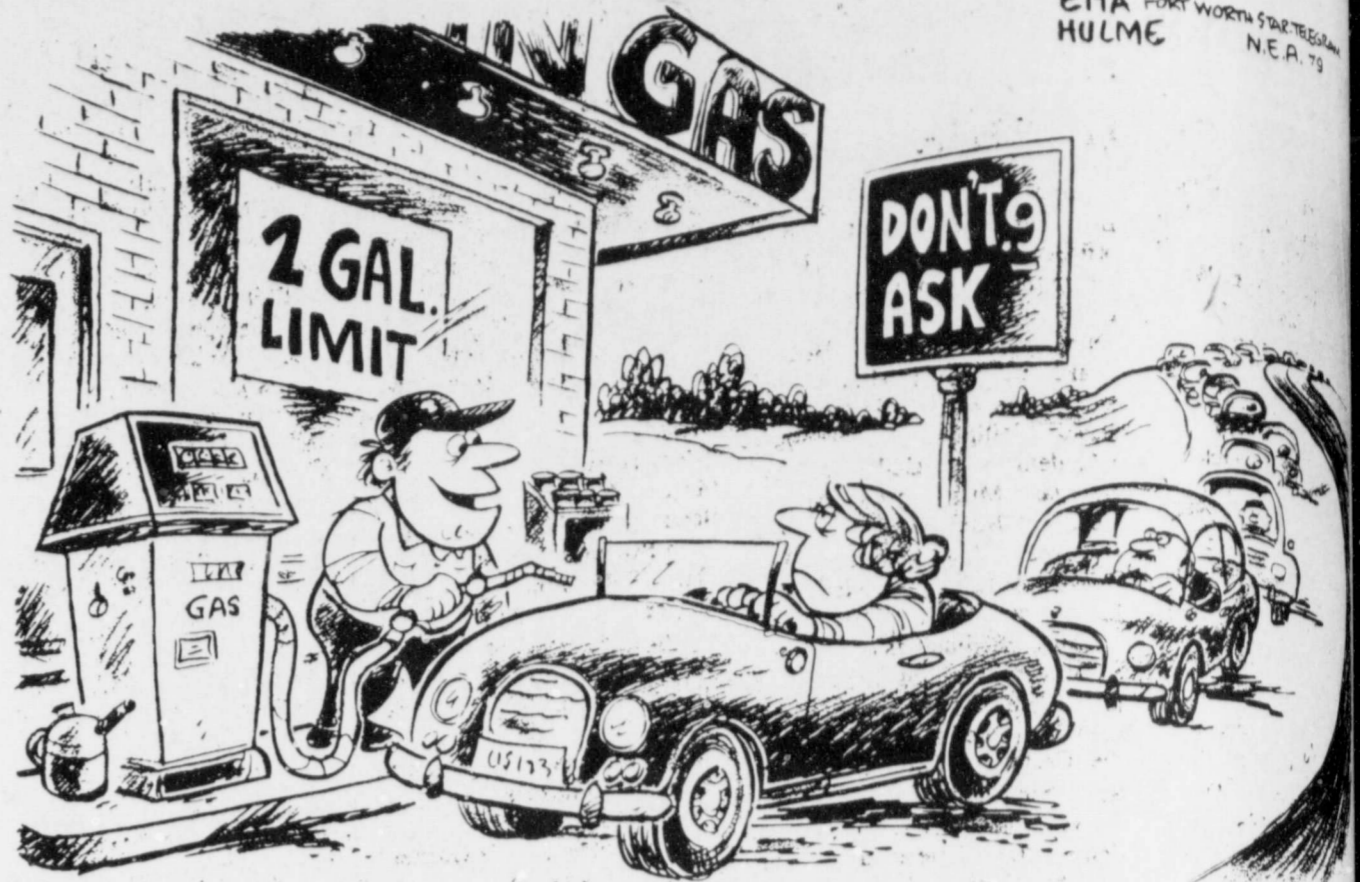

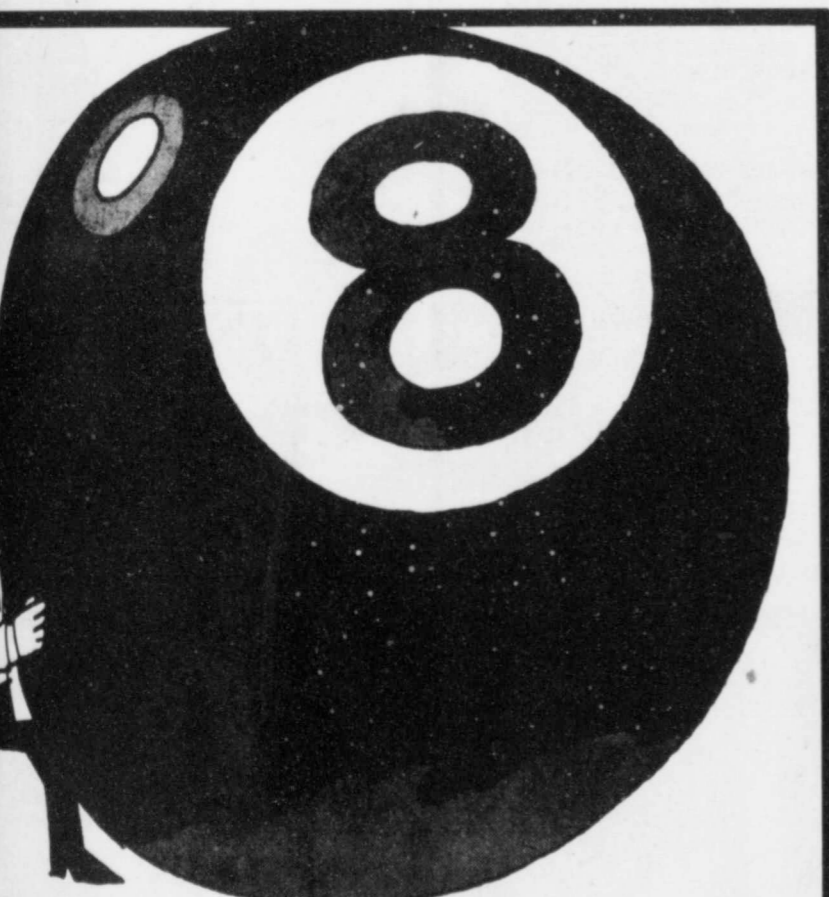

Erosion Topsoil Enemy

Would you rather keep your topsoil 48 years or 1800 years?
A foolish question? Not according to conservationists with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, who say it is relevant to land management practices in the United States today.

"We know that continuously cultivating certain row crops up and down the hill with no soil cover can cause a loss of an inch of topsoil in less than six years," Joe D. Platt, Soil Conservationist for SCS of Floydada said. "This may not sound like much, but at

this rate eight inches will be lost in 48 years. This is more topsoil than most farms have," he added.

"On the other hand," Platt said, "there are proven, practical conservation methods that can be used on this same land producing the same crop, which will extend the life of the eight inches of topsoil indefinitely."

How does the SCS estimate soil losses and come up with such widely-separated predictions?

"Conservationists can take known conditions — soil type, rainfall, steepness of slope, length of slope, and so forth — and feed them into a 'Universal Soil Loss Equation,' and come up with a reasonable prediction of soil losses," Platt explained.

"This method is not theoretical, but is based on 50 years of research by the USDA's Science and Education Administration and Agricultural Experiment stations, plus the accumulated experience of the Soil Conservation Service," Platt said.

The following table is an

example of predicted soil losses on a real cropland soil under different kinds of management. This example is on fullman clay loam soil with a gentle slope (three percent) with an eight-inch layer of topsoil:

	Avg. Annual Soil Loss Tons per Acre	Years to Lose 1 Inch of Topsoil	Years to Lose 8 Inches of Topsoil
(A) Flowing up and down the hill, no crop residue on surface. Continuous cotton.	22	6	48
(B) Terraced, contoured, plowed in the fall, no residue on surface. Continuous cotton.	5	27	215
(C) Planted without crop residue on surface. Terraced and contoured. Continuous wheat.	2	67	535
(D) Terraced, contoured, tilled with a ton of residue left on surface (minimum tillage). Continuous wheat.	.6	224	1792

"The Universal Soil Loss Equation was developed so conservationists can have a systematic means of helping landowners decide on management of soil under various conditions," Platt continued.

"The management shown on line A of the table is just about as bad as you can do," Platt said. By adding terraces and contouring, as shown on the second line, we can extend the soil's useful life up to 215 years.

"But look at the difference wheat can make. Line C shows what happens when we use crops that produce a high amount of residue. This procedure extends the expected life to the topsoil to 535 years.

"But if minimum tillage conservation methods are used, as shown on the last line, the topsoil will last 1792 years. Naturally, we think that in this length of time, by the use of crop residues and through normal processes,

the soil will not really be lost at all, but will be usable indefinitely," Platt said.

"Of course, soil erosion is always more damaging than we realize because erosion is just the first step in environmental and social degradation," Platt said. "Every farmer knows that it takes more power and more fertilizer to try to maintain production on an eroded soil. The inevitable result of erosion is lower yields, higher production costs, and higher prices in the marketplace.

"We should also remember that the eroded soil doesn't just disappear. It goes someplace. When we see sediment on streets and in playa lakes, muddy water in draws, or dust in the air, we are seeing how erosion hurts all of us no matter where we live or work.

"The Universal Soil Loss Equation was developed so conservationists can have a systematic means of helping landowners decide on management of soil under var-

ious conditions," Platt continued. "In other words, it is not a technical trick, but a scientific approach to conservation planning. We need to remember, too, that while we stand behind our estimates in the Soil Loss Equation, they are still just that — estimates.

"The equation reinforces the other planning methods that we have," Platt said. "It enhances the use of the soil survey and the value of the conservationist's training and experience."

It should also be noted that in addition to the Universal Soil Loss Equation which estimates water erosion, in West Texas and Floyd County we also must consider wind erosion on our soils. This will be the subject of future news articles.

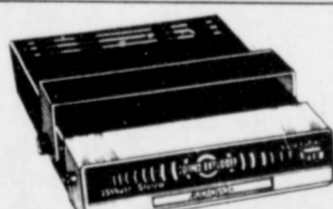

Floyd-Hale Game Warden Ainsworth Profiled

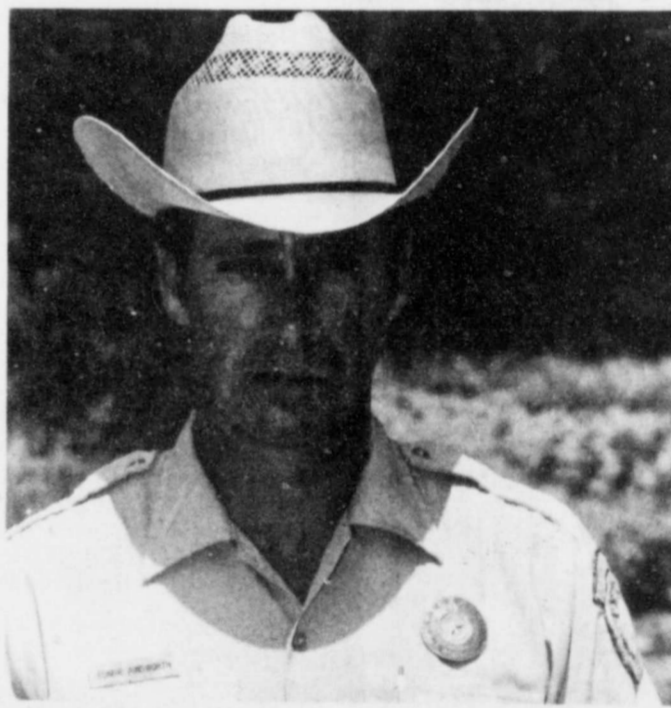
PLAINVIEW — When you think of local hunting and fishing regulations of water safety requirements in Texas, the first person to come to mind is the area Texas game warden and Ronnie Ainsworth of Plainview is the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department representative for Hale and Floyd counties on the South Plains.

Ronnie covers counties with as much wildlife as any in north Texas including: deer, quail, dove, pheasant, waterfowl, and aoudad sheep. Ronnie is also familiar with northwest Texas as his home town is Vernon. He resides with his wife, Barbara, and 11-year old Joey and 8-year old Kimberly at 2001 West 18th in Plainview.

Ainsworth has been with the law enforcement division of the P&WD for nearly six years upon graduating from the game warden school in May, 1973.

Although the game warden doesn't receive many calls reporting violations or asking for local information, the officer can be contacted by calling 806/293-5688.

Ainsworth, as well as other Lubbock district wardens, work closely with other local law enforcement departments. Many times, the war-

Cotton Crop May Be Late

COLLEGE STATION — Delays in cotton planting and replanting due to prolonged periods of wet weather in Central and South Texas plus hail damage in the Rio Grande Valley and Coastal Bend are getting the state's cotton crop off to a shaky start.

So, farmers in these areas who are still planting cotton

should select early, rapid fruiting varieties, advises Dr. Bob Metzger, cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

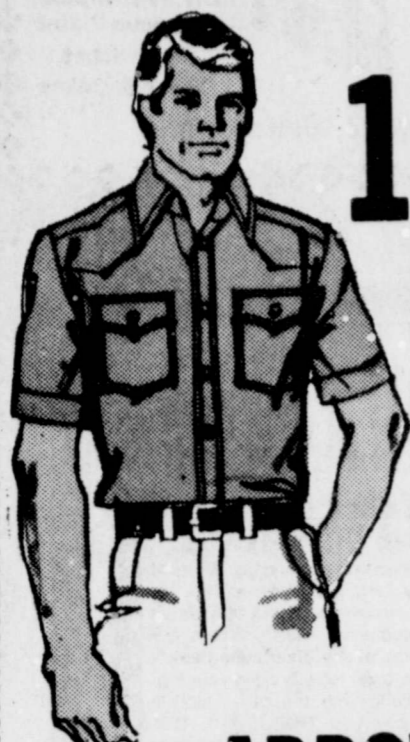
"Much of the cotton crop is two to six weeks behind schedule in central and southern areas and will require close management and a near optimum season to harvest a profitable crop," points out Metzger. "A late crop often spells trouble in terms of lower yield potential, high insect pressures and later harvest, which usually cuts into profits."

Although producers do not like May-planted cotton, in most cases there is no good alternative crop.

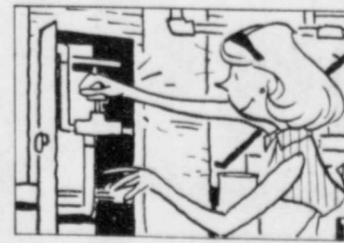

SHUT OFF THE WATER!
If a water pipe or fixture in your home springs a major leak, will you know how to shut off the water?



Most sinks, wash basins and toilets have shutoff valves below them that cut off their water supply. The hot-water heater also has a valve to turn off hot water to the whole house. Unfortunately, most of our bathtubs and showers don't have shutoffs because the plumbing is usually behind the wall.
