

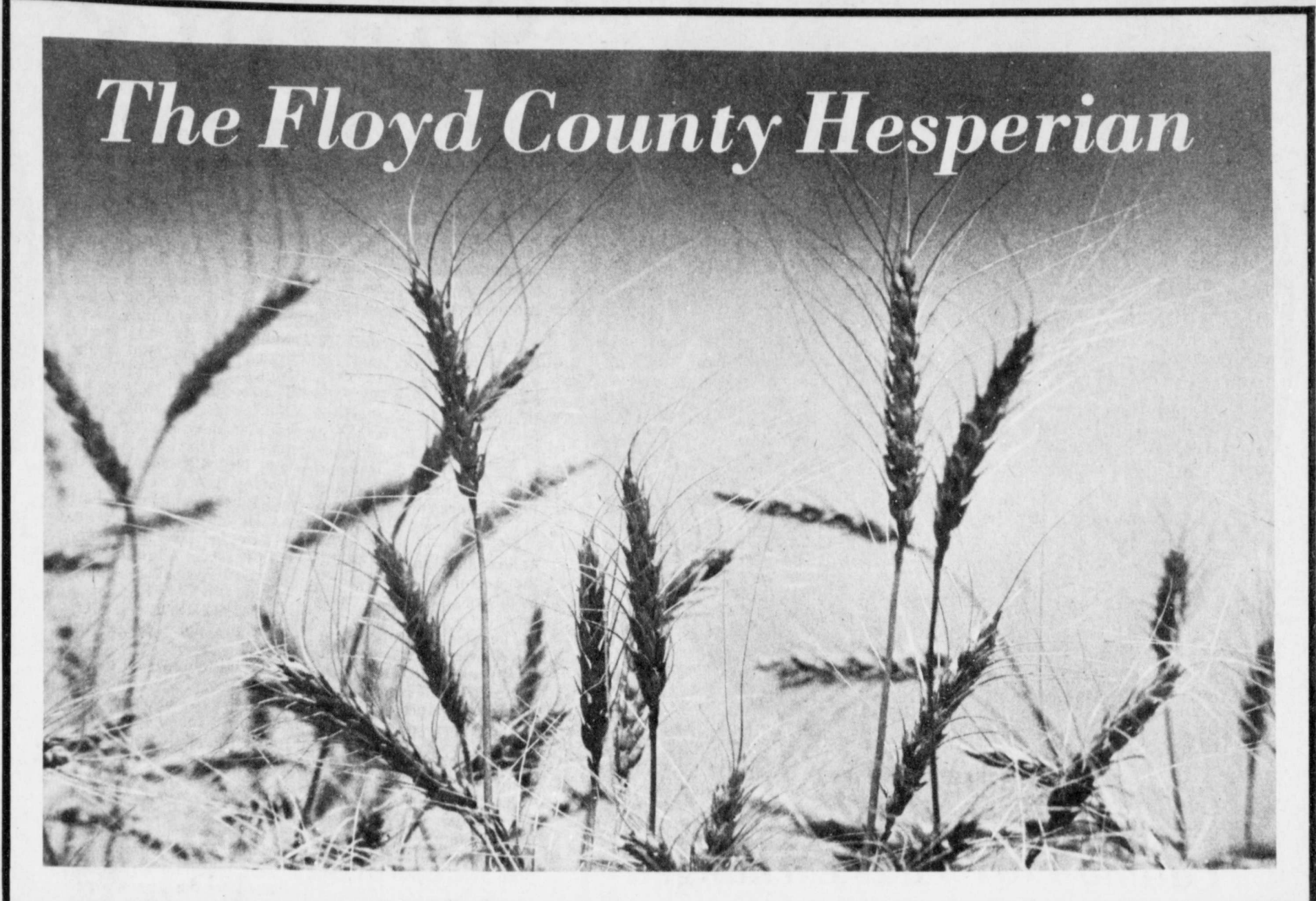

Commissioners Accept Remodeling Plans, Consider Courthouse Air Conditioning Bid

Floyd County Commissioners, in the regular monthly meeting last week, accepted plans for the remodeling of the Agriculture Building. Total cost of the remodeling is to be at the expense of the Department of Human Resources and at no cost to Floyd County. The commissioners considered a bid for the heating and air conditioning of the courthouse. A decision on the bid, total amount of which is \$62,500, is to be announced at the July commissioners' court meeting.

Also during the Monday-morning meeting, the commissioners authorized Sheriff Fred Cardinal to appoint Irene Miller deputy sheriff; accepted a trial contract of time share services between the county tax assessor-collector and a Plainview firm in connection with preparation of the 1979 county tax roll; authorized an accountant to complete the audit for the Floyd County Noxious Weed Control Office; approved payment of bills and made investments.

REMODELING OF AG BUILDING
 The commissioners voted unanimously to accept the plans presented by Carl Morris of the Department of Human Resources for the remodeling of the Agriculture Building. The total cost of the remodeling is to be at the expense of the Department of Human Resources, and at no cost to Floyd County, with the exception of the storage room on the north end of the building, and if this is remodeled, to become a meeting room, it will be at the cost of Floyd County. The motion was made by Bob Jarrett

and seconded by Jack Lackey.
COURTHOUSE HEAT, AIR
 Ed Hammonds of Hammonds Sheet Metal Company submitted a bid for the heating and air conditioning of the Floyd County Courthouse. The amount of the bid, for "equipment installed turnkey using existing duct," was \$62,500. The equipment list included ten heat pumps and "add-on electric heat" units. Commissioner Grigsby Milton made the motion to consider the bid and give Hammonds a decision at the next regular commissioners' court meeting to be held July 9, 1979. The motion was seconded by Bob Jarrett and carried unanimously.

Larger Fireworks Display To Be At Lake July 4th

A fireworks display "several times larger than last year's" is planned at MacKenzie Lake July 4th according to lake manager Neil Taylor. Lions Clubs from Lockney, Silvertown,

Tulia and Floydada — the four members of the MacKenzie Municipal Water Authority — are cooperating with Silvertown Fire Department to present the fireworks display. The recreation fund of the authority is also helping to

buy the fireworks. The display will begin at "dark-thirty" on the Fourth, but should not start before 9 p.m. Admission price to the lake will be usual gate-fee of \$1 for anyone 13-years-old and over.

Also scheduled on the Fourth is a six-mile, mini-marathon for runners of all ages. Arrangements for several other activities are incomplete, but boat races may be held. Details for all activities will be announced next week.

DEPUTY SHERIFF
 The court ordered that Sheriff Cardinal be authorized to appoint Irene Miller as Deputy Sheriff. The appointment is to date from June 6, 1979; the compensation for the deputy is fixed at the rate of dispatcher only.
TAX ROLL PREPARATION CONTRACT
 The motion by Milton that the court accept the Contract of Time Share Services between Jonelle Fawver, Floyd County Tax Assessor Collector and KMK Enterprises, Plainview, in connection with preparation of the 1979 county tax roll, such contract to be on a six-month trial basis, was seconded by Jarrett and passed unanimously.

Floydada Open Tennis Tournament Planned

Entries for the 1979 Floydada Open Tennis Tournament are now being accepted. This year's tournament is scheduled July 18-22. Entries must be received by July 14, and fees must accompany all entries. (Entry fees are \$5 for singles events and \$10 for doubles events.) Junior-high matches will start Wednesday morning, July 18; high-school events will begin at noon Thursday, July 19; 45-and-over doubles matches start at noon Friday, June 20; first-round matches in adult open and 35-and-over events are set Saturday, July 21. All players are to report to tournament headquarters at the Floydada High School tennis courts at the time their event is scheduled. If an event is cancelled because of insufficient entries, players will be notified, if possible. Certain events are not being offered this year due to a small draw in the past. Tournament directors are Tommy Baxter and Jean Hale.

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WEED DISTRICT AUDIT
 The motion was made by Jack Lackey and seconded by Milton that the court ask Newell Burk to complete the audit for the Floyd County Noxious Weed Control Office. This audit is to cover the period from January 1, 1979 until the closing of the office March 1, 1979. The motion carried unanimously.

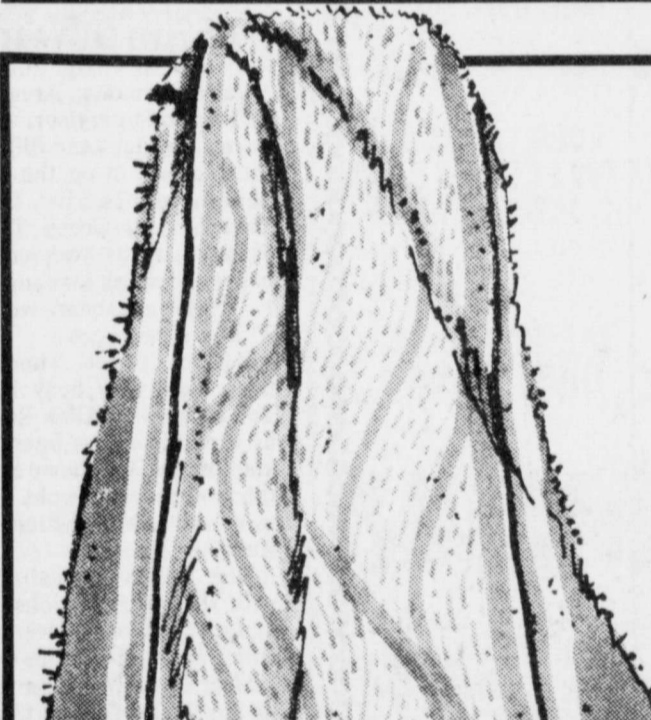

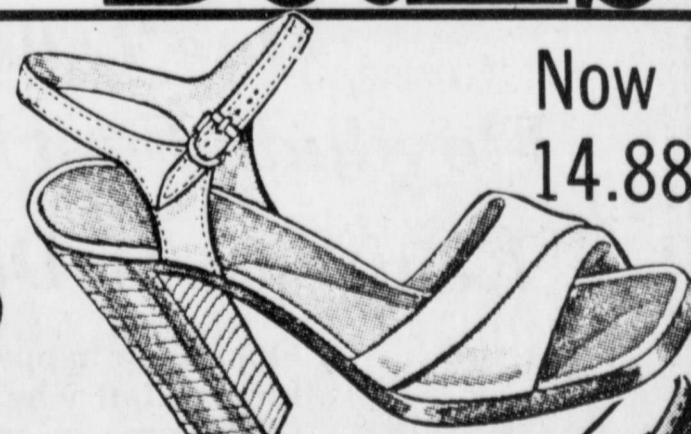

DRUGS AND PREGNANCY

Taking some drugs during pregnancy can adversely affect the mother and the baby.

To avoid drug-related problems during pregnancy, take drugs only when necessary and only on the advice of your doctor.

Also, avoid tobacco and alcohol.

Furthermore, discuss any questions you may have about drugs, either prescription or over-the-counter, thoroughly with your doctor before taking them.

EFFECTS OF DRUGS

When an expectant mother takes a drug, in most cases it will pass through the placenta to the fetus.

Whether or not the fetus is harmed will depend on the type of drug, the stage of pregnancy, and the amount and strength of the drug.

The fetus is probably most prone to harmful effects during the early stages of pregnancy when the cells are growing rapidly and organ systems are developing.

DRUGS TO AVOID

Taking the hormones estrogen and progestin (both are ingredients in oral contraceptives) during the first three or four months of pregnancy can increase the risk of birth defects.

Therefore, a woman who is on the pill and thinks she may be pregnant should consult her doctor immediately.

Also avoid tetracycline du-

ring pregnancy because it can cause discoloration of the child's teeth.

ALCOHOL, TOBACCO

Two other potential threats are alcohol and smoking.

If a pregnant woman drinks three ounces or more of alcohol a day, there is a definite risk of birth defect. In fact, drinking one to three ounces may also be risky.

Heavy smoking will increase a woman's chances of giving birth to a child of less than normal birth weight.

POTENTIALLY HARMFUL DRUGS

Other drugs may also cause harm to the fetus —

though no firm evidence has proven a cause-and-effect relationship.

These drugs are very suspect, however, and pregnant women should take them with caution. They include:

1) Barbituates — If taken in large doses throughout the pregnancy and especially during the last three months,

Cities' Sales Tax Rebates Announced

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas cities shared \$218 million in rebates from the one-percent optional city sales tax during the first six months of this year, State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday in announcing the city's June tax allocations.

This figure compares to \$196.4 million that cities received during the same six months during 1978.

Bullock said that June allocations for the more than 900 Texas cities will be \$67.7 million, compared to a 1978 statewide allocation of \$60.9 million for the month.

Floydada's June allocation is \$13,887.82, slightly less than the June 1978 rebate of \$15,590.58. 1979 payments to the City of Floydada total \$41,631.66, compared to \$42,917.82 for the same five months (January through May) last year.

Lockney's check will be for \$6,256.54, compared to last year's \$5,362.32 June rebate. Lockney's 1978 payment to date have been \$18,035.83, three percent higher than last year's \$17,449.51 five-month totals.

Other area cities' June 1979 allocation amounts:

Abernathy \$909.04; Childress \$24,883; Crosbyton \$5,295; Dimmitt \$13,316; Friona \$10,276; Hale Center \$5,447; Happy \$2,432; Idalou \$3,465; Kress \$1,844; Littlefield \$34,033; Lorenzo \$2,160; Lubbock \$1,175,936; Matador \$2,663; Muleshoe \$22,376; Olton \$6,858; Paducah \$7,442; Petersburg \$3,261; Silvertown \$4,122; Tulia \$15,910; Turkey \$2,048; Plainview \$121,180; Quitaque \$2,396; Ralls \$5,750.

Dallas will get a check for \$7.9 million, bringing the city's year-to-date payments to \$25.8 million.

Houston's payment for June totals \$14.3 million. The city has received \$45.8 million in tax rebates for 1979.

San Antonio's rebate for this month will be \$3.5 million, bringing that city's 1979 total to 12 million.

Fort Worth's check will be \$2.6 million for a yearly total of \$8.7 million.

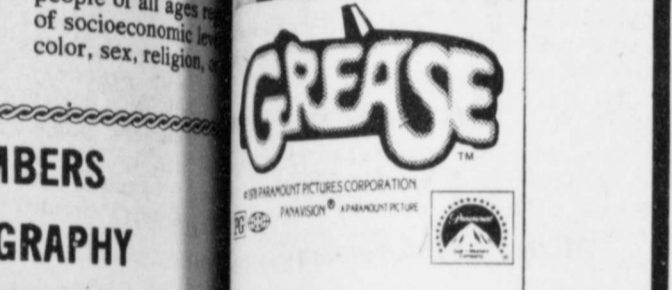

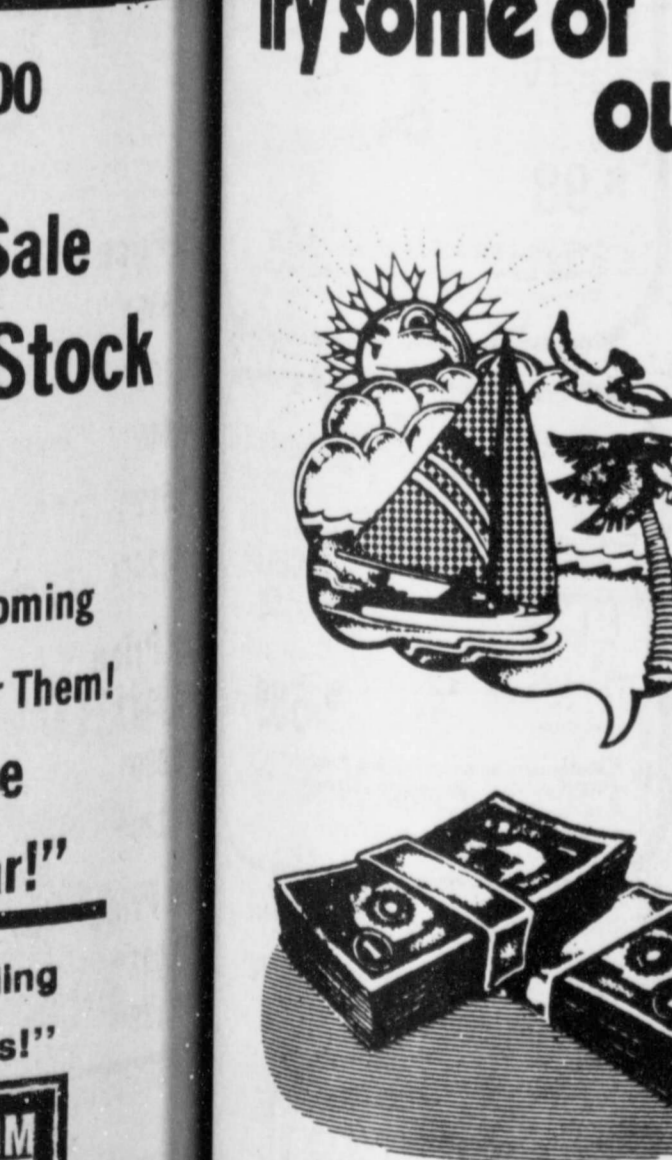

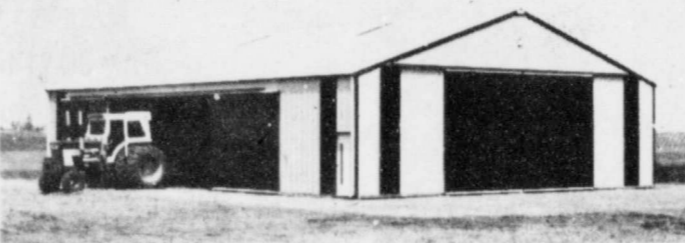

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON D.C. — A considerable amount of attention is being given these days to the growing dissatisfaction many citizens are having over high taxes and excessive government spending. People in Washington are finally beginning to reassess the will of the American people. Are the people most concerned about high taxes, excessive government spending, or waste? I believe they are telling us that they are not getting their money's worth for the taxes they pay. When workers get their paychecks every month and see the large income and Social Security tax withheld, they are wondering where and why it all goes — Good question.

One of the areas of greatest concern to the taxpayer is our growing social services programs. Next year the government will spend over \$300 billion on these projects. Much of this money goes for worthwhile services such as health care for those truly in need, income maintenance for the disabled, and services for the needy elderly. But a considerable portion of this money goes for programs that do not in any way increase the assets of America or provide gainful employment for those out of work. Often money is given to people who can and are supporting themselves. And one of the most costly side effects is the almost complete destruction of the work incentive for some of the poor on welfare. Why should anyone work if his or her income is already provided for? Government handouts too often stifle a worker's motivation to produce.

Last week the Agriculture committee proposed to lift the spending cap on the Food Stamp Program and thus increase costs by over \$1 billion. In 1964 when the Food Stamp Act was adopted there appeared little question that the intent was to assist the legitimately needy of America in meeting their nutritional needs, particularly the children. This goal has grown out of proportion and the working taxpayer is now being asked to support too many people who are either voluntarily unemployed or who can and should be supporting themselves. In 1967 there were 1.5 million recipients, but 18.5 million people are currently enrolled in the program. The food stamp program is now out of control with one out of every four persons eligible for assistance and it is growing by leaps and bounds. The answer is not to spend more money, but to reform the system. We need to eliminate food stamps for strikers and college students. The eligible income levels should be lowered to make sure food stamps go only to those who are truly in need.

Certainly I realize that the government has to provide for those people who are physically unable to care for themselves — we are our brother's keeper. But the state has no obligation to support those individuals who can work, but don't. It is a time to put people back to productive labor earning a living and not permit the government to rob a person of his dignity by giving him a handout. Only then will we control inflation and help all of the people.

Continental Singers Concert Set Sunday At First Baptist Church

The "Continental Singers and Orchestra," currently on their yearly 75-day summer tour, will present a live 90-minute concert of contemporary Christian music on Sunday, June 24 at 7 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Floydada.

Their performance includes contemporary gospel music, spirituals, anthems, and hymn arrangements. This year's program, entitled "Praise and Rejoice," will feature many of the great Christian songs being heard around the world. Medleys of favorite hymns and praise songs will be featured, along with contemporary gospel songs like Don Francisco's "He's Alive" and great standards such as "How Great Thou Art."

The 25 vocalists and 10-piece orchestra are highly trained and talented musicians selected by audition from thousands of high school and college young people from across the nation and in foreign countries. Auditions are held after each local concert for singers, instrumentalists and technical staff.

The program has proven so popular among young performers wanting to join the tours that they have grown from one group in 1967 to ten groups this year.

Since Cam Floria organized the first group, various editions of the "Continental Singers and Orchestra" have made more than 4,500 live domestic appearances and over 1,200 foreign appearances before more than 3 million people. The philosophy of Floria is that "regardless of the country or religion, music is the common language."

Traveling from 100 to 500 miles seven days a week by bus, boat and plane, they will perform nightly during the summer tour. Concerts are held in churches, auditoriums, outdoor pavilions, military bases and hospitals. They are completely self-contained with their own sound and lighting equipment.

In addition to performing in all fifty states, they have toured Canada, Great Britain and Ireland, eastern and western Europe, plus Poland, Yugoslavia, the Middle East, South America, Aus-

tralia, New Zealand, the South Pacific, the Far East and the Caribbean Islands.

This year the "Continental Singers and Orchestra" will visit Moscow, Russia for the first time as well as every section of the United States. The tours also include Canada, Barbados, the Bahamas, Bermuda, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic, Trinidad, Poland, Germany, Holland, England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Switzerland, Greece, Spain, New Zealand, Australia, Fiji, Samoa, Finland, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Yugoslavia, Austria and France.

Floria, president of Continental Ministries headquartered in Thousand Oaks, California, has perfected techniques to turn 235 singers and 130 instrumentalists into 10 professional-sounding performing groups in a short 10-day training period. Sound and lighting technicians and bus drivers also receive specialized training. While each member of the group has been rehearsing independently at home prior to coming together, the summer begins with an

intensive rehearsal camp in the Los Angeles area, where they meet as a

group for the first time. Financing for this non-profit group is unique. Each member raises part of his or her expenses on his own, with the

remainder being supplied by churches and organizations on the World and Light Records, entitled "Come to the new west," "Come to the new west," "Come to the new west."
