

# Storm Rips Through Floyd County

## Winds Estimated At 70 mph

Winds estimated at 70 mph... said the crop damage ranged from "minor" to "total."

Many farmers, especially in the northern part of the county, were using words like "sliced-off," "table-topped," and "wiped out" to describe

their young cotton, much of which already had been replanted twice. This time, they're expected to replant with soybeans, grain sorghum, or sunflowers.

Residential areas in both Lockney and Floydada were littered with tree branches, and large trees were uprooted by the fierce wind, the velocity of which was estimated at 70 miles per hour by several observers. Store signs were toppled, windows were broken, farm equipment and outbuildings were damaged and/or "relocated" by the gale-force winds.

Water was over the pavement on several farm-to-market roads, and playa lakes were "running together" as a result of the rain, in amounts of up to three inches, which accompanied the storm. There was more rain, but no reports of severe weather, early Monday morning in most parts of the county.

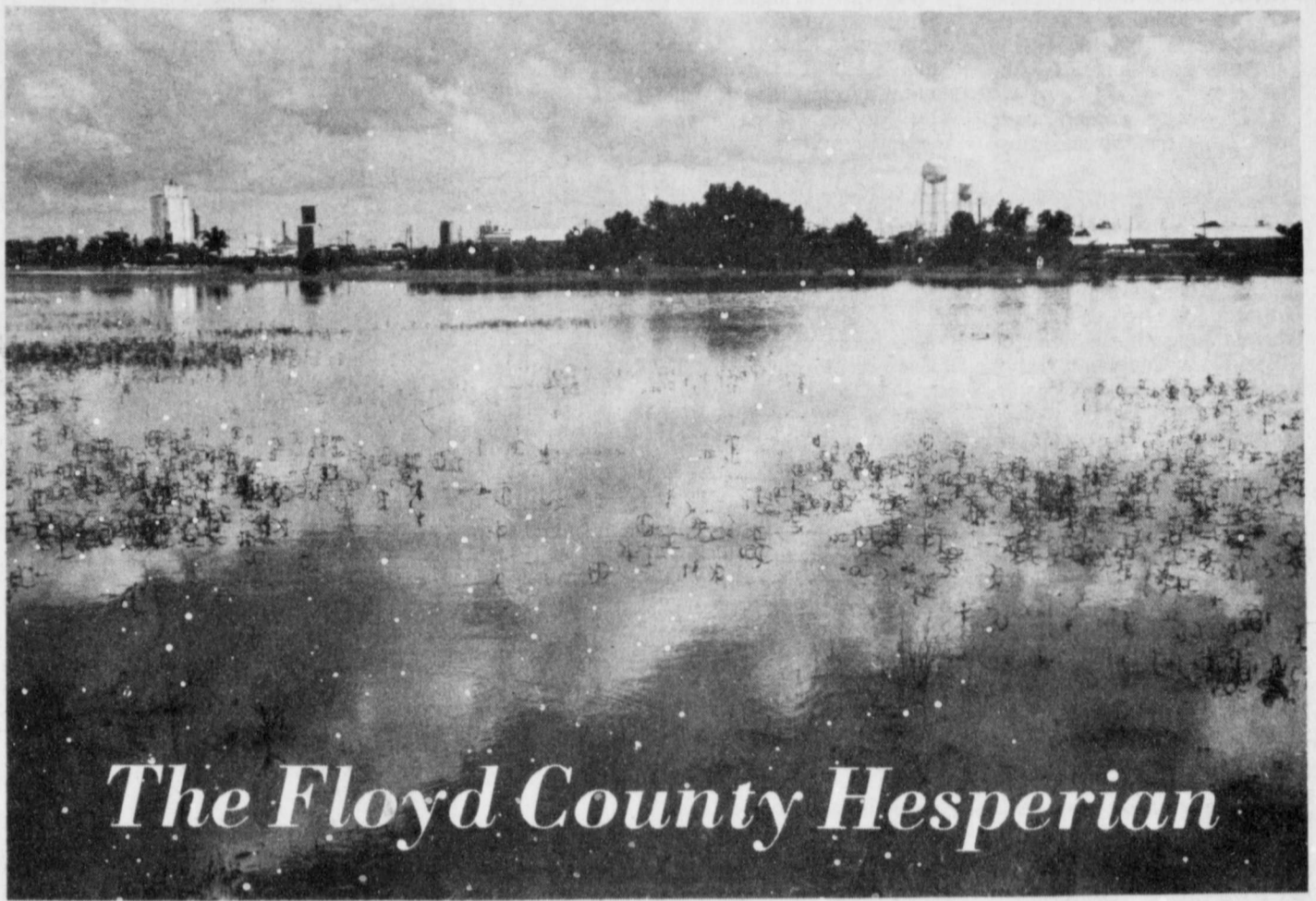
In southern parts of the county, they were luckier. In the McCoy community in southwest Floyd County, reports indicate one to two inches of rain and some wind Saturday — but the wind didn't last long, they had another inch of rain Sunday morning which washed the dirt off the cotton, and the cotton crop was "looking good" by Tuesday. Some farmers in the southwest part of the county were expecting to be able to "get back out there and plow" by Tuesday afternoon.

At Dougherty, only half an inch of rain was measured Saturday night and two-tenths Sunday night, although more rainfall was recorded "all around" that community. The wind wasn't too bad in the Dougherty area, either.

The gauge at Barwise Elevator showed 1.4" Saturday night and 1.7" the next night/early morning. There was no hail, but the wind "blew like thunder," some just-watered corn was blown over, and the cotton is "not as pretty as it was" before the storm.

The South Plains community didn't completely escape the wind, but crop damage there appeared to be less than in most other sections of northern Floyd County. Rainfall at South Plains measured half an inch Saturday and an inch Sunday.

The board-certified family practitioner is licensed to perform Federal Aviation Administration medical exams. He is currently a member of the U.S. Air Force Reserve.

"As far as I'm concerned, it's a permanent move. If I make a good living here, I'll be staying."

The "new doctor" served as secretary/treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce and vice president of the Kiwanis Club at Pilot Point. He is a Methodist.

His interests include gardening, collecting antiques, classical music, photography, and travel.

## Nuclear Power Plants: A Threat To Our Freedom?

Commerce, Texas—During a recent security exercise at an American nuclear power plant, officials with placards suddenly turned up in the control room amid much surprise and some embarrassment. The cards, held high, said: "Bang! If this was a gun, I'd be in charge of this place."

And, during another similar exercise in the southwestern United States, Army troops with real weapons staged a series of mock attacks with results again embarrassing to nuclear plant officials.

According to Dr. Doug Gale, ETSU physics faculty and nuclear consultant, the results of these tests were predictable. What bothers him the most, however, are the implications that our burgeoning technology—particularly in the nuclear field—may pose threats to our own free society.

"Security at a nuclear plant is actually two-fold," he explained. "It is indeed tight for certain types of white-collar crime, such as stealing industrial secrets. Military security, or the actual physical protection of the facility, is not."

"The inherent problem with military security is that the better you make it, the more you must use dictatorship-style tactics: keeping dossiers on individual citizens with technological knowledge, placing the plants on military bases under heavy guard and so on. The communist countries, as an example, don't have any security problems for this reason."

Although placing all nuclear plants on military installations would solve one aspect of the security problem, other disadvantages crop up, Gale said.

"The plants would be awfully easy to knock out in the event of an attack, thus leaving the nation with much of its generating capacity gone forever," he explained. "Also, you would have to tie up a very large number of troops for guard duty."

Strangely, Gale voiced an anti-technology note when asked his own preferences about power generation, especially in light of his nuclear physics and microcomputer background.

"I'd rather go without electricity than be faced with the prospect of nuclear plants guarded under a dictatorship-like scenario," he said. "If everything is concentrated, all it takes is one lunatic to cripple an entire region. This is true even for conventional plants—if 'Big Alex' in New York, for example, goes down, there goes much of New York City and much of upstate New York."

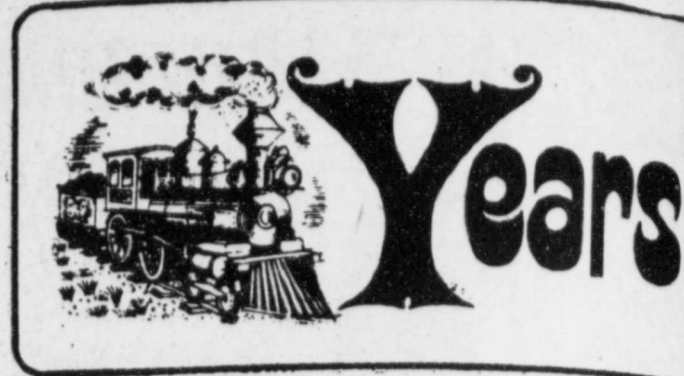
"My concept of reliable electricity production revolves around many, many localized plants under local control. Then, if one goes down, there is no threat of large-scale catastrophe. I envision these small plants to use appropriate technology, such as wind and geothermal, where possible."

In the midst of red-hot debate over the dangers and benefits of nuclear power, Gale emphasizes that the American people and their government have not yet come to grips with the real problem facing the nation: over-population.

"Our expanding population is crowding us into short-term technological fixes. The United States is like 220 million dope addicts on an energy binge," he warned. "We're overloading the system, deficit spending on energy and other resources. At the same time, scientists are expected to keep providing these quick energy 'fixes.' Personally, I think we have about another 70 years before the roof comes crashing down on us."

Concerning the controversy over nuclear energy, Gale said both sides are firing shots in the dark.

"The anti-nuclear people have a good function in that they keep us from being too hasty about nuclear plants, but at the same time, they tend to distort and emotionalize the issue," he said. "On the other hand, the nuclear people tend to underestimate the problems of nuclear energy. In contrast, my version of Parkinson's Law regarding technological devices is this: first, it'll take twice as long to build as originally planned; second, it'll cost twice as much as planned; and third, it won't work the first time anyway. There are few exceptions to this rule."

## Gas Shortage A Farce?

Is there really a gas shortage? Or is there really just a plot to keep vacationing Americans at home this summer and thus help to curb inflation? If this is the case, we don't think it will work.

Americans will find a way to go on their annual vacation trips if they have to crawl to the resort spots on hands and knees. Travel has been important to Americans for our entire 200 years, and we can put our trust in American ingenuity to find a way to make it all possible.

The United States became a great nation because our ancestors believed in growth and progress...scientific, industrial, technological, etc. If the government can keep hands off and not put the lid on this natural growth and progress, American ingenuity will find a way to overcome the problems of energy shortage, if, in truth, it actually exists.

Within our borders, the United States has the following reserves of energy resources based on present rates of consumption: enough crude oil to last for 84 years, enough natural gas to last 400 years, enough coal to last for 600 years, enough oil shale to last 300 years, enough uranium to last 120 years and enough geothermal energy to last for 200 years.

There are enough underground deposits of methane to supply the U. S. with gas for 500 to 1,000 years. According to geologist Paul Jones of Louisiana State University, it is necessary to separate the methane from the liquid in order for it to be used as natural gas. Jones says "we have the technology available to do this."

Our greatest natural resource, human ingenuity, will never be "depleted." We predict that Americans will not stand by and accept the notion that we must content ourselves with a lower standard of living simply because the residents of certain Middle Eastern countries are unable to get along with each other.

Less than half (40 per cent to be exact) of our country's oil was shipped to the U.S. before the Mid-East Crisis arose. There should be no need for our country to depend on foreign sources for this amount of oil if our energy production at home is quickly beefed up. This, in itself, should help to ease the burdens of inflation by creating more jobs.

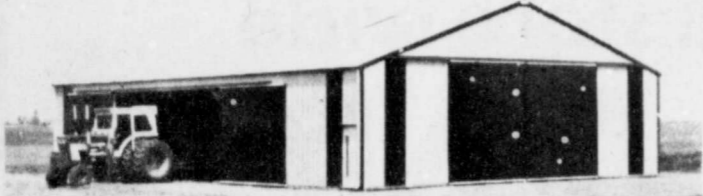
Once again, the solution to the problem is simply to let nature take its course in the natural cycle of things, preferably without governmental intervention.

If private industry can cut down somewhat on the cost of producing gasohol, (or if the price of gas continues to increase), then this may be one of our ultimate solutions to our fuel supply.

And, as we have stated before, this would "kill two birds with one stone" as far as our immediate area is concerned, since extra agricultural products would be needed to furnish material for making this proposed new fuel.

The Texas Legislature is making moves to secure federal money to assist in constructing gasohol plants in our state. It is to be hoped that such plants will develop in our state and area at an early stage, so as to benefit the farmers of our area more quickly.

## Farabee Blasts DOE

Austin...State Senator Ray Farabee blasted Washington for its lack of any National Energy Program saying "State government does not set energy policy, but somehow the Department of Energy (DOE) expects state and local governments to enforce their piecemeal plans."

"Until we have a coherent National Energy Plan, we will be living from one crisis to the next. It is unfair to expect state or local governments to carry out something which the federal government can neither explain, understand nor administer", Farabee stated to the Lions Club in Wichita Falls this week.

Although there are no simple answers to the energy problem according to Farabee, he outlined four points which he stated we must address: (1) a clear-cut National Energy Policy; (2) greater individual conservation; (3) development of energy alternatives such as gasohol, solar energy, coal and lignite power; and (4) priorities for agricultural production, emergency health care and commercial transportation.

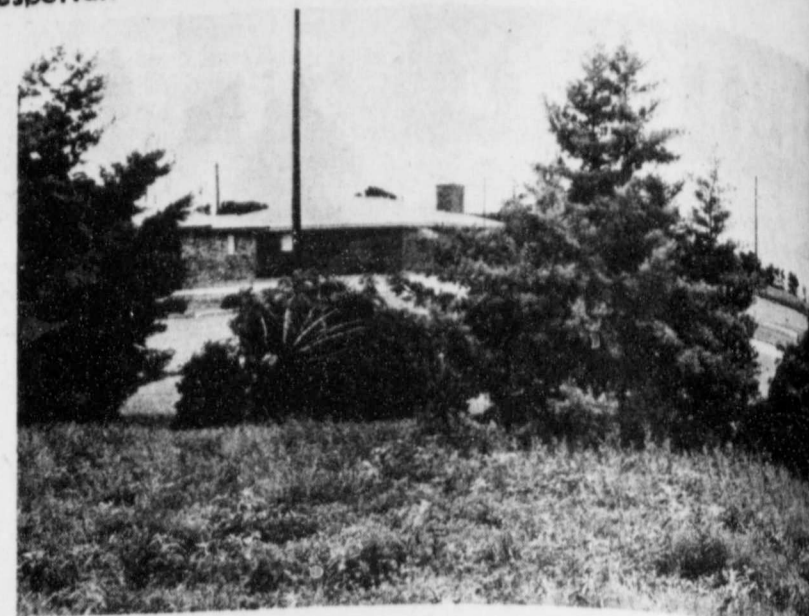
