SOMEHOW, IT JUST DOESN'T SEEM RIGHT. The U.S. Air Force has allowed a name change on one of its visiting officers' quarters in San Antonio.

'TIS THE SEASON TO BE JOLLY. 'Tis also the season to be on the lookout for confidence-men, grifters and other forms of gutter life. These people use the spirit of the season to work their illegal schemes.

As Christmas rolls around, these crooks take advantage of people who could use some extra money to tide them over or to get that additional gift for a loved one. Poor people and the elderly are the con artists' favorite targets.

So be wary of quick money deals or offers promising fabulous pay for little or no work. Be especially suspicious if the deal requires any investment or "good faith money."

BBB reports confidence schemes being worked in South Plains

The Better Business Bureau of the South Plains is experiencing a great number of inquiries on several types of schemes in this area.

The first involves the increase in newspaper and magazine ads dealing with "work at home" schemes. Typical of such an ad is: "Earn \$200 per week stuffing and addressing envelopes." Although most local newspapers in the South Plains do not run these ads, some are inadvertently printed. Sometime the ad is hard to identify as a work-at-home scheme. Such is the case with American Switchboard Association which promises dollars for using your phone as an answering service. If a person is in doubt, they should contact the BBB for assistance. Work-at-home schemes are usually illegal and are under the investigation of the Postal Authorities and the States Attorney General. We advise extreme caution in dealing with these offers for extra income.

The second problem involves the increased solicitations for charities. Usually, the ones to watch out for are those that come by mail or are being handled by itinerant solicitors. A po-

tential donor should call the BBB office to check. The Bureau keeps records of some 10,000 charities and rates them as complying or not complying to the standards of the Council of Better Business Bureaus.

A third problem involves salespersons representing a company by the name of International Tool Co., out of Greenville, South Carolina. This company has been in the South Plains area selling tools at a "discount" with a retail price fixed to the tools. They also reportedly have been selling their tools as "bankruptcy" items.

The BBB does not approve of a company using a distress-type sales pitch and too, a seller has to be able to prove 51% of the marketplace is selling at a certain price before he can claim a discount.

Your Better Business Bureau suggests before buying anything, that you shop around first and compare prices, quality, etc. Also, check with the BBB before doing business with an unknown.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Texas' two top-ranking Democrats last week warned the top-ranking Republican not to call a special session simply to play high-pressure politics because that game plan could self-destruct.

In Waco, House Speaker Bill Clayton told a Democratic party meeting that Gov. Bill Clements could seriously jeopardize his "real good working relationship" with the Legislature if he tries to strong-arm pet issues through a special session promised for March or September. A few days later Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby echoed those sentiments.

Clements wants the special session to pass three issues: use of wiretaps in narcotics cases, initiative and referendum, and tax reform.

But Democrats also strongly suspect the Republican governor wants to use the special session to disrupt their reelection campaigns back home — and they don't take that thought lightly.

Nor have they taken kindly to two Republican legislators whom they believe to be traveling the state rounding up opponents for their Democrat colleagues.

Clements has never been one to back away from a political fight and his party delights in their new muscle. The next election, round two in the state's new two-party ring, may be a big one for the history books.

New Party Policy

The State Democratic Executive Committee balked again at arraigning a presidential primary on May 3. Chairman Billy Goldberg said the committee will schedule a primary if the Democratic presidential race appears close by the March 10 SDEC meeting.

The Democrats also added a rule to permit removal of party officers who publicly support opposing candidates or parties, a gambit aimed at Dallas Democrats who backed Clements in 1978.

Unfazed, a group of Dallas County precinct chairmen announced the next day they were switching to the Republican party. Their numbers were estimated between 11 and 20.

50-Cent Gas Tax

Clements took a strong stand last week against a proposed 50-cent federal gasoline tax hike aimed at reducing fuel consumption in the U.S.

The governor proposed a state fuels hike of five cents a few weeks ago, but he isn't ready to up the ante that high.

He said he was studying ways to voluntarily reduce consumption.

Last week Clements appointed his chief counsel, David Dean, as head of the new Governor's Criminal Justice Division.

Odds and Ends

House Parliamentarian Bob Johnson, who has been a ditch-digger, truck driver, football player and legislator, announced he will leave government and join the law-lobby firm of former Speaker Rayford Price and former legislator Bob Hutchinson.

In stepping into a new career, Johnson drew high praise from all factions of the House of Representatives for his service as parliamentarian.

El Paso Representative Luthor Jones has also said he will not seek reelection, but indicated he might be available for state Democratic Party chairman. Jones was a member of the "Gang of Four," four representatives who played loyal opposition to Speaker Clayton.

Jones announcement brings to 12 the number of representatives who have said they won't come back for one reason or another. Others are Jim Clark, D-Pasadena; Bob Close, R-Perryton; Danny Hill, D-Amarillo; Lance Lalor, D-Houston; Tom Martin, D-George West; Ed Mayes, D-Granbury; Bill Sullivan, D-Gainesville; Buddy Temple, D-Diboll; and Tom Massey, D-San Angelo.

"Flat-Out Asking"

State Sen. E.L. Short, D-Tahoka, has "flat-out asked" Clements to rescind priority status for gasoline consumers in Dallas, Tarrant and Harris counties, because he fears the South Plains won't have enough fuel for the winter.


Clements wrote back to Short saying he can't agree with the senator's assessment and he will keep the priorities for the urban areas.

The Consumer Alert

Many consumers are looking for ways to earn extra cash for the holidays. One money earning scheme being promoted throughout Texas for the past few months should be avoided according to the experiences of many consumers who have complained to our offices: envelope stuffing "business opportunities."

In recent months the Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division has filed a number of lawsuits and Assurances of Voluntary Compliance against companies advertising envelope stuffing as a money making stay-at-home business opportunity. Consumers have found, in many instances, that instead of earning money they have lost money; the opportunity turned out to be an untested idea, and in one case, a fraud.

Typically, promoters of envelope stuffing as a business opportunity advertise that they will employ consumers to stuff envelopes. When consumers respond to the advertising, they learn that instead of offered a job, they are instructed on how to place advertisement which will lure still more consumers to the promoters.

Once consumers show any interest in the business opportunity, the promoters represent that if they will follow the promoter's instructions by placing advertisements specified by the promoters in various publications, they will make an average of \$30 for every

one hundred envelopes stuffed. In several cases, these promoters are little more than wannabe salesmen since no one in the area has ever kind of income before.

Another complaint frequently received against envelope stuffing promoters is that when consumers respond to advertising and send in requested instructional materials, the promoters in other, by the time the materials arrive, consumers have been turned to their incomes. Finally, some promoters promise consumers a certain sum of money for bringing additional consumers to the promoter or for providing a list of sales opportunities. This type of sales promotion constitutes a chain letter scheme and is just as unlawful as a chain letter.

Beware of any business opportunity that promises easy income. The holiday season is to find a depleted further instead of a new opportunity. If you are contacted by a promoter making a complaint about an envelope stuffing business opportunity, contact your other business opportunity promoter. 

Can you guess the cost of these books?

The stack on the left costs about \$100. The same sum could buy the one on the right just ten years ago. Book budgets don't go very far these days. The average new book a decade ago used to cost \$8.47, and now costs \$20.10—an increase of over 137%. Bad enough if you're an individual book buyer, but imagine how it would be if you bought books for a public library.

A \$1,000 library acquisition budget in 1968 meant 118 new books for library users to borrow and enjoy. Today, that same \$1,000 will only purchase 49 library books—less than half as many. Which ones would you cut out?

Magazines, too. The average subscription price for periodicals has jumped from \$8.65 ten years ago to \$27.58 up 219%. For libraries, this presents a real dilemma: if they give up any magazine subscriptions the missing issues are gone forever. Back issues with gaps in them become less and less useful as a reference and research tool. After a couple of years they might as well be thrown out.

That is only part of the problem facing public libraries today. Libraries are a service business. They require employees and supplies to operate. Wages and costs have gone up everywhere to keep pace with inflation. How does the public library cope? If it reduces staff, it must also reduce operating hours—that means less service, usually at nights and on weekends, the only times when working people can use library facilities.

Then there is the problem of local taxes and local budgets—both under increasing pressures. There just

isn't enough money to go around—for police, firemen, hospitals, sanitation, welfare. So who gets the axe first? You guessed it.

That is why a new grass roots movement has sprung up in communities across the country faced with public library service cutbacks. An effort is now under way to meld these local citizens' groups into a national organization to push for better Federal and State funding and support services for public libraries.


