Rabies outbreak hits Floyd County

Veterinarian Charles Overstreet has announced an outbreak of rabies in the Floydada-Dougherty area. The second confirmed rabid skunk was killed last week by Mrs. Lance Poole in Dougherty. The head was sent to Austin, and Overstreet has received written confirmation that the test was positive. The rabid animal was a two-stripe skunk.

So far there have been no humans or pet animals infected. However, everyone is urged to take personal responsibility to see that his pets are vaccinated. Dogs and cats are especially vulnerable. Also, trappers in the Floyd and Motley counties area should be careful in skinning coyotes. Any animal suspected of having the disease should be quarantined for six months. For further information or assistance, Overstreet may be contacted.

Floydada Independent School District failed to reach a decision Tuesday night about proposed construction of a new athletic field house. They will consider the matter again tomorrow during a special called meeting.

Construction bids were opened during the regular February board meeting Tuesday night, but the trustees put off the decision until tomorrow (Friday) morning at the earliest. The special meeting starts at 10 a.m. in the school business office.

During the lengthy regular meeting Tuesday night, the school board approved the 1980-81 school calendar and textbook list, named the date and site for the upcoming trustee election, authorized payment of the school district's share of a personal property tax reappraisal, accepted resignations from two teachers and hired a replacement for one, and extended contracts of the school business manager, Plan A director athletic director, and all four principals.

City council OKs Swifty storage

The Floydada city council voted Tuesday night to permit Swifty Distributors, Inc. to build a 125,000-gallon fuel-storage facility in the city limits. A. L. Wylie of Swifty Distributors had requested a city permit to install four 31,500-gallon tanks just south of his present location. The council OK'd Wylie's request. The tanks will be used to store unleaded gasoline, ethyl alcohol, and "gasohol," the gasoline-alcohol blend sold by Swifty.

During the regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, the council also accepted the bid of a Plainview firm for seal coating city streets next summer. High Plains Pavers, Inc., Plainview, submitted the low bid (\$35,235) for the seal coating project.

The council passed a resolution adopting policies and guidelines for the 1979 Community Development Block Grant Program. The city is taking applications from citizens for housing improvement grants under the CDBG housing rehabilitation program. Homeowners who meet specified income limits and live in the city's "target area" may be eligible to receive grants to make needed repairs on their homes. A community meeting on the housing rehabilitation program has been set at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, February 21, in

the Della Plains School auditorium. The council called a public hearing on the city's proposed 1980-81 budget. The budget hearing will be held March 11, at the next council meeting. A public hearing concerning proposed use of the city's Federal Revenue Sharing Funds was set March 3. The city expects \$20,895 in revenue sharing funds next budget year.

An election to choose successors to three councilmen whose terms expire in April was set April 5 at city hall. The terms of Leroy Burns, Carl Jarrett and Johnny Sue expire this year. Jarrett has filed for re-election.

The council renewed the city's sanitation department. SEE CITY COUNCIL, PAGE 2

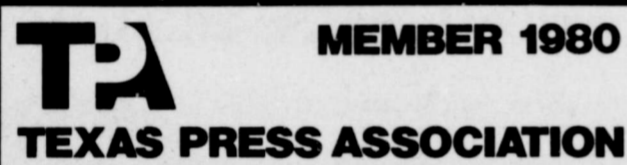

Census workers needed; testing set Tuesday

The U.S. Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census is seeking to hire enumerators, crew leaders and clerks from Floyd County for the 1980 Census, which starts April 1.

Testing for persons desiring the temporary employment is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m. Tuesday, February 19 in the county courtroom, on the second floor of the court house in Floydada.

Anyone 18 years of age or older may take the test, and only persons who pass the test can be considered for employment. Salaries start at \$4 an hour.

The test consists of a written exam designed to measure the applicant's ability and knowledge required for a variety of census jobs. Applicants are allowed to complete the test at their own pace.

Floyd Philosopher thinks he has found a way to get only untarnished men in Washington

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm takes a sidelong look at political campaigns this week.

Dear editor:

As most people now agree, political campaigns start too far ahead of the elections. Here it is only February, the elections aren't till November, nine months away, and some candidates for President have been running since last summer, some even before then.

This takes a lot of money, causes wear and tear on the candidates who seem to think they have to stomp around in New Hampshire in freezing weather with frozen smiles on their faces shaking hands with people who're more interested in the tourist business than the election.

There's no telling how many millions of dollars are being spent just to get

nominated, with millions more required to get elected.

That, political analysts say, is the reason all campaigns ought to be shortened, say to three weeks at the most.

They're wrong. That's not the reason. Campaigns ought to be shortened because that's the only way to get an un-tarnished candidate.

You give investigative reporters six months or a year to examine a candidate's background and campaign shenanigans and if you're looking for an un-blemished man you may as well stay at home on election day. The longer the campaign, the more the reporters are going to turn up. You get comfortable

with one candidate and some reporter turns up something.

Furthermore, even after elected the reporters don't uncover a month they don't uncover about Congress, you get they've been loafing on the job.

This can't go on. It looks like we're ever going to get government is to stop electing government officials. All should be considered caught, and anybody who's catching is a rotten egg. In hand, let's all be thankful that the reporters are checking officials, not on us.

Stenholm to sponsor Congressional internship

Applications for two summer internship programs sponsored by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm have been finalized and are now available at the Congressman's Abilene District Office.

The program will include two Omar Burleson Congressional Interns and two Lyndon Baines Johnson Congressional Interns, with one from each program to serve during June or July of this year at Stenholm's Washington office.

"A number of persons have expressed their interest

in the two programs since we first began developing the positions last month, Stenholm said, "and I am pleased to be able to honor former Congressman Burleson in this small way, as well as offer valuable experience in government to four interns from the 17th Congressional District."

Burleson will chair a special seven-person selection committee, chosen from throughout the District and State Representative Gary Thompson, an Abilene educator, is to serve as special advisor to the group.

Applicants for the Burleson internships must be 18 years of age at the time he or she is in Washington, allowing high school seniors who have enrolled in an institute of higher learning to be eligible. Others eligible include any student or graduate student who was enrolled during the preceding academic year at any of the District colleges, universities or technical institutes, or any other school, if the person's home of record is within the district.

Also eligible are teachers, counselors or administrators in any District elementary, middle school, junior high or high school or any instructor, any grade of professorship or administrator of any institution of higher learning within



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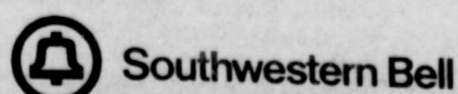

Caprock Trappers Association fur sale set March 1

Caprock Trapper's Association announces it will hold its Saturday, March 1 fur sale at the Roaring Springs high school gym, one block off Highway 70 between Dickens and Matador. All who can bring your furs in Friday afternoon and Friday night, February 29. Due to the co-operation of our Texas Parks and Wildlife department in Austin and especially Capt. Weldon Fromm of the Lubbock office and our two local wardens you will be able to seal fur bearers.

The law states you cannot have these in possession after Feb. 5. However, due to the efforts of Caprock and these people mentioned you will be able to sell your fur bearers, which consist of raccoon, badger, fox, possum, skunk, ringtail cat, etc. Coyote and bobcat are the only two non-fur bearers in the state of Texas that I know of that are not declared fur

bearers. These fur bearers must have been caught in the 1979-80 season, from Dec. 1 to Jan. 31. Anyone coming to the sale possessing a green or undried fur bearing animal will be arrested.

CRTA will hold a rattle-snake drive the third weekend in March, Saturday and Sunday, March 15 and 16. It will be headquartered at the Dickens pistol and rifle club, three miles north of Dickens on Highway 70. Watch for signs. Prizes will be awarded for various parts of the snake hunt. Any member wishing to participate and any rancher in the Dickens-Motley County area, who want to rid themselves of some snakes, should contact Dean Shaw, P.O. Box 7, Dickens, Texas 79229 or myself.

Experienced snake hunters will be in charge of the actual hunting. No fire arms will be allowed on any part of the snake hunt. These snakes will be caught alive.

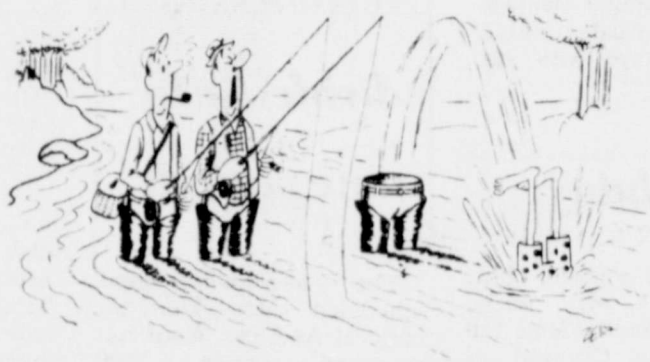
Both FHS varsity basketball teams lose to Idalou

Comments sought on USDA conservation programs

The start of a public review period during which interested people are being asked to comment on the Act directs the USDA to appraise the condition of the Nation's renewable natural resources and to propose alternative programs to guide the Nation's conservation activities. The appraisal revealed that one-third of the Nation's cropland — 136 million acres — is eroding at an excessive rate.

Basic information about the RCA process and proposals may be seen in four documents:

The first document, **Draft Appraisal Part I**, describes the status and condition of our natural resources and provides information on their quantity and quality and major uses of nonfederal land. The completed draft identifies national conservation objectives for:
— Reducing erosion and preserving prime farmlands
— Improving water quality
— Conserving water
— Improving fish and wildlife habitat, including the preservation of wetlands
— Reducing upstream

flood damages
— Conserving energy
— Solving related resource problems

The second document, **Draft Appraisal Part II**, projects demands on soil and water resources to the year 2030 and suggests levels of management that could be used to preserve these resources. It also summarizes trends in rural land ownership and describes the contribution of state and local programs to soil and water conservation.

The third document, **Program Report and Environmental Impact Statement**, outlines seven possible approaches — called alternative strategies — for changing USDA conservation programs and outlines the probable environmental impact.

The fourth document, **Summary of Appraisal, Parts I and II, and Program Report** is a brief summary of the other three documents.

During the public review period, three public meetings will be held in Texas to discuss content of the documents and provide an opportunity for comments. The meetings will be held in Arlington on February 26; Lubbock, March 4; and San Antonio, March 6.

Interested citizens are invited to send written comments about the documents or suggestions about future conservation programs to the RCA Response Analysis Center, P.O. Box 888, Athens, Georgia 30603.

Anyone interested in reviewing the documents or finding out more information about upcoming RCA meetings should contact Jon J. LaBaume of the Soil Conservation Service office or Tom Moore of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service staff. The office, or offices will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Floyd County students to participate in basic assessment program

All fifth and ninth grade students from the Lockney and Floydada Independent School Districts will participate in the first Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for February 1980.

The assessment plan, first of its kind in this state, will be scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session.

The Lockney and Floydada ISD students will be among 500,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February 25-March 12 statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

The Lockney and Floydada ISD will report their district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to W. H. Hallmark and Jerry Cannon, superintendents. However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian and the school personnel directly involved.

This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement. For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective.

Third-grade students will be added to the annual sequence during the 1980-81 school year, according to plans announced by the Texas Education Agency. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

Westinghouse DataScore Systems of Iowa City, Ia., will both help administer the 1980 test program and develop and field test new items for the 1980-81 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The Iowa firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

Each test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular grade.

Ninth-grade students who do not make a satisfactory score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. However, they will not be required to take it more than once. Later attempts to improve their scores and evaluate any remedial programs will be voluntary.

The annual test program will be administered by spe-

cially-trained personnel in each school district under the guidelines and supervision of the Texas Education Agency.

Agri-Facts

By Jerry Perry

Farmers may be leaving 850 million dollars out in the field. That's the amazing figure some scientists have come up with during a special study on energy alternatives. First, some basics. All oil products come from cellulose materials. Plants, especially plant stalks, are largely cellulose. There are a lot of stalks left in the field. Testing the fuel efficiency of this farm residue was the industrial giant, General Motors. Their engineers used a mixture of 10 percent cornstalks for boiler fuel and said the results indicated successful applications of as high as 60 percent cornstalks could be used to fire the boilers. Economic determinations made on the basis of the current value of coal indicate that those stalks particularly high in cellulose content could be worth as much as 20 dollars a ton. Ag officials say the amount of stalks available each year would total as high as 450-million tons.

WINDOW SHADES—POWERFUL ENERGY SAVERS

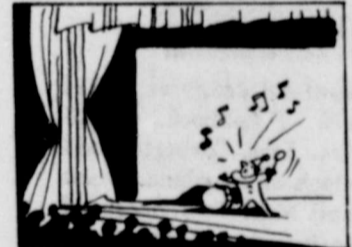
Window shades can be effectively used throughout your home to increase energy savings. They block in heat during winter months and block out heat during the summertime. Opaque, light-colored shades block air flow better than draperies or venetian blinds, saving eight cents on every home-heating dollar, and up to twenty-one cents on each home-cooling dollar.

Since glass in windows conduct heat, window shades save energy by blocking the passage of heat through the glass itself. Shades prevent heat loss in the winter by 24-31 percent and reduce heat gain in a home from the summer by 63 percent.

For maximum energy-savings, install window shades inside the window frame about one inch from the glass. This sets up an effective barrier between the glass and the shade. The one-inch of dead air space acts as insulation. Be sure the shade "fills" the window space as much as possible, leaving only the narrowest margin possible between the shade and the window frame.

For big energy savings during the winter, keep shades down during the coldest hours of the day—early morning, evenings and nights—to keep indoor heat locked inside the home. Raise the shades during the warmest parts of the day and let the sun's heat help warm the house.

For the biggest energy savings in the summer, pull shades down during hot, sunny parts of the day. That will deflect the sun's hot rays and keep their heat from building up inside the house—and that will save home-cooling energy. Raise the shades during early morning, evenings and nights—to allow cooler air inside and reduce the need for air conditioning.

The woman's car was in the garage, the gas tank

empty and the ignition turned on, Clark said. The home was still full of fumes Sunday evening, he said.

Clark said the woman probably died sometime Sunday morning, as her husband had talked to her on the telephone Saturday night.

Services for Mrs. Waters will be at 3 p.m. Tuesday at Elliott-Hamil Chapel of Faith, Highway 277.

The body will be cremated.

Born April 28, 1938, in Saltillo, she attended schools there and in Mt. Vernon. She came to Abilene from Lubbock in 1978. She married Jerry Waters Sept. 3, 1978, in Abilene. She was a member of Floydada Methodist Church. She had worked in quality control at Texas In-

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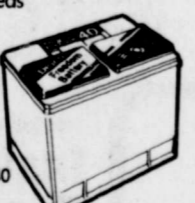
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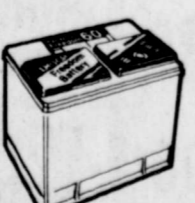
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
