## Patels Are New Floydada Residents..

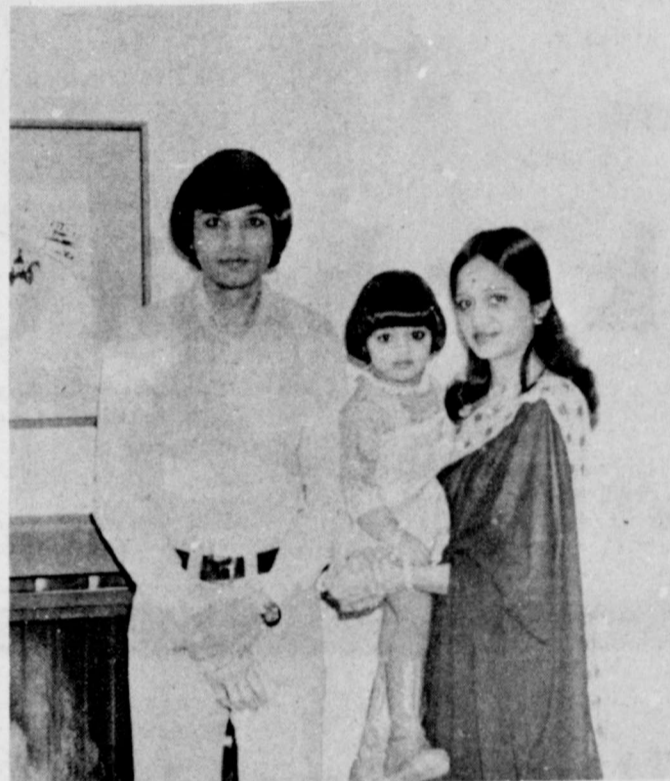

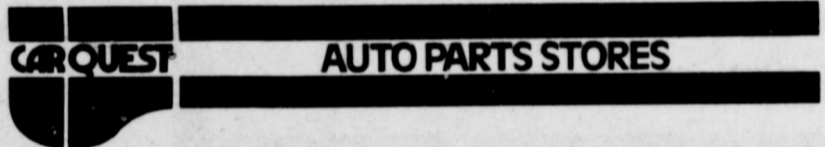

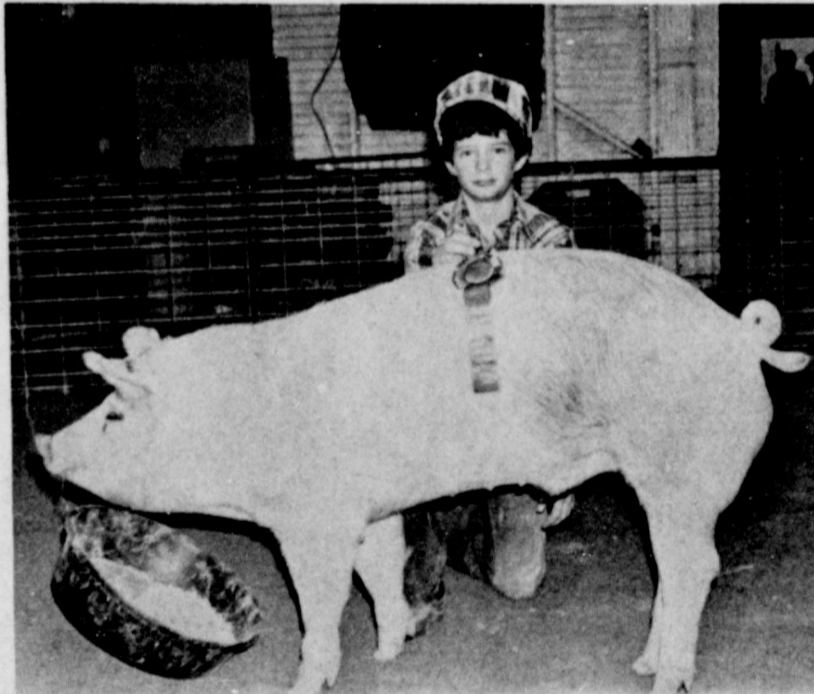

**Answer:** - You have the right to be represented by an attorney, or another person of your choice, in any business you have with social security. This does not mean that you will need a

representative. But if you wish to be represented, the social security people will be glad to work with your representative.

## Howard To Chair Hearing For Education Standards

Plainview classroom teacher David Howard will chair an open hearing for the commission on standards for the teaching profession at Lubbock Christian College on February 22 and 23.

The meeting is one of seven which are being held throughout the state to obtain comments and recommendations from interested persons regarding specific issues concerning teacher education and certification requirements.

The commission has been charged with the responsibility of replacing thirteen sections of the Texas Education Code, repealed by the last legislative session. Of prime concern to many will be life or renewable certificates, teacher internship, teacher qualifying exams, and certificates for all school secretaries and aides.

The open hearing will be held at the American Heritage Building auditorium at 3 and 7 p.m. on Friday and 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. on Saturday.

Other commission members on the hearing team will be Angelina Gallegos of El Paso and Tommie Jo Lindsey of Abilene. Texas Education Agency staff members, Joyce Howard and Ed Vodicka, and L.C.C. host John Castleman will assist in the hearings. All interested persons are encouraged to attend.

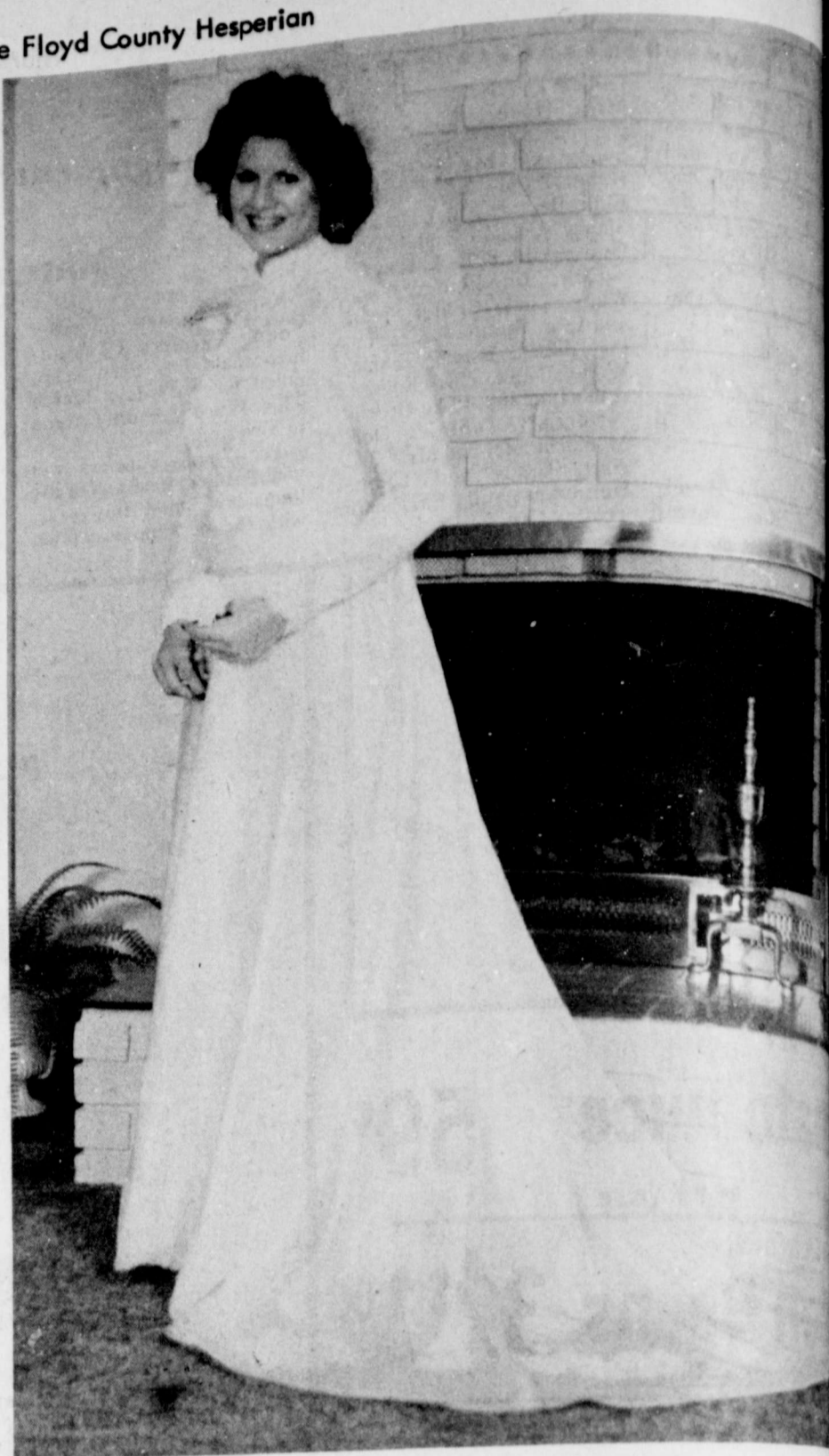

### Psych Professor To Offer Spring Course

A course in rational self-counseling, or "how to think and act better," will be offered this spring by Dr. Paul Knipping, professor of psychology at Texas Tech University's Division of Continuing Education.

The course is designed to benefit people under stress. Persons in the counseling and helping professions also will benefit in that they will learn how to minimize negative effects of emotional stress being experienced by clients.

The course will educate participants in the area of

rational self-counseling (RSC), a technique which teaches people how to manage themselves and their emotions and allows them to act the way they want to act," said Dr. Paul Knipping, course instructor.

Knipping is professor of health, physical education and recreation at Texas Tech. He served consultant and collaborator to the director of out-patient clinics while at the University of Kentucky at Lexington. Knipping has conducted RSC workshops throughout the nation for the past 10 years.

RSC, if learned and practiced, will minimize a person's unpleasant emotion, reduce tension, facilitate management of stress, aid in avoiding heart attacks, alleviate addiction to problems and increase the state of happiness, according to Knipping.

Some previous participants have stated the course helped them to minimize difficulties in marriage, drinking, divorce, smoking and in interpersonal relationships.

#### INSIDE BLANKETS LUXURIOUS AND WASHABLE

Among the novel bed linens which have surfaced over the years, plush, colorful and cozy blankets are still a traditional favorite. Add to this a wide range of fibers which boast machine washing and drying -- the blanket combines beauty and practicality!

Acrylic and polyester are today's dominant blanket fibers. Nylon, rayon, wool, cotton and blends of two or three fibers are also included in blanket fabrications. And, most of the satin bindings used as trim are made of nylon, rayon or acetate -- all as washable as the blankets.

Velour may be achieved with a 90% acrylic 10% cotton mix or with 100% nylon fibers on polyurethane backing. Thermal blankets, resembling crocheted throws, come in acrylic as well as cotton. Pure wools offer cozy plaid designs as well as earthy and pastel solids.

Electric blankets have become popular in view of saving energy on home heating. They are fashioned in 100% acrylic and in blends such as 50% polyester/50% acrylic. Muted Plaids and solids are in vogue. One manufacturer offers a reversible blanket -- solid on one side, plain on the other.

Most blankets can be machine washed and dried. Electric blankets should also be laundered at home, since dry cleaning can ruin the insulation on wiring. Check that wools can be washed and dried, some labels may specify dry cleaning.

Measure a woolen blanket before washing. It should be blocked or stretched to original size after laundering. Pretreat spots and stains. If the binding is heavily soiled, brush it prior to laundering with a liquid detergent or a paste made of detergent granules or soap and water. Or use a prewash soil and stain remover. Wash only one large blanket at a time.

Fill the washer with warm or cold water depending on the degree of soil, and a cold water rinse. Add detergent

or soap. Agitate briefly to dissolve the product completely. Stop the washer; add the blanket. Distribute it loosely and evenly around the agitator. Soak for 10 to 15 minutes, depending on the amount of soil. Start the washer and advance the control until agitation stops and wash water has been pumped out of the tub. After about a 1 minute spin, slowly advance the timer to the deep rinse cycle. Allow washer to finish the wash cycle automatically.

A fabric softener may be used in the washer or dryer to help reduce static cling and make a blanket soft and fluffy.

Depending on the construction of the blanket, synthetics and those made of cotton can be washed on a permanent press, knit or delicate cycle.

Dry a woolen blanket on the high temperature setting. To absorb moisture and dry a blanket more quickly, place 3 or 4 dry towels in the dryer. Preheat the towels for 3 to 5 minutes. This helps absorb moisture, dry blankets rapidly and avoid pilling caused by long tumbling. Place the blanket in the dryer with the warm towels. Set dryer control for about 20 minutes. Check the blanket after 10 minutes. Remove while still slightly damp to avoid shrinkage.

Place blanket on flat surface or over two lines to finish drying. Stretch it to its original shape. When the blanket is completely dry, brush gently to raise nap. Press binding with a cool iron, if needed.

Tumble drying knitted woolens is not recommended. Instead, trace the outline of the blanket on

a piece of paper. After washing, block by finger pressing gently to this outline. Let the garment dry to this shape.

Synthetic blankets and those made of cotton may be dried using the permanent press cycle and temperature. Use highest heat setting if the dryer has no permanent

press setting. Dry completely; do not overdry to avoid wrinkling. Remove blanket from dryer as soon as the machine stops.

To line dry a blanket, hang it over two parallel lines. Smooth and straighten edges. Change the position and straighten again, when partially dry.
