City Council To Consider Several Local Issues

The Floydada City Council is scheduled March 11, 7:30 p.m., at the meeting room of the city office.

The council members will consider several issues.

The agenda includes discussion of a request from Lighthouse Electric Company concerning sewer, water and electric service on the property adjacent to the Matador Highway and 12th Street.

An open public hearing concerning property to be demolished or removed under the 1979 Community Development Block Grant will be considered.

They will adopt resolutions ordering the demolition or removal of numerous structures.

The council will open public hearing on proposed uses of General Revenue Sharing Funds for the coming budget year.

Chief of Police requests to meet with

the council. The Council will approve attached transfers of bonds by First National Bank to cover city deposits.

They will discuss repairing city hall and Floydada park concession stand roofs, prices attached.

They are to examine repairing the north wall of the fire department.

Demolition of old houses and building in the city limits that are not in the work area of the CDBG will be discussed.

There will be discussion of capital investment purchases for the next budget year.

The council will consider all the following: audit of the 1979-80 city books; electric distribution construction; and construction of sanitation building.

They will also appoint a city health officer for 1980 and approve payment of the February city bills.

School Board Agenda Planned

The Floydada Independent School Board will meet March 11 for their regular monthly session.

Those filing for school trustee are Martha Farris, Adrain Helms, Keith Reeves, and Robert Stovall; however Keith Reeves has withdrawn from the race.

The agenda includes proposal of transfer student tuition for the 1980-81 school year and the discussion of employment of teachers, secretaries and aides.

The board will also consider the resignations of three teachers.

Commissioners Court Calls Special Session

The Floyd County Commissioners Court had a special meeting February 20.

Items on the agenda were: a request by Highway Patrolmen for a new radar unit. Action was deferred.

The Court voted unanimously that the Sheriff's Department would not move into the new jail until the contract with

the architect in Lubbock was completed and accepted by the Court.

Collins Blames Congress With Inflation Rate

In a speech to the House recently, Rep. Jim Collins of Texas placed the blame for America's skyrocketing inflation rate on Congress and its deficit spending habits. "Congressmen who pride themselves on being innovative and creative are finding ways to spend more money which means more inflation," Collins said.

In January, consumer prices took their biggest jump in six years, up to an annual rate of 18.2%. "Deficit spending has caused this 18.2% inflation rate. This year Congress will spend over \$616 billion and our total national debt will grow to over \$900 billion.

According to Collins, Congressmen who try to get the Government to do all things for all people create the inflation spiral. "Liberals through the 1960's and 1970's believed they could totally reduce unemployment, eliminate poverty, enhance prosperity and improve the quality of life which stimulated many expectations and demands.

"But the Government cannot solve all problems or relieve all hardships. The shortcuts are not there for individuals, for troubled industries, for regions or for any racial group. Congress created a problem which has been magnified by Federal judges with much heart and little sense," Collins said.

IRS Adds New Form To 1099 Series

The Internal Revenue Service has added another form to its 1099 series. It is called "Statement for Recipients of Nonemployee Compensation" and is numbered 1099-NEC.

In the course of your trade or business activities you may make payments to individuals who are not treated as your employee. If you have paid at least \$600 in fees, commissions, prizes or awards, or any other form of compensation, you are required to give them a form 1099-NEC, said the IRS.

A copy of the 1099-NEC should be filed with the Internal Revenue Service along with a transmittal form 1096.

Should you be unable to obtain a Form 1099-NEC, the Form 1099-MISC may be used as long as the transmittal form 1096 shows that the Form 1099-MISC has been substituted.

Harris Donates Chassis To SPC

Orville Harris, vocational agriculture instructor at Floydada High School, received his Honorary American Farmer Degree in Kansas City, Missouri recently. Along with this honor Harris was given a Ford motor chassis to use for educational purposes.

Water Rates Up In Lockney

Lockney residents will soon be paying more for city water, but they'll still pay less than citizens of most other area towns.

The city council voted Thursday morning to raise the city's minimum water rate from \$4 to \$5. That's for the first 3,000 gallons — city water customers who use more than 3,000 gallons per month will pay 75 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons. The old rate was 60 cents per thousand.

City water users who reside outside the city limits still pay double the in-town rates.

The council made the water-rate change after studying a survey of rates in other area towns. The survey indicated that the Lockney water rate was lower than most surrounding towns' rates. Even with the increase, Lockneyites still enjoy the distinction of paying less for city water than most of the towns surveyed.

Nobody showed up for an announced public hearing on the next year's proposed city budget.

Southwestern Public Service manager Kenneth Tate appeared before the council to discuss SPS's recent request for electric rate increases.

The council passed a resolution allowing the county tax appraisal district to appoint a review board.

Attending the meeting were mayor Claude Brown; aldermen Thurman Davis, J.D. Copeland, Bobby McCormick and Pat Frizzell; city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth; police chief Bill McConnell; and Paul Lyle, the city's attorney.

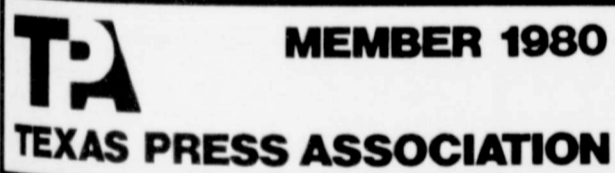

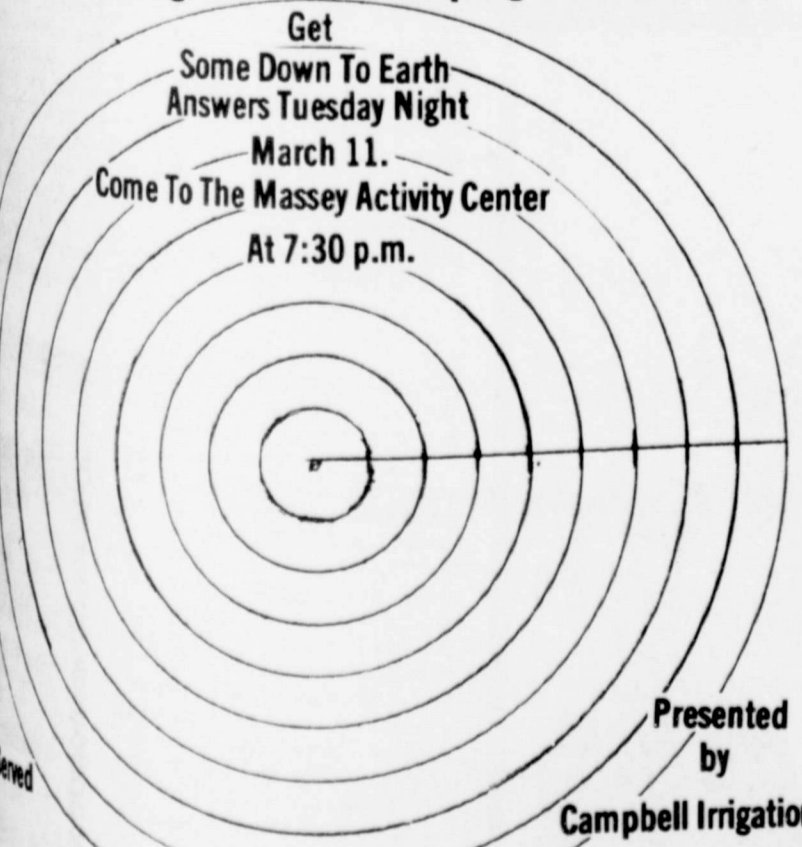

CONSUMER CREDIT OUTLOOK

"I just don't see people afraid of debt or interest rates anymore. As long as there is a supply of credit, people will use it," is the prediction of one economist. Other economists think the already-large burden of consumer debt—a record \$303.9 billion—coupled with tougher credit restrictions will break the back of whatever consumer strength is left in the economy.

Squeezed by soaring market interest rates and pressure from federal regulations to hold down unnecessary credit extensions, big banks, and other consumer finance lenders are tightening up on credit limits, weeding out new accounts, and jacking up usually rates to ration borrowing.

For the first time in this economic cycle, banks are beginning to jack up already high rates charged on national credit cards from 18 to 22 percent. Some are attempting to reinstate fees for credit card use. Others are rejecting new credit card applicants and are closing the loan window on new installment credit.

Retailers are responding by raising the minimum monthly payments for revolving charge customers, and by enforcing previously ignored limits on charge accounts. One department store has raised the minimum monthly payment on revolving credit accounts from \$10 to \$15.

Some economists predict an even harsher federal policy and a more painful crunch early in 1980.

MAKE A WILL—FOR YOUR SURVIVORS' SAKE

If parents make wills, estate-settling will be less painful for their children. A will ensures that a parent's wishes will be respected since it outlines how he or she wants property to be distributed. In addition a will allows the parent to name an executor to carry out the terms and provisions of the will. On the other hand, when an estate is left without a will, property is distributed according to the state laws of descent and distribution.

Why name an executor? There are several reasons in making a will, naming an executor is important, because an executor is the key figure in settling an estate. Ideally, the executor should live in the same state, be on good terms with the family and be familiar with the parent's finances. Executors have three main duties: to collect assets, pay bills and distribute the remaining assets among heirs. Many parents name an adult child as executor of the estate.

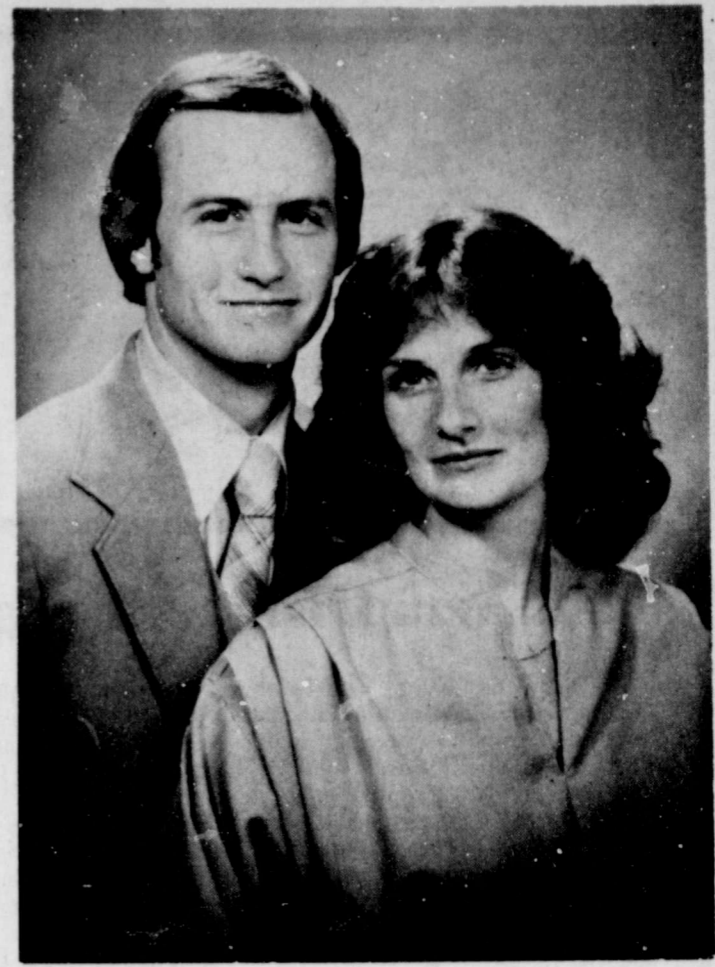
