Local Residents To Receive Questionnaire

According to the U.S. Department Of Commerce Bureau of Census, your household, and all others in the area, will receive something in the mail this Friday, a questionnaire from the U.S.

Census of Population and Housing. District manager of the census urges that you watch for the large white envelope with blue lettering. The census questionnaire for your household will be delivered by address, not on the basis of name. Below the address will be a telephone number to call if help is needed in answering any questions. With the questionnaire will be a yellow instruction guide that gives examples on how to fill out, and a brown, pre-addressed, postage-paid envelope for mailing it back.

Bureau of the Census for the 1980

The 1980 census symbol - a pencil inscribed "April 1" filling in the zero of "Census '80" - appears on the envelope with this message: "This

envelope contains your official census form. Please fill it out and mail it back on Tuesday, April 1.

The manager asks that you pay particular attention to his message, because April 1 is Census Day, the day of the official count of the U.S. population. That is why it is essential that every questionnaire list all persons in the household on that day, and does not list anyone who moved away or died a day or so before, but does not include anyone who just moved in, or a baby born on that day. The mother and baby are to be listed even if they are in the

The manager suggests that filling out the census form be made a family project, with everyone supplying the correct information about themselves. Be sure to mark your answers with a black lead pencil, so if you make a mistake, you can erase it.

Quilantan, Quiroz Die In Pickup Crash Near Idalou

Two men were killed early Saturday when the driver of the pickup truck they were in apparently lost control on a curve, sheared a utility pole, and burst into flames in U.S. 62 about two miles east of Idalou.

The driver, Daniel Quiroz; 19, of Petersburg, and a Floydada native, was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

Johnny Manuel Quilantan, 22, of Floydada was also pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

Quilantan was employed at Piggly Wiggly in Floydada and was a member of the Catholic church.

He was married to Carmen Morales November 15, 1977 in Floydada.

Members of the Idalou fire and police departments, the Lubbock County sheriffs office and Emergency Medical Services assisted Trooper Richard Addenbrook of the Department of Public

Safety at the accident scene. Addenbrook reported that it took authorities almost an hour to remove the bodies, which were both burned beyond recog-

The vehicle, which was traveling northeast, overturned after shearing the utility pole, DPS reported.

Addenbrook said authorities are not sure wheather the pickup truck caught fire when it hit the utility pole or wheather electrical wires which fell on the truck started the blaze.

Floydada Expresses Feeling About

Saturday Mail Service

In accordance with President Carter's proposed budget cut the House Budget Committee voted to recommend elimination of Saturday mail deliveries as one of President Carter's steps toward achieving the first balanced federal budget in 12 years.

The committee approved the recommendation by voice vote despite statements from some members that the Saturday mail proposal might be defeated when it reaches the House floor.

As part of his overall package to cut \$15.9 billion in spending in fiscal 1981, committee Chairman Robert N. Giaimo, D. from Conn., said \$836 million could be saved by ending Saturday deliveries and trimming subsidies for bulk mail. The panel's recommendation, howev-

er, does not mean that Saturday mail deliveries will definitely end. The proposal, even if approved by the full Congress, would not be binding on the U.S. Postal Service, which conceivably could raise rates or make other cuts to

achieve the savings.

Local Women Learn About Co-op Branded Foods At Corpus Christi Meeting

"What are some of the ways you assist your husin his work as a cooperative manager or director?" program directors Billy Conner and Tommy Engelke asked those attending the special session for women at the recent cooperative manager-director conference in Corpus Christi.

In a get-acquainted activity, the program leaders asked each woman to interview five other women in the room — with whom she was not previously acquainted and write down answers to the above question. The group then shared some of the answers such as serving as "a sounding board for ideas and frustrations," and "being sensitive and listening for complaints the husbands might not have an opportunity to hear."

A true-false test of the "cooperative knowledge" of the women helped point out areas of misinformation or misunderstanding of the role of cooperatives.

Cooperatives play a larger role in the daily lives of most citizens than is realized, Conner pointed out. Encouraging the women to buy coop-branded foods, the director of education of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives shared brand names of some coop-branded food products found in the grocery

Many coop-produced food products are sold in bulk or wholesale to distributors who further process and /or package and market the product under their own labels, Conner said. None of these products are included in this partial listing of farmer cooperative-branded foods.



Have you ever seen an advertisement like this which implies there is a quick and easy solution to consumer credit problems? This advertisement appeared in newspapers in Dallas, San Antonio and Houston this year until it was stopped by the Consumer Protection and

Antitrust Division. When consumers answered the advertisement the seller sent them a letter introducing a booklet called "THE CREDIT GAME" which he was selling. The introductory letter claimed that "the information contained in this publication offers various ways of establishing a AAA-1 Credit Rating in as little as 45 days, & Get any Credit Card you want, and it works no matter what shape your credit

On reviewing "THE CREDIT GAME" the Division discovered that the material described how to change bad credit to "AAA-1 credit" through a step-by-step process of engaging in unlawful conduct. For example, page 2 of "THE CREDIT GAME" detailed a plan "for creating a \$50,000 bank account balance and produce the illusion that you have money in the bank." The complex plan described what is commonly known as a "check kiting scheme" and is accomplished by floating worthless checks between several checking accounts. Check-kiting is unlawful both under federal and state law.

Under a section entitled "HOW TO PASS CREDIT INVESTIGATIONS" the booklet makes the following representations: "First you will have to change your name, such as dropping or adding an

initial to or from your name, alter your social security number, use a different address or former addresses, telephone numbers, and your birth date. Anything that was listed when your credit went sour must not be used on any of your new credit applications. . . . " What the booklet fails to state is that anyone who follows this advice on a credit application is also in jeopardy of violating both criminal and civil laws.

Consumers with credit problems cannot expect to remedy their situation overnight. There are, however, several places consumers can go to get legitimate counseling on how to improve their credit rating.

For example, in several Texas communities the business community and other concerned citizens have formed non-profit consumer credit counseling services which are offered free of charge.

Consumers with credit problems can also contact local credit bureaus with questions on how to improve credit standing. Finally, consumers with credit questions can consult the Office of the Consumer Credit Commissioner, P.O. Box 2107, Austin, Texas 78768, 512-475-2111, which is charged with promoting credit education in Texas.

Texas' phenomenal industrial growth faces a serious threat from Northeastern and Midwestern states seeking to keep companies from closing unprofitable operations in those areas and moving to more productive facilities in the

Two bills currently before the Congress - and several in various state legislatures - would in effect put the government on the board of directors of every manufacturing company. Their thrust is to try to keep plants in operation, not by making them more productive but rather by making it too costly for a company to move to

Both of the bills introduced in the U.S. Senate would impose punitive requirements in the form of extended benefits to workers and a pay-off to the community in which the closed plant is located. One of the bills also would require two years advance notice of a proposed closing, with heavy penalties for failure to comply.

Companies do not take on the expense and disruption of closing one plant and building another frivolously. Frequently such a shift is motivated by the need to be closer to raw materials, the need for a more modern facility or even the need to tap new sources of manpower. That Texas and other Sun Belt states have been chosen for new locations with increasing frequency is testimony to their progressive thinking, untapped resources and good oldfashioned salesmanship.

The proponents of punitive legislation to thwart this trend give no thought to their declining productivity and harsh business climates. They simply want the government to trap business in the mire of their sluggishness.

If they are successful, the result will be disasterous for American business, Texas and the very concept of free

It is impossible to wave a magic wand and make an unprofitable business viable. If a company can't move to a facility which would change its ink from red to black, it simply will go out of business. If individual companies can't expand, neither can our economy.

Texas and other Sun Belt states have pulled themselves out of economic lethargy by recognizing what it takes to attract business and industry to serve and employ their people. If short-sighted Frost Belt politicians have their way, we shall be punished for our success.

But perhaps the worst blow to come from this harebrained scheme would be the one to our freedom. If we tell businessmen today they can't make even the most basic of decisions for themselves, will we tell workers tomorrow they can't decide where they will ply their trades? If we tell a company where it must do business, what is to keep us from telling it what it must make?

The strength of our economy and of our people always has been our resiliency, our ability to adapt to a changing world and to find ways to do things better and more efficiently. We must fight to preserve that ability.



thought of over 20,000 accidents and over 1,000 deaths involving speeding over the limit last year should be cause for every Texas motorist to slow down and observe the speed limit."

He added, "Another reason, in addition to saving the lives of many Texans, is that many disabling injuries can be prevented. Also, achieving a greater compliance will have a beneficial effect on gasoline conservation."

The Federal Surface Transportation Act of 1978 established national levels of compliance that each state must meet or face sanctions. For instance, had we not met 30 percent compliance with the 55 MPH speed limit by September of 1979, Texas could have lost 8 million dollars. By September of 1980, 40 percent of Texas Drivers must be in compliance or we will be subject to similar sanctions.

Major Bell said, "We hope that by providing this special effort we can save precious lives, conserve fuel and comply with the 40 percent mandate."

BEFORE BUYING

THINK "ENERGY" **CLOTHES DRYER** Shopping for a new clothes dryer-wonder if it should be gas or electric? Make energy-conscious decisions when shopping for a new clothes dryer. First, check out inrequirements. Electric models will require a 120/240 volt, 3-wire A-C circuit of 30-AMP capacity. Gas models usually require a three-eighth or one-half inch gas supply line, but you will want to check the manufacturer's instructions and local plulmbing code. Gas models need a properly grounded 120-volt A-C, 15-AMP circuit. Before buying a dryer, determine the cost of providing the proper electrical and gas installation if the home is not already equipped to use a clothes dryer. If the home is equipped for either a gas or an electric dryer, then a gas dryer will probably cost less to run. If energy in your area costs the nation's typical rates; then an electric dryer will cost about four times more to operate than a gas model. This cost is based on the U.S. Department of Energy's estimate that 416 wash loads per year is typical. If this is the case, a year's worth of laundry would cost about \$40 to dry in an electric dryer and only about \$11 in a gas dryer. However, the initial cost of gas dryers is generally higher than a comparable electri-

cal model made by the same manufacturer-but the extra cost of buying a gas machine would be made up in about one year in the above exam-

ple. If energy rates in your area are different from the national average, there's still a way to figure your gas or electricity costs. It's really not so hard to figure, either. First remember that gas is measured by therms-or by cubic feet. If gas is measured by cubic feet in your area, simply divide the cost of 1,000 cubic feet by 10, and

To Employers of hiring and service-dis-A new federal program to

give tax breaks to employers is expected to provide additional job opportunity for thousands of Texas Vietnam Era veterans and veterans of all eras who have received rehabilitation training for service-connected disabili-

The program is sponsored by the Department of Labor and the Internal Revenue Service and is supported by the Veterans Administration through its regional offices, according to Jack Coker, Director of the Waco VA Regional Office.

The program offers em-ployers a "targeted jobs" tax credit for hiring individuals from seven groups the gov-ernment is seeking to help, Coker explained. The credit can amount to 50 percent of the first \$6,000 in qualified wages paid employees during their first year on the job and 25 percent of the first \$6,000 paid the second year.

Eligibles sought by the VA include economically-disadvantaged Vietnam Era veterans under age 35 at the time

abled veterans who have completed or are receiving VA rehabilitation training.

Tax credit is based generally on wages paid to quali-fied employees first hired after September 26, 1978, and earned between January , 1979, and December 31,

the tax credit program are given a voucher that explains to prospective employers the individual's eligibility for certification if hired before a certain date. To receive certification, the employer completes the declaration on the voucher and returns it to the local Department of Labor Jobs Service Office.

Operation Lifesaver Has Reduced book Thursday and took his

Accidents At Railroad Crossings

The number of car-train accident deaths in Texas dropped from 96 in 1978 to 69 in 1979.

Operation Lifesaver, a program promoted by the Railroad Section of Texas Safety Association to help reduce accidents at railroad grade crossings, assisted in reducing this fatality figure by nearly 30 percent.

With the aid of television programs, news articles, films, bumper stickers, brochures and workshops, the "message" of Operation Lifesaver—observance of all grade crossing signs—was spread to well over 36,000 Texans last year.

Statistics illustrate the importance and validity of this Operation Lifesaver message.

Although all of the 14,700 grade crossings in Texas are marked by at least one "Lifesaver" sign-the octagonal stop sign, the Xshaped crossbuck, the yellow and black advance warning sign, flashing lights, bells and/or automatic gates—one half of all grade crossing collisions are a result of drivers violating mechanical crossing protection indica-

"The greatest killer at crossings is a habit pattern slowly developed over a period of time by drivers who fail to slow down and look for trains," Jim McGee, supervisor of Accident Records for

the Texas Department of Public Safety, said. "In fact, nearly all car-train accidents occur within a 25-mile radius of the driver's home."

Because a motorist crosses the same railroad track several times a day without ever seeing a train, he or she is conditioned to a secure feeling that train will not be there the next time, and his or her vigilance is relaxed, McGee explained.

"The best safeguard for motorists is to slow down when approaching a railroad warning sign," he added. Other forms of prevention suggested by the DPS and

Motorist fails to look both ways after train clears

Texas Safety Association urges all motorists to consider these instances when nearing grade crossings and to obey all black and gold warning signs.

"There will be a need for the Operation Lifesaver program until every Texas motorist approaches crossings with a healthy respect, obeys the rules, and deaths and injuries drop to zero,' Tom Murphy, Operation Lifesaver chairman, said.




