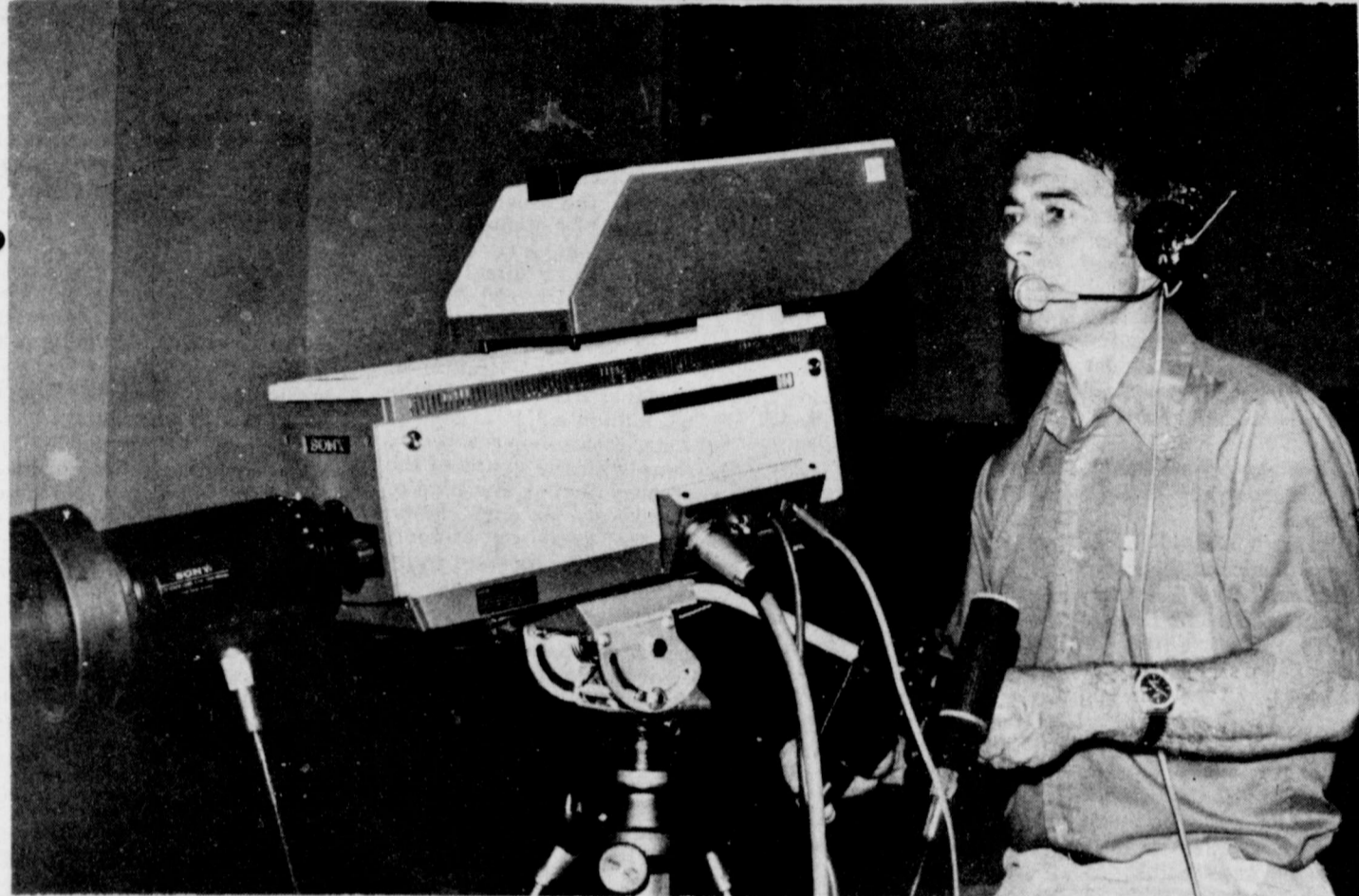

## Elections Set For Saturday; Commissioners, J.P. At Stake

Registered voter count as of Monday was 4556 for Floyd County. The count, at primary election time, in 1978 was around 4,800. Absentee vote count is also down from 153 in 1978 to Democratic 51 and Republican 17 as of absentee voting deadline Tuesday night. Using these numbers as an indicator voting this Saturday will be light.

Uncontested races appear to be the reason for voter apathy though, Floyd County has three races that should spark local interest. Two County Commissioner posts are open to fresh contenders since neither incumbent is running. Appeals have been made to the Commissioners Court for County funding and the two men elected from Precinct 1

and 3 will have a strong influence over how those funds are distributed. The Precinct 1 race includes Sam A. Spence, Roger Dawdy and J.W. Becker. In Precinct 3 Larry Noland is opposing Thomas E. Warren. Justice of the Peace race is of special interest since two women, out of only three on the entire ballot, are in

## Pre-registration Set For Tuesday

There will be a pre-registration held at the A.B. Duncan Elementary School the afternoon of Tuesday May 6, 1980, beginning at 1:30 p.m. Parents of Migrant children who will be four years old by September the first are urged to register their children at this time. Parents of children who will be five years old by September the first are urged to register their children at this time for Kindergarten. Parents of children who will be six years old by September the first and are not in kindergarten now are urged to register their children for the first grade. Parents are urged to bring their child's birth certificate and immunization record, signed by their doctor. If you do not have a record please come anyway and talk with our school nurse.

- Listed below are the required immunizations:
- Four year old migrant, kindergarten and first grade students will be required to provide a **birth certificate and proof of immunization**, with doctor's signature. State requirements for immunization for all public school students are as follows:  
(1) **DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS:** Ages 5 through 11 years. At least 3 doses of DTP or TD of which at least one dose received since the fourth birthday. After 10 years of age, a TD booster is required for all students through High School.
  - (2) **ORAL POLIO:** A minimum of 3 doses of which at least one dose has been received since the fourth birthday.
  - (3) **MEASLES:** One dose of measles vaccine on or before their first birthday.

- (4) **RUBELLA:** One dose of vaccine.
  - (5) **MUMPS:** Mumps vaccine will be required for students through the second grade. If you do not have a birth certificate it will be necessary for you to get one; also if your child has not had the required immunizations, it will be necessary for him/her to do so. The State Department of Education has stated that no kindergarten, first grade student nor four year old migrant student will be allowed to enroll in the public schools of Texas without a birth certificate. Your child's birth certificate and immunization records will be recorded in the office and returned to you. Your cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated by your school officials.

## Baptists Plan Television Coverage On Sunday

First Baptist Church of Floydada will begin live telecasting of its Sunday worship services over cable television channel two beginning May 4, according to an announcement made today by Dr. Floyd C. Bradley, pastor. The morning worship service will be telecast beginning at 11 a.m. and the evening service will air at 7 p.m. Both will be in color. "We are very excited about the possibilities that this new ministry presents to us in trying to reach the community of Floydada with the gospel of Jesus Christ," said Dr. Bradley. "Where churches in other communities have gone on cable television, experience has indicated that they have reached more people with the gospel, and attendance at the churches has actually increased. "In addition to reaching many people who are not regular church goers, we hope also to be able to minister those people who are homebound, and unable to attend church because of physical ailments," he said. Recent purchase and installation of the equipment necessary for telecasting was made possible by gifts to the television ministry by members of First Baptist Church and others who expressed an interest in helping. "We are very thankful to those who have made this ministry possible through their gifts, and also to the owners of Cable Television of Floydada for making the channel available to the church," said Dr. Bradley. The equipment, which will be operated by members of the church's Communications Committee, includes a color camera with a 10 to 1 zoom lens, a monitor/receiver, a videotape recorder,

## Farm Bureau Adopts Program

The Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors has adopted a five-point program to deal with the worsening farm income crisis, according to TFB President Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart. "Farmers and ranchers are caught in a crisis that is not of their making," Chaloupka said. "Indications are that net farm income will be about one-fourth below what it was last year." Chaloupka said agriculture's financial problems can be attributed largely to federal deficits "which caused inflation," and embargoes on farm exports "which helped depress farm prices." He said inflation hits farmers especially hard because they cannot automatically pass along increased production costs to the consumer. Calling inflation the "number one domestic problem," Chaloupka called on "all working and business people to join with us in the effort to stop inflation." The TFB Board also asked the American Farm Bureau Federation to take national leadership in efforts to alleviate the crisis. A series of meetings with county Farm Bureau leaders is scheduled across Texas in the next few weeks to assess the extent of the cost-price squeeze and to discuss Farm Bureau's program for dealing with it. Farm Bureau's five-point program includes the following:  
(1) Start controlling inflation by immediate steps to balance the federal budget, cut taxes, and increase productivity. Farm Bureau supports amending the U.S. Constitution to require the government to operate on a balanced budget, and to

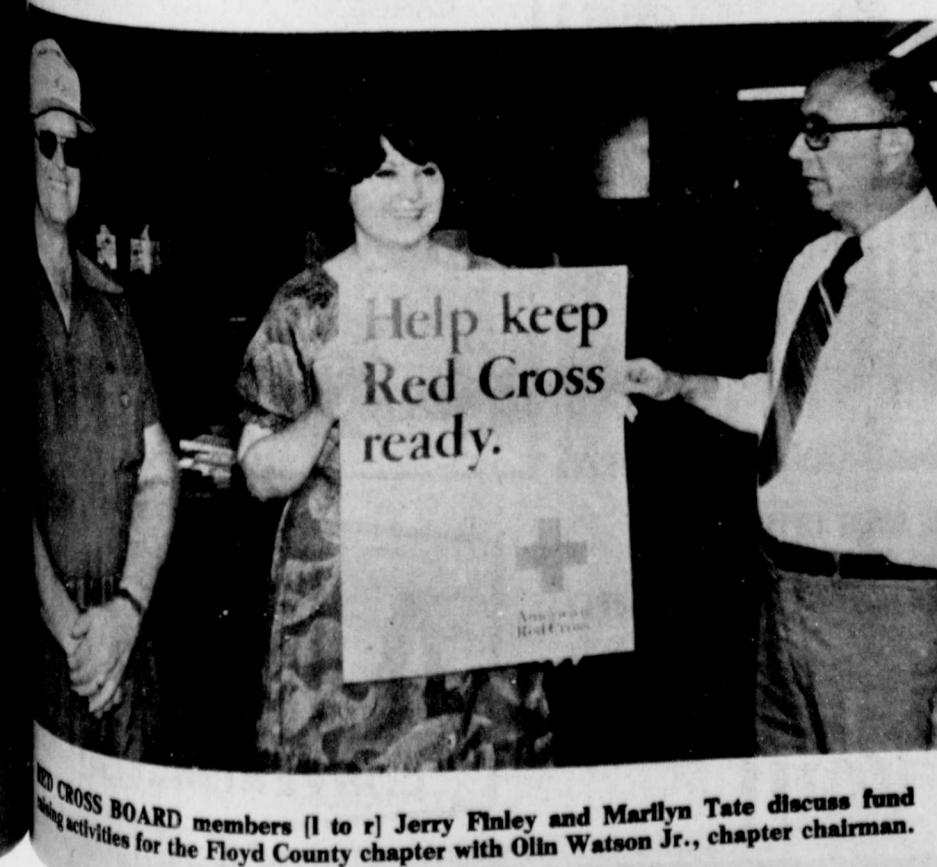
restrict spending to a "realistic" percentage of the gross national product. Productivity can be increased by reducing over-regulation by government and by eliminating costly government-protected labor practices.  
(2) Expand foreign markets through hard bargaining with nations which depend upon American markets for their exports.  
(3) Assure adequate fuel by deregulating the petroleum industry, reducing environmental controls, and by exploring alternate fuels such as agricultural alcohol.  
(4) Stop government's "cheap food" policies by eliminating market restraints (such as embargoes), by emphasizing market-oriented farm programs to avoid accumulating surpluses, and by effective acreage diversion programs when necessary.  
(5) Assure farm credit by limiting credit demands of the federal government in the money market.

# Commissioners, J.P.'s Speak Out

**Editor's Note:**  
The Hesperian asked the county commissioner candidates this week to comment on issues important to Floyd County now and those issues which will become important in the future. Each of the candidates gave a short background on their personal qualifications before answering the questions.

**Thomas Warren [Precinct 3]**  
I have been a lifetime resident of Floyd County and Precinct 3 (on the dirt road) and have served 11 years on the Floydada School board. I have learned to work with people, which I will continue to do to the best of my ability.

**Hesperian: How do you rate these issues? Library, County Child, Welfare Board, County Agricultural Office, Law Enforcement?**  
Warren: I feel we have to have good law enforcement so I will work with the sheriff's department any way possible. As for the other issues I know some of their goals and aims and will work with an open mind on each one and I will work with them in any way possible. Not knowing what the county revenue will be I do not know for sure what can be done or when, but I will carefully study each one and do what I feel can be done at that time. I plan to try my best to inspect the roads and hopefully try to keep them in as good shape as possible. I want to work with the people who live on dirt roads and work with them in any way possible.

**Larry Noland [Precinct 3]**  
I have been a resident of Floyd County and Precinct 3 all of my life. I am aware of the problems the commissioner's court faces and I feel I can take responsibility in taking care of the county's business. I am willing to work for Floyd County and stand up for what I feel is right. Also I travel the dirt roads every day. I realize they need a lot of attention and this is what they will get.

**Hesperian: How do you rate these issues? County library, County child welfare board, County Agricultural Office, Law Enforcement.**  
Noland: I would favor a Child Welfare Board for Floyd County. I feel this would benefit abused children in our county. Before I could comment on the County Agricultural Office I would need to study the matter further. As for law enforcement, we must maintain adequate enforcement in order to hold down crime and vandalism, and to keep Floyd County safe and an enjoyable place to live.

**Hesperian: What plans do you have for County Progress? Noland: I feel at the present, that Floyd County is progressing nicely. At this time I have no personal plans, but would listen to anyone's ideas.**

**Roger Dawdy [Precinct 1]**  
I am a taxpayer, land owner and concerned citizen of Floyd County. I am in the farming business and I can relate to the concerns of citizens in Floyd County about our tax situation. I am very aware that we need responsible people in our county government to handle our tax dollars.

**Hesperian: How do you rate these issues? Library, County Child Welfare, Board, County Agricultural Office, Law Enforcement.**  
Dawdy: I favor a strong law enforcement program. From the information I have received I favor a County Child Welfare Board. The library needs to be moved from the upstairs floor of the court house. I am not sure what the solution to this matter needs, maybe more study. Our County Agricultural Office is very important to our county. These offices help town folks as well as rural areas with problems that may arise from time to time.

I think we also need (1) to be more aware of the needs of our Senior Citizens in the county and (2) need to work more closely with our city government in Lockney as well as Floydada.

**Sam A. Spence [Precinct 1]**  
I would describe myself as a conservative, fair, friendly, honest and dedicated. I have spent 27 years with the State Highway Department working with people. I would have plenty of time for the job, with an office in town, and I am easy to find.

**Hesperian: How do you rate these issues? Library, County Child Welfare Board, County Agricultural Office, Law Enforcement.**

Spence: I have always been for a good County Library. The way the Child Abuse Board was explained to me I think if it could be worked out it would be good. I think the County Agricultural Office helps a lot of people. I am for a good Law Enforcement, it is something that every county needs. I would work with other commissioners on any of the issues. As for plans for Floyd County I would like for Floyd County to be a progressive county and this is something I would work for.

**J.W. Becker [Precinct 1]**  
I have farmed for 26 years in Floyd County. I have been a member of the FHA Committee for three years and on the ASCS Community Committee two years. I am a member of the Floyd County Fat Stock Show Board. In addition I am a member of the Grace Lutheran Church and a veteran of WW II.

**Hesperian: How do you rate these issues? Library, County Child Welfare Board, County Agricultural Office, Law Enforcement.**

Becker: On the library. In order to make an intelligent decision on this matter, more factual data must be presented by both sides of the issue. The best interest of the county can only be served when precise information regarding library utilization, construction plans, construction costs, operation costs, space requirements and full assurance of any

benefits to be derived from cost-sharing programs. Given the limited information which has been presented to date, I believe a referendum vote will be the best way to resolve this issue.

On the County Welfare Board. According to the presentation I have heard on this matter the board is only involved with cases of child abuse. In the interest of the children of this county, I favor his proposal. As for the County Agricultural Office, I favor a healthy county agricultural program and an increased interest in the county agent's office. On law enforcement, I favor strict law enforcement.

**JUSTICE OF PEACE**  
**Editor's Note: The Hesperian asked the Justice of the Peace candidates this week their views on the office and what they felt their personal qualifications for Justice of the Peace are. Incumbent Justice of the Peace Walter Hollums was out of the city this week because of a death in the family so was not available for comment.**

**Linda Morris**  
I have served as president and board member of many civic organizations in Floyd County for 19 years. At Texas Tech University I studied government and political science. I am co-owner of Floydada Seed and Delinting and have worked hard to become a successful breeder of running quarter horses.

**Hesperian: What Service do you intend to give through the office?**  
I believe in dealing fairly with all people. In order to do this it is important that each person be heard and that fines be assessed equally, especially in the area of traffic tickets. I believe the office of Justice of the Peace deserves the upmost in integrity and devotion to duty.

**Joyce Lipham**  
I am a homemaker and have taught music in the Floydada High School for 25 years. I graduated from Floydada High School in 1951 and attended Texas Tech University extension classes in Floydada.

I reside at 812 South Fourth with my husband, Julian. I have seven children of whom four live at home. Julianne is a high school junior, Timothy an 8th grader, Joe Kim a 6th grader and Spring a pre-schooler. I have three married children: Mrs. Charlotte Spurlock and Mrs. Brenda Clappitt of Daingerfield, and Ricky Nelson of Aiken.

My family and I attend church at Bible Baptist where I also am a Sunday School teacher. I have lived in Floydada for about 35 years.

**Hesperian: What service do you intend to give through the office?**

Lipham: If elected to the office of Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1 and 4 I would deem it an honor and a privilege to serve the people in Floyd County in this capacity. I will be fair and impartial while performing my duties and uphold the law. I am aware of the responsibility that would be expected of one who holds this office and feel I am a responsible and sensible person who will be able to prepare the legal matters which would be processed through the Justice of the Peace office in an efficient and dedicated manner.

I would always be trying to work with the public and the law enforcement officers in a compatible way, willing to listen to anyone who has a problem or complaint in our county and would of course always keep the discussion confidential.

I would consider it a privilege to serve in this office of public trust and would be working to the best of my ability to do "justice" to the office of Justice of the Peace, Precincts 1 and 4.
