PERHAPS YOU HAVE read or heard about the proposed "bullet train" for the state of Texas. But few people in this part of the state probably realize that they might be called upon to pay tax money for such a system, yet be excluded in the train's route.

According to preliminary information, the proposed line would link the cities of Dallas, Houston, San Antonio and Austin. Sounds familiar, doesn't it? No inclusion of Lubbock, Amarillo, or a number of other Texas points.

But we can imagine that state taxes which would be used to subsidize the proposed train would no doubt be paid by all Texas residents, whether they lived in the Dallas-Houston-San Antonio-Austin areas or not.

The chairman of Southwest Airlines, Herb Kelleher, has strongly objected to seeing the state's airline industry (which is unsubsidized) placed in such unfair competition with a rail system that "increases travel time, raises fares, degrades the air transportation system of the whole state, and is financially unfeasible without a huge public subsidy."

Kelleher contends that Southwest Airlines might be driven out of the state, if not out of business completely, if the proposed rail system took away up to 60 per cent of the airline's traffic, which might be possible, given the fact that it would operate in the state's largest metropolitan areas.

Should local and federal taxes be used to subsidize the introduction of a possibly risky rail project at the expense of a healthy, privately-owned airline company?

Taxpayers should also be made aware of the fact that the "bullet train" is being promoted by two foreign groups. One is from France, and the other from Germany.

At a time when U.S. citizens are already very sensitive about foreign ownership in our country, perhaps this is a question that should be studied long and hard.

In recent years, a German-based company bought out one of the nation's leading food chains, and tried to gain a toe-hold in this vital industry. But after a few years, the German owners have sold their interest to an American corporation.

A decision on the "bullet train" is to be made in May by the Texas High Speed Rail Authority. We would urge the members of this authority to seriously consider the possible impact that this project could have on existing transportation companies, when they make their decision.

In view of all the possible drawbacks that the proposed high-speed train could have, perhaps they should adopt the old theory, which still makes a lot of sense, in regard to the state's transportation system: "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

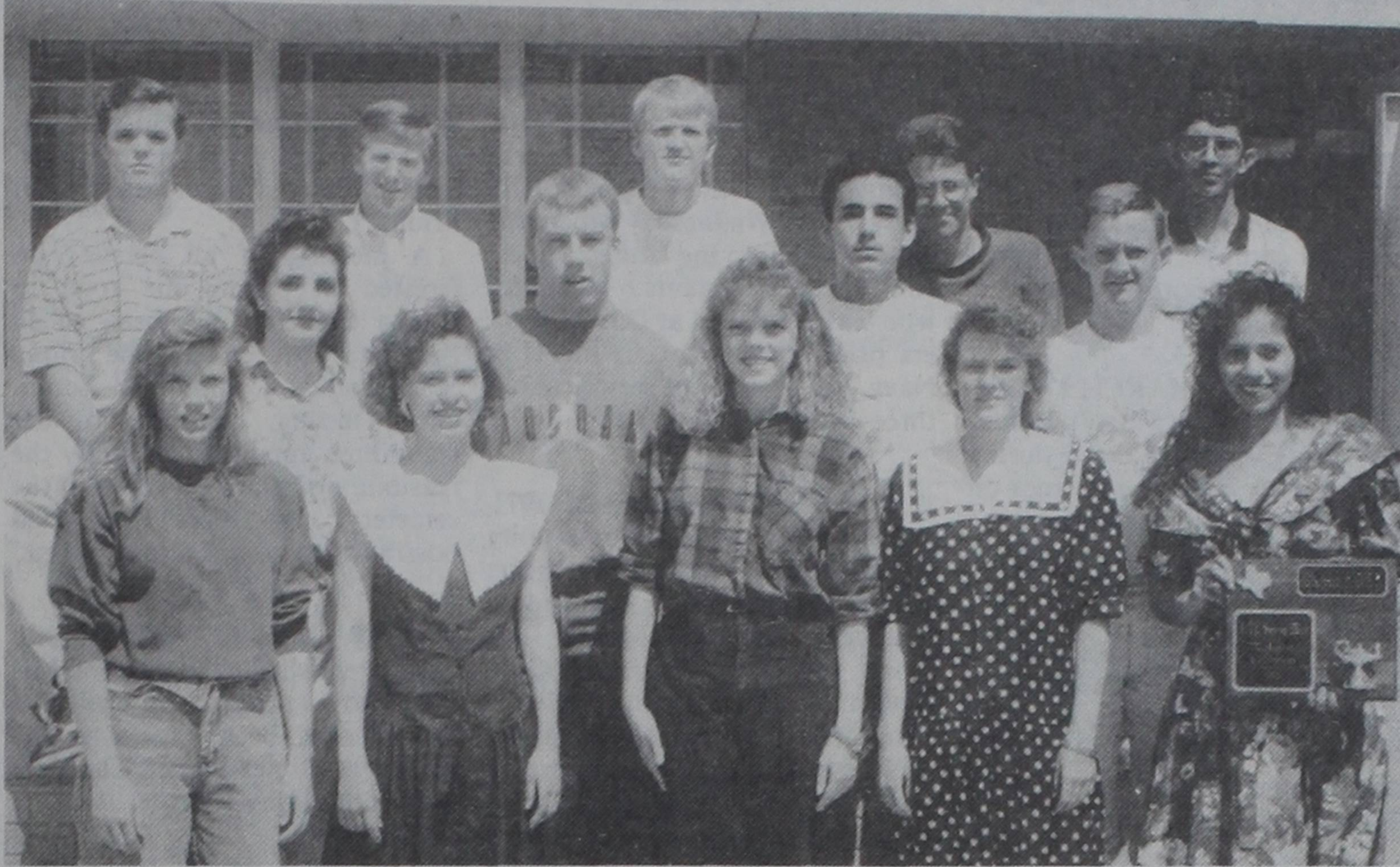

Hospital District Election Is Called

Parmer County took steps on March 25 to become one of the first areas in the state of Texas to establish a hospital district by election instead of by an act of legislation.

Prior to September 1990, hospital districts were set by the state legislature. Now voters may elect to set up their own hospital districts.

Petitions containing signatures of residents were presented to the members of the Parmer County Commissioners Court to show that voters in the affected part of the county are sincerely interested in the changes.

At the hearing Monday, the county commissioners directed County Clerk Bonnie Warren to call an election on Saturday, May 18 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Its purpose is to establish a Parmer County Hospital District which will include all areas in Parmer County not currently served by the Farwell Hospital District or the Muleshoe Hospital District.

The commissioners also set the polling places for election. They will be: the Rhea Community Center, the Friona Fire Station, the Bovina EMS Station (formerly the Legion Hall), and the Willard home in the Lakeview community.

Absentee ballots will also be available.

The proposed Parmer County Hospital District will set a maximum tax rate of 25 cents per \$100 evaluation.

According to Parmer County tax chieftain Ron Procter, the Farwell Hospital District, which covers the same area as the Farwell School District minus the portion in Bailey County, has a rate of 4.16 cents per \$100 assessed tax evaluation. It generates \$23,928.90 per year.

The Muleshoe Area Hospital District has a rate of 25 cents per \$100 assessed tax evaluation. It generates \$69,784.41 per year. It serves about half of the Lazbuddie School District, ending just north

of the highway there.

Part of the disparity between the two existing hospital districts in this county is due to the fact that the Muleshoe Area Hospital District was formed at a time when the Muleshoe Hospital had closed, and a large capital investment was required to resume quality service to the community.

Neither existing hospital district is close to the maximum rate allowed by the state—75 cents per \$100 valuation.

After 1993, hospital districts will also be able to get a portion of the sales taxes raised within its jurisdiction.

Nomination Period Is Underway

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 5 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Bobby Murphy said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Murphy said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income come from the farm operation has been dropped."

Kids, Inc. Baseball Is Slated

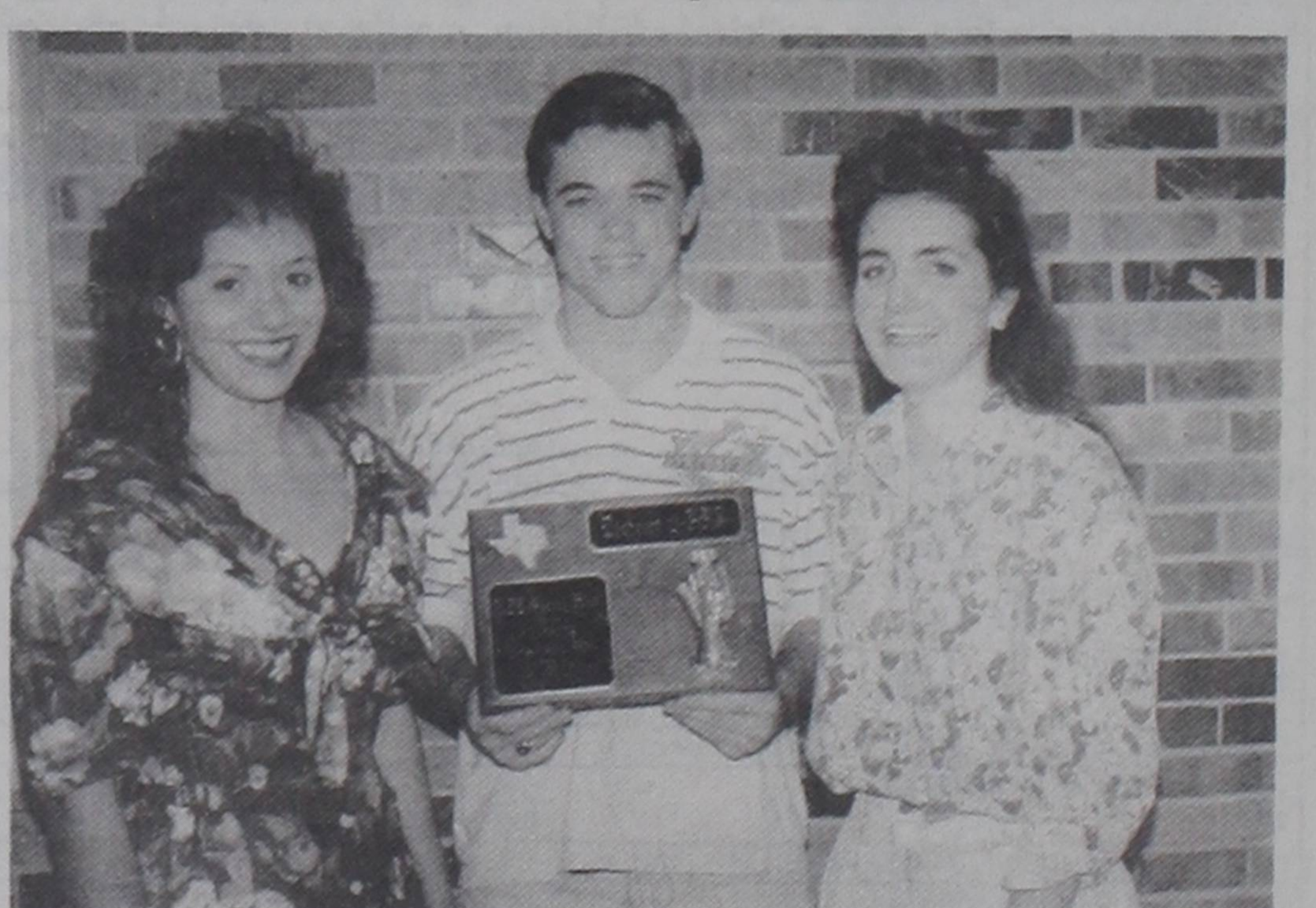
Tryouts will be conducted on Saturday, April 13 for youngsters wishing to participate in the summer baseball program.

Cancer Publication Has Been Released

The American Cancer Society recently released the 1991 edition of its annual "Cancer Facts and Figures" publication with a number of significant changes in incidence statistics.

"This year, the American Cancer Society estimates that one in every nine women will develop breast cancer during her lifetime," says L. Land Hart, Parmer County unit president. "This represents an increase from one in ten last year."

The incidence of lung cancer continues to rise in women at a rate of three per cent annually and an estimated 60,000 women will be diagnosed with lung cancer in 1991. "Cancer Facts and Figures" also includes information on the leveling off of lung cancer incidence in men. Over 101,000

new cases will still be diagnosed this year, representing only 1,000 fewer cases than in 1990. Lung cancer remains the number one cause of cancer death for both sexes in the United States with an expected 143,000 deaths in 1991.

"Overall there will be approximately 1,100,000 new cases of cancer diagnosed in 1991, reflecting the one per cent annual increase noted since the early 1970s," Hart said. "As long as cancer incidence continues to rise our work in providing education and service will remain a vital part of this community."

60 YEARS AGO--MARCH 27, 1931

Parmer County is in a very fortunate position regarding the paving of Highway 60, inasmuch as it traverses the entire length of the county, in a diagonal direction, giving us many miles of that highway, and three of the 13 Texas towns on it. The fact alone will bring Parmer County more than the usual county's share of tourist money to be spent by travellers along the highway.

55 YEARS AGO--MARCH 27, 1936

The fireboys of Friona's Volunteer Fire Company have, during the past week, removed the rack on which they dried the hose from the Blackwell lot to the lots which the city has purchased on the south side of Sixth Street. They also removed all undesirable objects from the two lots just north of the city jail, which makes the premises look much more desirable than while littered with the many articles on the lots.

50 YEARS AGO--MARCH 28, 1941

On Sunday afternoon, a car belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Claude C. Boren was totally wrecked by an eastbound freight train, on the Santa Fe tracks near the depot. Windmill Stirs Interest In Renewable Energy

A retired New Mexico cowboy and stockman, using a rusty axle from a junked pickup and other stuff found lying around his garage, produced an electricity source worthy of a U.S. patent.

J.R. "Chick" Schlenker, 82, built a windmill that doesn't sit atop a tower, is not a circle of spinning blades, doesn't stand perpendicular to the wind and doesn't pump water.

But it does produce electricity. As a ten-year-old, Schlenker rode 77 sections of Texas-New Mexico rangeland oiling water-pumping windmills. He'd climb the 40-foot towers with a whiskey bottle of oil and pour it into the wool-packed cup.

Schlenker's own windmill is a two-story-high, red, white and blue machine that looks like a carnival ride at the county fair.

"I didn't know at all what it was gonna do when I started out building this thing," he said. "Everybody told me I was crazy."

He said the windmill produces enough electricity to power an ordinary household.

The U.S. Patent Office found his windmill so unique that it recently issued a patent number showing Schlenker as the sole inventor of the machine.

Schlenker apparently hit upon a design that eluded engineers for years. He said he spent about \$500 for parts and did a lot of tinkering to build the windmill, which is still undergoing refinements.

Schlenker calls his windmill a "horizontal crosswind generator." He said he began thinking about it nine years ago after attending a wind energy seminar in Amarillo.

"My electricity bills had been getting pretty high," he said. Schlenker built a miniature wheel with flat paddles on it, but it didn't work.

He said the windmill became a hobby and a challenge after his retirement.

"Nearly every decision on this thing was made while I was lying there awake at night," he said.

The breakthrough came when he changed the flat paddles to V-shaped air scoops. He said the scoops are the secret because the configuration allows each one to capture the wind throughout three-fourths of every revolution.

He retrieved a used generator from an old wind charger at Carrizozo, had it rewired and connected it to his windmill with sprockets and chains.

The sprockets are attached to an axle that is turned by the three air scoops. When the windmill turns, the energy is converted by the generator to direct current electricity and stored in batteries.

Schlenker's machine, unlike large blade windmills, does not require an electric motor to start spinning, a feature he calls "a higher starting torque."

He said his windmill could be built at home and doesn't require a tower. Schlenker said the windmill will generate five kilowatts an hour if the wind is blowing 15 mph. If the wind blows

for 24 hours, the batteries will receive 120 kilowatts.

If the wind blows for half the days of the month, Schlenker's windmill will produce about 1,800 kilowatts.

Schlenker said he used 1,100 kilowatts a month, according to his last electric bill. The windmill would have given him 700 kilowatts to spare.

Schlenker said his windmill "can't go any faster than the wind is blowing," and will withstand a 60 mph wind with no possibility of coming apart.

"Those big ones with two or three blades have to have brakes because they can build up all kinds of speed and spin so fast they fly to pieces," he said. "That happened to a big experimental model in New Mexico a couple of years ago; an 8-ton blade broke off and flew about 200 yards."

Schlenker said he's in no hurry to market his invention, but when he does, it will cost customers about \$3,000.

Changes Have Been Made In Farm Bill

The Wetland regulations of the 1990 Farm Bill have changed, stated Thomas Reed, District Conservationist of the SCS in Friona.

One of the most important changes involves the time frame when a person is in violation of Swampbuster. As of November 28, 1990, when a person converts a wetland for the purpose or to have the effect of making the production of an agricultural commodity possible he or she will be subject to a fine plus loss of eligibility for USDA benefits until the wetland has been restored, stated Reed.

Persons who plan to convert a wetland for other than agricultural production (this includes things such as roads or building construction), may be able to get

prior approval so they will be exempt from eligibility and benefit losses. Reed stated that this prior approval involves a person completing a AD-1026 Form at the ASCS Office. He or she will need to state their intentions on the AD-1026. At this time, the SCS will approve or disapprove the proposal depending on whether or not the proposal fits into a non-agricultural use and all needed permits have been obtained.

Reed stated that if a person is planning any new construction in a wetland, he or she should contact the local ASCS or SCS Office prior to starting construction.

All programs and services of the SCS are offered on a non-discriminatory basis without regard for race, color, marital status or handicap status.
