McDonald Implement Closes After Fifty-Two Years

Floydada's oldest business will be closing its doors this week. McDonald Implement, the Alis-Chalmers dealer for the past 46 years, announced that economic reasons that prevent it from continuing in business were begun in 1928 by Ray's father, L.C. McDonald. He became a partner with Alis-Chalmers. Clem McDonald, who worked with the firm in 1972 and

bought his father out in 1976. Ray McDonald, has cited the general farm and economy as reasons for discontinuing the operation. He pointed out in an interview with the Hesperian that major car dealers in big cities are going out of business and many large companies are also in trouble. Ray stated, "I thought I would get out before I had to be carried out."

Meeting Called For Crime Line Query

Sergeant Doyle Nelson of the Lubbock Police Department has been asked to meet with citizens of Floyd County who are exploring the possibilities of starting a Crime Line program here. Nelson will explain how the program works in Lubbock and how to set up a similar program.

The meeting is open to the public and Mayor Parnell Powell asks that everyone interested in protection of private and public property attend the meeting. "The turnout at the meeting will determine the interest people will have in such an operation," Powell said.

Floydada City council endorsed the idea of a crime-line type operation at their last meeting. The council gave Mayor Powell the authority to set up the called meeting.

Sheriff Fred Cardinal said that he would like to see the program go county wide. "I think that if we can get the thing rolling it will help, and we can use all the help we can get," he said.

Cardinal said that he wants to know more about how the program operates and what all is involved. He intends to be at the meeting to find out how the program is working in Lubbock.

"There are just four of us here," Sheriff Cardinal said, "we're on call 24 hours a day and sometimes it seems like 30 hours. If it's (Crime Line) worth while and if the people want it, we'll be willing to try the program. It's all going to revolve around whether the people want to get involved."

Police Chief Scott Newton said that his office is very

receptive to the crime line operation. "The more help we get solving crime, the better off we are, and I'm sure that the crime line is going to give us some help," he said. "I'm looking forward to the meeting Monday night and hope that the citizens do form a crime line corporation. It would help the police department in Floydada and Lockney and the Sheriff's department."

Since the beginning of the crime line operation in Lubbock in April 1979, calls to Crime Line have led to 181 arrests in 153 felony cases, with \$291,300 in stolen property recovered. A total of \$21,900 has been paid to informants.

Generally the Crime Line program involved setting up a fund of private donations to be used as reward money for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for crimes.

Floydada Power Poles Go Up

After four years of negotiation and planning, Floydada Power and Light is now in the construction stage of bringing coal-produced electrical power to city residents. 90 foot poles are being set on the southwest side of town along the Ralls Highway.

The coal-produced power will be purchased by the city from Southwestern Public Service Company. The city lines will connect to the SPS substation west of town and carry 69,000 volts of electricity for 3 1/2 miles to the new municipal substation on Jackson Street.

There will also be a 7200 volt line carried for 2 1/2 miles. This line will feed the city water pumps directly with electricity.

The city substation has been completed and total project completion awaits only the poles set and line hook-up.

"We expect to be able to turn the power on about June 15," City Manager, Bill Feuerbacher said. "The power will have to be shut off as the men put up the poles along 3rd Street." The poles are so high that the men can't work them hot. "This will cause a little inconvenience," Feuerbacher said, "but the power should not be off very long in any one area."

The city will purchase one-third of its electricity from SPC. The coal-produced power is less expensive than the natural gas in that it will

save on fuel charges. The electrical usage charge will be a little more. In 1972 electricity cost 32 cents per mcf, today the cost has risen to \$2.37 per mcf. "We are providing the city with the best service for the least money," Feuerbacher said. The coal-produced power will cost \$20 plus per 1000 where as the natural gas and diesel cost \$30 per 1000.

The first one-third of the city power will be from the new line. When the daily city consumption goes over that amount the city generators will kick on and supply the other two-thirds of the power needed that day. A control panel has been installed at the power plant to handle the switch over.

Bible School Starts

Vacation Bible School for children from age 3 through Grade 6 will be conducted next week at First Baptist Church in Floydada. The school begins Monday, June 2, and continues through Friday, June 6. The sessions will be from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. and children will need to bring a sack lunch each day.

Daily sessions will include Bible stories, mission projects, handcrafts, and other projects, according to David T. Seay, minister of education and director of VBS. Canyon Tx. Sunday, May 25, 1980: Today the fifteenth cast and company assembled and took the first steps toward this year and season of the musical drama, "TEXAS", which will play this summer in the Palo Duro Canyon from June 18 through August 23. As before, the schedule will be Monday through Saturday each week, and one Sunday performance on July 6.

Members of the company met for the first time. The third who were in the cast last year were greeting old friends and introducing themselves to the new comers.

Thirty cast members came from out of state; New Mexico, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Kansas, Mississippi, Missouri, New Jersey and Wisconsin.

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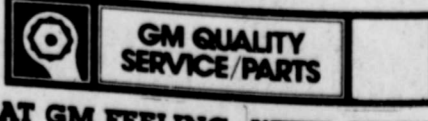

— Ask to see the owner's fuel bills for the past year.

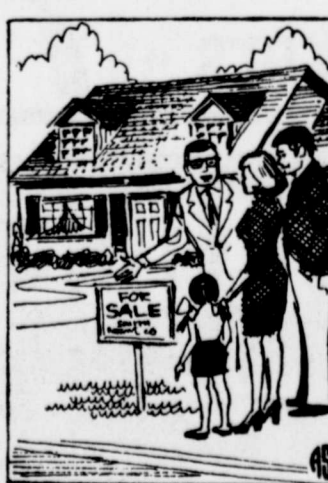
— Is the plumbing in good condition? Make sure tree roots aren't growing into underground pipes.

— The contract should list "fixtures", such as kitchen appliances, included in the sale. Also record in the contract all verbal promises of the owner to repair the home.

— Has the title been cleared by an attorney or a reputable title company?

— Has the property been surveyed for encroachments or violations of setback agreements?

Nachbar advises the homebuyer to have an architect, engineer or real estate appraiser inspect the property and report on the condition of the house.

It is also a good idea to have your independent insurance agent check the property before you buy for conditions which could affect your insurance rates.




