Billy figured on reaching Slaton on Thursday [today], as they average about 20 miles a day. Their record is 27 miles in one day, but Billy said they would only do that once because "everybody

Alternate Energy Symposium June 19-20

Regional, state-wide, and local interest is increasing for the "Alternate Energy Symposium" scheduled for June 19 and 20 in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center, according to Brent Magers, manager of the Public Affairs Department of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

"We have received inquiries from Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, and reservations from as far as Arkansas, Kansas and Florida," said Magers. "We are anticipating excellent attendance for the meeting."

The symposium is designed to present information regarding the practicality of the use of various energy sources, such as ethanol, methanol, wind, solar, and biomass. The Lubbock Chamber is cooperating with the Small Business Administration, Texas Farmers Union, and Texas Tech University in sponsoring the meeting.

The objective of the symposium is to provide interested individuals with empirical data on various energy sources and to dispel misinformation," said Magers. "Primary consideration was given to presenting useful information that can directly and immediately benefit the farmer, businessman, and society in general."

During the symposium, workshops are planned on wind energy, solar energy, and use of biomass with noted specialists in each area conducting the sessions. Individual topics slated to be covered include research on solubility that allow less than 200 proof ethanol to be mixed with diesel or gasoline - a major breakthrough in ethanol technology. A workshop on a small-scale ethanol production plant with the capability to convert starches and cellulose to ethanol is planned. Also included is a workshop on new developments in crop suitability for energy conversion.

In addition to the technical material that will be presented, a detailed look at business considerations such as capital requirements, return on investment and accounting procedures will be provided by selected experts. One workshop is designed to provide the latest information on legislation and federal and state policy affecting the alternate energy field.

In total, eight workshops will be held, in addition to the general sessions each day. Twenty-six speakers will participate during the symposium. Several displays, demonstrations, and information booths have been reserved for the Civic Center Exhibit Hall, for viewing before and after the scheduled sessions.

Extension Service Change Explained To Commissioners

Dr. Crawford, Extension Service District Supervisor, met with the Commissioners Court to explain the change in the dual line of responsibility that has been shared by the two district supervisors for this area.

Two years ago the Extension Service did an original study to determine a more effective way to use personnel. As a result of that study the District Agents will be moving into a new area of responsibility. Instead of the two supervisors covering the entire area, each was given an individual area to cover.

Mrs. Crawford will be working in the 10 northern

counties of the District which includes Floyd County.

"When all three of the County Agents are responsible to one person, it will strengthen the program," she said. It will go into effect July 1.

As far as programming, Mrs. Crawford said that Bill Gunner, District Supervisor, will continue setting up the Agricultural activities and that she would still be doing the Home Economics work.

Under the new structure, they will be able to back up the Agents with more support. It will mean less travel and less paperwork.

She said that it would be a big adjustment and change but that in the long run "we feel it will strengthen the county programs."

She commended the Commissioners on the remodeled Ag Building, saying she knew it took long hours of negotiating and work to get the building completed. "It is a facility you can be proud of, and the Agents will try to keep it that way," she said.

She suggested modest changes in the coming county budget mostly in salary increases, to be considered by the Commissioners in January. It came to about a 9% over all increase. She told the court that their aim is to give, "the most effective program for the dollars you are spending."

Commissioners Court met June 9, in their regular session. All four Commissioners; Jack Lackey, Bob Jarrett, Aaron Carthel and Grigsby (Doodle) Milton, were present. County Judge Choise Smith officiated.

Mr. James Winnat, District Supervisor of the Predator Control Program, met with the court and asked for a \$50 per month increase for the Trapper Fund. The increase will be considered by the Commissioners.

Motion was made by Bob Jarrett and seconded by Aaron Carthel that the Floyd County Canneries be officially opened July 1. Mrs. T.L. Hulsey will be hired as director of the Lockney Cannery and Mrs. Cora Hardine will be director of the Floydada Cannery.

Although not on the agenda, the subject of the Child Welfare Board was discussed for the benefit of Commissioner Milton who was absent from the last monthly meeting. Commissioner Carthel stated that he had been looking into the matter, talking with various people and from the information that he has gathered it looked like the forming of the Board would save the county money.

Judge Choise Smith said that he looked on it as an insurance policy for the county.

The matter of forming the Board will be on the next regular court agenda, and will be brought to a vote.

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VA Loans Decrease

Veterans Administration chief Max Cleland recently announced the largest decrease in the VA's GI home loan interest rate in history—from 13 percent to 11.5 percent, effective May 15.

The rate had dropped to 13 percent on April 28, from the record high 14 percent ceiling set on April 3.

The change does not affect existing loans, whose interest rate remains the same for the life of the agreement.

Since the program began in 1944, about 10.5 million loans worth \$178.6 billion have been guaranteed by VA.

D-Day Memorial

(Editor's Note: Ben Galloway, Floydada, clipped this article from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Mr. Galloway served in the fourth infantry during World War II.)

An American delegation led by U.S. Embassy counsellor Francis de Tarr attended low-key wreath-laying ceremonies Friday commemorating the 36th anniversary of the Allied landings in Normandy during World War II.

Ceremonies focused on Omaha Beach and St. Mere Eglise in the American theater of operations of the 1944 D-Day invasion.

Wreaths were laid at St. Laurent-sur-Mer, an American cemetery situated on a cliff overlooking Omaha Beach and the English channel containing the graves of 9,386 Americans.

A wreath also was placed at St. Mere Eglise where 23,000 paratroopers of the American 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions jumped into Normandy to kick off the invasion.

Omaha Beach, four miles long and about 200 yards wide, backed by 100-foot bluffs most of the way, was the bloodiest of the five invasion beaches.

Total American, British and Canadian casualties were about 10,000 in the first 24 hours of the invasion, including: 1,456 Americans killed, 3,184 wounded, 1,928 missing and 26 captured. The British suffered 2,500 to 3,000 total casualties and the Canadians 946 in their sector on Gold, Juno and Sword beaches.

Across the English Channel, meanwhile, the British noted the 36th anniversary of the landings by unveiling a 10-foot bronze statue of "Monty," Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery of Alamein, one of Britain's



most inspirational military leaders, in London.

Queen Mother Elizabeth unveiled the statue in Whitehall, a broad thoroughfare of government office buildings leading from Trafalgar Square.

Montgomery helped U.S. General Dwight D. Eisenhower lead Allied forces into France in the D-Day landings on Normandy.

Monty's most famous victory was at El Alamein, Egypt, in 1942. He died in 1976.

The Queen Mother, whose daughter is Queen Elizabeth II, called Monty "a legend in his own lifetime."

The \$70,000 statue by sculptor Oscar Nemon was paid for by donations from more than 7,000 people around the world, led by Monty's friends, comrades and widows of

men who served with him. Donors' names will be recorded in a book at London's Imperial War Museum.

Monty once posed for sculptor Nemon, but more recently his brother, Col. Brian Montgomery, modeled for the statue because of a remarkable family resemblance.

Asked if Monty would have liked the result, he said in an interview: "He would be absolutely delighted by it and would have loved to talk about it."

"He was a remarkable leader. I heard only recently how he would often drive his jeep out to where a soldier would be digging a trench."

"He would stop and talk to him, give him cigarettes and leave him saying, 'Right, I'll send a telegram to your wife telling her I've met you.' That's leadership."

Termination Of County Air Service Imminent

Southwest Airlines Chairman of the Board Herbert D. Kelleher and Southwest Airlines President Howard D. Putnam recently announced plans for termination of service at Jefferson County Airport later this summer. The announcement followed meetings recently with civic leaders in Beaumont, Port Arthur and Orange, Texas where Southwest's plans were revealed.

Southwest will file later this week with the Civil Aeronautics Board a document stating Southwest's intentions to terminate service later this summer, with an exact date of discontinuance of service to be announced later. This is the first city

Southwest has not been able to make profitable after opening service in its nine year history. Unlike all other Southwest destinations, Jefferson County has never responded to Southwest's low fares and frequent service, according to Putnam. He continued that it appears the close proximity to Houston diverts too much traffic to the freeways for Houston's Intercontinental and Hobby Airports where a greater variety of air service is available.

Southwest began service between Dallas Love Field and Jefferson County Airport on March 5, 1979 with five roundtrips daily. That schedule was reduced to four roundtrips on June 1, 1979.

We regret this action," said Herbert Kelleher, "as the people of Jefferson County and the surrounding areas have been tremendously supportive of Southwest. However, our shareholders can not be penalized in the long run to subsidize an unprofitable market. We also have taken this action now before incurring the additional expense of moving into the new terminal building."





Twisters In Midwest 'Alley' Take Heavy Toll, Make U.S. Tornado Capital Of World

Tornado season in the Midwest, especially in an area known as the "alley," and if an average year, 1,200 tornadoes kill about 120 people before it's over, according to the issue of National Geographic magazine.

The worst tornado of last year struck the north Texas town of Wichita Falls on April 10, 1979—a day local citizens now call "Terrible Tuesday." For 20 minutes in the late afternoon the city of 100,000 people was struck by a violent tornado whose winds rotated at more than 200 miles per hour, killing 45 people and destroying about \$400 million worth of property.

Wichita Falls is on the southern tip of tornado alley. Meteorologists predict that in the heart of tornado alley, chances are that a specific location might be struck by a twister about once every 250 years. "But tornado patterns do not fit mathematical models," explains National Wildlife Federation's Oklahoma City office. "It has been hit by twisters 32 times since 1892. And the community of Codell, Kansas, amazingly, was hit three years in a row—1916, 1917, and 1918—on the same day, May 20."

Researchers may never be able to prevent tornadoes, although Fujita has been able to break up scaled-down twisters in his laboratory. Fortunately, advances have been made in tornado detection. In Norman, Oklahoma, a 30-foot dome houses a radar system operated by the National Severe Storms Laboratory. A year ago, the system picked up almost every twister in the area, and enabled weathermen to locate some tornadoes a half an hour before they hit.

The tornado report is National Wildlife's fourth in a series on violent natural phenomena. The others covered tidal waves, earthquakes, lightning, and volcanoes. If a tornado approaches your area, National Wildlife offers this advice: "Go to the basement or innermost room of the house or building, away from windows. Cover yourself with pillows and mattresses. If you are in a car, get out quickly and lie in a ditch, culvert or other low spot. In the Wichita Falls storm, 25 of the 45 people killed were in automobiles; 16 of them had gotten into their cars, hoping to escape."


Some of the cowboys pictured in the program will be there, and some of the ranch owners as well.
