

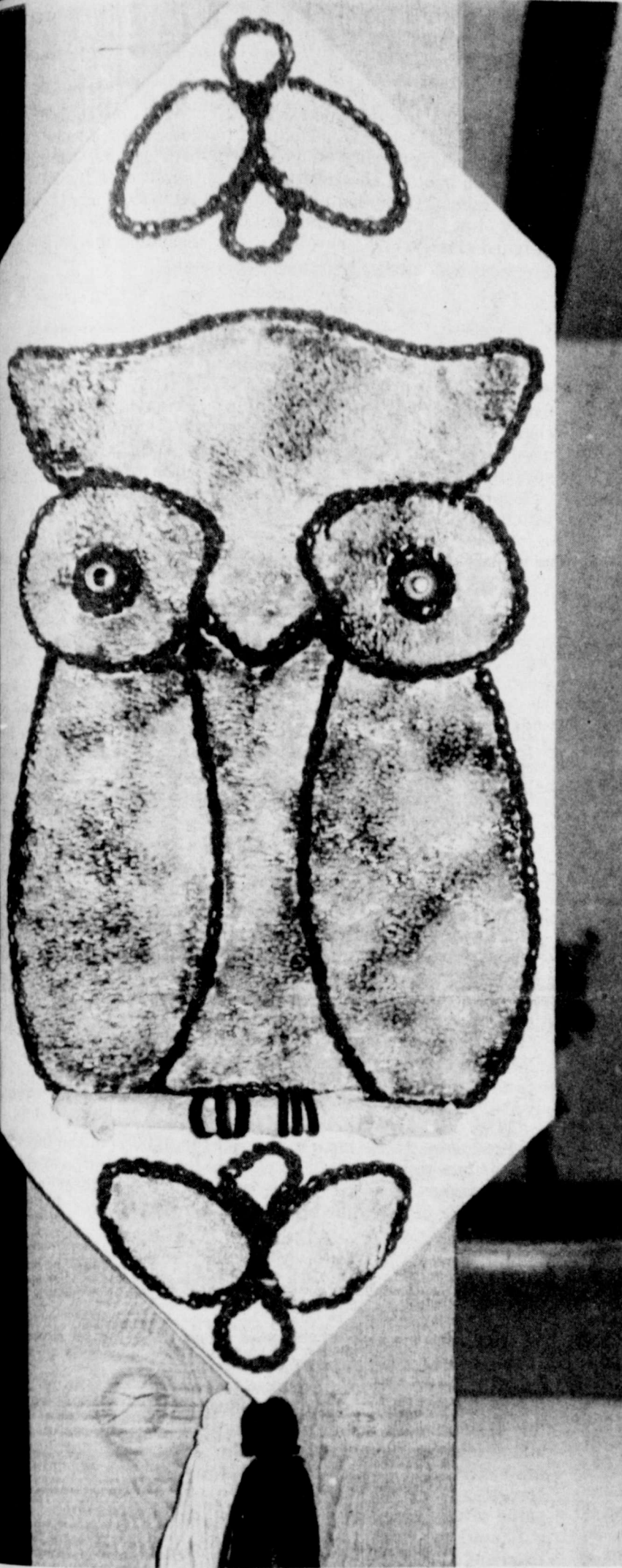

## Area Survey Says "Cut Government Spending"

Results of the second District-wide poll conducted by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm have been completed and the overall message is a clear one: Cut government spending.

"The thread that ran throughout the responses was a fiscally-conservative viewpoint that I honestly feel my service in Congress has reflected," Stenholm said in reviewing results.

Respondents strongly favored tighter restrictions for individual eligibility of Food Stamps (61.8 percent), compared to only 2.4 percent favoring a general increase of benefits. A total of 51.1 percent favored the elimination of benefits for individuals on strike; 38.2 percent for an increase in benefits for the elderly and disabled; 22 percent for a general reduction in the availability in benefits and 16.2 percent for the elimination of the Food Stamp Program altogether.

"I was especially pleased to hear the overwhelming support for some of these views which I, personally, have about the Food Stamp Program," Stenholm said.

Some 61.6 percent of those answering the questionnaire felt that a balanced budget and limited government spending would be most beneficial to the private business sector, as opposed to the choices of a limit on Small Business Administration loans (11.3 percent favoring); accelerated depreciation for business capital investments (15.2 percent); more Congressional oversight of regulatory agencies (18.3 percent); and the revision of estate tax laws to ease tax burdens on family-owned businesses (35.2 percent).

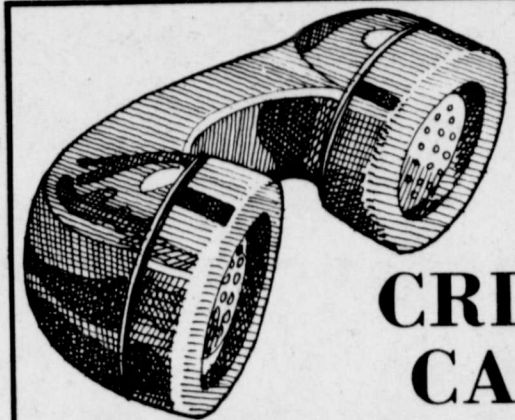
When given choices ranging from increasing foreign aid assistance (only 2 percent favored) to no foreign aid at all (8.3 percent favored), the majority favored reducing foreign aid and all other programs to help balance the budget (39.2 percent).

What might be considered a surprising range of attitudes was evidenced in replies to a question regarding registration for a draft, as more respondents favored the drafting of men and women (40.8 percent) than those favoring drafting men only (36 percent). Only 8.6 percent opposed registration and drafting of men or women and 3.7 percent favored for drafting of women for front line duty, compared to 37.4 percent in favor of women for non-combat roles only.

Respondents opposed the imposition of wage-

and-price controls, favored the restoration of voluntary prayer in public schools and opposed a National Health Care Program.

"I was extremely pleased with the over 14,000 answers we received and the promptness of the replies," Stenholm said. "The use of a poll such as this is an excellent way that I can obtain a wide range of views district-wide and I have found this information very useful to me in making decisions in Congress."

## County Citizens Give Support To Crime Call

The first two days of solicitation for donations by the Crime Call finance committee members netted \$1031. The members have reported high community support for the program.

The Crime Call telephone line is expected to be installed on July 1. An easy to remember number has already been assigned for the program.

The first spotlight crime is expected to be publicized in the July 3 edition of the Hesperian and Beacon.

At the board meeting, Sheriff Fred Cardinal said that they have a crime close to being solved, and they think that the Crime Call publicity may bring them the information they need for an arrest.

When Lubbock began their Crime Line Program, it was manned by police officers five days a week between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. At night, an automatic answering device was used to record any information people wanted to leave. However, the Lubbock Police found that most of the time the calls came in on weekends and at night. So finally two officers were assigned to answer the phone 24 hours a day, seven days a week. They work a divided shift, and one of the officer's wives is trained to answer the phone.

Floyd County does not have the volume of crime that Lubbock does. The board agreed that it would not be necessary to expect

the Sheriff's department to answer the phone 24 hours a day. The Crime Call line will be answered about 12 hours a day through the week and with the fast forward service on the telephone, will also be answered over the weekend.

There will not be an answering device on the Crime Call phone. The phone will be answered from the hours of 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Board members decided Floydada number would be the only one used and that the Sheriff's office would accept collect calls on that number from any place in the county. The calling party will not give their name to the operator. They will use the name Crime Call. This is to protect their anonymity.

The ladies are now working on a colonial doll quilt. When it is completed they will sell tickets on it to make money for new curtains for the lobby.

Tuesday is game day. Wednesday is divided into two activities so that all

residents can participate as they are able. The major part of the group has a Bible study class, conducted by Steve Westbrook, who is the assistant administrator.

At the same time, those residents who are able to travel take a short trip. The Senior Citizens bus picks them up. Sometimes they go sight-seeing to a museum, the Country Club or to local ranches. "We go as guests," Dorothy said, "someone invites us, and they fix refreshments, and we visit." Sometimes the group goes to Plainview for supplies.

Thursday the residents play Bingo. On Friday films are brought to the home. "We have popcorn to go along with the movies," Dorothy said.

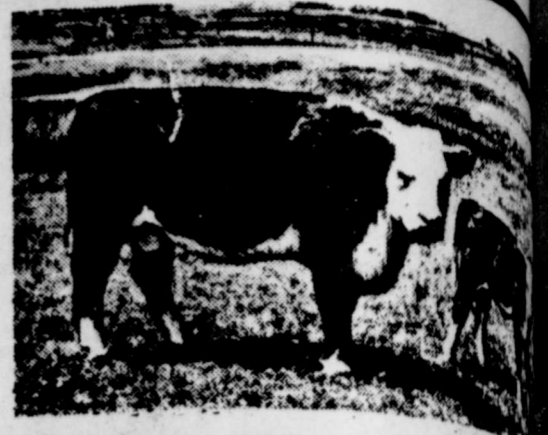
The 46 residents always celebrate holidays. Programs are often given by people in the community; many times the programs are musical presentations.

## Pest Management Program Offered By Floyd County Extension Service

"With the growing season here it is time to start watching for the insect pests that so often give us a problem," states Paul Treptow, County Extension Entomologist for Crosby and Floyd Counties. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and myself with help from the Texas Pest Management Association can help you with your pest problems this year, adds Treptow.

The Crosby-Floyd County Pest Management Program is getting underway for another year. This program was set up in 1976 to demonstrate to area growers the benefits of having crops checked regularly throughout the growing season by qualified scouts.

In this program, as in all farming operations, economics is the name of the game. Decisions to spray or not to spray are based on whether it is economically feasible to do so. In crops with year to year problems in our area—sorghum, sunflowers and corn—the necessity of treatment for pests is rather obvious. But are

these treatments properly timed and are effective chemicals and rates always used? In the case of cotton do you really know if bollworms are economically damaging your yield if fields are not checked regularly? Cotton is a crop with increasing pest problems. With careful field scouting and timely pesticide applications losses which occurred last year could have been avoided. Regular field scouting works out to be a management practice that can easily pay for itself and increase net profits.

The program operates through the Crosby-Floyd Pest Management Association which is made up of growers who participate in the program. Participants pay a per acre charge which is used to hire scouts for the growing season. Scouts check fields on a weekly basis (more often during increased pest activity) and report directly to the growers. The County Extension Entomologist is in contact with the grower throughout the season to help with control decisions and the selection of effective pesticides if

necessary, Treptow continues.

Listed below are per acre charges for the 1980 season. This amount goes to pay one scout team (2 people) checking about 3000 acres of crops in an area. A portion of this charge is for administrative costs to the Texas Pest Management Association (TPMA) the statewide organization responsible for scout payroll and promotion of integrated pest management concepts. Plains Cotton Growers is our commodity representative to the Board of Directors of TPMA and as such receive a contribution for their part in the promotion of pest management practices.

## Alcohol Fuel Symposium At A&M

There's still time to pre-register for the alcohol fuel symposium that will key in on small-scale production of ethanol from grain at Texas A&M University, July 1-2.

Sponsored by two agencies of the Texas A&M University System—the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service—in cooperation with A&M's Center for Energy and Mineral Resources, the symposium is designed to bring participants up-to-date on research progress and latest information available on alcohol-fuel.

Discussions will center around issues relating to the production and use of ethanol, including feedstocks, preprocessing requirements, use as a fuel in engines, by-product utilization, as well as legal, economic and financial aspects.

Information will be presented on a number of ongoing projects, such as agricultural residue combustion/gasification as a heat source of distillation, development of sweet sorghums as feedstock for ethanol production, operation of a small-scale ethanol demonstration plant, use of ethanol in diesel and natural gas driven engines, ethanol-gasoline dual fuel systems and economics of ethanol production.

Major speakers will include Dr. Neville P. Clarke, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who will speak on the "Texas A&M University System and the Ethanol Issue," as well as Dr. Wayne A. LePori, agricultural engineer; Dr. L.O. Schake, feedlot management researcher, and Dr. E.J. Soltides, wood chemistry researcher, all with the Experiment Station; and Henry P. O'Neal,

agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Other key speakers will be Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown, State Rep. Dan Kubiak, vice chairman of the House Agricultural and Livestock Committee, and ethanol advocates from Nebraska and North Dakota.

## Floyd County Farm Report

Wheat harvest is in full swing this week and above average yields are reported from all areas of the county. Dryland yields are ranging from around 15 bushels to 25 bushels per acre. The irrigated wheat has really had exceptional yields. Estimates from county elevators range from 35 bushels to (I heard this more than one place) 80 bushels.

The harvest in the Providence area is around 75% completed and Floydada estimated that only 20% of the wheat was cut there. Most other areas estimated 50% of the wheat to be out.

Cotton is still looking good. Some squares are being seen now. Some thrip and flea hopper infestations have been sighted but thus far, not enough to spray. However, this should be watched closely. Also a small build up of army worms has been reported.

Corn crops are in good shape. Some fields will begin tasseling in 10 days. A few corn bore eggs have been spotted along with some spider mites. These have not been heavy but again it should be watched closely.

## USDA Revises Mike Discounts

No firm figure can be placed on the additional dollar income that may accrue to High Plains producers from the recently successful efforts of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, and others to cut back the announced micronaire discounts in the 1980 schedule.

To arrive at such a figure would require advance knowledge of the 1980 crop size, micronaire distribution, how much of the crop will enter the loan, and what effect, psychological or otherwise, the lower loan discounts will have on discounts that will prevail in the marketplace.

On a per-bale basis, calculations are simple. The loan discount on cotton in the 2.6 and below "mike" range was lowered from 830 points (8.3 cents per pound) to 720 points, meaning each 480-pound bale of that description will be valued \$5.28 higher for CCC loan purposes.

Strictly in terms of loan value, the revisions in mike discounts pushed the price of 2.7 to 2.9 cotton up 90 points, \$4.32 per bale; for 3.0 to 3.2 up 70 points, \$3.36 a bale; and 30 points, \$2.44 per bale, on 3.3 and 3.4.

The 1974 through 1979 crops in the 25-county PCG area averaged 11.7 percent in the 2.6 and below mike range, 20.7 percent 2.7 to 2.9, 19.5 percent 3.0 to 3.2 and 8.2 percent 3.3 to 3.4.

Using these averages and assuming a 1980 crop of 3,175,000 bales, if the entire crop went into the loan this year or was sold in the market at the identical loan discounts, the mike discount changes would add something over \$7.25 million to the value of this year's crop.

Should the 1980 crops repeat the extremely poor mike record of 1979, heaven forbid, the loan value difference could range well over \$12 million.

Whatever the value, says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, "we all owe a debt of gratitude to Congressman Kent Hance, Charles Stenholm and Jack

Hightower, Senators and Lloyd Bentsen for the issue, and to the officials who were willing to the facts and figures to their attention."

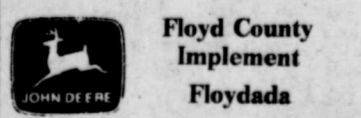

**Gasohol may be the tip of the iceberg.** Blending ethanol with unleaded gasoline is only one of the ways ethanol can supplant petroleum usage. On that basis it replaces only ten percent of gasoline that would be used without ethanol. When used as the sole fuel in an engine, it replaces 100 percent of the gasoline that would have been used without it. When used as a dual-carbureted diesel fuel supplement it offsets diesel usage by 25 to 50 percent. For many farmers, another advantage of burning straight ethanol may be that it can be considerably less expensive to produce. Ethanol burned alone can be hydrated (containing 10% - 15% water) and therefore requires less expensive distillation than anhydrous (no water) ethanol which is required for mixing with gasoline.

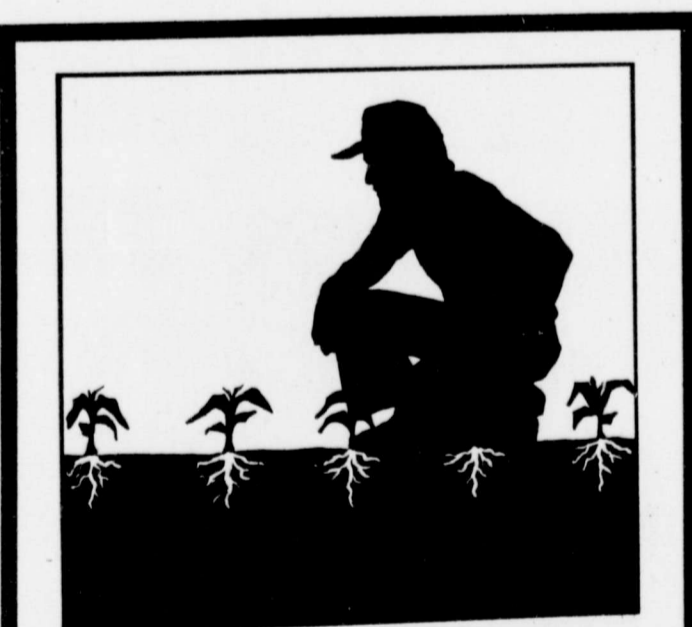

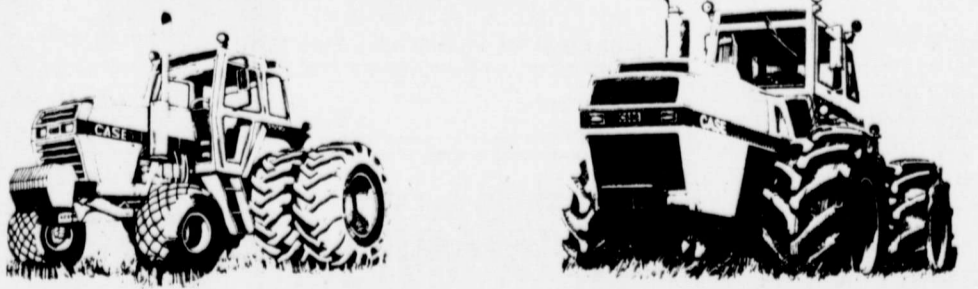

**CONSERVE ENERGY WHILE ON VACATION**  
It's vacation time for many of you, but before you leave town, take a few steps to conserve energy around your house while you are away.

Turn off all unnecessary appliances. Unplug "instant-on" televisions, timed coffee pots and clock radios. Turn off the air conditioner, but remember to move house plants to a friend's house if warmer temperatures would harm them. Also, turn off the electric or gas supply to the hotwater heater.

If your vacation will last more than a week. Consider turning off the refrigerator. Unscrew the interior light bulb and prop the door open so mildew won't form. If you leave the refrigerator running, put in on a warmer setting. Be sure no food is left that will spoil at the warmer temperature.

When you are at home, you can conserve your cooling dollar by raising the air conditioner thermostat to the highest comfort level possible. This will reduce energy consumption from three to ten percent of each degree

the thermostat is raised. When it is excessively hot outdoors, turn your thermostat up even higher to keep the air conditioner from overworking. Your air conditioner will operate most efficiently when there is no more than 15 to 20 degrees difference between inside and outside temperatures.

The quickest, most-efficient way to cool your house is to set the thermostat at the temperature you want it and leave it there no matter how hot it

gets outside. Turning the thermostat way down will not cool the house any faster. If you do change your mind and want it cooler, lower the setting only about two degrees every four hours until you reach the desired level.
