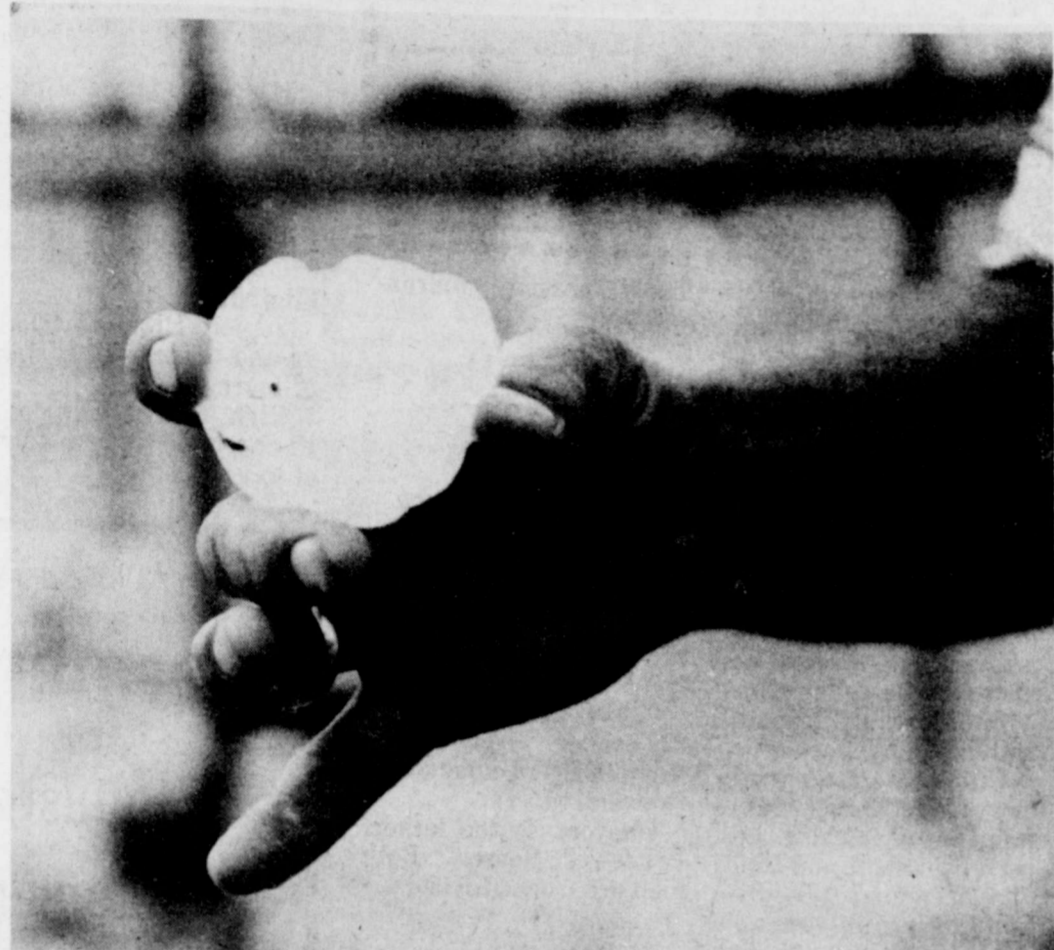

## Harmony Is The Key Word For The Texas Republican Convention

Harmony is the one word description of the State Republican Convention in Houston according to John Farris, county committee chairman. Twenty-five resolutions were passed on with "no roll call vote."

"The party is as unified as they have ever been since I've been with them," Farris said, "that's the last 25 or 26 years."

Speakers at the convention "laid it on Carter" and stoutly supported Ronald Reagan. Farris said that there were no recommendations for Vice President, "no one even brought up the question of a running mate." Two Texans, John Connally and George Bush, are in the running, but evidently the delegation is leaving the choice up to Reagan.

The 25 resolutions included a support of agriculture to "promote legislation and/or programs to encourage the sale of raw agriculture products in the market, at prices on par with the rest of the economy."

The Texas Republicans are against busing, "proposes an amendment to the constitution which would permanently eliminate forced busing for social goals." They also "support the abolition of

the Department of Education and to return total control of education to local schoolboards and state agencies."

The delegates were opposed to the ERA and opposed to any further extensions of time for ratification. They were also opposed to any legislation leading to further development of a national health insurance plan; and that solutions to health care needs of the people be carried out through the private sector.

The Texas Republicans have taken a pro-life stand and urge the Congress to propose a Human Life Amendment which would protect innocent human life both young and old at every stage of biological development.

In the matter of tax reduction, "be it resolved that federal laws should be adjusted to provide a \$10,000 annual exemption for gifts; a \$250,000 state tax exemption; an income tax exemption appropriate to present levels of double digit inflation to be adjusted annually based on the inflation rate; and an exclusion of the first \$10,000 of earned income from savings accounts, certificates of deposit, money market certificates, treasury bills, stocks, and bonds.

They were for the right to bear arms and the right to work without having to belong to any organization or group. They support the rights of students to voluntary prayer in school.

As far as the welfare programs, they said that "we find the present 'hand out' system degrades the recipient and promotes laziness...therefore, be it resolved that we support the reform of all welfare programs for the purpose of returning control of such programs

from the federal government to the states and counties, denying welfare payments to individuals who are able to work, but refuse to work, and restricting the eligibility of food stamp recipients to the truly needy."

Delegates from Floyd County to the Convention were: Albert Scheele, Billy D. Colston, Farris, and Keith Jackson, alternate. The convention was held at the coliseum in Houston.

## Roller Coaster Ride Unexpected Thriller

Getting stranded on top of a monstrous roller coaster isn't exactly tops on most people's lists of favorite ways to spend a Friday, but it does happen, as several Floydadans found opportunity to testify.

Tommy Cathey, son Tommy, and Lance and Melissa Barrow were all set Friday to enjoy a thrilling ride on Judge Roy Scream, the newest addition to the family of roller coasters at Six Flags Over Texas.

As their set of four cars

trudged to the top of a steep incline and prepared to plunge to unknown depths, the switch operator, a new employee, failed to slow down the second train of cars immediately behind the first.

The second train rammed into the first, giving all travelers a jolting experience. As Tommy Cathey described it, "The whole thing came to a screeching halt, including us. I thought I had busted a rib."

After being stranded on the top of the ride for about 30 minutes, the riders were instructed to walk down the incline so the cars could be repaired and the ride reopened.

Cathey recalls, "There was one little girl of about nine or ten who was scared of heights. It took two security men and her mother to get her down. Once she was pried from the safety bar, she had a death grip on everything within her reach."

Upon reaching solid ground, the four didn't hesitate as they headed back for the line which would put them back on the same ride. The operators allowed them to get at the front of the line as penance for their failing equipment. However, park authorities closed the ride down for about two hours in order to make repairs, and hopefully to find a new switch operator.

## Summer Event Planned By The Museum Board

A three day "Summer Event" has been planned by the Museum committee to coincide with the Rodeo on July 17-19. There will be an Open House, Senior Citizens Day, and a Sidewalk Arts and Crafts Show.

The "events" are planned for the daylight hours to complement the county rodeo programs at night.

The first day, Thursday, an Open House is planned with special exhibits, and an antique quilt show. Gladys Jones is chairman of that event. Senior Citizens Day is planned for Friday, and invitations are being sent to those groups in the

surrounding towns. Ann Swebston is Chairman.

The Sidewalk Arts and Crafts Show will be held on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. around the Courthouse Square. 100 letters are being sent out to artists and craftsmen inviting them to set up display booths. There will be demonstrations as well as sale of arts and crafts items.

Organizations are also being contacted for food concession booths. Olin Watson, chairman of the "Event" committee, asks that those interested in having a booth call the museum as soon as possible so they will have an idea of how many displays to count on.

## Wind Erosion Report By Soil Conservation

The Soil Conservation Service in Floydada has responsibility for reporting wind erosion for Floyd County. It is SCS policy to monitor wind erosion in the 10 Great Plains States. Wind erosion is reported three times a year to cover the following periods:

First Period—November and December  
Second Period—January and February  
Third Period—March, April and May

The objective of preparing reports on wind erosion in the Great Plains States is to provide current information to farmers, ranchers, and the public on the status and condition of affected soil and vegetation resources and to determine the changes, trends, and action taken to reduce the effect of soil erosion during critical seasons of the year.

Wind erosion in Floyd County this year was slight to moderate, however there were several days which Floyd County residents will remember that the air was filled with dirt and it was better to stay indoors. One of the main factors which contributes to wind erosion in spring is the constant crusting over of the soil after a hard rain causing the farmers to run rotary hoes and sandfighters.

Information concerning ways to help control wind erosion and other conservation practices can be obtained at the soil conservation office in Floydada.

All programs and services of the U.S. Department of Agriculture are available to everyone without regard to race, creed, color, sex, or national origin.

## Old Time Tent Revival Town For Two Weeks

The raspy-voiced Evangelist said that he had lost his voice while serving with the Air Force on Vietnam. Before that he had been vocalist with a combo group.

Lopez said that after his discharge he started the ice cream business and had three trucks working in the Austin area. His teenage daughter was "in the wrong group" and was into drugs. Lopez, himself, was drinking, his wife was about to leave him, "My throat was going out, things were bad with my whole family, there was no peace of mind," he said.

On October 23, 1976 the family attended a revival in Austin. "That night," Lopez said, "after I felt the presence of the Lord I knew that God was going to change our lives."

"Eight months later He called me," Lopez said, and he began preaching. The group has been in Florida, Colorado and Texas. The services are in Spanish, but Lopez's wife, Ruth, translates into English. There are nine young people with the group that have been

saved at different revivals and have joined Lopez, his wife, and 10-year-old daughter, Michelle. The older daughter is "preaching the Word in Houston."

Main stay of the services is healing the sick and casting out of demons. Lopez feels that he is in hand-to-hand combat with the devil.

"We are saving souls and the devil doesn't like that," said the mild man whose hair is lightly touched with gray. He speaks with enthusiasm; the gravel-voice has an arresting quality.

"God gives us power to save souls through constant prayer and fasting," he said.

Lopez's father was a preacher in the Pentecostal Church and he encourages those in the audience to go to that church.

The Evangelistic group will be in Floydada for two weeks. "There were 110 miracles in Plainview," he said, "We could be here longer than two weeks. As long as the souls keep coming and being healed we'll stay."

## Family Argument

### Results In Shooting

A family disagreement Saturday night resulted in one man being treated for a gun shot wound and another being charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Officer Wallace Brucher answered a call at 8:18 p.m. to the northeast corner of Crockett and Third St. He found two men scuffling with a gun.

Louis Guevera, 41, had his hand on the butt of the weapon, and Martin Suarez, 23, was holding the barrel.

Officer Brucher separated the two men and found that Suarez had a bullet wound in the leg. Guevera had lacerations about the head.

Both men were taken to the hospital. Suarez had been shot in the upper left thigh. Both entry and exit wounds were clean and no bones were broken. He was treated and released.

Guevera was arrested and a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly

weapon was filed with the county attorney at approximately 10:20 p.m. He was released on a \$500 bond.

The weapon, a Ranger 22 caliber "New model single-six," belonged to Guevera.

Guevera is the father-in-law of Suarez. Both men are from Floydada.

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## Sweetwaters' Prayers Answered

This West Texas town's prayers were answered this weekend when five inches of rain relieved a critical water shortage.

"I've become a total believer. Amen," said City Manager Joe Benton as he looked out over his lawn Sunday, rain dripping from his face.

A thunderstorm pelted this Nolan County town of 12,000 Saturday night.

The rain ended a drought so severe that 500 persons had held hands, prayed and sang hymns on the grounds of the Nolan County Courthouse June 1.

The Saturday night deluge eclipsed overnight the less-than-five inches of rain that had fallen the previous six months here, bringing the annual moisture total up to nearly normal for this time of year in West Central Texas.

The Rev. Orval Brantley, a Baptist pastor who had organized the prayer service, had asked "God to give us rain in your own good time."

Bentson said it was the

biggest rainfall here in more than a year.

The city manager said "while I wasn't at the prayer service because I was out of town, I will most certainly endeavor to be present at all prayer services for rain in the future."

Public water usage had been cut back drastically because of the low water in the city's reservoirs. The rain produced at least a two-foot rise in the level at Oak Creek Lake, at least 6 inches at Lake Sweetwater and a slight rise of Lake Trammell.

Before the rain, the three lakes were holding less than 9,000 acre feet of water, compared with total capacity of 52,000 acre feet.

The rain was widespread enough to benefit other communities with acute water shortages, such as Roy, McCaulley, Sylvester and Longworth.
