Drought Reduces
Grain Crop
Sorghum Crop Prospects
The 1980 grain sorghum crop has been reduced as much as one-third by this summer's drought, reporte
Elbert Harp, executive director Grain Sorghum Producers Associamuch as fifty percent if general rains don't fall in the next two weeks throughout much of the
sorghum belt," he Harp reported a telephone survey. he conducted during the last wee
of July. "The crops are now in critical condition even where they had not suffered earlier in the year," he said. "The crops hav gone as far as they can go without
rain and they will deteriorate rapid rain and they wild deteriorate rapid
ly from this point. Even irrigated crops have suffered from the exHarp fo
is beyond the point of return crop areas are being baled as hay chopped as ensilage, or grazed out. These areas include a region west
and south of San Antonio and another strip through North Texas, Oklahoma, Southeastern Kansas and Missouri.
The irrigated crops of the Texas
High Plains and Western Kansas are fair, but need supplemental rain and cooler weather. Western Kan sas is spotted with much of the crop
still in fair condition, provided rains still in fary soon. The same is true of
Nebraska.
Most of South Texas and South Central Texas sorghum mature Harvest there produced fair-to-good
yields.
The drought is already affecting tave strengthened prices to the "call level" for sorghum in the reserve program. On July 25 , the last of the reserve sorghum was 80 million bushels of sorghum will be forced into the market within 90 days following the cail. If the market continues to streng. Then, over a billion bushels of reserve corn will be dropped into considering a plan to raise the call levels.) The "called" rain will tend to hold a ceiling on prices-at least temporarily.

## Soybean Prices

Could Rise
With soybean acreage down in both Texas and the U.S. and drouth conditions threatening the existing
crop, prices could gather strength later in the season.
Texas farmers planted only
625,000 625,000 acres of soybeans this spring compared to 860,000 last year, points out Johnny Feagan
economist with the Texas Agricul tural Extension Service, Texa A\&M University System. About ed, and that total could drop if drouth conditions persist in coasta and eastern areas.
Nationwide, some 70.3 million year, down almost a million this year, down armost a million acre
from earlier estimates due to less-than-promising price outlook. Feagan expects soybean prices to average about $\$ 6.25$ to $\$ 6.75$ per
bushel this fall, with oil going fo about 24 to 28 cents a pound and meal prices averaging $\$ 185$ to $\$ 200$ per ton. However, he points out that soybeans and that a short crop du to weather conditions could boost
prices considerably.

masses covered by a whitish, vel vety material on both the top and bottom of leaves. Newly hatched worms feed together but eventually disperse to surrounding plants. rather than chewing large holes in feed. Beet armyworms will also Infestations are usually spotty with. in a field so careful scouting is needed to determine the need for control measures. Worms over $1 / 4$
inch are difficult to control. inch are difficult to control.
Cabbage looper eggs are laid singly, usually on the lower surface of leaves. Eggs are similiar in appearance to bollworm eggs but
finely ribbed and do not turn brow before hatching. When feeding large holes in the leaves. green, obiong objects that you have actually cocoons of a parasitic wasp that has developed within the worm. Loopers with these parasites
attached are in a weakened condition and will eventually die. Well-defined economic thresholds do not exist for these pests in our area. While treatment for lea
feeding of worms is seldom econom ically justifiable we cannot use the word never.
