Insect Workshop **To Be Held**

The Floyd County Extension Service is sponsoring a crop insect scouting workshop for all interested producers in Floyd County. The workshop will be held from 1:30-4:00 on Friday afternoon, August 22, at the Lockney High School Vocational Agriculture Building.

The workshop will focus on training producers how to identify and scout fields for both beneficial and problem insects in corn, grain, sorghum and cotton. The session will begin with a short slide presentation at the Agriculture Building, after which the group will proceed out to the county where producers will learn and actually practice the scouting procedures discussed.


There will be no charge for this workshop which will be conducted by Paul Treptow, County Extension Entomologist for Crosby and Floyd Counties. With insect activity nearing its peak in Floyd County, all producers are encouraged to attend this insect scouting workshop.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Drought Reduces

Grain Crop

Sorghum Crop Prospects The 1980 grain sorghum crop has been reduced as much as one-third by this summer's drought, reported Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association. "The crop could be off as much as fifty percent if general rains don't fall in the next two weeks throughout much of the sorghum belt," he said. Harp reported a telephone survey he conducted during the last week of July. "The crops are now in critical condition even where they had not suffered earlier in the year," he said. "The crops have gone as far as they can go without rain and they will deteriorate rapidly from this point. Even irrigated crops have suffered from the extreme heat." Harp found that much of the crop is beyond the point of return. Large areas are being baled as hay, chopped as ensilage, or grazed out. These areas include a region west and south of San Antonio, Texas and another strip through North Texas, Oklahoma, Southeastern Kansas and Missouri. The irrigated crops of the Texas High Plains and Western Kansas are fair, but need supplemental rain and cooler weather. Western Kansas is spotted with much of the crop still in fair condition, provided rains fall very soon. The same is true of Nebraska.

New weapons in the war against an old foe of the farmer--weeds--will be examined during the 71st annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock and Halfway.

This year's program will be from 12:30 to 5 p.m. Tuesday, September 9, at the Halfway research site, 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70.

The report on weed control will be one of four major stops during tours of the test plots and facilities, said Dr. Douglas F. Owen, research scientist at the staion and field day chairman.

At the stop, Dr. John Abernathy, TAES weed research scientist, will present the latest information on new application systems and new chemicals for combatting weeds. He also will present results of research at Lubbock and Halfway to help area farmers combat perennial and annual weeds.

'There are many different types of new application systems for herbicides," Abernathy said. Among those to be demonstrated and discussed are various rope and

Most of South Texas and South Central Texas sorghum matured before the onset of the heat wave. Harvest there produced fair-to-good yields.

The drought is already affecting market prices. Short crop prospects have strengthened prices to the 'call level' for sorghum in the reserve program. On July 25, the last of the reserve sorghum was called. This means that more than 80 million bushels of sorghum will be forced into the market within 90 days following the call.

If the market continues to strengthen, reserve corn will be called. Then, over a billion bushels of reserve corn will be dropped into the market. (USDA is presently considering a plan to raise the call levels.) The "called" grain will tend to hold a ceiling on prices-at least temporarily.

The extent of damage to the corn crop will ultimately determine the price of both corn and sorghum. Some analysts are now predicting the 1980 corn crop to be 6.4 billion bushels or less. If the corn crop drops below this level, all reserve stocks will be absorbed and both corn and sorghum prices will remain strong throughout the coming vear.

COTTON

Moderate to high bollworm egg laying activity is continuing in many fields in Crosby and Floyd County. Most activity can be found in fields that have been recently irrigated. Higher activity continues to be found in Floyd County. Egg counts of from 12 to 133 per 100 plants have been reported in the last several days. Bollworm counts of less than 10 per 100 plants in fields checked indicate worm numbers to be low at this time however hot spots do exist. High egg counts recorded last week have not materialized into treatable worm num-

bers. In Crosby County a moderate egg lay is being seen in irrigated fields. Egg numbers of 14 to 36 and worm counts of 3 to 7 per 100 plants are being reported. Beneficial numbers are increas-

ing rapidly in many fields. Hardly noticeable to those not used to looking for them, the minute pirate bug is one of our better small worm and egg predators. High numbers of spiders and lacewing fly larvae can be found in many field.

Unfortunately some fields have extremely low beneficial populations.

INSECT OUTLOOK

I guess you could call 1980 the year of the worm. In addition to bollworms we have present in cotton fields the beet armyworm, cabbage looper, yellow-striped armyworm and even a few fall armyworms and cotton square borers.

Beet armyworm eggs are laid in masses covered by a whitish, velvety material on both the top and bottom of leaves. Newly hatched worms feed together but eventually disperse to surrounding plants. These worms skeletonize the leaves rather than chewing large holes in them. Beet armyworms will also feed on squares, blooms and bolls. Infestations are usually spotty within a field so careful scouting is needed to determine the need for control measures. Worms over 1/4 inch are difficult to control.

Cabbage looper eggs are laid singly, usually on the lower surface of leaves. Eggs are similiar in appearance to bollworm eggs but looper eggs are more flattened,

finely ribbed and do not turn brown before hatching. When feeding these worms cause leaf ragging and large holes in the leaves. Small green, oblong objects that you have noticed associated with loopers are actually cocoons of a parasitic wasp that has developed within the worm. Loopers with these parasites attached are in a weakened condition and will eventually die.

Well-defined economic thresholds do not exist for these pests in our area. While treatment for leaf feeding of worms is seldom economically justifiable we cannot use the word never. SORGHUM

Problems with mites, greenbugs and headworms continue in sorghum. Parasitic wasp activity is beginning to build up on greenbugs in some areas. Fall armyworms which were present two weeks ago in sorghum heads are now being replaced by corn earworms (bollworms). Mites have built rapidly in some sorghum fields. Treatment of fields for mites nearing the hard dough stage may not be necessary.

Most areas of the county received some rainfall this past week. The northernmost part of the county had around 1/2 inch in spots on Tuesday night.

The worms are doing great. One farmer is trying to hire an entire fleet of airplanes to fly on chemical on his cotton. He swears that one plane will not be able to keep up with the worms.

There should be a little corn cut within the next week if no more rain falls. Some tested around 28% on Wednesday of this week.

Ground is being plowed getting ready for planting wheat.

Cotton futures were up the limit on Wednesday. Contracts were being offered at 2700 points over the 1980 loan.

Soybean Prices


Could Rise

With soybean acreage down in both Texas and the U.S. and drouth conditions threatening the existing crop, prices could gather strength later in the season.

Texas farmers planted only 625,000 acres of soybeans this spring compared to 860,000 last year, points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. About 585,000 acres will likely be harvested, and that total could drop if drouth conditions persist in coastal and eastern areas.

Nationwide, some 70.3 million acres of soybeans were planted this year, down almost a million acres from earlier estimates due to a

less-than-promising price outlook. Feagan expects soybean prices to average about \$6.25 to \$6.75 per bushel this fall, with oil going for about 24 to 28 cents a pound and meal prices averaging \$185 to \$200 per ton. However, he points out that August is a critical month for soybeans and that a short crop due to weather conditions could boost prices considerably.

With each renewal, the premium will go up slightly. Renewal term policies can be renewed without a medical examination or meeting any medical standards. Convertible term policies can be converted to policies which will accumulate cash value, also without medical restrictions. A person interested only in pure protection with no savings element will find the renewable or convertible (in case you change your mind about saving) term policy suits their needs very well.



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
