## **Statewide Club Steer Evaluation** Clinic

The Statewide Club Steer Evaluation Clinic will be held November 5 and 6, at the San Angelo Fairgrounds. The event is hosted by the West Central District of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and is open to anyone in the United States.

On November 5th the clinic will begin with a fitting and dress demonstration by county agents and adult leaders from over Texas on how to fit and dress steers for show. Following this a showing of these steers in three separate classes will be held. Steers will be purchased from the New Mexico State Fair.

The audience and participants will have a chance to place the steers along with the steer judges for Fort Worth, San Antonio and Houston, Texas. Following the placing and showing, Dr. Frank Orts, Extension Meat Specialist at Texas A&M University, will operate a scan-a-gram to determine ribeye area and fat thickness on the live steers. Then the steers will be taken to a packing house to be slaughtered. The following morning the steers will be viewed by participants and judges of the clinic to determine carcass evaluation versus live placing.

Educational meetings will be held during the afternoon with discussion topics such as "Selection of Show Steers" or "Who can find the line of Friday, October 10, 1980.

sleeper in buving young show steers." County extension agents and leaders will present a show-manship clinic. Dr. John McNeil, Beef Cattle Specialist from Amarillo, will present a program on what to feed show steers.

Following the educational events a panel discussion will be held of the classes by the steer judges who will be judging the Fort Worth, San Angelo, and Houston Stock Show. An open discussion by agents, leaders, and club steer enthusiasts will conclude the opening day program.

The morning of November 6, a video tape of the carcass information will be shown to all of the participants as well as live evaluation information from the previous day. The morning will conclude with an open discussion by stock show officials.

In addition, approximately 20 bull consignors from all across the United States will be in attendance. These consignors will have their bulls on exhibit during the two day event for everyone to view and visit with the breeders. In addition, the consignors will have a part on the program during the clinic to tell about their breeding practice.

### **Far East Textile Leaders To Study Cotton Production**

Twenty-one textile leaders representing 10 Far Eastern countries which in 1978-79 bought over four million bales of U.S. cotton will be in Lubbock October 17 and 18 to study High Plains cotton production, processing, merchandising and research facilities. Officials of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock based cotton producer organization, point out that the 10 countries accounted for almost 70 percent of all U.S. cotton exports in 1978-79, and estimates that well over two million bales of their purchases were of cotton stapling one inch or below, largely from the High and Rolling Plains of Texas and Oklahoma. PCG is coordinating the foreigners' activities for the two-day Lubbock visit, which is a part of the annual U.S. Cotton Orientation Tour sponsored by Cotton Council International, National Cotton Council, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agricultural Service and local hosts. Joining PCG as hosts in Lubbock will be the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Cooperative Association.

## **ASC To Hold Election**

**Community Committee Election:** The ASC Election of Community Committeemen will be held on December 8. 1980. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters about November 20 and the ballots must be returned to the ASCS Office by December 1. Any person who is of legal voting age and has an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or sharecropper, or is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations on an entire farm is eligible to vote in the election. Both husband and wife are eligible to vote.

Failed Acreage: If you have cotton. corn or grain sorghum which will not be harvested because of drought, contact this office and file a low yield application before any use is made of the crop. Corn and grain sorghum must be appraised before grazing, baling or cut for silage.

If your crop is carried through harest and the yield is low, you have only 15 days from the date of harvest on that farm to file your application for disaster. Additional time will be allowed to bring in production records after filing your application.

1981 Wheat Program: Cross Compliance and Off-Setting Compliance are back with you for 1981. The cross and off-setting rules are about the same as they were in 1979. That is as follows: Cross Compliance means that producers with a farm that has wheat

planted on it must make sure that the total planting of NCA crops on that farm does not exceed the NCA for the farm

Off-Setting Compliance means that in addition to planting within the NCA on a participating wheat farm, an own er or operator must make certain that the NCA is not exceeded on any other farm with wheat planted which they own or operate.

More about 1981 Wheat Program: a. No set-aside required.

b. Participating farm must have plantings within the farm's NCA.

c. There is possibility of having a having and grazing program. It will be considered later.

d. Loan rate will not be less than \$3.00 per bushel and target at least \$3.81 per bushel.

e. The secretary (based on supply situation) will consider a paid diversion later in the crop season.

f. Disaster Program - none on books for 1981 at this time. Legislation is now pending that would make ASCS Disaster Program an option for 1981.

g. Payment Limitation - \$50,000.00 limit for the total deficiency and voluntary diversion payments to any one producer in the wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, and rice programs,

Easily adapted to meet size needs, kitchen storage is as close at hand as the wall space below the upper kitchen cabinets and as accessible as pulling on the swing-down doors. Cut 3/4" plywood for the top, back and bottom to the full length of the upper cabinets less 3". Using butt joints, fasten the top, back and bottom together. Cut two pieces to fit over each end to give you a three-sided, close ended rectangular box. To section storage areas, cut inside dividers 3/4" less than the depth of the cabinets, leaving room for doors and trim. Cut facing strips out of a 1x2 and nail at both ends and the center. Fasten the box to the wall by screwing into the wall studs. Cut two doors out of 3/4" plywood measuring from each end to the center. Attach the doors with butt hinges on the bottom. Cut 4 chains for retainers to allow the doors to open horizontally to the unit.







If you've ever watched a filming you know it's like the races, alot of waiting and getting set up, and then the big stuff is over in just a few minutes. I had a chance to talk to Greg Mulavey and get a picture. He's a very nice fellow too. went out of his way to tell Bill Catching I was there and the interview was set up.

After the supper break, Billy and I were taken to the motor home and ushered inside. There was a large bowl of fresh fruit, covered in saran wrap, on the table. The interior was well used, not luxurious, but most comfortable and best of all AIR CONDITIONED.

Dennis Weaver was sitting on the divan playing a guitar. He put it aside and stood to greet us and shake hands. He looked just like he always did. Bit of grey at the temples, a few smile wrinkles around the eyes, face brown with make-up and the same steady McCloud gaze. First we talked about Texas, yes, he's been in the state many times, four times on location, but this is his first time in

Del Rio. Yes, he likes Del Rio especially the fact that there is a 'tremendous health food store right across the street from the motel.

My line of ready questions centered around vacations and travel and he blew the whole thing by saying that he doesn't take vacations since he does so much traveling on location. "I'm really a home body," he said.

I'm now staring at him blankly, trying to think of a question. "We did take a trip to Hawaii this year." he comments helpfully, "and we have a place at Lak Arrowhead where we swim and do some fishing.

l asked about his guitar playing. He really warms up to this subject. "My hobby, the one I enjoy most, is writing songs." What kind of songs?

"About things that mean alot to me."

Like what?

"I write songs for my wife, for anniversaries, birthdays." He also writes songs about ecology. One is called "Where have the Wild Blueberries Gone." He laughs, "And I write about bulldozers and freeways." He has made three albums, 'but they haven't been distributed very well in the United States. I have about 30 albums at home if anyone wants to ...

I'm having a great time at this point, he is so easy to talk to, but I have to think up another question. I share the amateur interviewers feeling of not really wanting to pry.

"Is this unusually hot weather affecting the filming?" I ask. "'Yes, it is," he replies, "those large metal reflectors

Now, I look hopefully at Billy, does he have a question? "When the McCloud series was dropped, what difference did it make in your life?" he asks. Dennis Weaver laughs, "very good question," he says and then turning to me, "you better give him the pencil and paper." I smile proudly.

Dennis tells us that it did make a difference, but that he had been very fortunate to have film offers right away.

'Have you ever done plays?'' I ask, "Not since 1966," he answers. "I'd much rather do movies, it's closer, more intimate, the camera comes right up to your face, you can't get that same feeling from the stage.

The interview was at an end. I asked if we could have our picture taken together for my office and he graciously assented. We went outside, one of the cast members took my camera and directed us to stand over in the shade.

Dennis is as tall as he looks in films, over 6 feet. We stood together and he put his arm around me. That's Hollywood style folks, they shake hands with the men and put their arms around the ladies.

There we stood waiting while the other man adjusted the camera. Ever stood like that before? Waiting for the picture to be taken? With Dennis Weaver's arm around you, Ladies? This was the time for a clever remark, and what did I do? Right, I giggled. "Hope I'm not getting you dusty," he said gallantly. "Oh, no," I thrilled, giggling again.
