
Robinson to preach at services

Darrell W. Robinson, 45, will be the preacher for the revival services at First Baptist Church of Floydada, October 12-19. He is pastor of the First Baptist Church in Pasadena, Texas.

A native of Big Spring, Robinson has been pastoring since the age of 18. He began pastoring at Lakeview Baptist near Stanton, held student pastorates while in college and seminary, and since then has pastored in Big Spring, Amarillo, Liberal, Kansas, and Vernon. He has been in Pasadena since 1973.

Since Robinson's going to Pasadena, the church membership has increased from 2,372 to more than 6,600, and Sunday School attendance has grown from 700 to 2,200. Hundreds of members have been equipped to share Christ personal witness. Personal winning by lay people is a strength of the church. The church budget has grown from \$250,000 annually to more than \$2 million. In mission giving in Texas, the church has moved from 51st place among Southern Baptist churches to third place .. Robinson is a graduate of Howard County Junior College, Baylor University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He has been very active in denominational service on both the associational and state level. He is also the author of three books. He and his wife, Kathleen, have four children. Dr. Floyd C. Bradley, pastor, has issued an invitation to the entire community to participate in the revival services. They begin Sunday at 7 p.m., and then continue Monday through Friday at 7:30 p.m. The final service will be Sunday morning, October 19, at 11 a.m. Noon services will be held Tuesday through Friday followed by a meal.

Several special activities are scheduled during the week. On Monday night, there will be a Battle of the Banners involving all Sunday School departments. Department members will sit together at the beginning of the service, and the department with the largest number present, and the highest percentage of enrollment present will be recognized. Visitors will be counted, so departmental directors are being encouraged to bring as many visitors as possible



There will be a youth hamburger supper on Tuesday night, a hot dog supper for grades 4 through 6 on Thursday night, and a senior citizens old-fashioned pie supper on Friday night. All evening services and the morning service will be televised on Cable Channel 2.

Are you tired? Depressed? Listless? Do you feel nobody really appreciates you?

Thirty-three of the businesses said that the skill level they employ at their Well, somebody does! And to prove

they are a public business.

To Questionaire said tha city is a tax burden and three believe that state taxes burden them. When asked, "If taxes were cut back, what service (s) would you be willing to give up?", the businessmen answered welfare programs, federal and state government programs, doing away with the city owned power plant and the school lunch program.

HOUSING

The businessmen of the community voiced the same concern over the housing situation as the citizens did when they responded that housing is needed to attract new business/industry. Ninteen said housing could make a difference and of those 19, seven would like more privately owned housing to be available and 16 want more rental property.

Twleve merchants believe that the appearance of the community needs to be improved to attract more people to Floydada and six see a need for more available labor force and community services. There are five businessmen who believe that nothing needs to be improved or changed in the community to attract new businesse/industry.

"I think especially the downtown and square area needs a facelift. This might help to attract industry and give the city a better general appearance," commented one businessman.

"I think housing is a serious problem. It also keeps new people from coming in. You can't usually find a house or an apartment, without looking for a while or having to "make do."

"Appearance is also a factor. The only good'first impression' you get, is when you come in from Ralls. All others have junky buildings and other stuff." wrote another.

"We need a builder who will build tract type homes in the \$30,000 to \$50,000 range. Housing for teachers and others who would buy in this price range is virtually nonexistent.

"Need more apartment type rentals for middle income families. Close to schools for convenience of working parents. "This possible would attract young families to move into our community without having to live in low rental houses or buy expensive new homes." One businessman believes that there is a need for more leisure time activites to appeal to the families of the business community. Twelve businessmen responded that they have plans to expand their firms in the next two years, two said they are planning cutbacks and 21 businesses plan to remain operating as they are at the present.

"Is your turnover high at any of these skill levels?" Yes, responded nine employeers and the level that the turnover is the highest is with unskilled and semi-skilled help. Twenty-six businessmen responded that they do not have a high rate of employee turnover.

SALARIES

In response to the question of salaries that employees are paid at the various skill levels, the survey showed that of the 12 businesses that employ unskilled workers, four pay a salary of \$3.15 to \$5. per hour and one pays \$5.01 to \$10. an hour.

Of the businesses that employ semiskilled workers, eight pay their employees \$3.15 to \$5. an hour, two pay \$5.01 or \$10. an hour and one pays \$9,000. a vear.

Salaries for workers at the skilled level started with five firms who pay \$3.15 to \$5. an hour, four pay \$5.01 to \$10. an hour and 10 pay \$9,000. a year for skilled help.

Thirty-four of the employers believe that their employees are productive in light of what they are paid and five responded that they do not believe their employees are productive enough.

Fourteen businessmen responded that adaquate help is availiable to work in their type businesses, but 24 said that there is a shortage of help available for the type of businesses that they have.

The type of workers in short supply for 12 business are in skilled level.

JOB TRAINING

When asked if they were willing to train people to obtain the skills that are needed in their business, 35 answered ves and six said no.

Twenty-seven businesses said that they already have a training program available for employees that may not have the needed job skills and 14 said

they do not provide job training. "In light of the current energy situa-

tion, are services provided by the city/ county/ or private concerns reasonably priced?" Yes answered 25 businessmen with 15 replying no.

When asked if they have utility problems 25 said no and 17 said yes. Thirty responded that if they have had problems they are taken care of quickly and efficiently.

TAXES

The survey then asked the businessmen to look at taxes. "Do taxes at the city, school, county, state or federal level put an undue burden on your business compared to other cities this size? If so which one?" Fourteen people believe that they are not under any tax burden.

Of those who responded that they believe that taxes are a burden, the only area that received no response was the county. Seven believe that taxes are too high on the federal level, five believe school taxes are too high, four

INDUSTRY

When asked, "Do you feel that your city needs an Industrial Foundation?" 22 merchants said yes, 15 replied no and five did not respond.

"What should an Industrial Foundation be doing?" Actively seeking new industry and funds and helping with acquiring additional water supply, came the responses.

Seventeen said that they would be willing to donate money to help create/ reactivate an Industrial Foundation while 19 said they would not be willing to give money.

Comments concerning the Industrial Foundation included:

"Yes, the city needs an Industrial Foundation that is actively seeking grants and possible new businesses." "Actively solicit new industry and ag gressively develop and expand business already here.

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"Need more industrial type businesses to promote new people to the city." "What should an industrial foundation be doing? I don't know, but Don Hardy's business is one of the few that wouldn't shut down if something happened to the farming businesses. "It should be working toward obtain-

ing new industry."

"We had one at one time and it didn't seem to get alot done."

Chamber of Commerce

"Is the Chamber of Commerce any help to you?" No, responded 24 businessmen, yes answered 14.

The activities that the merchants would like to see the Chamber involved with include promoting the city, recruiting new industry, more community involvement, help existing businesses with promotion, and working on a downtown renovation program.

Following are some of the businessmens comments concerning the C of C. 'We have never needed them but nice to know they are there."

Yes, Chamber does a good job." Yes, they need to be involved in bringing new businesses to town. improving housing and improve appearance of this town.

'Yes, activities that they need to be involved with are retail sales promotion and downtown modernization.

Is the Chamber of any help to you? "not that I am aware of."

"Very little. Obtaining new industry."

Rainfall amounts ranging from 2.5 to 4.5 inches were reported over most of Floyd County late last week and an additional two inches fell in the northwestern portion of the county early this week. Although the rainfall hampered harvest operations in the area, it was generally well received by all producers, especially those that have, or are sowing, wheat this fall. Rains have also stimulated growth in droughtstricken pastures causing grasses to finally turn a healthier green color.

Desiccation of cotton has, however, been made more difficult by the rainfall because of the harder-to-kill regrowth it has generated. Those fields that had been desiccated prior to the rainfall have also suffered some reduction in

Election Nearing

The ASC Community Committee election this year will be held on December 1, 1980. Ballots will be * mailed to voters about 10 days before the election. The voted ballots must be mailed or returned in person not later than December 1.

The ASC communities in the county are known as A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, and I. You will be sent a ballot for the community in which your principal farming interest is located.

A slate of at least six nominees will be developed for the community. This letter informs you of the right to nominate candidates by petition. A blank petition suitable for this purpose is printed on the back of this letter. If you need additional petitions, you may copy this one or you can obtain more copies at the county ASCS office. Each petition submitted must be:

1. Limited to one nominee. 2. Signed by at least three eligible


voters in the community. 3. Include a certification that the

nominee is willing to serve if elected. 4. Received at the county ASCS office not later than October 27

If six or more eligible candidates are nominated by proper petition, no further nominations will be made. If less than six are nominated by petition, the present community committee will add the number of nominees needed to complete the slate of six. A person who is nominated by petition found ineligible will be so notified and given 7 days in which to appeal.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. In general, a farmer is eligible to be a community committee member if the farmer lives in the community in which he/she is eligible to vote. The duties of community committee members include:

1. Informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of the ASCS programs. Keeping the county committee

Winter Stocker Cattle-**Are They Profitable?**

Whether or not producers can make money from stocker cattle this winter depends largely on how well they buy and sell the animals as well as their rate of gain.

Yet, to make sound management decisions, stocker cattle operators must know what they're up against, and that means developing a budget, points out Norman Brints of Vernon, area economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Brints provides some estimates of variable cost for budgeting purposes which total \$400.50 a head. These are based on grazing of wheat pasture at 25 cents per head per day, a stocking rate of two acres per head, 130 days of grazing, a 3 percent death loss and stockers grading high good. His costs include the following for a 400-pound steer: steer cost, \$320; death loss, \$9.60; wheat pasture, \$32.50; hay, \$12; medicine and veterinary costs, \$3; salt and minerals, 56 cents; miscellaneous expenses, \$2; hauling and marketing, \$5; and interest, \$15.84.

Based on these expenses (not including labor or a pickup), the economist lists the following breakeven prices per hundred pounds depending on the rate of gain per day for the 130-day grazing period: \$75.56 with a 1-pound gain; \$71.26 with a 1-1/4-pound gain; \$67.31 with a 1-1/2-pound gain; \$63.87 with a 1-3/4-pound gain; and \$60.68 with a 2pound gain.

By using a breakeven price, a producer can determine the price he must receive to at least get his operating money back, notes Brints. As the rate of gain increases, the breakeven price drops.

Producers can boost the gate of gain or the stocking rate through a supplemental feed program, adds Brints. Of course, the economics of such a program depend on the price of cattle in relation to the price of feed and the amount of additional gain. Usually a high energy supplement fed at the rate of 1 percent of body weight will increase gain per had by about 1/2-pound per day. If supplement costs \$150 per ton, the cost per pound of gain would be 75 cents if 5 pounds of feed is fed per

head per day

As production costs continue to increase, stocker producers need to consider several factors in making sound management decisions. Excluding the calf purchase price, interest rate and cost of pasture are the two key factors that influence producers' decisions for a given grazing situation, believes Brints. However, some of these factors have a greater effect on breakeven price than others.

Based on these factors, the economist offers several examples with regard to the variable costs mentioned earlier and a rate of gain of 1-1/2 pounds per head per day to increase the breakeven price by one cent per pound:

--interest rate must increase by 5 percent

-pasture cost must increase by \$3 per acre.

--cost of pasture paid on an in-weight basis must increase by 35 cents per hundredweight per month.

Having a good handle on operating costs and how they affect profitability is a key to a successful stocker cattle operation, contends Brints,

Taylor re-elected to board

Junior Taylor was re-elected to the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation Board Tuesday night. The election was held at Producers Elevator in Cedar Hill at 8 p.m. Taylor will represent zone 2 for the next five years, zone 2 is the northeast part of Floyd County.

Taylor was appointed to the Board in the spring of 1978 to fill the unexpired term of the late Gerald Lackey for zone 3. Taylor served as director for zone 2. At that time, zone boundaries were changed and were approved by the State Soil and Water Conservation Board and Taylor was appointed as director to fill Purcell's unexpired term for zone 2.

The board of directors then appointed Leslie Nixon Jr. as director for zone 3. Zone 3 consists of an area bounded by the Cedar Hill highway on the north, Matador highway on the south and the west boundary is the Silverton highway.

The purpose of the Floyd County SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has the authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

In Texas there are 200 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

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
Coach's Comments

"Thunderbirds" To **Appear In Lubbock**

Plans continue to be made for the 1980 aerial demonstration by the U.S. Air Force 'Thunderbirds'' October 12 at Reese Air Force Base. Gates to the base will open at p.m. with pre-show activities beginning at 2:30. Letters of invitations have been sent to area school superintendents and some local churches inviting them to bring buses full of people from their organization to the base for the event. Air Show planners stated that those groups bringing buses wouldn't find themselves in a traffic jam before and after the show like they would if

they came by car. The Thunderbird activities will begin with a precisely choregraphed launch ceremony. Once airborne, the team will perform for 30 minutes demonstrating complete rolls, loops, dives and fly through and under other formations. This, combined with a sharp appearance, descriptive narration, vivid paint schemes and trailing smoke transforms an ordi-

nary flight exhibition into an exhilarating Thunderbird aerial ballet.

Such precision cannot be accomplished by the daredevil or stunt flier. It comes from hours of practice, discipline and sacrifice. Today's airspace is rigidly controlled and monitored with sophisticated computers and radar tracking equipment. Strict regulations are enforced, with the safety of the spectators and crews of prime consideration. The aerial demonstrations performed by the team are variations of maneuvers which have proven to be successful in actual combat situations. Every U.S. Air Force pilot has been taught variations of these

same aerial combat tactics. Everyone is invited to attend the show. Schools, churches or civic groups desiring to bring a bus are welcomed to do so. 
Dean's List




