Floydada Nursing Home Happenings

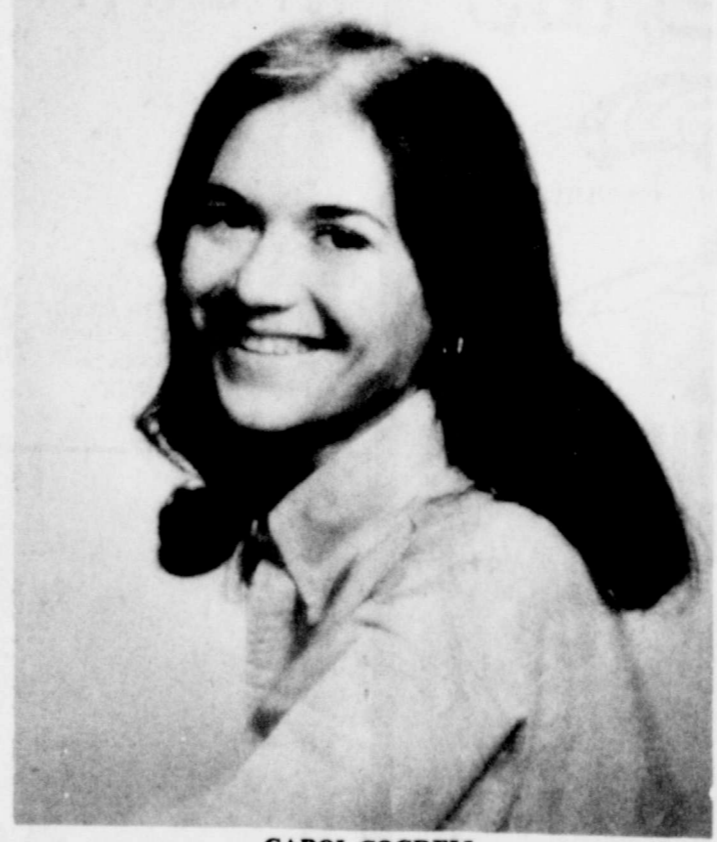

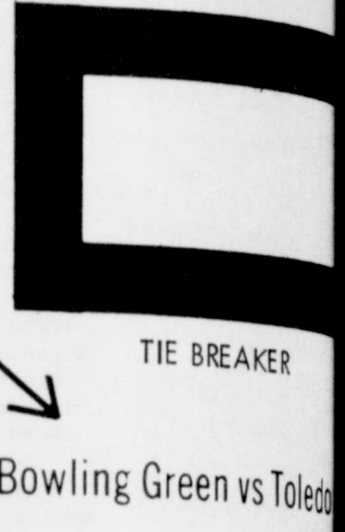

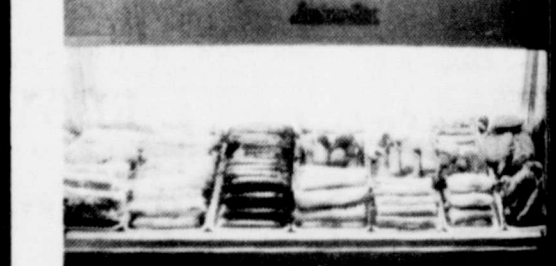

Plans continue to be made for the 1980 aerial demonstration by the U.S. Air Force "Thunderbirds" October 12 at Reese Air Force Base. Gates to the base will open at 1 p.m. with pre-show activities beginning at 2:30.

Letters of invitations have been sent to area school superintendents and some local churches inviting them to bring buses full of people from their organization to the base for the event. Air Show planners stated that those groups bringing buses wouldn't find themselves in a traffic jam before and after the show like they would if they came by car.

The Thunderbird activities will begin with a precisely choreographed launch ceremony. Once airborne, the team will perform for 30 minutes demonstrating complete rolls, loops, dives and fly through and under other formations. This, combined with a sharp appearance, descriptive narration, vivid paint schemes and trailing smoke transforms an ordinary flight exhibition into an exhilarating Thunderbird aerial ballet.

Such precision cannot be accomplished by the daredevil or stunt flier. It comes from hours of practice, discipline and sacrifice. Today's airspace is rigidly controlled and monitored with sophisticated computers and radar tracking equipment. Strict regulations are enforced, with the safety of the spectators and crews of prime consideration. The aerial demonstrations performed by the team are variations of maneuvers which have proven to be successful in actual combat situations. Every U.S. Air Force pilot has been taught variations of these same aerial combat tactics.

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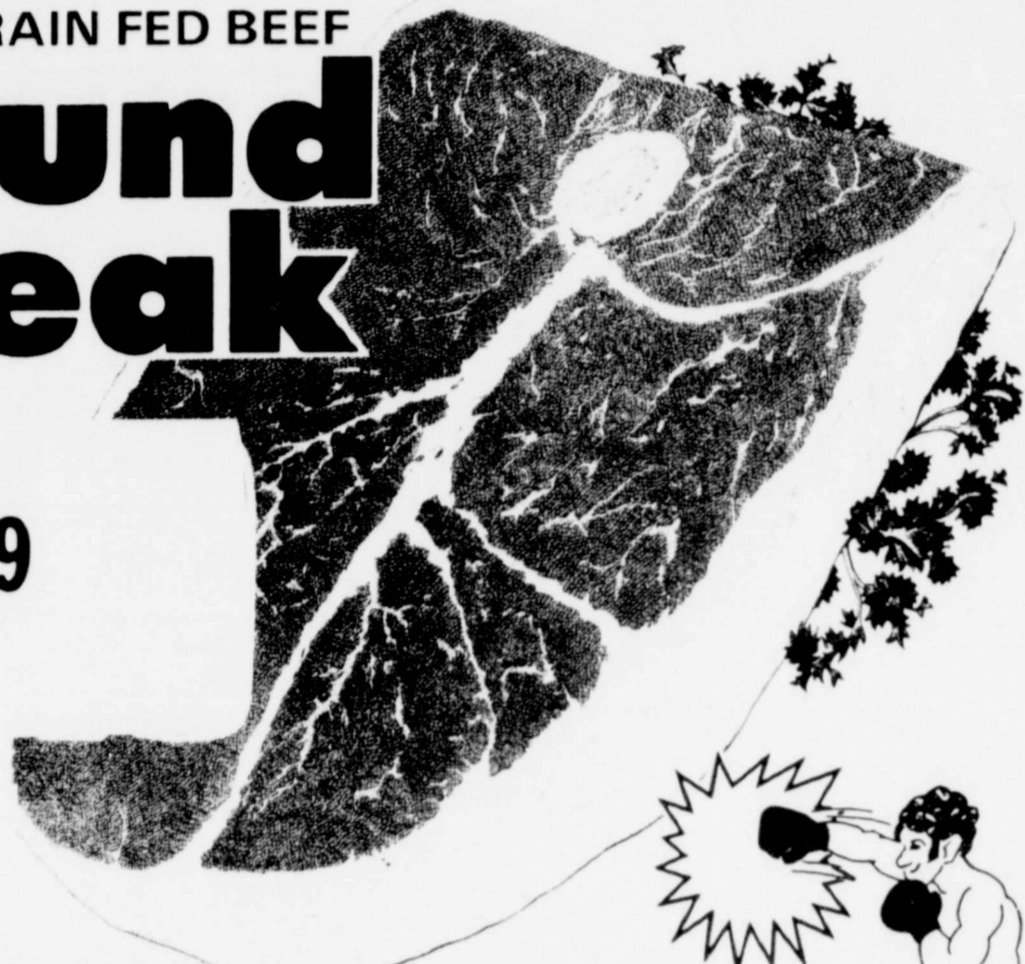

The rain, slow, gentle, soaking, measured 3 1/2 inches in our community last week. What's the weather for this fall? Well, from the museum column in the Ford County News at Crowell is an old German weather observation:

"An old Coryell County farmer, Arthur Krause, whose parents came to Texas from Germany in the 1880's, had a formula whereby he could tell if his parched tinner-dry land was due to three more months of drought.

A legacy left by his parents was the old family weather lore, the traditions and beliefs that often defy scientific explanation. Sometimes scoffed at, many of them have an amazing high

percentage of reliability. The accuracy of the "weather man" is a simple formula. Parents taught him: "How close the Ember Days on those days four times a year, almost invariably how it will do the next days, Krause believed.

The derivation of term, "ember," is obscure but one theory is that comes from the old Saxon "Ymbren" or "son." They were a time fasting and prayer, a time thanking God for the gift of nature. For centuries the Roman Catholic Ember Days were uncertain, but 1095 specific dates were designated and would fall these days:

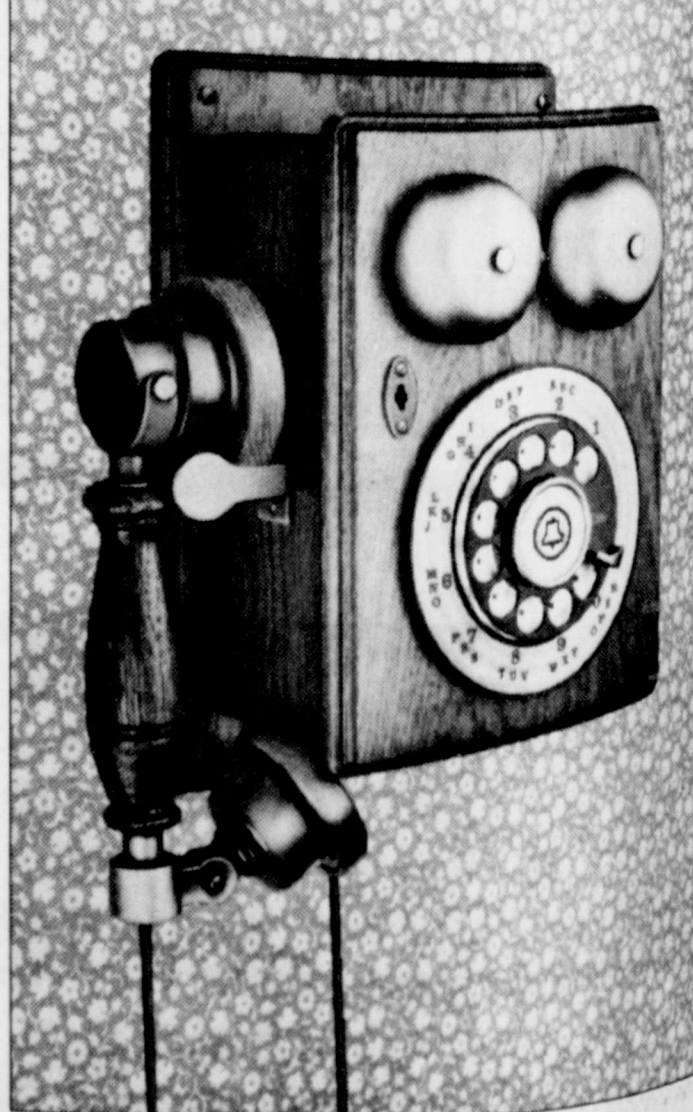
First Wednesday, Friday and Saturday after the Sunday in Lent (February); Whitsunday or Pentecost (May); Exaltation of the Cross Day (September); St. Lucius Day (December); Spring Ember Days (May 28, 30 and 31).

The next Ember Days this year were September 24, 26 and 27.

Upcoming Ember Days are December 17, 19, 21.

If Mr. Krause's formula is true, then we base the next three months weather on Homecoming weekend, when we get 3 1/2 inch rain. Good for wheat and grass, but not cotton. You might clip ancient prediction and it's true.

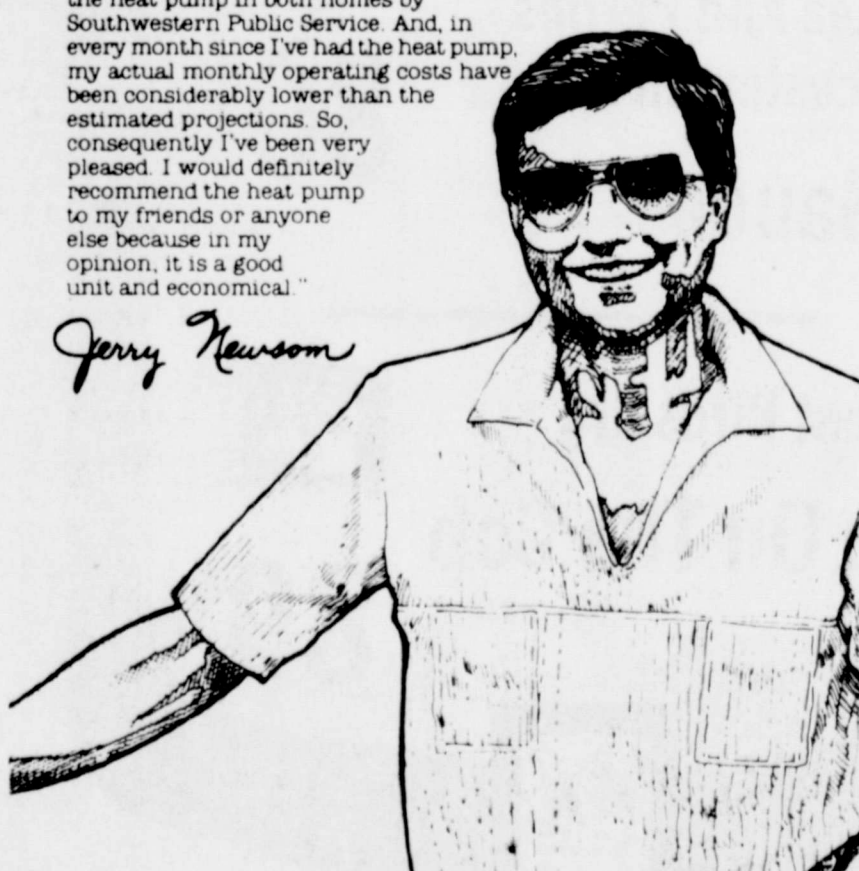

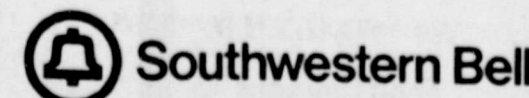
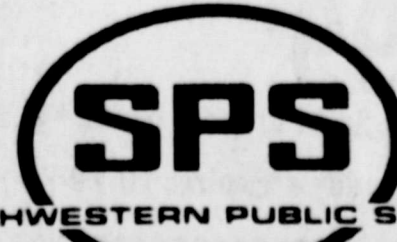
