Presidential race tops general election

From Alaska to Texas and from New York to California, millions of United States voters will visit the polling sites next Tuesday, November 4, to elect a president to serve the nation for four

Four presidential-vice presidential candidates are listed on the ballot.

One glaring error is that Anderson has chosen Patrick J. Lucy as his running mate. However, Milton S. Eisenhower was registered as the candidate, and his name appears on the ballot instead of Lucy's.

Since there are no local races this year, voter turnout is expected to be normal for a presidential election in Floyd County.

Absentee voting is expected to be about 100 when the County Clerks office closes at 5 p.m. Friday, October 31. That is the final hour on absentee voting there. Mail ballots must be postmarked no later than midnight Friday and must be received by the County Clerk no later than 1 p.m. on election day.

Straw votes taken at local service organization meetings, schools and general tallys show Ronald Reagan to be ahead of President Jimmy Carter in Floyd County.

Election watchers have predicted that the South Plains will vote Republican on the national level. The metropolitan areas of Texas still seem to be Democratic strong holds.

Whether the debate sponsored by the League of Women Voters Tuesday night will make a difference in popularity between Carter and Reagan remains to be seen.

Amendments are important voter choice

There are nine constitutional amendments that will come before the voters on Tuesday.

Some of those issues will directly effect Floyd County and some won't. The first amendment has gotten more publicity in this area than the others. It

has to do with authorizing banks to use unmanned teller machines. In the small town banking of Floyd County this is not a burning issues. General feeling is that the Savings and Loan Companies already have the ability for unmanned teller machines

and that the passage of this amendment would put the banks on a more competitive level. Number two is granting the state the right of appeal in certain criminal cases. Both Districty Attorney Randy Hollums

and County Attorney Kenneth Bain are against the amendment. They think that it would further clog the already congested appeal system.

Generally speaking the defense attorneys are for the amendment. The prosecuting attorneys are against it. The third amendment on county appraisal and equalization doesn't apply to Floyd County since our commissioners "wisely" have already joined the central taxing units. This amendment would make it mandatory for other

doors to gambling in Texas. Both attorneys are leery of the number 5 amendment giving the governor control over appropriated funds. Bain wonders if it might not have an adverse effect on some funds appropriated for the county. Hollums describes

it as a 50-50 proposition for or against. The number 6 amendment giving the Governor the right to remove appointed officers with Senate approval is another proposal that they feel could possibly be misused. The Governor should have the right to remove executive appointed offices. Hollums is concerned that the removal right could go into the judiciary offices if a judge disagreed with the Governor.

Since Floyd County is not in the 5000 population bracket the seventh amendment proposal does not effect us. Bain feels the in counties made up of large ranches that they are paying most of the taxes anyway and ought to be able to use county road equipment for private roads on that theory.

The number eight proposal is the one that the attorneys come closer to disagreeing on than any other. In talking to both of them the enormity of the back log of cases in the Supreme Court is hard to believe.

What the amendment is set up to do would spread out the criminal appeal cases and shorten what is now a three year wait for the Appeals Court to hear those cases.

Hollums said that he would much rather try a case in Amarillo than have to wait on the 900 to 1000 waiting list for Austin. This amendment could shorten the waiting time to something like nine months.

Bain agrees that that part of the proposal would be good. But he is very concerned that a passage of the amendment would then clog the civil appeals courts as badly as the criminal appeal courts are now. "I agree that the criminal appeal court needs some relief but I wish they'd figure out a way to do it without over burdening the Court of Civil Appeal." Bain said.

The Texas District and County Attorneys Association voted in favor of amendment number eight.

The ninth amendment on the ballot having to do with spouses designated income and property from separate property is a complicated issue. Right now Texas has community property laws. This would enable one spouse to singularly retain property. There would be tax consequences if the amendment were passed. Bain said that we already have a complicated property system and that this would complicate it further.

Nine amendments are to come up before Texas voters Tuesday. Pros and cons are further discussed here.

Amendment No. 1: UNMANNED BANK TELLER MACHINES

The amendment would permit the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or city in which they are located on a shared basis to serve public convenience.

1. Unmanned teller machines allow customers to transact business at convenient locations and at any time.

2. Because each bank has the right to share in the use of the machines, a bank will be able to serve a larger area than it currently serves. Competition among banks will increase.

3. The use of unmanned teller machines allow banks to better compete with savings & loan associations, which currently may have more than one business location while banks are restricted to a single location.

AGAINST:

1. The cost of installing a network of unmanned teller machines would be passed on to the consumer.

2. The amendment circumvents the long standing prohibition on branch banking 3. The use of unmanned teller machines will let large banks serve the entire

Amendment No. 2: STATE' RIGHT OF APPEAL

community and force smaller banks out of operation.

A constitutional amendment to grant the state the right of appeal in criminal cases from certain rulings of the trial court.

1. Granting the state this limited right of appeal provides the only effective way of testing the constitutionality of certain statutes and the legality of certain pretrial

2. The amendment will provide a criminal defendant with a method of ending criminal action at an early stage if appeal is worthy.

3. Granting the state a right of appeal will eliminate to some extent the tendency of some judges, when in doubt, to rule in favor of the defense to avoid appellate review of their rulings.

AGAINST:

1. The duration of a criminal trial will be substantially lengthened when the state

2. The caseload for the court of criminal appeals will be significantly increased.

Amendment No. 3: EQUALIZATION BOARD FOR AD VALOREM TAX Proposing a constitutional amendment to require a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes.

1. Single appraisal districts and boards of equalization are needed to fulfill legislative intent in the passage of the Property Tax Code.

2. The creation of single appraisal districts eliminates duplication of property tax 3. Such districts would prevent conflicts in appraisals, thus promoting uniformity and equality.

AGAINST:

1. Preventing county commissioners from direct involvement in property tax administration will vest too much tax authority within one non-elected board. 2. Property taxes will probably increase at the county level.

Amendment No. 4: LOCAL CHARITABLE BINGO GAMES

Proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games for charitable purposes on a local option election basis.

1. The charitable purposes for which churches, synagagues, religious societies, and many other organizations engage in bingo are of great benefit to society. 2. The proposed amendment would allow each community to decide whether to

permit bingo games. 3. Bingo games provide an opportunity for entertainment, social gatherings and relaxation.

 Fraud in bingo games would not be easy to prevent by local law enforcement. Organized crime would become involved in bingo games since profit margins would be as great as in criminal activities.

Amendment No. 5: BUDGET EXECUTION

A constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to grant budget execution powers to the governor, subject to approval by a budget execution

1. Since the Legislature meets every two years in regular session, there is a need for more budget execution authority vested in an elective office.

2. With the approval of a budget execution committee, the chief executive could closely monitor agency expenditures and insure accountability of tax dollars.

AGAINST:

1. Additional controls on spending are not needed in Texas as the citizen's tax

burden is among the lowest in the country. 2. Such authority would allow a free-spending governor the ability to increase

expenditures, just as a frugal one could decrease them. 3. Agencies are managed by appointed or elected boards that are accountable to the people now; there is no need to change a system that is considered one of the best in the country.

Amendment No. 6: REMOVAL OF CERTAIN APPOINTED OFFICIALS Proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove

appointed officials with the advice and consent of the senate; and allowing the governor to call a special session of the senate for this.

1. Allowing the governor to remove appointed officers of the State gives the governor the ability to insure the promotion of his/her policies. 2. This ability would make board members and other appointees more

accountable to the needs of an elected official.

1. Appointees should have the ability to make independent judgments concerning the operations of their agencies, boards, and offices.

2. Such an added governing power would be a move away from control by the Legislature, which represents citizens at a district level.

3. The governor has no need for day-to-day control over appointed officers of the State.

Amendment No. 7: COUNTY ROAD WORK ON PRIVATE ROADS

Proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the authority of a county to perform private road work.

1. It is unfeasable to hire a private firm to perform private road work in many remote areas of Texas when the county can do the same at a reasonable

2. Small counties must maintain expensive road construction and maintenance equipment even though not required on a full-time basis. Part of their investment could be regained with the revenue received from private road

AGAINST:

1. Provisions of the Texas Constitution prohibits the use of public funds for private purposes and public funds would be squandered by this amend-

2. Counties would be in direct competition with private construction.

Savings bonds

to be increased

The Treasury Department has raised the interest rate paid on all new issues of U.S. Savings Bonds by one percent effective November 1, 1980, Lewis McDaniel, District Manager of Southwestern Public Service Co., said today. McDaniel is the Savings Bonds volunteer chairman for Floyd County. In addition, all Series E, EE, H, and HH Bonds and Savings Notes now outstanding have had their interim yields increased by one percent to their next maturity, McDaniel said. More than \$70 billion worth of Savings Bonds are now

The new interest rate is eight percent for Series EE Bonds held to a nine-year maturity. The interim yields on these Bonds have also been improved to 5.5 percent after 1 year and 7.5 percent after 5 years. Series HH Bonds will now earn 7.5 percent to their 10 year

The rate increase was made possible by legislation permitting the Secretary of the Treasury, with the President's approval, to raise Savings Bonds interest rates by up to one percent during any six-month period. The rates previously in effect were seven percent on EE Bonds held 11 years, and 6.5 percent on HH Bonds held 10 years. Depending on market conditions, the Treasury says, a further rate increase of up to one percent may be made as early as May 1, 1981.

According to Lewis McDaniel, "The Treasury Department's actions in raising the rate on Savings Bonds an shortening the maturity period for EE Bonds make what was already an attractive savings medium even better.

SBA to assist drought losses

The Small Business Administration's (SBA) declaration #1900 for drought has brought much needed assistance to the agriculture industry in Texas.

'The disaster victim is eligible for crop losses sustained during the 1980 growing season providing the crop was in the ground during the incident period of the declaration, regardless of the harvest date," stated Russell R. Berry, Lubbock District Director of the SBA, "and partial crop losses will be computed only after harvest and determination of actual yield.'

The following formula will be used to compute eligible loss:

Acres planted X established yield X percentage of loss X market price (less insurance received, less ASCS low yield payment and other recoveries) eligible loss.

Lower Red Meat And **Poultry Output Expected**

During the rest of 1980, supplies of pork, broilers, and eggs will fall short of year--earlier levels as production cutbacks planned earlier in the year--plus the impact of this summer's heat and drought--begin to take effect. Beef production, on the other hand, will be slightly higher than last year.

The September 1 inventory of hogs and pigs (in the 14 major producing States) showed market hog numbers down 2 percent from last year, but still 15 percent larger then in 1978. Farrowings during June-August and farrowing intentions for September-November were both down 10 percent, implying that pork production in the first half of 1981 will fall substantially below yearago levels.

Farm commodity prices have been rising much faster than input prices in recent months, this improving farm income prospects for 1980 relative to earlier expectations. The index of prices received by farmers gained 12 percent from June to September, while the index of prices paid rose only 3 percent. Despite this improvement, prices paid by farmers were up 12 percent from a year ago in September, while prices received were up 9 percent. Higher feed prices have continued to squeeze livestock producers' margins. In addition,

farmers who lost most or all of their crops to this summer's drought and heat will not share in the improved income situation.

With improved market conditions, total feed grains have shown net movement out of the farmer--owned reserve in recent months. Corn, which is in release status, has shown the largest absolute drop in farmer-owned reserves, while oats, which are in call status, have shown the largest percentage drop. Barley is the only feed grain for which net movement has been into the reserve. Wheat has been moving into the reserve in recent weeks, although at a slow pace.

Retail food prices, as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI-U), increased 1.5 percent in August--the largest monthly rise since February 1979. The major contributors to the August increase were poultry, pork, beef, and fresh fruit. With food prices having risen relatively slowly in the first half of 1980, the total gain this year is expected to be about 9 percent--the smallest increase since 197

Foreign production of most crops is expected to turn out better than last year. Foreign output of grains and cotton are forecast up, but oilseed

Individual performance information is a requirement to effectiviely select beef cattle for genetic progress. No single selection plan fits all breeders and producers, but any profitable selection program must be based on the ability of an animal to perform in a given environment.

Properly measured performance is the best estimate of the animal's breeding value. It should include such traits as growth characteristics, reproductive ability, longevity and the ability to produce acceptable quality meat at a minimal unit cost, points out the livestock specialist.

Although objective information is most important in the overall selection process, visual appraisal also remains an important tool for selecting animals for many functional economic traits.

The trained eye is still needed to assist in determining composition of gain, degree of or type of muscling, skeletal dimension, structural correctness, masculine (testical size and shape) and feminine (udder and external genitalia development) characteristics, believes

Boleman. The most economically important beef cattle production trait is that of reproduction. The young heifer has to sexually develop and calve as a two-

ay on top of beef production in used alone provides low accuracy in year-old and continue to calve every ear of her productive life to be considered a proficient breeder.

When selecting a heifer, ask for maternal information of the cow, suggests the specialist. An exceptional performance record in itself will not totally insure that the heifer in question will be a productive breeder, but it sure will go a long way to success. Also use visual appraisal and try to select those heifers that look feminine, with a more refined head and neck, properly developed udder with correct sized teats, and a well-developed vulva. Combine performance information and visual appraisal in selecting a reproductively sound heifer.

In a nutshell, then, Boleman offers these suggestions for selecting top replacement heifers:

--Study performance pedigrees and individual performance information of the parents of heifers in question.

Select only those heifers from cows with demonstrated reproductive ability, longevity, and proven milking and mothering ability.

--Select heifers that are over the 100 percent weaning weight ratio (above the average of the group.)

-- Select heifers on the basis of sound and functional conformation.

Amendment No. 8: JURISDICTION AND AUTHORITY OF THE COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS

A constitutional amendment to change the names of the courts of civil appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the supreme court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate court.

1. It is unrealistic to expect only one criminal appellate court in Texas to administer criminal justice that is needed speedily and is a deterrant to crime.

2. The heavy workload of appeals in criminal cases that is presently handled by one court of criminal appeals would be shared by the 14 regional courts of appeal. 3. Appellate courts with jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters may attract and develop better judges that have benefitted from experience with a variety of legal

4. This amendment would clarify such questions as qualifications of a justice of the supreme court and a vacancy in the office of chief justice.

1. Our present system is the most efficient system to achieve criminal justice. 2. The addition of a large number of criminal cases to the civil caseload of the civil appeals courts will create another caseload problem.

Amendment No. 9: CONVERSION OF MARITAL COMMUNITY PROPERTY INTO SEPARATE PROPERTY

Proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the conversion of marital community property into separate property.

1. A system for marital property should provide general rules for determining rights and allow for persons to make alternative property arrangements in their

2. Benefits derived from property should be owned by the spouse who owns the 3. The amendment would reduce the complexity of the process of converting community property to separate property.

1. The present community property system has served the best interest of the citizens of Texas.

2. The community property system, as permitted by the amendment, could foster the creation of an entirely different way of settling property matters.

Halloween Safety Reminder

Halloween. Here are some tips for safe and happy haunting.

-Consider using make-up to decorate the face rather than wearing a mask which may block vision.

-Sew or glue reflective tape to both front and back of the costume. Be creative and incorporate the tape into the costume design.

-Check labels or packaging on purchased costumes for flame retardant finishes.

-For home sewn costumes, select fabrics that have a flame retardant finish, or apply a commercial aerosol or homemade finish at home. Commercial aerosol finishes may not be effective on all fabrics, so check the aerosol

To make a flame retardant finish at home, dissolve three ounces of boric acid in two quarts of hot water and stir in seven ounces of borax. (Boric acid and borax are available in drug stores.) Soak the costume in this solution for about five minutes, then wring out and hang. When the costume is only slightly damp, iron until dry.
