



# Mackenzie bonds Get voter okay

Heavy voter turnout marked a new record for the four South Plains towns as they voted on the Mackenzie Water Authority bond issue by a 5-1 margin Saturday.

Floydada voters turned out in a surprisingly heavy count of 323 to 89 in favor of the bond issue.

Lockney had heavy voter participation with 206 to 20 giving them a 10 to 1 margin.

They cast 871 votes for and only 147 against.

Silverton resident provided the town's largest single margin of victory with 200 ballots for to 20 against.

The funds from the bond issue will be used to existing monies to finance the construction of a water treatment plant at Lake Mackenzie. This will provide water for the four towns with an underground water source, a crucial need in view of the gradual depletion of the underground supply in the Ogallala and Santa Rosa aquifers.

The issue had to pass in all four cities to secure funding for the original building of the dam came from the four towns.

Monday night the Mackenzie Board met to canvas the votes and discuss the results. They are contacting Representatives Charles Stenholm and Jack Hightower and informing them of the election results.

The first item will be to secure the one million dollar grant that has already been approved for the project.

Jack Hightower is on the appropriations committee. He has stated that the Mackenzie project is top priority with him. He was particularly impressed that the four towns secured the water rights and built the dam on their own without depending on government funds.

Charles Stenholm said in an interview last week that appropriation money has been cut by 2% and they will not know until later in the year what area of government spending will be shorted.

The fact that the bond was approved by such a wide margin will help in getting the funds soon said Niel Taylor, Manager of the Mackenzie Lake. "We are trying to get it pushed through, but we definitely think that within the coming year it will all be approved."

He was referring to the one-million-dollar grant and also to the FmHA loan that will be secured by the water contracts.

Lon Davis, president of the Mackenzie board, said that he was particularly pleased with the election results. "We told the people exactly how it was and they came out in favor of it. I'm very gratified."

# Floydada Cable Changes hands

The Floydada Cable T.V. system has been purchased by Big Spring Cable T.V. Inc. Take over date is set for December 1 according to Area Manager, Joe McKinnis.

Parent company for Big Spring Cable T.V. is Texas Community Antenna based in Tyler, Texas and owned by Robert M. Rogers.

The company doesn't anticipate any personal changes in the Floydada office. "Everything will be pretty much the same as far as programming goes," McKinnis said. "The only difference will be in the billing system."

The coupon booklet will no longer be used for monthly payments. Each subscriber will receive a bill for two months in advance thru the mail.

No plans for expansion or equipment changes in Floydada are being made.

# Near-blizzard hits Floyd County again

A near-blizzard ripped Floyd County for the second time in ten-days yesterday.

About ten inches of snow had fallen by early afternoon and the National Weather Service was calling for another three to five inches before it stopped coming down.

Winds were clocked at 20 miles per hour with gusts to 27 causing three to five foot drifts and at times reducing visibility to no more than 50 feet.

The National Weather Service officially classifies a blizzard as a snowfall with 35 mile per hour winds and blowing snow. A Weather Service spokesman at Lubbock says yesterday's snowfall was close but not quite a blizzard.

Schools at Floydada called off classes yesterday while Lockney schools did not open until 10 o'clock in the morning and bus service was provided only on paved roads.

The Texas Highway Department crews at Floydada were called out about 3 a.m. yesterday. A department spokeswoman says two graders, six trucks with snow blades and two trucks with front end loaders were put into action.

No roads were ever officially classified as closed in Floyd County, but travel nevertheless was extremely hazardous.

There were no reports of any serious traffic accidents but there were a number of minor collisions. The highway department crews also rescued several people whose automobiles had become stuck or stalled in the snow. There were no reports of any injuries.

The latest snowfall came just nine days after ten inches of snow buried the county and sent temperatures plummeting into the teens.

# Space sold out For arts festival

All exhibitor space for the Floydada Lions Club Christmas Arts and Crafts Festival December 6 has been sold, assuring another successful show, Bill Gray, festival chairman, said Monday.

The 1980 festival will be at Massie Activity Center in Floydada from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. Admission is free.

The center will be filled with 30 booths of art and craft items for sale, including Christmas wreaths and decorations, artificial floral displays, toile painting, oil and acrylic paintings, wood crafts, ceramics, western art, wind chimes and macrame. An unusual exhibit of calligraphy will be an added feature.

Among exhibitors from the Panhandle-South Plains areas will be well-

known Western artist, Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia, who will have several of his paintings, books and prints for sale. His new book, "Leapfrog and Other Things I Remember," will be available at \$12.95 a copy.

"You can leapfrog back through time on the pages of this book, with a few printed words to guide your way," according to the dust jacket of the book. "Dr. Wyatt's paintings and drawings can take you back to grandmother's house, ice cream freezers, horse tanks and ponies, cream cans, songbooks and prayer."

The first edition printing is limited to 5,000 copies. The first 750 copies will serve as a signed, boxed and numbered deluxe edition and the first 250 copies of the deluxe edition will be sold only as a unit with a small bronze sculpture, numbered through 250. The remaining unnumbered copies comprise the entire first edition.

Wyatt is a complete artist working in the medias of oil, watercolor, pencil, charcoal, pastel and clay. His sculpture is cast in his own Y-8 Bronze Foundry where he has complete control over his finished product. Because he wants to know people personally who own his work, he sells directly from his studio at 310 Comanche Trail in Tulia.

Wyatt will present a one-man show of his work December 7 from 1 to 5 p.m. at First State Bank in Tulia.

Also in the Lions festival, Alpha Sigma Upsilon will have a booth of handcrafted items and will feature a handmade Dutch Doll quilt. The Floydada Fire Department Women's Auxiliary will be offering baked goods and refreshments throughout the day.

# Probe continues In Floydada Murder

Investigation continues into the mysterious death of a Floydada man early Saturday morning.

Robert Contee was found dead in his 1977-model Chevrolet after the car had struck a residence.

Awakened by the crash, the home owner at 806 W. Marivena called the police at 6:43 a.m.

Justice of the Peace, Walter Hollms pronounced Contee dead at the scene, but withheld his ruling on the cause of death until the victims wounds could be analyzed.

Contee had what appeared to be a stabbing wound below the heart. Police theorized that he had been wounded earlier and was driving himself to obtain medical aide at the Caprock Hospital a block away.

Police Chief Scott Newton said that Contee was traveling on Texas Street in his Caprice Classic when he came to the T-intersection.

The vehicle continued straight, however, crossing a church yard and an ally before plowing through a six foot wood

fence, chopping down a young peach tree and coming to rest after smashing into the home.

Contee was alone in the car when they found him.

The authorities are awaiting the outcome of an autopsy report done by Dr. Diez, Amarillo pathologist. Results will show whether the case will turn into a murder investigation.

Police have traced Contee's movements throughout most of the night. They still have not located the scene where Contee met his attacker.

They have definitely established that the alleged stabbing did not occur at his home.

Texas Ranger Jim Null is aiding in the investigation.

The automobile was impounded and the I.D. section, aided by the Plainview Police Department, went over the car and "printed" it.

Contee worked at Babe's Service Center and is well known in the community.

# Two Couples in MGM fire

I suppose this story begins with the first snow of the season. Connie Bearden had been stripping cotton without a break and now that he couldn't get into the fields he felt like getting away for a few days and relaxing. On the spur of the moment Monday, November 17, Ray Nell and Connie Bearden, and Lewis and Ann Reddy decided to go to Las Vegas.

Ann was reluctant. They were remodeling their house and she didn't want to leave. She finally gave in, and within 24 hours they checked into the luxurious MGM Grand Hotel.

Ann was uneasy. "What would we do if there was a fire?" she asked Lewis as they checked into their room on the 18th floor.

Another time during the week as she and Ray Nell were winding their way through the long honeycomb of passageways she posed the same question.

They had 11 a.m. reservations on a flight out of Vegas on Friday.

Connie got up early that morning and went downstairs. He read the paper awhile and watched the few players in the casino.

Raynell called home to Floydada to talk to her children before they went to school.

About 6:30 a.m. she joined Connie downstairs and they went into one of the seven coffee shops and restaurants arranged in a semi-circle around a central kitchen.

They ate a leisurely breakfast and then instead of getting on an elevator and going directly to their room they took a short walk down the Hall of Statues.

At the end of the hall they noticed a strong odor. Turning back they saw one of the maintenance men come out into the hall. Smoke was coming through one of the ventilators.

Two exits were close by. Doors going into the Hali game room were locked. Another exit to the outside was about 40 feet away.

Suddenly a huge black ball of smoke erupted and filled the hallway. They were choking, blinded by the smoke. Ray Nell was close to the maintenance man and he lead her to the exit. She thought Connie was behind her. But he didn't come. She waited, holding the door open thinking the light would pierce the thick smoke so Connie could see his way out.

Finally the maintenance man told her that perhaps her husband had gone out one of the other exits and she ran to it. People were stampeding. Fire engine sirens were coming from every direction. Frightened she ran back and forth, but the exit she had come out of is part of the Wall of Mirrors and she couldn't find it again.

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When the smoke blast hit, Connie had dropped to his knees. The air nearer the floor wasn't as thick and it was easier to breathe. He began crawling in what he thought was the direction of the exit. A door opened in front of him and he went through, past a woman, and the door shut immediately behind him.

He was in one of the offices. The woman, about 60 years old, was panicky. She had a breathing and heart problem and begged him not to open the door that would let more smoke into the room.

Trying to calm her, he stuffed kleenex around the door. Smoke was drifting in through the ventilation system. They could hear people screaming, and the sirens sounded like they were right outside the door.

They were in the eastern part of the building. The blast of smoke and fire had swept west through the casino. Gutting the lobby and killing at least 10 people.

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Upstairs on the 18th floor Ann Reddy had just gotten up. She could hear people running through the halls. A man banged on the door and shouted "Fire."

She and Lewis went out into the hall. People were running frantically. Smoke was everywhere.

A man came from one direction and yelled, "We can't get out that way; I'll check the other direction." He disappeared into the smoke.

His wife was screaming, "Where are you? Where are you?" People were coughing and choking. The Reddy's knew they couldn't stay there so they ran back in their room.

Lewis grabbed towels and wet them to hold over their faces. He started the water running in the tub and the lavatory.

He grabbed the sheets off the bed and soaked them. They stuffed the sheets around the door to keep the smoke out.

"I was sure we were going to die," Ann said. The couple knelt together in the room and prayed.

The bathroom was flooded but the water wouldn't run into the room. They filled the wastepaper basket and soaked the carpet. Lewis kept the sheet around the door wet. They kept wet towels over their faces. The room was still filling with smoke.

They could hear glass breaking and see it showering down from the upper floors. It was smoke colored and they thought it was exploding and that the fire was right above them.

The window would open only a few inches. Smoke was billowing up from the lower roof and was coming in the window.

A couple across from them was standing at the window. Smoke was pouring out behind them and it was hard to see the couple.

Helicopters were lined up on the ground. Ann counted 10 at one time. They would fly to the roof, back to the ground, unload people into ambulances and fly to the roof again.

One helicopter posed outside the building with a loud speaker. The noise made it hard to hear what they were saying. Finally the Reddy's made out that they were broadcasting, "Stay where you are." "Stay by your windows." "Don't jump."

They tried the phone to get instructions about what to do. The phone was dead. Strangely the television never went off. They watched the newscaster tell about the fire at the MGM. He said hundreds were trapped in their rooms. The death toll began to mount.

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Connie Bearden could still hear the fire sirens. He had been in the office room for 45 minutes. A call had come in. It was a friend of the older woman who had heard about the fire and was checking on her.

Hysterically she told them to get ahold of someone and tell them she was trapped in the room.

Connie knew that a fire lasting that long was a major one and that they had to get out. The woman finally allowed him to open the door and try to find an exit.

The smoke hung almost to the floor, but there was about a foot of area clear enough that he could see and breathe. He found the outside door and went back after the lady. After much persuasion she agreed to go with him.

Finally outside Connie found Ray Nell. She had seen the Reddy's standing at the window 18 floors up. They were on the north side of the building and not aware of the incredible damage done to the front of the hotel.

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The smoke in the Reddy's room was getting heavier. They could still see, but it was very difficult to breathe. Their throats were sore. Ann's headache was getting worse.

Huge marine helicopters were taking people off the balcony's in swing seats. The Reddys had no balcony on their room. Ann was sure she couldn't have gotten in one of the bucket seats anyway.

A man a few windows down was tying sheets and blankets together and draping them down the side of the building. The make-shift rope now hung down almost to the fourth floor. They never did see if he tried to climb down.

Some security men on a lower room were yelling up to the people in the rooms. Their voices were lost in the noise from the helicopters. People were screaming.

The Reddy's had been in their room for two hours when someone began knocking on their door.

Two firemen stood outside. One with helmet and mask. The other bare headed. Both were covered with black soot.

They told the Reddy's to hold wet towels to their faces and that they would lead them to the stair well.

Ann grabbed her purse and a few items. She hung the shoulder strap around her neck to keep her hands free.

"I'm going to lead you down the hall," the fireman said. "When you get to the stairwell go straight down. Don't stop for anything. Just keep going."

On the landing there was a girl of about 23. Her hysteria was such that her legs wouldn't work. She would just slump to the floor.

Lewis tried to pick her up. Then another man appeared and he got on one side of the girl and the two men began to carry her down the stairs. Ann went ahead.

The first floor number she saw was the ninth. She felt they were nearly down. As they got nearer the bottom they could feel the intense heat. Still struggling with the young woman they finally made it to the bottom.

Once outside Ann couldn't believe it. "Are we really on the ground?" she kept asking. Finally assured that she was, she broke into tears for the first time that day.

The Reddy's then began a frantic search for the Bearden's. Finally the two couples found each other. They hugged each other and tearfully thanked God for sparing them.

School busses were lined up by the side of the hotel and the couples rode on one of them to the Convention Center.

There they registered their names. Hotel reservations were made for them at the Flamingo Hilton.

When they arrived at the Hotel the manager told them their luggage could be sent on to them if they wanted to go on back home.

They went to the airport on stand-by for the 1 o'clock flight. The tickets agent issued them new tickets and in place of the price wrote "Lost in MGM fire."

They were able to board the plane with no problem. The flight was far from being filled.

Heading back to Texas, Ann glanced down and realized that she was still wearing her bedroom slippers.

# Over Coffee

In thinking back on Thanksgiving's past I am reminded of Mama Tashiro.

She was a diminutive Japanese lady who was the matriarch of a family who farmed in the Las Cruces, New Mexico area.

The family moved from Japan to Mexico first and then about the time of the depression came to Las Cruces. They bought land cheap, worked it themselves, and by the time I knew them were prosperous.

A conversation with Mama required a great concentration. She spoke English, but if the right word eluded her she would revert to Spanish, if that language failed her she would use Japanese. She had a sweet melodic voice and it was pleasant just to hear her talk. Facial expression and hand motions usually aided in making her meaning clear.

She was married to Kay Tashiro. He was a grey-haired, dignified, gentleman much older than she, and his failing health kept him from taking much part in the farming operation.

It was a second marriage. Harry was her stepson and closer to her age than his father was. So it was Harry and Mama who ran the farm.

They raised a big cotton crop each year, but their main interest was vegetables; onions and lettuce mostly.

They had built a large produce shed in Mesilla Park. At that time it was a small town four miles from Cruces. It has now been encircled by the city on two sides and the overflow from New Mexico A&M on the other two sides.

My Dad shipped produce for the Tashiro's for years.

During packaging season Mama not only oversaw the shed but was generally up on the grader. Otherwise she could be found with a hoe in her hand, or a shovel irrigating.

She wore pants, a man's shirt, and a wide brimmed straw hat as protection against the stark New Mexico sun. She also wore gloves most of the time.

Harry handled most of the business, but it was Mama with her pride of crop who made sure that what was shipped deserved the Tashiro and Tashiro brand name it bore.

They drove pick-ups and Cadillacs. The pickups were driven until they fell apart. The Cadillacs were traded every year.

There is a story about a new salesman at one of the dealerships who saw Mama and Harry, dressed as usual, come in for the new model car showing. He looked them over, decided it would be a waste of time talking to them. He watched them out of the corner of his eye with the idea of protecting the agency property. They left and to his chagrin he saw them climb into a top-of-the-line, last years, model and drive away.

Mama did dress when the occasion called for it. She owned a full-length, pelt-matched, mink coat, which she wore indiscriminately for the warmth it provided.

Every three or four years the family would make a pilgrimage to Japan and visit relatives and friends. Mama confessed that she had gotten soft with her life in America and was uncomfortable in the cold Japanese houses. So she slept in her mink coat.

When they returned they would bring as many Japanese articles as customs would allow. One year they gave me a lovely tea set. The frail, China cups, when held up to the light, revealed the portrait of a Geisha in the bottom of the cup.

Cruces has a spring and fall lettuce crop. If the weather is right they will ship into November. On those occasions we would have Thanksgiving dinner with the Tashiros.

Harry had two daughters, who were married and had small children. The union between Kay and Mama had produced one son who was a few years younger than Harry's daughters.

Just as Mama was international in her speech so was the table fare for Thanksgiving dinner.

There would be turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes and cranberry sauce. Then there would be platters of tacos, enchiladas, chicken mole, and the

traditional raisin stuffed tamales. Huge stacks of tortillas would set next to the plates of hot rolls.

Beside that would be bowls of vegetables with water chestnuts and bean sprouts in a rich sauce, rice with mushrooms, new fish, and several other Japanese dishes. This was all served with Coca-Cola as the beverage.

The food covered the table, so side tables were used with an American table setting. The cloths, however, were brightly colored and resembled a serape. Tiny Japanese lanterns decorated the room and the centerpieces were delicate replicas of a temple adorned with flowers.

Tradition was important to Mama Tashiro so she skillfully blended each culture she had known.

I always thought it very fitting since what we now regard as the traditional Thanksgiving menu must have seemed a strange mixture to the Europeans and Indians who shared it on Plymouth Rock.

# King appeared with opera company

Former Lockney resident Ben King, a baritone, appeared in two roles last week in performances by the Western New York Opera Company of Buffalo, New York, on the campus of Buffalo State University.

King appeared in the role of Germont in La Traviata and he also sang the role of the major general in the Pirates of Penzance.

King, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman King of Route 1, Lockney, is currently assistant professor of voice in

the school of music at Houghton College in Houghton, New York. He received his master of music degree in vocal performance from Texas Tech and has appeared with the Houston Opera and the New Orleans Opera among others.

Last summer he was the recipient of a national endowment for the humanities grant for research in the operas of Verdi at the American Institute for Verdi Studies in New York City.

## Santa visits hospital



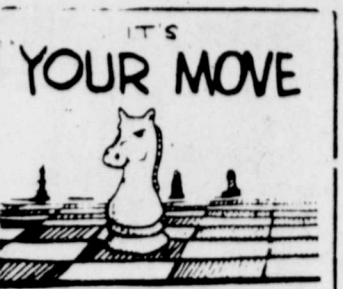
By special request Santa made an early surprise visit to Caprock Hospital to see Israel Casarez.

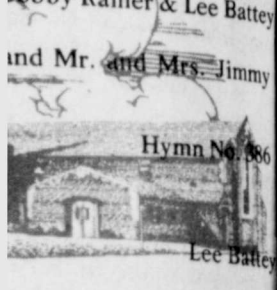

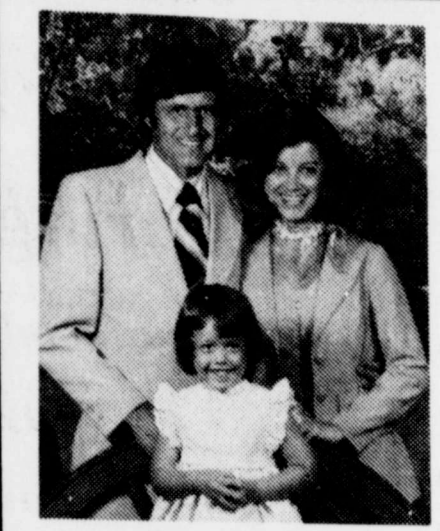

## Today's Lifestyles

Any 4-H'er who has participated in a 4-H Foods and Nutrition project this year is eligible to enter. Judging will be based on the entrant's knowledge of nutrition and the food exhibited. One winner in each division will advance to the South Plains Food Show December 13 in Lubbock.

### HOW TO CARVE ROAST TURKEY

Carving a turkey at the table seems to make a meal just a little more special and festive. This impressive looking task is easy if the carver follows these steps:

1. Let turkey stand for 20 to 30 minutes after roasting.
2. Remove drumstick and thigh—To remove drumstick and thigh, press leg away from body. Joint connecting leg to backbone will often-times snap free or may be severed easily with knife point. Cut dark meat completely from body by following body contour carefully with knife.
3. Slicing dark meat—Place drumstick and thigh on separate plate and cut through connecting joint. Both pieces may be individually sliced. Tilt drumstick to convenient angle, slicing towards plate.
4. Slicing thigh—To slice thigh meat, hold firmly on plate with fork. Cut even slices parallel to the bone.
5. Preparing breast—In preparing breast for easy slicing, place knife parallel and as close to wing as possible. Make deep cut into breast, cutting right to bone. This is your base cut. All breast slices will stop at this vertical cut.
6. Carving breasts—After base cut, begin to slice breast. Carve downward, ending at base cut. Start each new slice slightly up on breast. Keep slices thin and even.

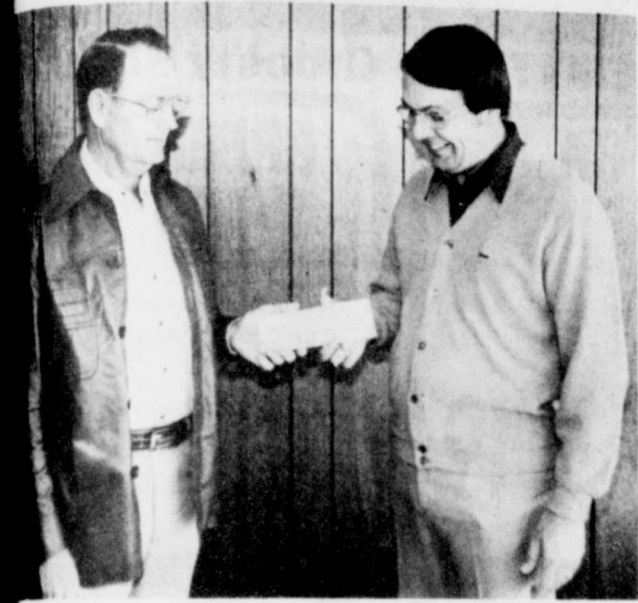

Weathermen are forecasting a bad 1980-81 winter and increased heating costs. To combat larger fuel bills, insulate. The best place to start is in the attic. An under-insulated attic drains energy, letting heated air through the roof in winter and acting as a giant solar collector in summer. R-values measure the resistance of the flow of heat. The greater the R-value, the less energy lost. R-values of R-30 - R-35 are considered ideal for our winter climate. However it may not be economically feasible to get over R-20... considered to be an acceptable goal. Without compressing, measure the attic's insulation depth. Most kinds of insulation used in an attic (batts, blankets, poured loose fill) have an R-value of 3 - 3.1 per inch thickness. For example, if your insulation is one of these and has a depth of 3 inches, the R-value for your attic is R-9, considerably lower than the goal of R-20.

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## Rabbits Second to deer

BY J.D. PEER

Recent hunter census by the National Rifle Association indicates that deer are being hunted by more sportsmen than any other animal. The second most hunted animal is rabbit. The recent snow in northwest Texas offered the sportsman an excellent chance to bag a cottontail.

Whether you hunted with a rifle or not, rabbit hunting is a real challenge to your hunting ability as they go through the heavy brush.

The best rabbit hunting time is after the sun comes out and the winds drop. The rabbits have been holed up by the snowstorm and they are out to find food.

There is no closed season on rabbits in Texas and hunters can bag them any time of the year. Most hunters prefer to wait for the first snow to try their luck with a rifle or shotgun.

Two species of cottontails are found in northwest Texas. One is the eastern cottontail (Audubon). The eastern cottontail prefers areas off the Caprock on rolling plains where there is more brush and cover. The desert cottontail likes the plains country where there are cactuses and prairie dog holes. In fact, they are called "prairie dog cottontail" by many high plains hunters.

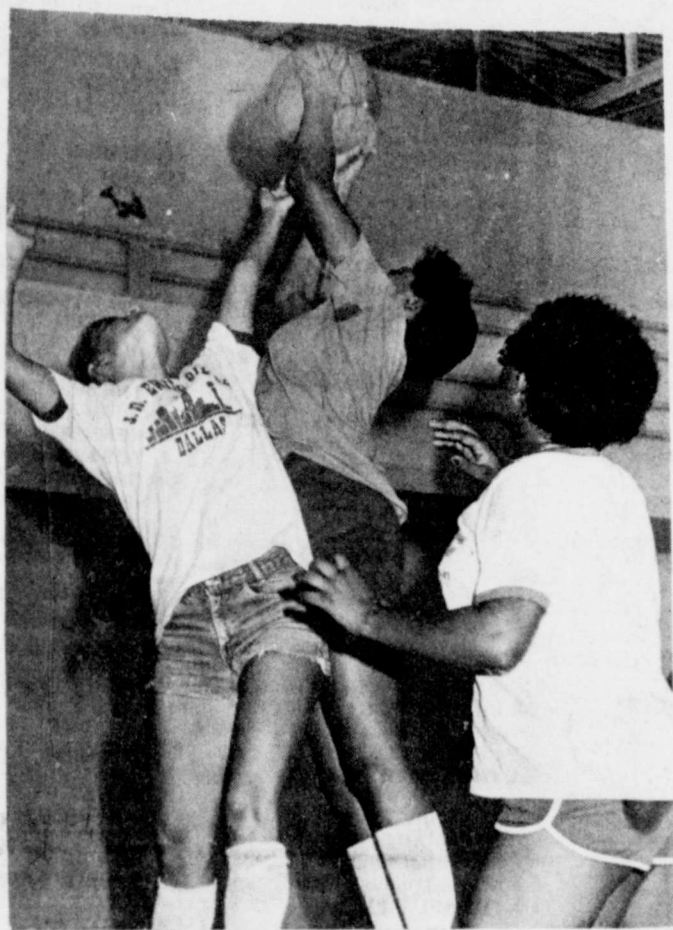
Both species of cottontails are most active during the morning and evening. They are also active during the day when snow is on the ground. Neither species of cottontails range very far from their burrows and it takes a good hunter to bag a cottontail through heavy brush.

Successful Texas rabbit hunters know the habits of the cottontail and if the eye is sharp and bullet true, a rabbit is tried for supper should be on the menu.

Texas hunters are reminded that a Texas hunting license is required for rabbit hunting if you are 17 years of age or older and hunt out of your county of residence. Rabbit hunters over 65 years of age are not required a Texas hunting license. All resident rabbit hunters are required a nonresident hunting license.

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# Salisbury trip triple treat

August 11, started out like any other day at our house, but by 3 p.m. we would call it our triple bonus day. At 3 p.m. we received a phone call from our son-in-law, Tibor Nagy, that we had become grandparents to triplets, born to he and our daughter, Jane, at 6 a.m. that morning in the Lady Chancellor Maternity House, in Salisbury Zimbabwe (formerly Rhodesia).  
Tibor assured us that Jane and the babies were all doing fine. We had known that they were expecting twins, but triplets came as a complete surprise to everyone. The girl, Tisza Ann, weighed two pounds and eight ounces and the boys, Peter William and Stephen Branson, weighed four pounds and eight ounces.

After several telephone calls back and forth, we knew that the babies would have to stay in the hospital until they had made a satisfactory weight gain, or about a month or six weeks, so we decided that I would go and visit with them when it was near time for the babies to leave the hospital and could go home to Lasaka, and I could help Jane, and get them all settled.

I left Lubbock, Tuesday, September 16, on a Braniff airline and flew to Dallas, there I changed to American Air Lines and flew to Dulles, in Washington, D.C. and changed to British Airways, and flew on that plane all the way to Salisbury. We arrived at Heathrow Airport, outside London, on the morning of September 17th.

Before we got to London, they announced that they were having a ground crew strike, and if you had checked your baggage on through, you had better go and check on it, either check it on through again or make sure that it had been checked through. Heathrow is a very large air terminal, and not very well organized. I guess any place that you haven't been that is so large would seem unorganized to me. Here in the states, they park all of our planes together, like the American will be in one place, and the Braniff and United Air Lines in another, but in Heathrow, they don't do that, they are parked all over the place. It took me over an hour and a half to find out where they unloaded the luggage. It was in another building some distance away, down several long ramps, and thru another terminal, and by asking around I finally found the right place and then had to show my passport. It took me three hours to find out that my luggage was checked on thru to Salisbury, as it was supposed to be. I found most people to be nice and helpful and some were rather rude, saying "Madam, that isn't my job," but since I had all day I wasn't rushed for time I could spend my time watching people. I visited several gift shops and noticed that their gift items, were much higher than they are in the States. Jane, said this was true about buying anything outside the U.S.A.

In talking with people, whether it was London or Salisbury, and they found out that I was from Texas, the first question they would ask me was "Who shot J.R.?"  
I left Heathrow, about 7 p.m. on the evening of the 17th, and arrived in Salisbury about 8:30 a.m. September 18th. I flew from the States to London during the night and then going from London to Salisbury, Zimbabwe, we flew during the night.  
Jane and two of the Embassy officials met me at the airport. It was so nice to have someone to take care of all the little details. The Embassy has a special immunity, and took my passport and asked me to point out my luggage, then they took me over to Jane, and took care of all the details. I noticed that they didn't even have to wait in line, and it all seemed so easy for them. I sure could have used them at Heathrow!

about the babies. We went to the hospital twice that first day to give the babies their feedings. They were in the Lady Chancellor Maternity House. The nurses there are called "Sisters" and that does not mean that they are Catholic nuns, but designated that they are nurses. The Sisters told Jane to bring me back every time she came to the hospital. I suppose that they were bending the rules, as all other visitors were only allowed to visit 30 minutes each day. Tibor, was only allowed to visit 30 minutes in the evening.  
I went to the hospital every time Jane went on Thursday and Friday, as they knew that was my reason for being there, to help care for the babies when they were strong enough to go home, which was planned for Saturday.

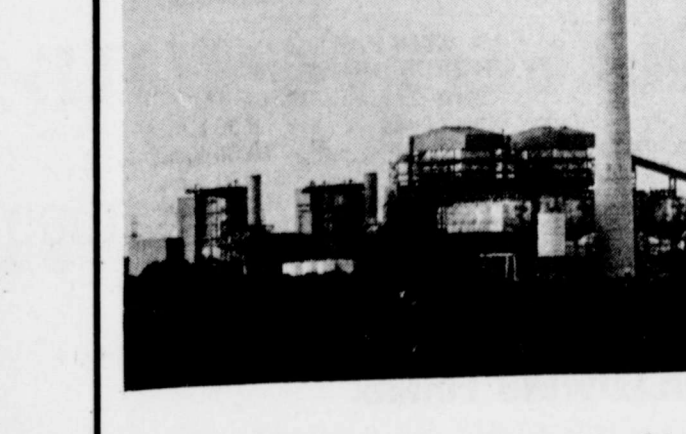

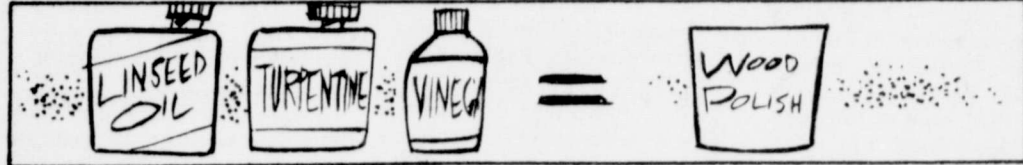

GIFTS FOR ALL

Thanksgiving is more than a "day"; it's a way of life. A teaching of St. Cyril of Jerusalem (380 A.D.) shed some light on the beauty of a grateful heart.

He compared the spirit of God to water. It was an image he chose because of Christ's words, "The water that I shall give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (John 4:14)

"Water," said St. Cyril, "comes down from heaven as rain, and although it is always the same in itself, it produces many different effects: one in the palm tree, another in the vine, and so on, throughout the whole of creation. It does not come down now as one thing, now as another, but while remaining essentially the same, it adapts itself to the nature and need of every creature that receives it. In the same way the Holy Spirit, whose nature is always the same, simple and indivisible, apports grace to each man as He wills."

The idea that your basic natural gifts are enhanced by the Holy Spirit was taught earlier by St. Paul. It's an interesting concept worthy of meditation.

When human weakness or personal shortcomings prevent you from doing what you'd like to do, don't think of yourself negatively. St. Paul had the same problem, "The good that I would do, I never do." St. Cyril is consoling on this point:

"The Spirit makes one person a teacher of divine truth, inspires another to prophesy, teaches another to fast and lead a life of asceticism, makes another oblivious to the needs of the body, trains another for martyrdom. In each person the Spirit reveals His presence in a particular way for the common good."

From this we see that it is possible to be weak in one or more area, while being gifted in another. No one receives all the gifts. Yet how many people feel discouraged when they come across real holiness or outstanding generosity in another? They are unfair to themselves.

As I reflect on the teaching of St. Cyril, I realize how important it is for us to thank God for what we have, whatever it is. Certain gifts are obviously stronger in some people than in others, giving balance to the whole. And since the gifts of the Spirit are given for the common good, we can all rejoice in the gifts of others.

The Spirit, like water, is everywhere the same. We thank God for all His gifts, especially for the ones He has given you.

## FHA state plan gets approved

Approval of the Farmers Home Administration state management plan for fiscal year 1981 which began October 1, was announced recently by W.H. Pieratt, State Director for Texas. National FmHA Administrator, Gordon Cavanaugh had recently notified the state office of final approval.

The state management plan establishes FmHA goals and policies for the use of over \$800 million of loan and grant authority in Texas. The plan addresses targeting of FmHA resources to assist distressed communities and disadvantaged persons and outlines methods of coordination with other agencies to better serve rural Texas. Goals for assisting citizens and communities most in need have been established for each FmHA program.

Farmers Home Administration is an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and is charged with the responsibility of providing rural credit to families and communities. FmHA provides loans and grants for farmers, housing, water and sewer, community improvement and business and industry.

In addition to the state office, there are District and County offices in Texas to serve rural citizens. "Rural" usually means places of less than 10,000 persons, with the exception of the Business and Industry program which may serve communities up to 50,000 population. Last year in Texas, FmHA provided 16,043 loans and grants to families and groups totaling over \$826 million. Group loans include rental housing, business and industry, water and sewer and community facilities. These loans are repaid with interest and provide a means for rural people to help themselves improve their lives and conditions.

## 'Wait 'til next year' Ag leaders say

While 1980 will go down in the record books as a tough year for most agricultural producers, 1981 offers hope, especially for those in the livestock industry.

"Livestock prices should show solid increases next year due to lower total meat production and improved consumer demand," believes Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Cash receipts from livestock and livestock products totaled \$69 billion last year in the U.S., 52 percent of all farm and ranch income, notes Uvacek. In Texas 1979 cash receipts from livestock and livestock products surpassed \$4.3 billion, or more than 55 percent of all agricultural income in the state.

Livestock cash receipts for 1980 will be down some from the 1979 level due primarily to reduced cattle feedlot activity.

"Retail demand for all meat products should be much improved in 1981," contends Uvacek. "Economic recovery in the business segment should help considerably. Somewhat reduced inflation will also be helpful although that may focus attention on the inevitable higher meat prices. That, in itself, could stimulate consumer resistance or, even worse, might lead to government price controls."

While the new year should be a boon for some segments of the livestock industry, not all will share equally in the prosperity. Cow-calf operators should fare well in 1981, but meat packers, stocker operators and feedlots may find the going a little tough, predicts the economist.

## Government sets Crop regulations

The U.S. Department of Agriculture now has announced that growers of either wheat or feed grains in 1981 will be required to plant within their established Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) in order to qualify for loans, disaster coverage or price deficiency payments under government programs.

A pending announcement on whether cotton producers also will be shackled by the same requirement is not expected until after December 2. There is industry-wide opposition to the requirement for cotton, plus opposition from state officials of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), but a Washington source November 20 told Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. that as far as the current Administration is concerned "it looks now like you're going to get it."

And the American Cotton Shippers Association indignantly reported from Washington November 17 that "Unless the cotton industry and sympathetic legislators overrule him, USDA Economic Czar Howard Hjort will be successful in his attempt to limit plantings and thus embargo the production of cotton in much of the Belt."

The "embargo" of production refers to 10 cotton producing states where the NCA requirement reportedly would force farmers to reduce acreage of basic crops by from eight percent to as much as 26 percent.

Texas as a whole, and especially the High Plains, would be much less severely affected. Statewide plantings of wheat, grain sorghum, corn, barley, rice and upland cotton in 1980 totaled 20,366,459 acres as compared to the states' total NCA's of 23,922,420.

In the 25 High Plains counties represented by PCG, 6,900,325 acres were planted to these crops in 1980, considerably below the area's aggregate NCA of 7,485,413 acres. It is assumed the remaining acreage was planted to soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, vegetables, etc.

Only two of PCG's 25 counties show planted acreage significantly above their NCA's. Those counties, Bailey and Cochran, according to local ASCS officials, are counties in which there was considerable double cropping due to early losses of wheatland, replanted to cotton or losses of cotton replanted to grain sorghum. In those cases only the planting of one crop is counted against the farm's NCA.

Nevertheless, PCG is fighting the NCA requirement on the grounds that it is unnecessary, difficult and costly to administer and will cause a hardship on a number of individual producers who for one reason or another have NCA's much smaller than the acreage they'd like to plant or have plans to switch planting patterns.

"We still have hopes that the mounting evidence against the wisdom of a cotton NCA requirement next year will be heeded by Secretary Bergland and company," says PCG President Joe D. Unfred of New Home. "But if it isn't, there's still a possibility that the incoming administration can be induced to reverse Bergland's decision or at least modify the regulations to reduce unwarranted government interference with farm management decisions."

This is the time of year when cattlemen really could use a crystal ball. The big decision is whether to keep calves and feed them through the winter or sell them now to a feeder. The only thing most producers really need to know is what feeder prices will be next spring. Therein lies the rub. Guess-timating cattle prices is old hat to a lot of observers, but getting it right would be a new experience to almost as many as have tried it at all. One of the special problems with estimating feeder cattle prices is that the two known factors affecting those prices also have to be guessed. One's the price of fat cattle... the other, the price of feed. By the time a proper prediction is put together, there are more "ifs" than there are cattle. Usually the answer gets worked out - about April 1st.
