## Commodities tumble; Worst in 30 years

Commodity futures began recovering this week after the worst nine days in some 30 years.

Wheat, sorghum, and soybeans all lost between one and two dollars over the nine day period culminating in what one futures dealer called "Black Thursday," last week. In that same period, cotton lost five-cents a pound.

Mike Stevens, a commodities broker with Merrill Lynch in Lubbock, says the nine consecutive down days may have been the worst decline in commodity futures since 1949.

During the nine days:

- ...March cotton futures slipped from 94.2 cents a pound to 88 cents.
- ...March wheat futures dropped from \$5.65 per bushel to \$4.35.
- ...January soybeans fell from \$9.50 per bushel to \$7.20.
- ...March corn plummeted from \$4.10 per bushel to \$3.50.

Prices began to turn around last Friday. Cotton was much stronger by Tuesday, largely because of a major sale to China.

Stevens says the steadily rising prime lending rate, which hit a record 21 percent Tuesday, was the major factor behind the commodities decline.

"The cost of carrying inventory had become so burdensome," Stevens said, "it caused the market to collapse."


In addition to the prime lending rate, Stevens said the crisis between the Soviet Union and Poland further weakened the market. The increased wheat acreage was also limited factor, Stevens said.

If the prime lending rate continues to climb to as high as the 25 percent as some financial analysts predict, Stevens said the effects on farmers will be disastrous.

"Unfortunately, politicians don't look at the farmer anymore when they're considering policy and the effects on the producer are extremely critical," Stevens said. "When the farmer's got to borrow money for seed or fertilizer or to put cattle in the pen, the effects of that policy are critical," Stevens said, if it leads to an extremely high prime lending rate.

Without a sharp drop in the prime lending rate, Stevens said the best hope for the farmer is if the Soviet grain embargo is lifted.

"We badly need to sell something," Stevens said, "and real soon."

## City council approves four new ordinances

The City Council passed on four ordinances at their regular meeting Tuesday night. In some cases previous ordinances were rescinded so that new expanded orders could be used.

The new ordinances have to do with property within the city limits. They were adopted to comply with HUD recommendations.

The city is planning to file a preapplication with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

Council met with Gary Traylor, Lubbock, whose firm, Barber-Traylor and Associates are community development consultants. They assist cities in attaining the C.D.B.G.

Floydada will be applying for a single purpose grant of \$300 per person in the Community up to a maximum of \$600,000.

Due to the limited amount of dollars available, all applicant cities and counties are not funded each year.

HUD evaluates each City's preapplication using an established rating system which takes into account the applicant's needs, the impact of proposed projects and several other factors.

The basic intent of the CDBG program is to eliminate slums, blighted housing, and deteriorating neighborhoods by providing new streets, parks and community centers; improved utility systems; better drainage; and other public facilities.

The target area in Floydada is between Fourth and Twelfth Streets, north of Missouri and excluding the flood zone.

## Helms quits school board

Adrian Helms submitted his resignation to the president of the school board at their regular meeting Tuesday night, December 8.

Helms cited two reasons for the resignation. He is a member of the reappraisal board. Both public positions require a great deal of time and many meetings. He also has a large farming operation.

The early resignation was also prompted by the hiring of his wife, Ann, as librarian at Duncan Elementary.

The library position was left open when Sue Swearingin and her family moved from Floydada.

The Helms resignation was accepted with deep regret. "He has been an exceptional member of the board," Superintendent Jerry Cannon said, "very dedicated and hard working."

The board presented Helms with a four year service plaque to show their appreciation.

Don Hardy was appointed to replace Helms on the board until the election in April.

That election will be to replace three board positions instead of the usual two.

Band director Bruce Kenner presented a proposal for 25 additional band uniforms at a cost of \$6197.50.

Larger band membership in the high school as well as the Jr. High and sixth grade were cited as reasons for needing more uniforms.

The band must maintain a 20% average of uniforms because of size differences of the members.

The board approved Kenner's proposal.

The 1980-81 tax rate was set at 74 cents. A 3% discount on tax payments will be given until December 31. A 2% discount will be in effect until January 31.

Floydada schools will be in session on January 16 which was originally scheduled as a teachers work day. It will serve as a make-up day for one of the two days the schools were closed because of weather.

Make-up of the other day will be decided on later.

A meeting will be held at 5 p.m. Thursday to go over the audit report. Next regular meeting of the board will be January 13.

Each greeting has been selected by the business people just as they used to select a card.


The Christmas edition will also feature some delightful stories written by fifth graders at R.C. Andrews Elementary School in Floydada.

## Bert Massie dead at 71

Many feel that with the passing of Bert Massie has marked the end of an era in Floydada.

W.M. Massie, father of Bert, came to Floyd County in 1889. The next year he established a land office in Floydada, which became the oldest continuous land agency in West Texas.

He was instrumental in bringing both the Santa Fe and Frisco railroads to Floydada.

Bert carried on the family land tradition.

His sister, Laura Geraldine Murray, now lives in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

The family land interests make them the largest owners of lots in the city from the business section east to the Silverton Highway.

Massie opened two additions in Floydada. The first, called the Western Addition, was opened in the 1950's.

In 1966 he began the 13 block Texas addition. He was the only one to operate land with building restrictions. Time has proven those restrictions to be of benefit to the property buyers.

For years the City of Floydada has gotten their entire water supply from Massie land. The city wells are all located on his property.

He and his family gave land to the city for park use. The Floydada Park is located near the high school.

Bert lived in Floyd County all of his life. He graduated from Floydada High School.

In 1976 he married the former Troye Willis Stansell, and lived on the tract of ground where the Massie's established their home in 1929.

He farmed and ranched. Friends say that he always seemed more interested in the cattle part of his business.

He was a unique individual, who, with his family have done much for the City of Floydada.

## MBFA reorganization awaited

Officers of the beleaguered MBFA Foundation awaited word from the Creditor's Committee early Wednesday concerning acceptance of their reorganization proposal.

The Floydada radio station is owned by MBFA Communications, a subsidiary of the Foundation. The station has been off the air since mid-October, when the parent company declared bankruptcy under Chapter XI of the Federal Bankruptcy Act.

Under Chapter 11, the company may obtain a federal court order freeing it from the threat of creditors' lawsuits until it can develop a plan to put its finances in order. The reorganization plan must be accepted by a majority of the creditors and activities of management in the interim are subject to court approval.

In a standing-room-only crowd at Lubbock's federal bankruptcy court December 5, creditors heard court-appointed trustee Robert Wilson describe the books of the ailing multi-state corporation as being "in a marvelous state of disarray."

Employees of KFLP were among 840 employees who were not paid when the company missed an October payroll. The radio station was not included in the bankruptcy petition because it was feared such "in" would place the license to broadcast in jeopardy, according to Dennis Olsen, an attorney for MBFA.

Nevertheless, like the parent corporation, the MBFA Communications Corp. is insolvent, the attorney said. Proper notification was made to the Federal Communications Commission prior to the closing of the station, Olsen told the Hesperian.

"It is to the advantage of the creditors of the radio station that the Communications Corp. is not included in the bankruptcy filing," said Maurice Stanley, a vice president of MBFA.

Stanley is one of four officers of the parent corporation remaining in the relocated offices at First Federal Savings Plaza in Lubbock. The other

employees are Jim Zachary and Sue Flannagan, vice presidents, and Dorothy Dougless, executive secretary to Land Wall.

Wall, directed by the court to resign effective October 31, was president of the non-profit corporation, which he described as part of a Christian outreach program.

At the Dec. 5 creditor's hearing, MBFA officers were charged to "come

up with a plan agreeable to the court and acceptable to your creditors." The court met in session again Tuesday afternoon to consider proposals for resolution of claims against the corporation. The court recessed at 2:30 p.m. and the creditor's committee began consideration of three proposals. Two involved sales of the Corporation's

## Tax man cometh with Santa Claus

The lines of taxpayers are long and not always sympathetic since taxes are higher this year for most of them. The reappraisal, 100% evaluation, and higher budgets of the several entities have not only raised tax payment but have delayed collection time.

Tax payments that would normally have been spaced out since October 1 will be suddenly crammed into the last two weeks of this month for those wanting to pay in 1980.

The school system was the first to mail their statements out. Most people received theirs over the weekend.

The city mailed their statements Monday night.

The county statements won't be ready until January, but they began accepting payments last Monday for those who want to pay their taxes before the end of the year.

Taxpayers who do not want to wait in line at the business offices are encouraged to mail their payment in.

Since the county statements are not out yet, the deputies will be glad to give

the individual's tax payment amount over the telephone so the money can be mailed in.

The tax collection offices will be open more days around Christmas this year than usual.

The school office has traditionally closed with the school closing. Not so this year. They will be open December 22 and 23; will be closed Christmas Day and Friday; then will be open again December 29 and 30.

They are staying open so that those taxpayers who want to take advantage of the 3% discount until December 31 may do so. A 2% discount will be allowed until January 31.

The city office which normally closes early Christmas Eve day will be open all day Wednesday this year. They will close Thursday and Friday only.

The county tax office will close December 24, 25, and 26. A 3% discount of taxes has been allowed by the county until January 31.

The clerks and deputies can use some Christmas cheer this season. They are carrying on a hard job under stress conditions.

## Cotton to Continue in Tight supply

A continuing tight supply-demand balance is in prospect for U.S. cotton during the latter half of 1980/81, and very likely well into the 1981/82 season that begins on August 1, 1981. This season's supply is down sharply due to lower beginning stocks and a smaller crop. Expected disappearance this season of 11.6 million bales (2.53 million metric tons) is also well below last year's level, but is still 0.4 million bales (0.09 MMT) above estimated production. The carryover at the end of this season is likely to be slightly below the beginning level of 3 million bales (0.65 MMT).

Based on November 1 conditions, the 1980 U.S. crop is forecast at 11.2 (+0.4) million bales (2.44 + 0.09 MMT), down from 14.6 million (3.18 MMT) last year. Although harvested acreage is up 3 percent, hot, dry weather in the Southwest and parts of the Delta and Southeast has reduced the U.S. average yield to 408 pounds per harvested acre (457 kilograms per hectare), 26 percent below last season's record high.

U.S. cotton exports this season are forecast at 5.7 million bales (1.24 MMT), down sharply from last season's unusually high 9.2 million (2.00 MMT). Factors behind the anticipated decline include increased foreign production, sluggish world textile activity, and reduced U.S. export availability. U.S. cotton is currently priced 5 to 7 cents a pound (11 to 15 cents per kilogram) above competing cottons in world markets.

By November 20, U.S. exports plus outstanding sales totaled 3.8 million bales (0.83 MMT), up slightly from August 1, but 3.3 million (0.72 MMT) below a year earlier. The People's Republic of China, which took 2.3 million bales (0.5 MMT) of U.S. cotton last season, had commitments for early 0.9 million (0.2 MMT) as of November 20.

Domestic textile mills are expected to use around 5.9 million bales (1.28 MMT) this season, down from 6.5 million (1.42 MMT) in 1979/80. The seasonally adjusted annual rate of use was about 6.25 million bales (1.36 MMT) in September and October, slightly above the August rate, but about 4 percent below a year earlier. Cotton use is likely to slip further this winter due to tight supplies, relatively high prices, and rising product inventories.

World cotton production is forecast at 3.7 million bales (13.87 MMT) in 1980/81, down 3 percent from last season. Foreign production is expected to total 52.5 million bales (11.43 MMT), .5 million (0.33 MMT) above last season. The Soviet crop may rise from last year's 13.1 million bales (2.85 MMT) to a record 13.8 million (3.00 MMT); production in China is forecast at 10.5 million bales (2.29 MMT), a .4-million-bale (0.09 MMT) increase.

World cotton consumption may total around 64.8 million bales (14.11 MMT) this season, nearly a million below 1979/80. Foreign use is forecast at 58.9 million bales (12.82 MMT), near last season's level. However, Chinese consumption is placed at a record 13.8 million bales (3.00 MMT). As a result, China will probably again be the world's leading importer, taking about 3.2 million bales (0.70 MMT) from all sources.

Early season forecasts of a close balance between cotton production and use suggest that prices in 1981 will be particularly sensitive to changes in production prospects and economic conditions. World cotton stocks could decline to 20.5 million bales (4.46 MMT) on August 1, 1981, the lowest level in recent years. Reflecting these tight supplies, world cotton prices are around 25 percent above a year earlier.

The Twelfth Biennial Grain Sorghum research and Utilization Conference will be held at the Hilton Inn in Lubbock, on February 25, 26, 27, 1981.

The purpose of the three day Conference is to review current production and marketing problems; research that has been completed, that is now underway, and is needed for grain sorghum.

## Grain farmers eligible For higher loan levels

Producers placing 1980-crop grains in the farmer-held reserve December 3 became eligible for special higher loan levels and interest on those loans will be waived as a result of President Carter signing the Agricultural Act of 1980.

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland said wheat producers placing this year's crop into reserve will receive a \$3.30-per-bushel loan, compared to the \$3.00-loan level for wheat not in the reserve program. 1980-crop corn going into reserve will receive a \$2.40 loan, compared to the \$2.25 loan for non-reserve corn. Producers placing 1980-crop barley in reserve will receive a 12-cent premium above the \$1.83 loan level for non-reserve barley.

Producers with 1980-crop wheat, corn and barley already in reserve may request the higher price supports at

their local county ASCS office, Bergland said. Reserve release and call prices are not affected by today's action.

The act also provides for a 7-cent reserve premium to the current oat loan level of \$1.16 per bushel and 14-cent premium to the \$2.14-per-bushel loan for non-reserve sorghum. However, oats and sorghum have already been called from reserve.

Bergland said the new higher loan levels for reserve commodities will help strengthen the reserve program.

"While crop prices are likely to remain very strong through this year, there will be years in the future when grain supplies will exceed current-year needs. This measure will make the reserve an even more attractive marketing alternative to producers when it is needed," Bergland said.

## Soil service invites Comments on program

The Soil Conservation Service is seeking public comments about the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) in order to evaluate its past, present, and future environmental, social, and economic impacts.

This program gives assistance under long-term contracts to landowners in designated counties of ten Great Plains states. Its purpose is to provide needed protection and improvement of soil, water, land, plant, and wildlife resources of the Plains area, which is plagued with recurring drought and wind erosion problems. Installing complete conservation treatment and management systems on farms and ranches helps stabilize individual enterprises and consequently the local economy.

We, of the Soil Conservation Service, therefore invite you to give us your written comments on any or all of the issues listed below:

I. Your opinion about the overall benefits of the program.

II. The effects of the Great Plains Conservation Program.

A. Environmental impacts, including the effect on wildlife, water quality, air pollution.

B. Economic and social impacts, including the effect on the economic stability of farm and ranch units in a region of climatic extremes; effect on net farm and ranch profits, rural development, small farms.

C. Impacts on the conservation of soil and water resources.

III. The need for any new program initiatives, direction, or management to improve operations.

IV. Any problems that have hindered or delayed achievement of GPCP goals.

V. Possible alternatives for implementing GPCP more efficiently.

If planning to insulate an attic which will later be finished into additional living space, here are a few tips to avoid headaches later, and additional work now. First, don't be tempted to insulate walls (the roof) right up to the ridge beam. Add collar beams overhead, first. These are beams parallel to the floor, cut to size, and nailed to the existing rafters which will furnish the rough-out for the ceiling you'll install later. Since this will be your ceiling, plan for the correct height. Now you can begin to staple insulation to the collar beams, on down the knee walls to the floor. (That space above the collar beams will also get rid of additional winter condensation and summer heat.) If you're going to beef up existing insulation, don't pull the old insulation out. Simply cut it at the rafters, slash any vapor barrier with a knife, then push the entire sheet back and staple the new material to the rafters over the old.

## Now is good time For soil nitrogen tests

Now is a good time to test soils for residual nitrogen following corn. Some Floyd County producers set their yield goals for 10,000 lbs/a of corn and missed due to dry summer and insufficient irrigation water. In some cases, the southwestern corn borer caused lodging thus preventing harvesting. Reports from area Extension agronomists indicated that fields suffering severe lodging have from 2000 to 3000 lbs/a of grain not harvested. In either case, our producers may have residual nitrogen present in their soil which could be utilized for the 1981 crop. This nitrogen is available and can be detected by soil testing. Producers must be careful when taking soil samples. Sloping fields which were furrow irrigated had very poor yields in the middle of the field. Soil nitrogen levels will be generally higher when yields were lower. Producers using certain pivot irrigation systems should also use care when sampling the southwest edges of their circles. Dry winds depleted moisture and reduced yield and nitrogen utilization in these areas.

According to Dale Pennington, Extension soil chemist based in Lubbock,

fields under heavy nitrogen fertilization should have a profile sample. Pennington noted that recently a corn producer where 300 lbs/a of N was applied several years indicated that over 100 lbs/a of nitrate-nitrogen was present in the top 18 inches of soil. Here, fertilizer application can be reduced and still be adequate for a 10,000 lbs/a corn yield. On the other hand, another field fertilized at the same rate did not show the same level of nitrate build up. Nitrate-nitrogen levels were only 10 lbs/a. If the fields were fertilized the same, then the method of fertilization should be changed since it appears some nitrogen is being lost due to leaching.

Where cattle graze corn stubble producers are reminded that sampling in urine spots is a problem. If you have soil sample testing high in nitrogen that really does not make sense, resample field and have field retested for nitrogen. Many times, the laboratory will suggest a resample if an analysis appears out of line.

Mailing cartons and instructions for soil sampling are available at the Floyd County Extension Office located east of the Courthouse in the Agriculture Building.

## Today's Lifestyles

ARE YOU AND YOUR FAMILY 'GOOD EATERS?' Eat a balanced diet based on the daily food guide to get enough nutrients. Nutrients most often lacking for all age groups are calcium, iron, magnesium and vitamin B6. These are the findings of the nationwide Food Consumption Survey, 1977-78, conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The survey provides nutritionists with information about food-related problems and deficiencies of certain nutrients in the diet. The first three nutrients found deficient in the diets were iron, calcium, and magnesium. Minerals are essential for either building or regulating the body and keeping it functioning properly.

Calcium is the most abundant mineral in the body. About 99 percent of the body's calcium is present in the bones and one percent in soft tissues (muscles, nerves, skin and connective fibers). Calcium helps clot the blood and regulate the heart beat and nervous and muscular systems. In teeth, calcium and phosphorus form crystals similar to those in bones to give them strength. These minerals in the diet are directly related to the hardness of the outer covering of the tooth (Enamel). Important calcium food sources are milk and other milk-group foods, such as cheese, cottage cheese and custard. Two or more servings of milk and milk-group foods provide 75 percent of the calcium needed. When milk-group foods are restricted in the diet due to allergies, intolerances or dislikes, it is hard to provide enough calcium from other foods. Other sources of calcium are dried fruits, leafy green vegetables, molasses and dried beans.

Obtain 15 percent of the needed calcium by eating four or more servings of fruit-and-vegetable group foods or 10 percent from eating two or more servings of the meat-group foods. Other food sources of calcium are eaten in small quantities. For example, it takes about five and one-half heads of lettuce, three and one-half pounds of liver, 22 eggs or eight ounces of cooked collards to provide

570 milligrams of calcium. Instead, drink two cups of milk a day for about the same amount of calcium.

Iron-deficiency anemia is one of the most prevalent nutritional problems today. Iron is found in small amounts in many foods. About one-third of the iron available to consumers comes from meat, poultry and fish. Almost as much comes from enriched bread and cereal products and about one-fifth from vegetables. Consider eating more dry beans, green leafy vegetables, enriched whole grains and cereals, dried fruits and organ meats.

Although magnesium is concentrated in the bones, it is present in all body tissues. It is an important part of enzymes which convert energy in the body. Heart and skeletal muscle and nervous tissue depend on a proper balance of calcium and magnesium. Dietary sources of magnesium vary from rich sources (cocoa, nuts, soybeans and whole grains), good sources (clams, cornmeal and spinach) to fair sources (oysters, crab, fresh peas and liver). Magnesium occurs widely in foods, but fruits, vegetables and cereal grains provide the highest amounts.

B6 is one of the B vitamins that help prevent anemia. It is also involved in the use of protein by the cells and is necessary for the conversion of tryptophan to niacin. The intake of this vitamin tends to increase with protein eaten because most animal-protein sources are good sources of vitamin B6. Fish such as salmon and mackerel are excellent sources. One serving of milk contributes one-third of the amount of vitamin B6 found in a serving of meat. Vegetarians should take special precautions against vitamin B6 deficiency. Vitamin B6 is not plentiful in grains, peas and beans, or in dairy products.

Remember, adults and children need four or more servings daily from the vegetable-fruit and bread-cereal groups and two or more two-to-three-ounce servings of meat-group foods. Children need two or more servings; teenagers, four or more servings; and adults, two or more servings from milk-group foods every day.





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## Beware of eye-threatening toys Prevent Blindness warns

If gifts for children are on your holiday shopping list, the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness urges that you select them with safety in mind.

"Over 26,000 eye injuries have been caused by toys in the past five years," reports Dwyer L. Wright, Society president. "Last year alone some 6,000 children had toy-related eye injuries. According to figures from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, the major causes were toy guns and toy weapons with projectiles (116), sling shots and sling propelled toys (137) and gas, or spring operated guns (whopping 1,335 injuries).

"It's sad that the toys that caused these and other injuries were purchased, for the most part, by parents who had wanted their gifts to bring pleasure to their children, not the pain that they did. Some children even suffered permanent vision loss from their injuries. But such unfortunate occurrences can be prevented this year if parents will select toys and games for their child's enjoyment from an

eye-safety point of view."

Wright made these recommendations for toy selection:

- \*Avoid toys with projectiles for sharp edges; they have a built-in threat to the eyes.

\*Avoid toys with detachable or removable parts that can fly into the eyes; this warning also includes mobiles for infant cribs.

\*Look for sturdy construction using shatterproof and non-flammable materials; be sure gears and springs are completely enclosed. It is better to pay more for one quality-constructed toy than a couple of cheap ones that are dangerous because they break so easily.

\*Make sure the child is old enough to handle the toy safely; three quarters of all toy-caused eye accidents occur to children under 15 years of age. Last year 1,913 youngsters in this age group suffered eye injuries from BB guns, darts and bows and arrows.

\*Thoroughly explain the safety risks and dangers of chemistry sets to older children and be sure the child understands them.

\*Also, after you purchase

the toys, watch what your children do with them; most accidents occur when youngsters are not supervised. Find out - are the children rough housing too much when using less eye-hazardous items as toy cars and trucks, even skateboards, all of which caused eye accidents last year? Are the children taking a "safe" toy and making it unsafe - for example, by pulling rubber tops off darts? Are older children keeping their more complex toys and games out of the reach of younger family members?

"Pick eye-safe toys this Christmas and show your children how to use them properly," Wright concluded. "In that way the gift you buy with hope of seeing your child's eyes light up on Christmas morning will never be the cause of dimming that light."







nursing home facilities and the other was the reorganization proposal by the MBFA group.

"We presented a plan that will pay our creditor's in full within five years," said executive secretary Douglass.

The plan is contingent on long-term financing and arrangements for a \$400,000 loan were being finalized, she said.

Chairman of the creditor's committee is Frank McGlaun of the McGlaun Office Supply Company in Lubbock. The other committee members are: T.R. Jewell, Jewell Family Enterprises of Arlington; Jerry Garoutte, Gentec Health Care; Tony Downey, Tice Food Service; Gary A. Ward, attorney representing Peterson & Associates; John K. Williams, Carpenter Paper Co.; Rod S. Hobson, Hobson & Associates, representing Sysco Foods; Robert Gale, Pharmacy Corp. of America, Inc.; and Jim Lueker, North Texas Health Facility Management Inc. of Dallas.

Operating under the umbrella company, MBFA Foundation, MBFA Management Consultant Services Corp. centralized operations for five subsidiary corporations. They are Associated

Memorial Homes, Texas Homemaker Service, MBFA Communications, MBFA Housing and West Texas Home Health Service.

Trustees of the Foundation were Land D. Wall, E. Harold Henderson, Claude Meadows, B.A. Hyatt and Charles Boyle. Chartered as a non-profit corporation March 12, 1968, the group created the West Texas Home Health Agency,

which serves 134 counties with offices in Lubbock, Dumas, Seymour, Abilene and Kerrville. This subsidiary was not included in the bankruptcy filing in hopes the well-established and reputable agency would be able to continue delivering home health care services.

While the ultimate fate of the Foundation rests in the hands of its creditors, plans are to sell the radio station in Floydada. Any sale must satisfy demands of the previous owner, Petty D. (Bo) Johnson. Johnson remains indebted to the owners of the original

equipment, B.A. Robertson, Marshall Formby and Alma Holmes. Olsen said several had expressed interest in the station and MBFA would continue to negotiate with Johnson for an acceptable sale price.

Meanwhile, the tower lights are blinking once again, courtesy of B.A. Robertson, although the airwaves remain silent at 900 kilohertz.

## FHS girls triumph in Lorenzo tourney

Floydada's girls basketball team put together a perfect 4-0 week that included the championship in the Lorenzo Tournament, a big victory at home and ran their season record to 9-2.

After dismissing Petersburg 58-20 at home Tuesday night, the Whirlettes reeled off three straight victories in the Lorenzo tournament capped with an exciting 52-51 come-from-behind win over Roosevelt in the finals.

## Check store policies before you buy that "Just Right" Christmas gift

The Christmas gift-buying season inevitably is followed by the post-Christmas gift-buying season, and most consumers expect to be able to return or exchange gifts with little or no trouble. However, perhaps, the inconvenience is that stores are not legally required to accept merchandise, or accept goods for store credit unless the item is defective or not as represented.

Most merchants, though, are very agreeable about adjustments since this is a time of customer service which encourages repeat business.

However, sometimes, certain stores may be unable to cooperate fully with the post-Christmas gift return because they operate under restrictive adjustment policies. Some stores will not accept merchandise back for a refund but will issue a credit or allow an exchange for other merchandise. They are rightfully so, so it is important for shoppers to check on store policy before buying gifts that may need to be returned or exchanged.

There are certain instances in which a store is legally required to make adjustments, however. For example, if a store advertised car seats with sheepskin linings, and you discover the lining is actually acrylic pile, you have the right to return the coat for an adjustment.

Or perhaps you ordered a size 12 dress, but the store sent a size 14. Or you specified a green table lamp, but got a blue floor lamp. The store must correct its error or make some satisfactory adjustment in such cases.

It's important to remember that if a store has advertised goods for a special sale, there may be a "no return" policy on that particular merchandise. Other items, such as pierced earrings, swim suits, undergarments, and other intimate apparel, may always be sold on an "all sales final" basis for the customer's protection. Once again, the shop-

per should inquire about the store's return policy on such merchandise.

Just as most stores try to cooperate in making adjustments when possible, most consumers are careful to ask for an adjustment only when it is needed. A few individuals, however, may attempt to return merchandise that is worn or used, that they damaged themselves, or that they purchased months earlier. In such cases, merchants may rightfully refuse to make an adjustment.

If you find you must return merchandise to a store, you

should:

—Take all tags, price labels, and all sales or charge receipts with you. A store that might otherwise give a full refund may only offer a credit or exchange or refuse any adjustment without proof of purchase.

—Return goods in their original containers, including all packing materials and papers, such as warranties and instructions.

—Return goods in their original condition.

—Return goods to the department where they were purchased or to the adjust-

ment desk if there is one.

—Explain the reasons for the return.

—If you have a problem with an adjustment you think is deserved, try to settle it with the manager of the store. If that doesn't work, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division in Austin, Houston, Dallas, El Paso, Lubbock, McAllen or San Antonio.

My daughter just got engaged and received an expensive diamond ring. They are not planning to be married for about a year and a half until the young man graduates. In the meantime, she will be living with us at home. I think I had better insure the ring but don't know how to go about it. How much will it cost?

For approximately the same cost, you can insure the ring through either your Homeowner's policy or through a "personal floater", an addition to that policy. The actual cost of coverage will depend on the value of the ring. You will need to obtain an appraisal from an accredited appraiser. Because of the effects of inflation and higher gold and diamond prices, many people are taking a second look at this type of coverage.

## Residents to receive Federal Income Tax packages

Taxpayers will receive their Federal income tax packages within the next two weeks, the Internal Revenue Service says.


The IRS sends taxpayers either a 1040 or 1040A package, depending on the form the taxpayer filed last year. Taxpayers who need to file a different form this year, because of a change in tax status, can pick up the proper form and schedules from their local IRS office, or from one of the many post offices that stock them. Extra forms are also available by using the order blank in the back of the tax package.

Whether taxpayers use the form the IRS sends them or order a different one, the IRS encourages use of both the pre-filled address label and pre-addressed, coded return envelope provided in the

originally mailed tax package. The label and envelope speed up the processing of the return, lessen the chance of making mistakes, and produce a faster refund for the taxpayer.


If there is a mistake on the label's information — the taxpayer's name, address, and social security number — or if the envelope is marked with the incorrect form number, the IRS said the taxpayer should make the necessary changes in ink.

The tax package contains complete instructions for filling out the tax return and any schedules which the taxpayer needs to use. If additional information is needed before deciding what credits, exemptions, or deductions should be claimed, there are over 90 free special publications that can be ordered by mail using the order form in the tax package, or by calling the IRS number listed in the local telephone directory. If more convenient, they can also be picked up at most IRS offices.




