Over Coffee

"Holly Dean, Dallas, representing Texans War on Drugs Committee will speak to interested citizens Friday, January 9, at 7 p.m. at Lighthouse Electric.'

That's the announcement that came in this week to the Hesperian along with a handful of printed material principally about marijuana and kids.

I came very close to marking the announcement for the "This Week" box and putting the informational sheets to one side.

But I didn't.

I read them. And I think you need to listen to some

of the things I found out. I know. Drug problem in Floyd

County? Hard to believe! I have lived along the Texas/Mexico border for over 20 years, and believe me

I know towns with drug problems. Floydada and Lockney aren't like those towns.

But did you know that the U.S. spent as much money on marijuana - \$40 billion a year - as is spent on imported oil? The drug industry ranks with General Motors, and Exxon - it's a \$50-60 billion dollar a year industry.

No matter how strong our families are, our schools are, our Churches are....any industry of that enormous proportions is going to find it's way into our towns.

The way it comes in is not through some sleasy dope peddler. Children scarcely ever see the classic pusher. They don't need him.

Marijuana passes from friend to friend, from sibling to sibling.

The atmosphere is friendly and fun-filled. Remember, many kids are convinced that marijuana is harmless. The illegal drug business has spread into every Texas community.

The most rapid movement is into the Junior High Schools. Sale of drugs is a giant merchandising machine that sells pot as the norm, the cool, almost the required behavior.

If that is hard for you to believe, ask yourselves these questions:

Do you really understand the lyrics of most of the rock music on your child's stereo? Would you guess, for instance, that the pleasant song praising "Job" for "taking away the blues" refers to Job brand marijuana rolling papers? Your child probably knows.

Did you notice the ads for the movie 'Up in Smoke'? The headline read, "Don't come straight to this movie." The kids got the message - come stoned.

Do you know where the nearest "headshop" is? Do you know what it is? Ask your child. Even non-users will know the answers.

Have you read High Times? Look for it on local newsstands, just one of a flock of glossy magazines and comic books dedicated to the drug culture.

Do you notice the drug jewelry (tiny coke spoon earrings and bracelets, "snort tube" necklaces) on T.V. --Johnny Carson Show and Gong Show, for instance: Junior-high kids don't miss them.

Are there illegal drugs and alcohol abuse in Floyd County?

Law enforcement officials tell us there is. Glue and paint sniffing are major juvenile problems.

Teachers, parents, and concerned citizens tell me that there are high school and junior high youngsters from every type of hon.e and background who are regularly drinking some kind of alcoholic beverage.

If they are getting ahold of and using liquor; marijuana and harder drugs are not far behind.

The schools are carrying on a program of drug prevention through films and health/science classes aimed directly at the students.

The churches are carrying on programs of strong youth involvement in healthy, constructive types of activities.

It now remains for the parents to be informed. It is imperative that as parents you educate yourselves about the effects of drugs, the availability of drugs, and local drug scene.

Drug usage affects non-users in negative ways as well as users.

Many people think that marijuana is relatively harmless. That seemed to be the opinion of the experts back in the sixties. But since 1976, four things have 1. Marijuana in 1981 is more potent

than marijuana in the 60's. It was mostly a wild weed with only about .2% THC (marijuana's major psycho active ingredient). Today's marijuana is cultivated and contains up to 4% THC.

2. Younger and younger children are smoking marijuana. Observers report that the average age for beginning users seems to have dropped to about

3. A mounting body of scientific evidence indicates significant physiologic changes caused by marijuana. 4. Longer experience in observing

young marijuana users has led many psychiatrists and doctors, including a number who originally thought marijuana relatively benign, to report serious personality changes, which they attribute to the drug.

Experts used to think that marijuana use was the sign of an unhappy child, but no more.

"Peer pressue rules the lives of adolescents, and today's peer pressure is overwhelmingly heavy for marijuana. Every child who wants friends will feel the pressure.

Ordinary good parenting seems no longer to be safeguard enough.

Parents in communities all over the state of Texas are studying and adapting techniques developed by organized Parent Peer Groups who have been highly successful in pulling their children back from the marijuana scene."

I don't know anymore about the Texans War on Drugs Committee than you do. But I've read their literature and it is my opinion that anyone in Floyd County that has any interest in youngsters should make every effort to be at Lighthouse Electric at 7 p.m. Friday, January 9.



Egg production may drop in '81

Total egg production for 1981 may decrease, as producers continue adjusting output to achieve a positive net return. Broiler and turkey production will expand in 1981 in response to higher prices and less competition from other meats. Poultry prices should be up sharply from this year's secondquarter lows, but record feed costs may hold profits near break-even levels at least through the first half of the year.

Egg production in 1980 will about equal a year earlier, the increase having occurred in the first quarter. Output in the fourth quarter may be near a year earlier, and indications 1-percent decline in the first half of 1981. The table egg flock is below year-earlier levels and, until well into 1981, fewer replacement pullets will be available. Because a high percentage of the flock has already been force-molted, producers are expected to increase culling if egg prices do not keep up with

Egg prices were down sharply in the second quarter but have since increased -mainly in response to production cuts from a year earlier. Cartoned New York large eggs in July-September averaged 70 cents a dozen, 5 cents above last year. Prices have increased this fall and will continue strong in early 1981 before declining seasonally in the spring. Prices may average in the high 70-cent range in the first quarter but then decline to the mid-70's in the spring. In the second half of 1981, if production is held at this year's level, prices can be expected to average 78 to 82 cents a


Output of federally inspected broiler meat for 1980 will total a little over 11 billion pounds, ready-to-cook weight, up 2 percent from last year. Output should continue expanding in 1981, perhaps around 6 percent. Production costs will be higher than in 1980, but strong red meat prices will likely keep broiler production profitable, particularly in the second half of the year.

Broiler prices have declined from the high summer levels but remain above last year. The nine-city wholesale price for the fourth quarter may be about 9 cents more than last year's average of 42 cents a pound. Prices may average in the low 50-cent range in the first quarter of 1981 and then rise slightly as demand increases seasonally next spring and

Injunction issued in envelope stuffing work-at-home project

U.S. District Judge Barefoot Sanders has issued a preliminary injunction allowing the United Sates Postal Service to detain incoming mail addressed to American Service Directory, American Service, and American Commercial Publications, at four separate Dallas addresses, pending the outcome of a Postal Service attempt to obtain a mail stop order for mail addressed to the companies.

The Postal Service claims that the three Dallas firms have misrepresented workat-home projects in advertisements soliciting home workers for envelope stuffing jobs. Classified advertisements placed by the companies in publications throughout the United States claimed that persons could make up to \$2500 per month addressing and stuffing envelopes at home. Other advertisements read, "Home addressers wanted, \$500 per week possible, no experience requir-

Flu season peeks in Jan

The flu usually takes one to three days to develop. When it does come out into the open, you may notice chills, fever, headache, backache, muscular pains and a loss of appetite. Your temperature may go up quickly during and first day of symptoms, and will gradually drop over a few days. Fever usually lasts for about three days, but it may go on for as

long as seven. As your fever drops, you may notice more stuffiness in your nose and the cough may continue. There might also be a pus in the discharges from your nose and throat. From that point on, however, you'll begin healing quickly.

While most patients recover completely within a week, many continue to feel unusually tired for some time. The standard remedies of getting plenty of rest, drinking fluids and taking

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
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
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
