## County tax roll victim of crash

"computer crash" has been blamed for the latest delay in completing the county tax roll for 1980. The date for mailing statements has now been set for March 1.

County commissioners have extended the 3% discount on taxes until March 15, which is the last date by law that a tax discount may be given.

The regular commissioners court session on Monday, February 9, the tax assessor-collector, Jonelle Fawver, was asked to appear and give reason for the delay in the tax billing.

Fawver said that a computer breakdown had occurred recently when the Floyd County tax rolls were being completed in Plainview.

Because of this, mistakes would appear. It was then necessary for the county tax office to check another proof roll against records for accuracy. This process has already been done once this year, and the tax office was already long overdue in completing the tax rolls.

Commissioner Bob Jarrett acted as chairman of the meeting in the absence of County Judge Choise Smith.

Jarrett asked Fawver when the statements would be sent out.

"It will be when we get those errors corrected and they give us the (completed) tax rolls," she said.

She then went on to say that she thought it would be close to the first of March before the statements would be mailed.

The commissioners then discussed rescinding the motion made at the December 8 court session to give a 3% discount in January, a 2% in February and a 1% in March.

Sam Spence moved that the motion be rescinded. Thomas Warren made the

motion that the discount of 3% be carried through until March 31, the last allowable tax discount date. Motion carried.

Fawver said that those few who had come in and paid taxes during this first week of February and only received a 2% discount would be corrected to receive the 3%.

Jarrett then asked Fawver if there was anything in the way of personnel or equipment that they could get for her "to help her along in completing this tax roll". Jarrett had also pledged this support on behalf of the court at their December session.

"Court will be more than willing to do whatever it takes," Jarrett said.

Fawver said that it would be harder to train someone new and that they were doing fine now.

Fortunately Floyd County has not had to borrow money to operate during this delay of tax billing. Commissioners said that they have "been running on reserve funds."

Also a portion of the taxes have been paid by property holders who volunteered to come in to the tax office and pay before receiving their official tax statement.

In other business before the court the Floydada First National Bank was approved as being the county depository for the coming year.

The landfill contract with the City of Floydada was approved.

Bids were opened on a loader for Precinct 3. Low bidder on a comparative 105 hip loader was Yellow House Machinery Co. The John Deere loader was purchased at \$45,543.

The county sold a tractor to high bidder H.M. (Rip) Pol, Lubbock, for \$811.56.

Bids were opened for a pickup truck for precinct 3. City Auto was low bidder at \$6085; Reed Ford was \$6544; and Oden was \$6385. Pickup will be purchased from City Auto.

The only bid on the sale of a dump truck which is in bad repair was made by City Auto at \$202. It was accepted.

The court voted to continue its regular session until 1 p.m. on Friday 13. Court will have to be in session at 3 p.m. that day for the public hearing on disbursement of revenue sharing funds.

Also Judge Smith will be back by then and able to sign papers which must be tended to only on regular court meeting days.

## Hongs become citizens

Last week the entrance to Caprock Hospital was decorated with small American flags. There were also flags in the corridors.

It was the hospital auxiliary and staff's way of congratulating Dr. and Mrs. Hong on their attaining U.S. Citizenship.

The certificate of citizenship was presented to the Hongs on Thursday, February 5, at the New Federal Build-

ing in Lubbock.

Friday morning, February 6, a reception was held in their honor at Caprock Hospital.

The cake, baked by Jean Jarrett, was decorated like an American flag.

Dr. Hong was presented with an authentic western hat.

The Hong's have two children. Susanna, the oldest, is nine and her

citizenship was automatically changed with that of her parents.

The youngest daughter, Esther, is five and was born in this country.

Dr. Hong and his family came to the United States from Korea in July of 1974. He had practiced in his home country both privately and, as is required, in the military service.

To be a surgeon in Korea a doctor must have a base at the hospital. This makes it very difficult Dr. Hong said. The political situation in Korea was another factor in his decision to come to the United States.

When they first arrived in this country they lived in New York City. Dr. Hong was required to serve an internship and residency in this country before being certified to practice here. This was done at Jamaica Hospital where he did general surgery.

He said that the medical system in this country is advanced, but that there is a great American influence in Korea. They used American textbooks for instance.

Mrs. Hong, Eunice, is a graduate of Ewha University in Korea. It is the largest woman's university in the world. Her degree was in elementary education.

The Hong's applied for citizenship in early September of 1979. However, it wasn't until July 22, 1980 that they were contacted for an interview. At that time they were questioned on such things as the constitution and their knowledge of governmental set-up in this country.

They then waited for the letter to arrive informing them that their certification was ready.

Each member of the family has taken an English name from the Bible.

Dr. Hong is now Samuel. His Korean name is Seung Kook. This was a hard name for the New Yorkers to pronounce so they called him S.K. Someone then asked him what the S.K. stood for.

"Stands for South Korean, of course," he told them.

## Deadline extended for farm disaster loans

(LUBBOCK) — The filing deadline for obtaining disaster loan assistance from the U.S. Small Business Administration has been extended for 60 days.

The filing deadline affects those who experienced drought damages to farms, ranches and related enterprises in Texas.

The new filing deadline is April 13, for physical drought losses - crop losses, pasture damages, loss of livestock, etc. For economic injury losses, the new deadline will be July 13. This extension will allow farmers more time to calculate losses due to a late harvest season.

The interest rates on SBA physical loss disaster loans are either 5% or 8 1/4% depending upon the borrower's financial ability. The lower rate will

apply to those who could not borrow from commercial, private or non-federal sources.

The interest rate on economic injury loans is 8 1/4%. Loan maturities are established by SBA Loan Officers in accordance with the applicant's ability to repay the loan.

## Challenge of '80s is cotton conference topic

(LUBBOCK) — Challenges facing cotton producers in the 1980s will be examined here February 17-19 during the five-state Western Cotton Production Conference.

The challenges will range from political policies and marketing opportunities to production techniques, financing and textile trends. Dr. James R. Supak, area cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said, Supak is program chairman for the annual conference.

The program will draw cotton producers and industry representatives from California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma. It is co-sponsored by the Southwest Five-State Cotton Growers Association and the Cooperative Extension Services of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California. General chairman is Joe D. Unfried of New Home, president of the Plains Cotton Growers.

The conference at the Hilton Inn will open at 8:25 a.m. February 17 with an analysis of the world outlook for cotton by Dr. Arlie Bowling, senior economist with the National Cotton Council, Memphis.

The Reagan Administration's viewpoint on agriculture, especially on cotton, will be presented by a yet-to-be-named spokesman.

Farm financing during the decade will be projected by Lloyd Cline of Lamesa, cotton producer and president of the First National Bank of Lamesa.

One of the industry's major concerns for the '80s, byssinosis or brown lung disease, will be discussed by Dr. I.W. Kirk, acting director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Science

and Education Administration southern regional research center at New Orleans.

Carl Weiler of Laveen, Arizona, chairman of the producer steering committee of the National Cotton Council, will report on farm programs for the '80s. Trends in textile and fashion production which will affect cotton will be discussed by Becky Saunders, Extension area clothing specialist, Amarillo.

Other sessions will focus on irrigation efficiency, weed control, cottonseed and lint quality, hybrids and varietal improvements, and insect management.

A panel of Texas growers will discuss their experiences in production planning and cost projection. Panelists will be Larry Shaw, Big Spring; Rudy Halfmann, Garden City; S.M. True, Plainview, and Marion Bowers, Seminole. Moderator will be Gary Condra, Extension area economist, Fort Stockton.

A panel of agricultural consultants and producers will discuss managing insect problems on the farm. On this panel will be consultant Olan Moore of Dimmitt and Dr. Jerry Coakley of Altus, Oklahoma, and growers Ronald Groves of Cotton Center and Morgan Nelson of Roswell, New Mexico. Moderator will be Dr. James Leser, Extension area cotton entomologist, Lubbock.

The final morning of the conference will be a tour of the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University, led by Dr. James Parker, director of the center.

## Cotton producers elect new director

Floyd County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a Producer Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a 7:00 a.m. breakfast meeting on Friday, February 20, at King's Restaurant, Floydada.

Announcement of the election comes from Ray Ferguson of Floydada, Floyd County Businessman Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Kenneth Wofford of Lockney, current Producer Director.

Each of the counties has two directors, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and businessmen are invited to the meeting. However, under PCG By-Laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election, give a review of current and planned PCG activities and answer questions about the organization and its objectives.

## Children victims of many farm accidents

(COLLEGE STATION) — Farm animals may be responsible for up to 10 percent of all farm and ranch injuries, with children often the victims.

Knowing and using proper farm animal handling methods can prevent many of these injuries, points out Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

He emphasizes the need to "use" known safe practices. Curiously enough, notes the engineer, even Bible scripture warns that "knowing how to charm a snake is of no use if you let the snake bite first."

Most animal-related accidents involve violation of simple, commonsense procedures, Nelson points out. So, he emphasizes a number of guidelines:

—Teach children to treat farm animals and pets with kindness and respect.

—Always expect the unexpected when handling animals.

—Don't permit anyone to tease, abuse or mistreat animals.

—Let animals know when you're around—don't startle them.

—Keep small, unsupervised children away from animal pens and pastures.

—Discourage youngsters from reaching through fences or pens to pet or feed animals. Some animals may bite or toss their heads, jamming a child's arm against the fence or pen.

Nelson says many accidental injuries

are also related to animal-carement. That means giving close attention to the following:

—Keep walking and working clear of ice, manure, mud and substances to reduce the risk of slipping.

—Keep pharmaceuticals and chemicals in a safe, preferably locked storage cabinet where children can't get at them. Put them as well as such as tools and buckets away from children after use.

—Keep pens, ladders, fences and chutes in good condition.

Shock hazards are also a real threat in wet or damp environments of confinement pens and buildings.

Ensure all electrical equipment is in good shape and properly grounded, says Nelson. Check wiring, service switch boxes, outlets and extension lines, and repair or replace faulty wiring.

Silos, manure pits and feed locations should also be off-limits to children. Keep them locked. Gas vapors given off from these places have killed many people.

Proper ventilation in these locations is also hazardous to workers, so proper ventilation and piratory protective equipment is essential.

Knowing all of these procedures, though, means little if they are not followed, emphasizes Nelson.

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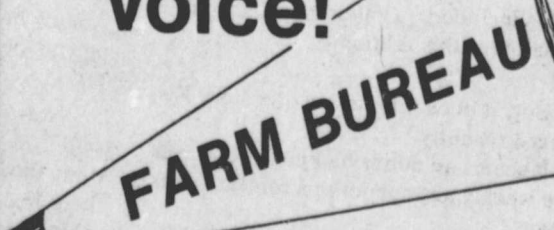
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# Hiway 70 robber is sentenced

Sammy Lee Holloway was sentenced Tuesday afternoon to 20 years in prison for the robbery of Hwy 70 Texaco in Lockney.

The grand jury met Monday, February 9, and Holloway was one of six who were indicted.

Represented by William E. Lee of Ralls, who was a court appointed attorney, Holloway waived arraignment and jury trial. He pled guilty to the charge and was sentenced Tuesday.

Holloway, in his early twenties, told Judge George Miller that he had finished high school and two years of Jr. College and that he was from Plainview.

He also testified that he had been in prison before. The charge that time was forgery.

Holloway remains in custody and will be transferred to the penal institution by Sheriff Fred Cardinal.

The other cases indicted by the twelve member grand jury were: Lorenzo De La Cruz for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle; Donald Ray Howell for theft of value of more than \$200 but less than \$1,000; Billy Ray Burks charged with forgery, and Guadalupe L. Rodriguez who was charged with burglary.

Of the six who were indicted Rodriguez is the only one out on bail.

De La Cruz was charged with taking a pickup belonging to Robert Torres.

Howell was charged with the robbery

of the R.B. Rosson residence. Some of the items stolen were silver coffee services, a stereo, and diamond rings.

Burks was charged with forging a check in the name Don MacCandle at Buddy's Super Market.

Rodriguez was charged with burglarizing the David Campbell property.

All five indicted will appear before Judge Miller at 2 p.m. on Friday, February 13, at the District Court Room for arraignment.

It is a fund raising event for the American Heart Association.

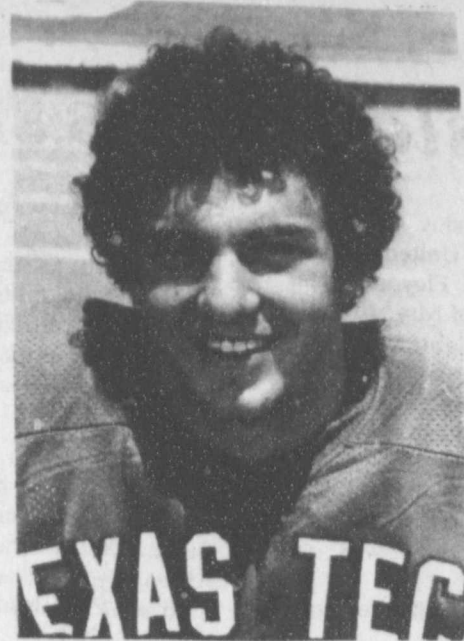
You can help make the day a success by making a donation for sponsoring one of the rock 'n rollers.

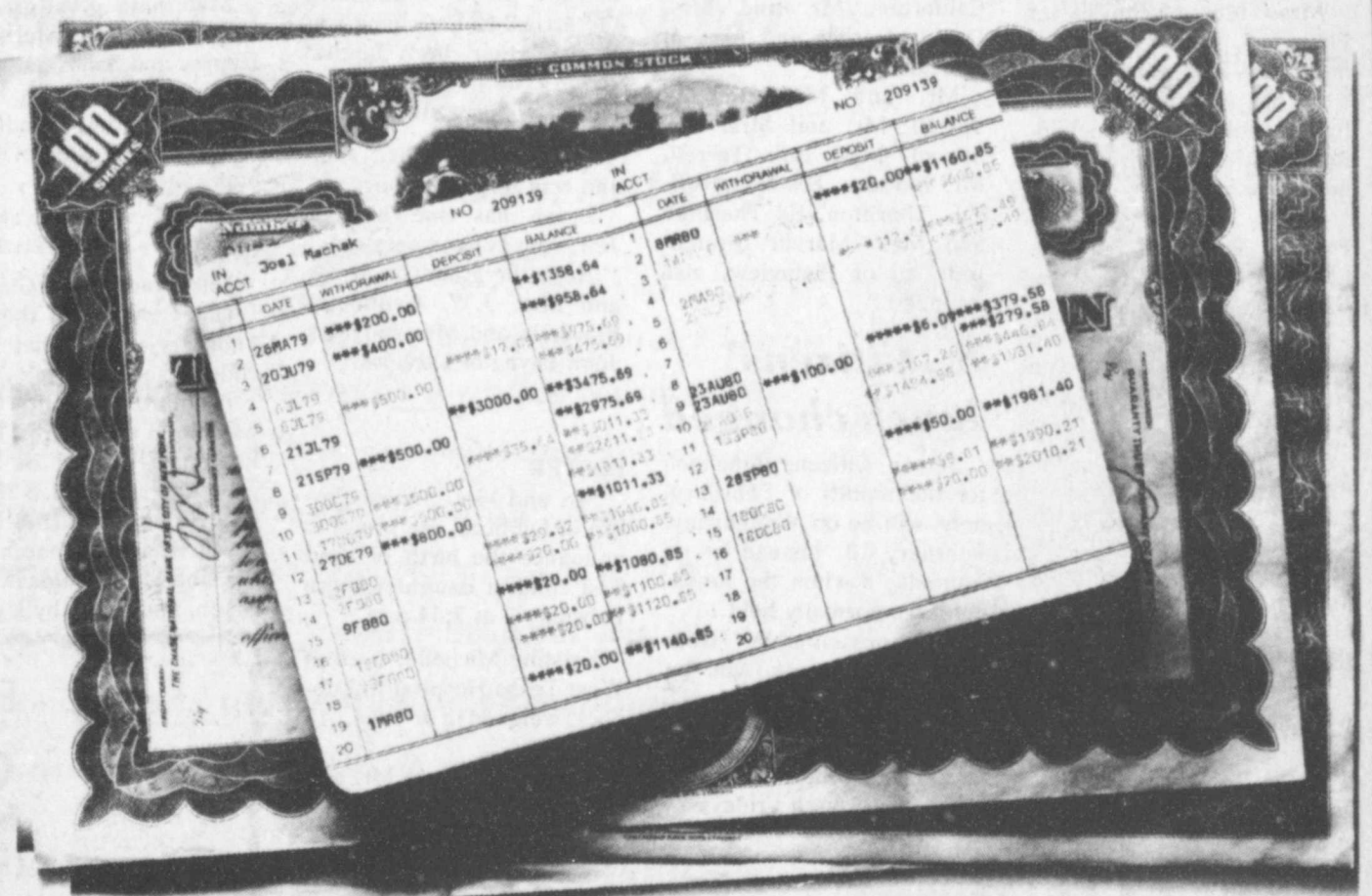

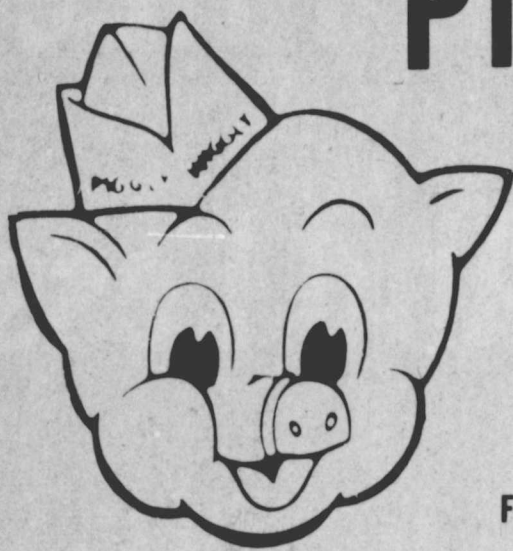

Modular storage units solve two problems ... more storage space plus storage which won't outlive its usefulness because of easy rearranging. A good beginning is making a set of 1' x 2' x 6' units, adding two or three shelves inside the unit as desired. Two 3/4" ash or birch 4' x 8' plywood sheets will usually make two to three cases. Cut the sheets so the good side of the wood will be on the inside of the cases. Make rabbit cuts at the corners and use dadoes to support the shelves. One-quarter inch plywood backs can be added if desired. Put together with glue and finishing nails. Paint or stain. Rough edges can be covered with 1/2" wood strips or wood tape. Different sizes and shapes add interest to any grouping.

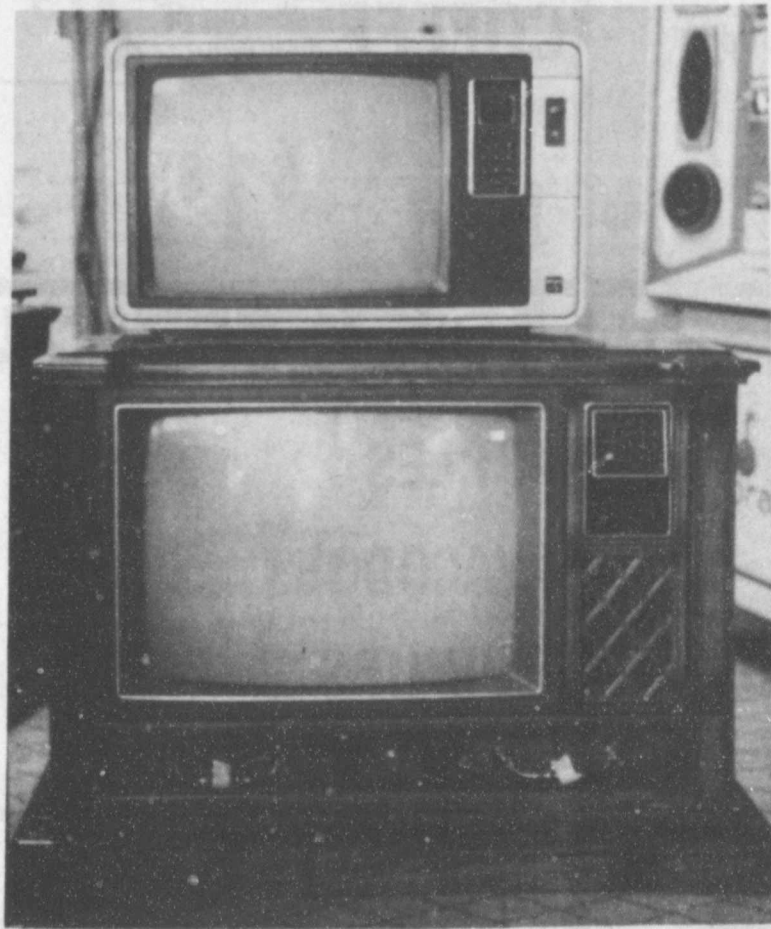

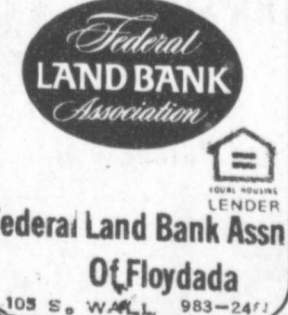

narrowed the lead within 3 points at the end of the third quarter.

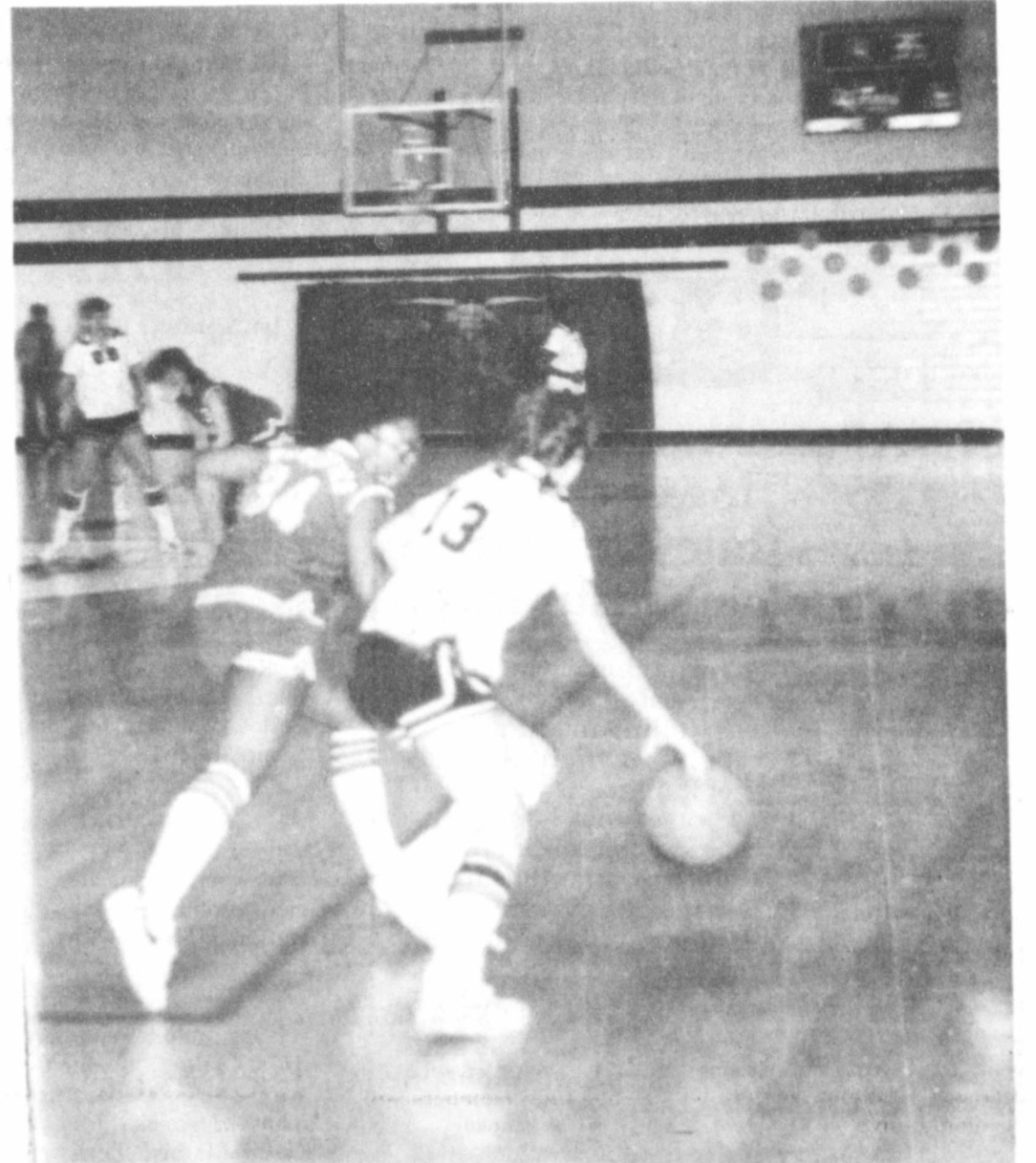
The Lady Horns then started to widen the lead in the final five minutes for a 55-39 victory.

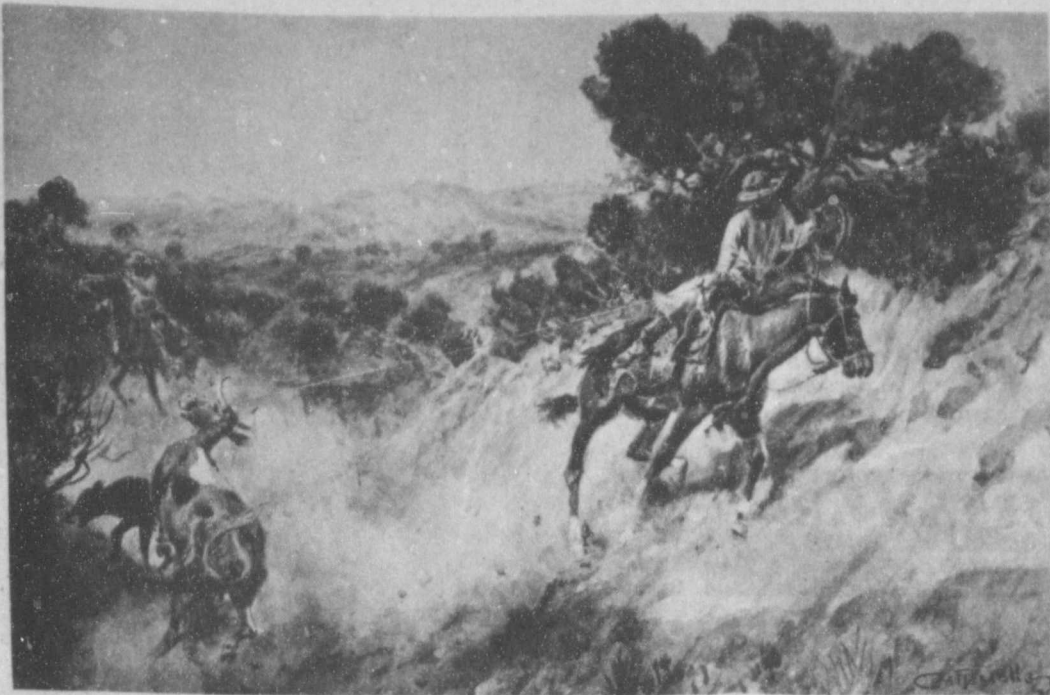

Notice is hereby given of a public hearing before the Texas Water Commission to consider the application of PLAINS WEATHER IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION, INC., P. O. Box 1627, Plainview, Texas 79072 (applicant), for a permit pursuant to §18.051, Texas Water Code, and Rules 156.11.01.001 et seq., to conduct an operation of weather modification for rainfall increase and hail damage reduction in portions of Castro, Lamb, Hale and Floyd Counties, Texas, for a duration of four years with actual activity to occur during the period from March 1 through October 31 of each year. This hearing is mandated by §18.081 (b), Texas Water Code.

Applicant, holder of Weather Modification License No. 81-3, filed its application in March, 1980, which set forth the proposed operation and described the area of intended operation to be within Castro County Election Precincts 6, 7, 10, 11 and 16; Lamb County Election Precincts 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 12, 13, 15 and 16; Hale County Election Precincts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15 and 17; and Floyd County Election Precincts 3, 4, 7, 16 and 18. As a result of Special Elections held on June 11, 1980, the area within the following election precincts must be excluded from coverage if a permit is issued: Castro County Precinct 11; Lamb County Precinct 3; Hale County Precincts 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 10 and 15; and Floyd County Precincts 3, 7, 16 and 18.

A Hearings examiner from the Texas Water Commission will hold a public hearing on this application beginning at 10:00 a.m. on March 11, 1981 at the American Legion Building Post 260, 111 Ash Street, Plainview, Texas to receive evidence on the application, the feasibility of the operation and the conditions under which a permit may be issued. Those persons desiring to participate in the hearing should appear prepared to proceed.

Any person who intends to offer prepared testimony at the public hearing shall prefile the testimony with the Chief Clerk of the Commission not less than five days prior to the hearing, and shall serve copies of prepared testimony on the applicant, the Executive Director and Public Interest Advocate of the Department of Water Resources and all other persons who have filed written protests or written requests not less than eight days prior to the hearing. The Commission may authorize the late filing of prepared testimony upon a showing of good cause and extenuating circumstances. Any person who desires to receive prepared testimony shall file a written protest or written request with the Commission not less than eight days prior to the hearing.

Those persons opposing the granting of this application may appear at the hearing and/or, not less than eight days before the hearing date, may file written protests with the Commission and serve copies on the applicant and all designated parties, if any, with proof of service to be provided to the Commission. Written protests shall contain the name and address of the protestant, an identification of the pending application, the basis of the protestant's interest with allegations of any relevant facts and conclusions, a description of the protestant's property relative to the application and any amendments or adjustments to the application which would result in a withdrawal of the protest. The written protest will be noted by the Examiner but will not be considered as evidence since the right to cross-examine is absent. No protestant will be admitted as a party to the proceeding unless the protestant complies with Commission Rule 155.04.00.001 which requires a justiciable interest and actual or representative presence at the hearing. Due to the technical nature of the hearing, it may be advisable for the protestant to have an expert witness available at the hearing.


After the hearing, a written proposal for decision will be prepared prior to submission of the application to the Commission for final decision. A copy of the proposal for decision will be mailed to all parties and to any other person who has made a written request for a copy. Parties may file exceptions to the findings and recommendations in the Examiner's proposal.

Some welcome news for beef raisers - and eaters - from the food and nutrition board of the national academy of sciences. Great exception was taken to the Report of Dietary Goals issued by the Senate Select Committee on Nutrition and Human Health. That board member, Dr. Robert Olsen, who is also professor of biochemistry at the St. Louis University School of Medicine, said that the report, which downgraded meats - particularly beef - as nutrient sources, was "just not true". Olsen also said that the consumer advocates of the 1970's "set his own rules". According to Olsen, the idea that beef will fall out of favor with the American homemaker during the 1980's is "ridiculous". He stated that beef contains a very small amount of saturated fat, and a small amount of cholesterol, but is a very important source of iron and protein.

# Pioneer has record earnings

(AMARILLO) — Strong performance in exploring for and producing oil and gas, in producing and selling natural gas liquids, and in supplying contract petroleum drilling services led Pioneer Corporation (NYSE) to record annual earnings for 1980.

The diversified energy resources corporation reported net income of \$90.6 million for the past year, an increase of 38 percent from 1979. Earnings per share for 1980 were \$2.44, up 36.3 percent from \$1.79 in 1979, adjusted for the Dec. 30 two-for-one stock split.

Pioneer's revenues for 1980 increased 24.5 percent.

Floyd County Chapter of the Red Cross will sponsor a Vital Blood Pressure class on March 1.

Red Cross Board Chairman O.M. Jr. announced this week that the class will be held at the Agriculture meeting room at the court-house one until five p.m.

County volunteer instructors will teach the class on how to take blood pressure as well as danger signs that a person should see his or her doctor.

The class is a self-paced course. Watson takes around three hours to complete. The students will read the workbook and answer questions. At the end of the course a practical test with a blood cuff and stethoscope.

Instructors for the class will be Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Marquis and Mrs. Q.D. Williams.

ture. The legislation is designed to make it more difficult to profit from the sale of drugs and drug paraphernalia. Representative Foster Whaley and Senator Ray Farabee support this legislation. To let your legislators know you support these bills, write to them.

H. Ross Perot, in a videotape discussion with the Dallas Junior League, described marijuana as the largest cash crop in California. It is a much stronger type of marijuana than was used ten years ago because it is now a highly refined hybrid.

The potent drug, THC, remains in the tissues of every cell, especially in brain tissue and gonads. Even a week after a marijuana joint is smoked, 30% to 50% of the THC is still in the body in active form. Reaction time for the motor skills, such as driving, is reduced by 41% after smoking one joint, by 63% after smoking two joints. Marijuana lowers the body's resistance to disease. White blood cell count is reduced 41% from normal levels with regular use of the drug.
