South Plains students build new field cleaner

(LEVELLAND) — What's green and weighs 1,000 pounds?

It's no joke to the five advanced welding students from South Plains College who spent an entire semester building a prototype of a half-ton field cleaner. The machine, which cleans cotton as it is being stripped, was dubbed an extractator by its inventor, farmer and businessman from Enochs, Texas, D.J. Cox.

When Cox first brought them the plans he'd drafted for the contraption, they were mystified.

"I used to farm with my dad and I'd never seen anything like it before," said Ralph Grasso of Hale Center. Fellow student Catarino "Cat" Soto of Meadow laughed. "I haven't been around farming too much, and I sure haven't seen anything like it."

"They were real hesitant about it at first," agreed their instructor, Odell Simmons, who assigned three others to work on the project as well — Bob Smith of Lockney, Mark Willis of Brownfield and Kevin Bird of Lorenzo. "They were halfway through the project before they knew what it was going to look like."

But the five plunged ahead anyway, using three full sheets of sheet metal (each is 180x40 feet), a variety of welding techniques and gallons of green paint to complete the cleaner, which fits onto the stripper.

Cox says his invention is able to remove about 30% of the dust and trash from the cotton as it is stripped, saving the farmer an estimated \$10-\$15 a bale at the gin.

It works something like this:

The cleaner's saw drum, which is larger than those found in cotton gins, is loaded with cotton by air and rotates from bottom to top. A sling-off action from the drum expels sticks, burrs and other trash from the cotton bolls, while a brush and fan combination transfers the cotton to a stripper basket.

The main saw cylinder gets out the initial burrs, a reclaiming unit takes the cotton through the same process again, and a kicker unit blows the cotton into the basket, explained Simmons.

"The machines was so large it

couldn't be turned but had to be welded as is," said Simmons, including the awkward overhead position.

Perhaps the hardest part was the precision required.

"It was a real slow process," said Soto, "because the bearings had to be mounted just right, like a 32nd of an inch so the cleaner wouldn't be lopsided."

For Mark Willis, it was "riveting the gin saws on the cylinder just right, so the saws won't hit the walls."

The machine includes two gin saws and 12 brushes, which are part of the kicking unit.

"But there weren't that many problems, though, for it was pretty well drawn up," explained Bob Smith, a 1979 graduate of Lockney High School and the 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Smith of Lockney.

When the young welders had completed the massive project, they were still skeptical. They didn't know if it would work.

But they switched it on, and yes, it worked.

"That's what's so beautiful with welding," said Soto. "When you're finished, it works."

Cox displayed the extractator last fall at the Panhandle South Plains Fair and used it on his cotton stripper as well. He plans to go into production this year in Levelland.

"I was real pleased with the cooperation I had at the College and the work the kids did on it."

Soto, who knew he was going to be a welder when he struck his first arc as a sophomore in high school, plans to go into underwater welding for awhile after graduation from SPC's welding program.

So does Ralph Grasso. "It's really dangerous work; the average life expectancy is a year and a half, but you can make \$75 an hour," he explained. Much of the welding is done on oil rig platforms in the oceans.

"Two welders went underwater for 157 days, came up and retired for life," he noted.

There are about as many branches of welding as there are branches sprouting from trees.

Around The County

Now is the time to start thinking about what you're going to plant in this year's garden and how much to plant for your size of family. Whatever the size garden you intend to have, think in terms of four basic requirements. First of all, you need sunlight because all vegetables need some sunlight. And, believe it or not, most vegetables must have full sunlight for highest yields of quality produce. Unless you are concentrating on leaf or bulb crops like broccoli, collards, spinach or onions, your crops need every ray of sunshine that is available.

The next thing to consider is closeness of your garden. Put it as near to the back door as possible. Make bringing home the fruits of your labor a pleasant and enjoyable chore. The out-of-sight, out-of-mind principle applies here. A garden does not demand constant care and attention, but it will thrive and do better if you visit it about once a day. If you do not check it regularly, many insects and diseases which are a problem in Floyd County or maybe even lack of water can destroy your garden in a short period of time. So put the garden close to the house where watching it will not be a hassle.

Next, consider the soil. Realistically, there is not much you can do about changing the type of soil you have in your yard. But, ideally, the soil should be fertile and easy to till, with just the right texture — a loose, well-drained, loamy soil. If your backyard soil does not meet those specifications 100 percent — and let's face it, not many soils in Floyd County do — don't panic. You can work it into shape without breaking your back. Existing plant nutrient levels in the soil should be determined by having your soil analyzed. Soil samples can be taken to the County Extension Office for testing with very little expense involved.

Avoid areas heavily infested with Johnsongrass, nutgrass and other weeds. Don't put your garden on a rocky ledge or in a poorly drained area. All of these things make gardening more difficult.

The next thing to consider is availability of water. Your garden should be near a spigot or at least easily reached with a garden hose. After the scorching, dry summer experienced in this region last year, I think everyone will agree that it doesn't always rain in Floyd County when it's needed. In a typical year, your garden will need watering about once a week.

After considering all of these things and you still want to grow a garden, now you are ready for the planting stage. The first step in planning is selecting vegetables you want to grow. Plant vegetables you like to eat. Avoid those that your family doesn't usually buy on trips to the local grocery store. With a few exceptions, you can plant almost anything in your garden you want.

If you are undecided about what to grow, give our office a call. We'll be glad to help you with information on what vegetables grow best here.

After you have made the decisions in step one, then step two is the tough part, but it's worth it. Make a rough diagram or drawing of your garden. Indicate the number of rows and vegetables you wish to plant. Also show the desired location of each crop in your garden, number of plants or feet of row you want to plant, and the best time to plant.

You will find the plan will help you make deadlines you would otherwise put off until it's too late, help you make decisions on what you need to buy at the local garden center or nursery, and put some order into your expected gardening activities.

All the rice in China may be going to buy U. S. wheat. When the final figures are in, U. S. D. A. experts who predict that China may "nudge" its way into the top ten U. S. markets for farm goods may have predictably red faces. It seems that China may well end up the third or fourth leading market for U. S. goods, with the October signing of the first grain trade agreement between the U. S. and China adding a tremendous leap to the upward climbing graph. Six to nine million tons of U. S. wheat are part of that bargain with China, which experienced a considerable crop shortfall in 1980 due to dry planting weather and below normal temperatures. That estimate places China's wheat production down 5.5 million tons from its 1979 mark of 60.5 million tons. A government plan for gradual expansion of livestock and poultry production to increase domestic consumption of meats has added additional pressure to China's grain needs. Any move in this direction could mean larger Chinese grain imports in the future.

Shoe care guidelines

Shoe care pays off, especially if you've invested in quality to begin with, says Ann Vanderpoorten, a clothing specialist.

Here are her "just-a-minute" shoe-care guidelines:

After each wearing brush or wipe shoes with a clean cloth or remove soil. Dust or grit left on shoes, especially leather ones, works its way into the finish, dulling and marring it.

Polish shoes after every five or six wearings to keep the color rich and the leather supple. Use a matching color or a neutral polish and buff to get a good shine.

Insert shoe trees into shoes to prevent toes from curling and wrinkling—and to allow free air circulation.

For boots, use boot trees or rolled newspapers. Alternate shoes instead of wearing the same pair every day. This will make shoes last longer, since it allows each pair to dry thoroughly before the next wearing.

Ease on shoes carefully. Use a shoehorn if needed to avoid breaking down the back of the shoe.

When heels begin to wear down, replace them right away. Once the leather itself is worn off the bottom, the shoe cannot be restored to its original appearance.

Fructose, also known as fruit sugar or levulose, offers food manufacturers an alternative to standard sweeteners. Most of the fructose manufactured in America is derived from corn syrup, making it a low-cost sweetener. Honey contains about 40 percent fructose while most fruits contain about five percent.

Fructose is approximately one-third sweeter than sucrose or table sugar. However, the relative sweetness of fructose depends on the type of food to which it is added. Fructose is sweetest when the temperature is decreased and acidity is increased. Because it is sweeter than sucrose, less is required for an equivalent amount of sweetness. Thus fewer calories are added than with sucrose.

Absorbed slowly from the gastrointestinal tract, fructose can be converted by the liver to glucose for utilization as energy. Therefore, it is important that diabetics calculate foods sweetened with fructose into the diet.

Fructose will probably not significantly change the incidence of caries or tooth decay. Bacteria in the oral cavity can utilize fructose just as they do sucrose.

ESTATE PLANNING — WHY A WILL?

Many people put off thinking about a will because they

don't like thinking about death, but that can mean trouble and major expenses for heirs. It can also mean the courts will dole out the property according to state law. Even in Texas, a community-property state, there is a need for a will — and an estate plan.

Inflation alone should be enough reason for people to write a will and plan their estate. Your estate may be much larger than you think thanks to inflation, more corporate fringe benefits and retirement programs, and the increasing value of homes and other real estate. If you don't say how you want all of this distributed, you can create a lot of trouble and expense for your heirs.

It generally costs more money to die without a will than it does if there is one. Delays in estate administration that result from "no will" require extra attorney services along with an increased fee. Also, court costs and other administration fees often are major expense items for the "no-will" estate. On the other hand, a will makes it possible to cut out many of the legal steps that would otherwise be required.

A "no-will" situation also leaves the heirs vulnerable to the full impact of estate and inheritance taxes. Of course,

the exact amount of death tax levied upon a particular estate is dependent upon the amount of money involved and the manner in which the estate is distributed, but a will can lessen the heavy impact of this taxation.

Making and continually revising an estate plan can lessen the tax amount even more. The Tax Reform Acts of 1976 and 1978 made significant changes in federal tax laws applicable to estates and trusts. An attorney familiar with estate planning can help you take advantage of the provisions that these laws offer. While estate planning and a will may not be the complete solution to the problems faced by survivors, it is a giant step in the right direction. You spend considerable time accumulating assets, so it's a "must" that you spend considerable time in planning the distribution of those assets to minimize the anxieties of your survivors.





As a result of Special Elections held on June 11, 1980, the area within the following election precincts must be excluded from coverage if a permit is issued: Castro County Precinct 11; Lamb County Precinct 3; Hale County Precincts 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 10 and 15; and Floyd County Precincts 3, 7, 16 and 18.

A Hearings examiner from the Texas Water Commission will hold a public hearing on this application beginning at 10:00 a.m. on March 11, 1981 at the American Legion Building Post 260, 111 Ash Street, Plainview, Texas to receive evidence on the application, the feasibility of the operation and the conditions under which a permit may be issued. Those persons desiring to participate in the hearing should appear prepared to proceed.

Written protests shall contain the name and address of the protestant, an identification of the pending application, the basis of the protestant's interest with allegations of any relevant facts and conclusions, a description of the protestant's property relative to the application and any amendments or adjustments to the application which would result in a withdrawal of the protest. The written protest will be noted by the Examiner but will not be considered as evidence since the right to cross-examine is absent. No protestant will be admitted as a party to the proceeding unless the protestant complies with Commission Rule 155.04.00.001 which requires a justiciable interest and actual or representative presence at the hearing.
