



# **Husband** is charged in attempted murder

A shooting in front of the Floyd County Jail resulted in the arrest and charge of attempted murder against a Floydada man. No one was injured in the April 30 incident.

The shooting was apparently provoked by a family argument as a 20. year-old man fired at least two shots from a 20 gauge shotgun.

Witnesses said that the first shot was fired approximately ten blocks from the jail. The young wife was in an automobile with two other persons when they were fired on by the husband n another car Apparently the wife got out of the car at the jail to make a complaint. At that time the young husband, from a position beside his car, fired a shot. No bullet hole was found according to

#### Sheriff Fred Cardinal.

Officers arrested the man a approximately 8:25 p.m. Thursday. Complaint was taken by District Attorney John R. Hollums filed in and the charge was attempted murder.

He played varsity football and was a team captain his senior year. Both junior and senior years he was sports editor for the school annual. He is a member of the Young



# Viewpoints New tax bill causes concern

#### **BY SHELLY HARRIS**

Concern this week led to confusion as officials of the newly formed Floyd County Appraisal District tried to figure the effect a new state house bill would have on them.

The confusion results from any layman trying to understand the workings of the legislature.

Three calls yesterday to Austin by this reporter resulted in a semi-knowledge of bill 602 which has passed, favorably, out of the ways and means committeed.

It is a taxing bill which would rescind bill 621 and restore the property tax to the way it was before the passing of Bill 621

If you are still with me, I will try to make this all clearer. Bill 621 is the one setting up the new appraisal district.

It is a 70 page bill that did a number of things one of which was that if the constitutional amendment was passed by the people in the November election it would set up a single appraisal district.

The amendment was indeed voted in by the people of Texas. The Bill 621 happened to be passed just shortly before the election so that it all came about at the same time

Called the Peveto Bill in honor of its author, Bill 621 brought about the re-evaluation, the re-appraisal, and will lead by 1982 to establishing a single appraisal district and a single taxing enity.

Now, as with anything of this scope, and as with anything dealing with taxes, there have been problems.

Lynn Nabers, representative from Brownwood, has introduced Bill 602 to the Ways and Means Committee, which would recend Bill 621 and restore the taxing procedures to the county tax office.

In talking with Cissy Woomer, from Nabers' office in Austin, she said "Lynn Nabers feels like there have been alot of problems in the #621 and that is has resulted in higher taxes." He has therefore introduced to recending Bill. She said that there is a three year phase-in period and that to go ahead will create more problems.

She explained that the next step in the progress of this Bill 602 will be to come before the Calendar Committee. They will vote whether or not to place it on the calendar. If it passes there it will be read on the house floor.

House members will then discuss the bill, make amendments and then vote on the bill as a whole with all the amendments.

This is called a second reading. If it passes that vote it will be read again the next day in what is called the third reading. If it passes there it goes to the Senate Finance Committee and the process is repeated. If the Senate passes the Bill on the third reading it will go to Governor Clements to be signed.

It seems a long way off before anything final will happen, and boggles the mind that Bills do make their way through all that maze. But they do. They get signed. They go into effect. Bill 621 did.

The woman who answered the phone at Whaley's office said that they have had numerous calls from throughout the district concerning this Bill 602.

It is interesting to note that the author of the Bill 621, Peveto, is also introducing a Bill 1465 as his effort to amend his own taxing bill. It has also been reported favorably out of committee.

WASHINGTON, D.C. -When Congress reconvenes after the current District Work Period, House members will be called upon to cast one of the most important votes of the year - approval of the first concurrent budget resolution. In all likelihood, there will

be two proposals considered by the full House, the House Budget Committee's (HBC) recommended budget and a bipartisan substitute that has the Administration's approval. I will be supporting the bipartisan plan.

That proposal, I believe, is superior to the budget reported by the HBC in every respect. It encompasses most of the changes that conservative Democrats recommended to the President when we visited the White House earlier this year. It restores full defense funding to the level recommended by the President and it reduces total outlays by \$6.1 billion below the level of the Reagan March 10th budget. It also adds money back for veterans' programs to bring the level of veterans' cuts to the level recommended by the Veterans Committee. Partial funding for the Economic Development Agency and Vocational Education programs are restored, as well.

Following the Budget Committee's approval of their proposal, there have been charges and counter-charges involving whether the Reagan economic assumptions used to formulate his spending plan or the differing House assumptions were the depth of those cut The assumptions a will probably be deha the year is over and the results are in. Whatever happened to CAP?

The infamous Lubbock anti-porn crusaders were in the headlines quite often for awhile. Perhaps they are still at work and the news media have given up on them.

In any case they have not yet succeeded in doing away with X-rated fare in Lubbock. Nor do I think they really will.

The reasons for such a pessimistic view are many. Our laws are vague, and the interpretations have been more vague. Many people think freedom means they may do and see as they

please, and nobody has any right to tell them otherwise. Others feel there is no intrinsic harm in pornography, and thus no need to regulate it.

Changing the laws will perhaps somewhat stem the tide, but will not completely do away with the production or distribution of porn. Nor will a change in the law cause any reduction in things as obscene as life, where people the sale of the softer varieties of the die daily of poverty, abuse, and stuff to children.

I remember when I was in junior high. I found it easy enough to find a store that would sell me a Playboy, even though at the time most merchants taken care of better. would not.

To eliminate pornography, we must eliminate the need for it. To do that means that people who are concerned about the problem must do more than demonstrate, they must also show compelling, logical reasons for eliminating porn.

Even more than this, they must be willing to change the hearts of people. If porn is offensive to God, then people must be brought to know God well enough that He can convince them He does not like it.

We must also examine our prejudices as to what is obscence. Traditionally, pornography has been limited to the expression of explicit sex.

Is that any more obscene than explicit violence - watching someone's head blown off in technicolor splendour?

Are either of those more obscene than a soap opera where people solve their problems by lying, cheating, and drinking?

For that matter, are any of these neglect?

Perhaps some are called to protest, but all are called to be disciples and make disciples. Let us be about those tasks, and all obscenities we face will be


dependence on foreign markets by U S producers, he believes agricultural exports are increasing sharply to both developing and centrally planned countries. While agreeing this is good, Cook cautions these are the most

politically volitile areas lending to a greater dollar risk. US agricultural exports rose from \$6.9 billion in 1970 to \$40.5 billion last year. A 3 percent increase in food and fiber demand is predicted in the next few years with world-

wide changes from a grain diet to one with more animal protein being part of the reason. Cook's statement emphasized increased agricultural production and decreased resources of energy, water, land and credit will be the key to future growth in agriculture.

**Colorful proof that Bluebonnets** will grow this far north

"Most of the flowers are volunteers," Mrs. Ross said. Small bunches of the plants scattered along the fence and sidewalk attest to the fact that the seeds. carried on the wind are planting themselves

A few years ago Ross, challenged by the opinion that Floydada is too far North to support the Bluebonnets, broadcast seed into his backyard.

The flowers not only came up but they have thrived. As one of the original board members

of the Mackenzie Water Authority, Ross, has been broadcasting Bluebonnet seeds at the lake site. "If they'll grow here, they will grow

at the lake, "Someday it (the park area) will be covered with the Bluebonnets.' he predicted.

The Bluebonnet, state flower of Texas, belongs in the pea family. The name comes from the tiny, deep

blue blossoms in the shape of a bonnet. A parade of wildflower enthusiasts They grow one above the other along have been admiring Bluebonnets at the the stem. It is an annual flower which blooms in the spring and is killed by the first frost in the fall. During the summer it drops seeds from which the next years flowers grow

> Wildflowers over the entire state are in abundance this year. The weather has favored the billions of seeds lying dormant by the side of the roads.

> Conditioned by nature to survive the past two years of dry spells they have simply awaited the right conditions.

The mild winter and timely rains we have experienced this past year plus the most important factor ... no late frost ... has produced a bumper crop of wildflowers

On our trip to College Station two weeks ago the flowers were magnificent. We saw more of the red. Indian Blankets than we did Bluebonnets.

The fact that we as Texas motorists can enjoy this year's wildflower show is because of alot of hard work and research done by the Texas Highway Department over the last 50 years.

Fred Pass, editor of the Texas Almanac, said that "It was in 1929 that highway people observed they were creating an environment for wildflowers habitat along highway right of ways. These flowers thrive on poor soil where they don't have much competition from other vegetation. And since roadways are built largely of fill dirt with little topsoil, bluebonnets and other varieties began to take over on the sites. At once, a policy was distributed throughout the highway system that was designed to

preserve and protect the propagation of wildflowers alongside highways."

There has been some criticism of the Department for mowing the roadsides. But this "is probably the only thing that has allowed the flowers to survive. Otherwise, other vegetation would take over and crowd them out."

Even with the price of gas, a short trip off the cap to see the roadside decoration is certainly worth it.

If you can't do that, perhaps the Ross will allow you to have a look at their wildflower garden.

CHICAGO - America's farmland is becoming the scene of an increasingly confusing battle during harvest time.

The TFU president said deregulation of natural gas prices could put many farmers out of business who rely on gas for their irrigation pumps. "Irrigated farming at this stage is marginal at best. If we double the price of natural gas, it will put a lot of them out of business," Moeller predicted. The TFU president said "the consumers of this state will have to suffer from higher

There's always been the issue: "What is the best combine?" But now complicating that question is the more recent controversy: "Which is better, the rotary or conventional machine?"

Presently, four North Americanbased companies offer rotary-type combines. Two companies are standing by their conventional models.

In an attempt to put International Harvester's Axial-Flow rotary combine into perspective, IH engineers involved with its development reviewed recent test data and specific patented features. Included were Donald Murray, chief engineer; Richard DePauw, machine design manager; and Robert Francis, product engineer.

The men began with a discussion of test data.

"IH conducted extensive tests during the Axial-Flow combine's development," said DePauw, "and the tests have been supplemented by outside results.'

Kansas State University agricultural engineers, for example, made field comparisons of the IH rotary combine and conventional machines operating in small grains in Kansas in 1978. The conclusions were reported at the 1978 winter meeting of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers.

The results included:

\*The Axial-Flow combine harvested more wheat per unit area at both high and moderate feed rates. At moderate feed rates on four series of trials, the Axial-Flow averaged a 4.5% yield advantage over the conventional combines

\*The Axial-Flow combine consistenly caused less crackage in all varieties of wheat harvested.

In summary, the Kansas State agricultural engineers stated: "Overall, we felt that the IH Axial-Flow Model 1460 combine performed very well. Although our experience thus far has been limited to this one machine, we are of the opinion that the development of the Axial-Flow principle for field combines will be recorded in history as a major milestone in the development of combines for small grain harvesting.'

The Japanese government tested an IH 1440 Axial-Flow in very high moisture wheat in 1980. Typical of test results was one where grain moisture, was 32.1% and straw moisture was 49.5%. The yield was 73.5 bushels per acre. Total grain loss from all causes, at an average speed of 3.4 mph, was only

"this means the Axial-Flow design reduces grain loss, crackage and dockage in the crops it is harvesting, regardless of conditions." The reason, he continued, is that the

single, large-diameter rotor is the only moving part in the entire threshing/ separating process. With its rasp bars, the rotor repeatedly threshes the crop as it swirls through the rotor cage.

"There is no cylinder, cylinder beater, beater grate, straw walkers or racks. have straight rasp These can cause grain damage and losses," added Francis. "On the other hand, the rotor's gentle rubbing action - repeated several times as the crop is moved in a spiral path over the concave and grate area - minimizes grain crackage while recovering a higher viding better control the threshing proce percentage of grain from the straw.

"Yet another concern to farmers is fuel consumption," Francis continued. "The best criteria for measuring fuel consumption is number of bushels or acres harvested per gallon of fuel. In a an enlarged chambe residue - straw, cob word, that's productivity. "In our own tests, we consistently

had more productivity per gallon of fuel used.'

One example: a 1480 Axial-Flow combine and a conventional IH 915 machine worked in the same rice field. The Axial-Flow used 9.26 gallons per acre, while the conventional used 12 gallons per acre.

"Two IH combines also were compared in soybeans. The 1460 used 1.01 gallons per acre while the 915 consumed 1.08 gallons per acre.'

"We are getting similar reports in other crops and in other countries," said DePauw.

One report received by the engineers was from a custom operator who had operated his own IH 1460 and a conventional, competitive machine.

The operator reported that he harvested almost 2,000 acres of wheat and over 600 acres of corn with his Axial-Flow. Reports from other countries include one from an Australian IH Axial-Flow owner. He said his IH Axial-Flow harvested 48 bags of sorghum per Imperial gallon of fuel. By contrast, his conventional combine harvested 46.5 bags per Imperial gallon.

Again, the Axial-Flow combine's design, according to DePauw, is the main reason it harvests more efficiently. And the design involves certain patented features.

The elusive causes and specific conditions that may inevitably cause grain dust explosions in grain elevators and feed mills are virtually impossible to "nail down" in every case, but not from the lack of financial and manpower support of the grain elevator industry.

grain dust explosions

Currently, more than \$1.6 million has been pledged by firms in the grain industry to conduct research for the purpose of identifying these causes and conditions. All of this money has been made available by private industry, including many grain firms that have facilities in Texas. Texas Grain and Feed Association has provided a \$10,000 donation. Texas A&M University is among the twenty universities, private firms, and research organizations currently engaged in specific research projects.

"The National Grain and Feed Association, through its 52 member Fire and Explosion Research Council, is guiding the efforts for this unprecedented grain industry financed research program. Today, 20 research projects totaling more than \$500,000 in industry donated funds have been awarded," according to National Grain and Feed Association spokesmen. "The Council is sponsoring practical research that has the best chance of yielding workable results that can be put to use immediately by grain and feed firms to maximize safety," they emphasize.

From recent attention-getting head-

lines and irresponsible statements made by various "headline grabbers" it would appear that there are more fatalities in the grain elevator industry due to dust explosions than in any other industry. According to USDA there have been 12 fatalities during 1979 and 1980 in grain elevator explosions, while the National Safety Council during 1979 reported a total of 13,200 fatalities in all industries with the construction industry responsible for 2,600, agriculture 1,900, manufacturing 1,800, and government related jobs 1,700. It would appear that with government related jobs accounting for 1,700 fatalities, more inspectors is not the answer. Until the conditions which prompt these explosions and the causes definitely identified, inspectors may be at a loss as to what to look for.




