Willson installed as Grand Master

Different titles are worn by different Floydadians. On Saturday night one of our citizens was bestowed with a title that is the only one of its kind in the state of Texas.

That title was given to J.M. (Jimmy) Willson as he was installed as Grand Master of Texas Masons. It is the highest office attainable in the Texas order.

Willson was elected from the 225,000 membership during a two day meeting of Masons in Waco December 4th and 5th.

The session ended Saturday with the installation ceremony. Many members of the Floydada Lodge attended the meeting.

Willson was born in Hale Center, attended school in Floydada, and graduated from Southern Methodist University in 1943 with a BBA degree. He served in the army from 1942 to 1946.

Willson, and his wife, Ann, have five children; and six grandchildren.

They are active members of the First Methodist Church of Floydada where he has served as Sunday school teacher for 18 years. He also serves as trustee of the church and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Home in Waco, and serves as treasurer of that body.

Active in community affairs, he has served three terms on the City Council of Floydada and two terms as mayor.

He is a member of the Rotary Club and has held many offices in that organization.

A past president of the Floydada Jaycees, he is also a past director of the Floydada and West Texas Chambers of Commerce.

He is a past commander of the American Legion Post in Floydada, and has been registered with the Boy Scouts of America for forty-eight years, having received the Eagle, Silver Beaver, and Distinguished Eagle Awards.

Willson was raised a Master Mason

in Floydada Lodge 712 on February 22, 1947, and served as Worshipful Master during the 1956-57 year. He served as District Deputy Grand Master of District 96 in 1958.

Other areas of service include three years as State Regional Conference Coordinator; three years as Area Workshop Chairman, Area E-3; and Chairman of the Finance Committee in 1978. He was elected Grand Junior Warden in 1978.

A member of Floydada Chapter No. 227 R.A.M., he served as High Priest in 1961-62. He was Deputy Grand High

Priest District 39 in 1963, and Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Texas in 1978.

Willson was coroneted with the 33rd Degree, Inspector General Honorary, at Dallas in December, 1965, and is a charter and life member of the Lubbock Scottish Rite Bodies. A life member of Khiva Shrine Temple, he is an honorary member of El Mina and Maskat Shrine Temples.

The year long duties of Grand Master will require a great deal of travel across the state of Texas; an occupation that Willson is well acquainted with.

Women's Chamber blood drive announced

The Womens Division of the Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring its annual Christmas Blood Drive on December 15 in the Community Room of the First National Bank from 4-7 p.m.

According to a Donor Resource Specialist, the need for blood is now a desperate situation. The Christmas holidays will add an additional burden to the already short supply for this area. Recently the South Plains Blood Service of Lubbock had to issue an emergency call for blood donors in order to meet routine demands.

Caprock Hospital is one of many area hospitals who benefit from this non-profit blood donor program. The patients of Caprock Hospital who need blood are charged only for the expenses of processing the blood — not the blood itself.

People between 17-and-65-years-old may donate blood. People over 65 years old may be accepted as donors at the discretion of the hospital.

You must weigh at least 110 pounds to give blood and it must have been at

least eight weeks since you last made a donation.

You may not give blood if you have or had:

- Hepatitis
- Current active disease of heart, lung, kidney, liver, stomach
- Internal malignancy (cancer) within past 10 years
- Diabetes requiring insulin
- Habituation to injectable drugs
- You may be temporarily deferred from giving blood if you have had:
 - Acute symptomatic flu, cold, or upper respiratory infection
 - Close contact with hepatitis in past 6 months
 - Tattoos in past 6 months
 - Active infection or disease presently requiring medication
 - Vaccinations in past 24 hours; some vaccinations have longer deferral periods
 - Major surgery or blood transfusion in past 6 months
 - Dental surgery in past 3 days
 - Pregnancy in past 6 weeks
 - Lived in malaria area in past 6 months

It is best that you eat a substantial meal before giving blood preferably one low in fats. Fasting is not recommended.

If you are taking vitamins, hormones, birth control pills, diet pills, antihypertensive medications, or antibiotics for acne, you may give blood unless otherwise deferred.

Blood bank personnel will also ask for your Social Security number for identification purposes.

First place winners and their divisions are: Matt Williams, Jr. snacks and desserts; Kellie LaBaume, Jr. Main Dish; Lisa Terrell, Jr. Breads and Cereals; Jodie Smith, Senior Snacks and Desserts; Deon Zumwalt, Senior Fruits and Vegetables; and Heather Holt, Senior Breads and Cereals.

Purpose of the Foods and Nutrition Project is to provide opportunities for members to learn basic nutrition, food buying, meal planning, food preparation, and storage information.

The scoring is based fifty-percent on the youngster's knowledge of nutrition. Twenty-five percent is on the food they have prepared for the show. This includes how the food is exhibited and how it is garnished.

The remaining quarter of the judging is based on the 4-H members preparation of a well-balanced one day menu. They are also judged on their project record from the different food classes they have been studying during the fall.



Sock Factory Opens In Crosbyton Saturday

Open House at the newly completed Texas Knitting, Inc. building in Crosbyton is this Saturday. Owners of the facility which will manufacture knit socks are natives of Floyd County.

Danny Bradford, president of the company, is the son of Marion Bradford, Floydada. His wife, Diane, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Fry, formerly of Lockney, but who now live

in Lubbock.

David Brotherton, the vice president, is the son of Mrs. C.L. Mooney, Lockney. His wife, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Smith, Lockney.

The plant was opened on a temporary basis in Crosbyton in April of this year. The permanent facilities were constructed at the Crosbyton Industrial Park, 2 1/2 miles south of the town.

The plant will be open for inspection from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. Saturday, December 12. Coffee and doughnuts will be served.

The installation, which has eight workers, and only one shift, is still in the infant stages.

The concept began as a dream of the two young men and Dr. Calvin Brints, a Crosbyton native and owner of Brints Cotton Co., Inc. in Lubbock. He had envisioned a sock producing factory in West Texas "for several years." He was introduced to Bradford and Brotherton who also had visions of a sock plant.

The result was Texas Knitting which will initially specialize in white athletic socks.

Bradford says that "as far as we know" this is the only such facility "west of the Mississippi."

The goal: A once-over cotton harvest, with higher quality. A tough act, but a major U.S. agriculture chemical company thinks they have the answer with a new boll opener. The company is careful to describe the product as a boll opener, not a defoliant. According to company scientists, it works best as a preconditioner used before a defoliant is applied. This means more defoliation can be expected. In a summary of test plots, the product showed first pick yields of up to 95 percent, three weeks earlier in the season, as compared to 75 percent from untreated fields. 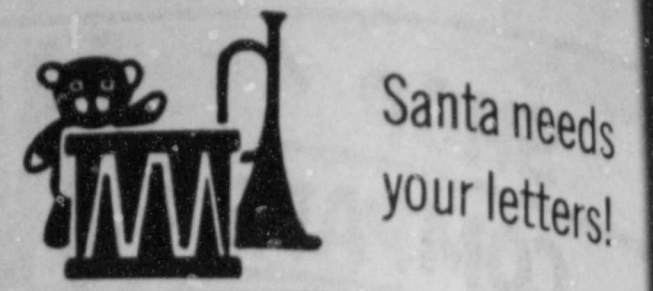

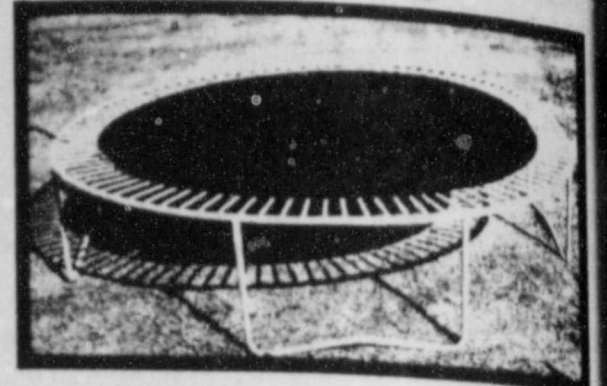
